## George Rowland Republican Chairman Here

George T. Rowland of Merkel has been appointed GOP precinct chairman of the Merkel precinct, precinct No. 24, with the appointment including precincts No. 25, No. 26, No. 27, making Merkel the center of Republican activities in Taylor county outside Abilene. The appointment was announced this week by Max Mossholder, Taylor county Chairman of the Republican Party of Texas.

"We plan a vigorous campaign on the behalf of President Eisenhower and Vice-President Nixon, and toward this end we have established a temporary headquarters in Merkel for precincts 25, 26 and 27. We invite not only Republicans, but Democrats for Eisenhower and Independents to co-operate in this effort. It has been a pleasure to visit various headquarters throughout the state and see the wonderful work that is being done towards President Eisenhower's re-election through the unified efforts of Republicans and Democrats for Eisenhower," Rowland said.

## Poage Speaks To Rotarians In Stamford

W. R. (Bob) Poage, Congressman from Waco, was speaker for a farm clinic meeting sponsored by the Stamford Rotary Club on Monday night.

The meeting was held at the National Guard armory building, immediately northeast of Stamford.

All farmers from Jones and surrounding counties were invited and special invitation was made to the farmers Union of Roby and Fisher county who had been wanting to hear Poage.

Congressman Omar Burleson introduced the speaker and state Senator David Rattliff of Stamford was master of ceremonies.

Jack Watson is president of the Rotary club and W. A. (Bill) Thompson is chairman of the rural-urban committee of the host club, which made the arrangements.

Mr. Poage, ranking member and vice chairman of the House committee on agriculture, is author of House Bill HR 8703 which is a self-financing cotton program to assure 90 per cent of parity to the farmer, but reduce the sale price of cotton through a sales tax on all textiles. He is considered probably the best informed individual in the nation on the needs and possible solutions from a legislative view, of the farm problem. This was his only appearance and statement on the farm problems during the current recess. The meeting, non-political in nature, was intended to assist farmers in reaching a decision as to current problems.

## December 31st Is Deadline Veterans Insurance

Veterans separated from active service since September 4, 1956, will not have 120 days in which to apply for 5-year term non-convertible GI insurance; they will have ONLY until December 31, 1956.

Robert W. Sisson, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office at Lubbock, Texas, said the new application deadline was set by the recent enacted Servicemen's and Veteran's Survivor Benefits Act (Publis Law 881, 84th Congress).

Before this law was enacted, Mr. Sisson said, eligible veterans had 120 days from separation in which to apply for the post service five-year term nonconvertible policy.

The new law ends issuance of this insurance effective January 1, 1957 and thereby established December 31, 1956 as the deadline for application, even though less than 120 days have elapsed since separation, Mr. Sisson said.

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## WILSON - A NEW PERSPECTIVE

One of the phenomena of American political life is our facility to rise to supreme heights of selfless dedication in times of stress only to plunge into the valley of forgetfulness once the danger has passed.

The post-World War I era presented an example of this paradoxical behavior of the American people and there is no better example in our history than Woodrow Wilson as the prototype of the leader of vision whose counsel was heeded and then seemingly forgotten.

In 1919-1920 a certain of silence and forgetfulness shrouded our wartime pledges to support international cooperation against future aggressors. This country tried desperately to forget the past. The fighting had ended and the "boys" brought home; the Treaty and the League were annihilated in the political arena; a "peacetime" administration replaced the "war" administration and the return to "normalcy" was confidently awaited.

But of course it was not to be. The old problems that gave rise to World War I began to reappear and assume an ever more threatening form. The country became uneasy and took tentative steps back towards its original wartime resolutions, only to retreat once more. World War II became an ever-growing cloud darkening the horizon that exploded in flames at Pearl Harbor and the myth of "independent isolation" was destroyed forever.

The Centennial Year of Woodrow Wilson has resulted in focusing attention anew upon this whole first period of our era. Indeed, the numerous activities — the ceremonies, memorial services, lecture exhibits, speeches, TV panel discussions, new books, magazine articles in the U. S. and many other countries — have resulted in a new perspective on the life of our 28th President and his era.

For example, for the first time since Wilson's death, there was high praise this year for Wilson from leaders of the political party which opposed him while in office. Members of the Congress on both sides of the aisle joined in establishing a Wilson Centennial Celebration Commission and in naming a new bridge in the nation's capital for Wilson. President Eisenhower issued a proclamation calling upon the American people to join in the Centennial commemoration.

To add but one other example, Governor McKeldin of Maryland recently reflected the new perspective of Wilson in these words:

"Washington, leaving the Presidency amid a storm of vilification and abuse; Lincoln, dead in the moment of victory; Wilson, broken and defeated in his supreme effort — these are typical of men so great that their true stature cannot be appreciated, or even seen, by their contemporaries."

In short, the Centennial activities are succeeding in presenting to that new and unprejudiced generation which has come of age since Wilson's time a better balanced picture not only of Wilson but also of America — her successes and her failures, her weaknesses and her strength. All of us cannot but profit from this.
