



## Nuclear Attack Book Available At County Agents

To help farmers survive a nuclear attack, county agents are being supplied a booklet "Defense Against Radioactive Fallout on the Farm."

"While those on the farms and ranches are not in the critical target areas," warns William L. McGill, state coordinator of defense and disaster relief, "many would be critically affected by radioactive fallout in the event of an enemy nuclear attack."

This pamphlet, U. S. D. A. Bulletin 2107, is an invaluable aid to rural survival.

Experiments have proven that dangerous fallouts occur in a cigar-shaped area downwind from the target. Generally speaking this could cover an area 140 miles long and up to 20 miles in width. Several factors determine the area where fallout would seriously threaten lives of persons and livestock: altitude of bomb burst, power and design of bomb, wind speed, etc.

The closer to earth that the explosion takes place, the greater will be the fallout because larger quantities of soil, rock, and debris are drawn up into the ascending cloud. After mixing with the highly radioactive material, particles fall back to the earth with the greatest hazard existing during the early hours following the explosion. The radiation hazard decreases with the passage of time because the radioactive materials decay, or gradually lose their ability to emit rays.

Since the fallout material resembles dirt or dust, some protection is afforded to livestock by trees; however, barns provide the best protection. Contaminated animals and poultry, in some instances, can be hosed with water and then housed in barns. Animals and poultry should be fed grain or hay which has not been con-

taminated, and given water from a covered storage tank or cistern for a few days. Vegetables and fruits will be contaminated in the fields and must be thoroughly washed.

Farm workers should remain indoors until the danger from fallout has diminished. Civil Defense officials will issue reports on the degree of danger from time to time. In most areas protective boots and gloves will permit workers to proceed with their chores in a relatively short time except where fallout is heaviest.

Here are a few pertinent pointers from the pamphlet:

Wash hands and face and change clothing immediately if you have been exposed to high concentrations of fallout.

Use packaged, canned, and bottled foods, as well as food protected by storage and refrigeration, they are least likely to be contaminated.

Milk is safe to use if cows have not been exposed to fallout. May be safe if cows have been exposed to fallout but are being fed uncontaminated feed.

Eggs are safe to use if poultry have been exposed to small amounts of fallout.

Potatoes and other root crops should be washed and peeled before used.

Wear protective clothing — hat, coat, boots, gloves, etc., the first few days you work outdoors. If you are plowing or cultivating dry land, or if you are harvesting corn, wear a dust filter over your nose and mouth.

## State Employees Retirement Plan To Be Voted On

AUSTIN — The voters of Texas will be called upon, Nov. 5, to make a decision in regards to changes in the retirement program of state employees.

Speaking in behalf of the issue, J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, said today, "The amendment, which will be the first one on a ballot of three, is not designed to 'give' the state employee additional retirement income, but is to achieve a more equitable and realistic approach to a program whereby he can pay for additional security beyond retirement."

Musick listed five outstanding advantages he considered the amendment had to offer:

1. The employee has the opportunity to select the highest salary he has received for five conse-

cutive years, of the past ten, as a basis for his retirement scale.

2. The amendment eliminates the inequity and controversy between prior service and contributory service. This is a technical distinction and under the new plan each employee is assured equitable treatment.

3. The amount paid in by lower salaried employees is reduced.

4. Allows a transitory period (10 years) wherein no employee should be deprived of previously accumulated benefits.

5. Reduces the employee's contribution from 5 to 4 1/2 percent and eliminates the \$3,600 ceiling that is imposed by the old plan.

6. The new program, although greatly improved, will not result in additional taxation.

"The amendment will be of particular benefit to the Texas Department of Public Safety," Musick said. "In that it will create a greater incentive for promotion and tenure of service, and will be of aid in recruiting more competent personnel."

Musick explained that he believed an adequate retirement program is one way we can offset the usual low salaries which state employees receive.

Of the other two amendments to be considered on November 5, one deals with an increase in payments to needy, aged persons. The third asks for a decision on whether or not the state should create a Texas Water Development Fund, for the conservation and development of water resources.

## Amon Clark Serving On Cargo Ship

U. S. SEVENTH FLEET (FHTNC) — Armon D. Clark seaman, USN, of 309 El Paso St., Merkel, Tex., is serving aboard the attack cargo ship USS Chlara now a part of the U. S. Seventh Fleet.

The Chlara's primary mission is to service ships of the Seventh Fleet. Carrying 4,000 tons of cargo in her five holds she is capable of transferring supplies to any

type of Navy ship underway. While in the Western Pacific the Chlara is scheduled to visit the Japanese ports of Yokosuka, Sasebo, Kobe and Nagoya.

# OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

By HUGH WILLIAMSON

This is the month that separates the outdoorsmen. Some are hunters, some fishermen, some both. How does a "both" man decide where to go — field or stream? I'll guess with you. He goes hunting, if in reach of the North Zone; his mind's ear hears the shotgun blast, and his mind's eye sees the birds fall. But some of our outdoorsmen will stick to their fishing. They'll

figure that now September's here the fish will be a little bit more cooperative, maybe. Also shrewdly, they'll think the best fishing spots may be less crowded, what with the hunters gone to the sunflower patch. Let's talk about both of those guys — the fisherman first. He is concerned about the black bass, and that fish has been suffering his usual case of the summer sulks. He has been playing it cozy.

down deep where the water is cool, moving around very little, using up not much energy and requiring a minimum of food. But he can be had.

Old time anglers are getting bass, these hot days, by fishing deep with minnows or plugs. Deep trolling also pays off.

The Hellbender has been a productive lure at Lakes Whitney, Texhoma, Possum Kingdom, and the Highland Lakes of Central Texas. Work it deep and slow.

The big bass are down deep as they can get to keep cool, but they have to stay above the "dead" water where the oxygen content is too low.

That may be 20 to 30 feet down, but you'll have to experiment to find the right depth in your own favorite fishing hole. All depends on the water temperature and the oxygen content of the water.

If the first norther of autumn hits before this gets into print — change signals.

When that happens, your lake or stream will "turn over." That means when the surface is colder than the bottom, the top, cold water will sink and the bottom, warmer water will rise to the top. Look for that day! When it comes, get out your top water lures and be confident of getting bass if you are fishing in good waters and using your bait adroitly.

Meanwhile, the bass will hit surface lures, even in hot weather. Try them early in the morning or in late afternoon. Or at night.

**Now About Whites**

That's black bass we've been talking about. Now, what about the white bass?

All summer, these fish have been congregating in the swift water below dams eating their fill of shad that abound in such waters.

Many fishermen have caught limit strings of white bass all through the summer, fishing in the fast water. But now, this kind of fishing has dropped off. What's the trouble?

Well, the spring-born shad are now getting a little too big for the whites to handle. So the fish are drifting downstream, looking for other food.

They will be moving a lot. But if your minnow or spoon is there there — in the right place at the right time — you will be in business in a big way.

Work your bait deep, where the water is cool, using the same technique as for blacks.

**Work Lures Slowly**

I suspect that most anglers work their lures too fast.

Fish like action, but they like it slow. To give an example, my fishing partner and I catch good strings of bass in the Highland Lakes of Central Texas, using minnows, either free swimming or with a light split shot.

This is the procedure: toss the minnow out there in bass water and let him swim. Put the rod down and pour a cup of coffee out of the Thermos. Maybe you get a strike, maybe not.

But pick up that rod and begin reeling in — very, very slowly. Pretty soon, here come a little tug. Don't get excited. Wait.

Reel in some more — very slowly. Another tug, maybe harder this time. Don't strike yet, wait him out. You can feel when

he is on. Then strike, hard. Result: bass.

**Trotline Technique**

Well, about catfishing: how often do you run your trotline?

The experts are at odds on this point. Some of them give the line a test every hour or two — others allow much more time for the catfish to get themselves hooked.

One experienced trotliner of my acquaintance belongs to the long-wait school of thought.

He reasons that a big, heavy, lazy catfish will take his own sweet time with a bream or other bait. He nibbles at it, nudges it around, contemplates it, and takes it (maybe) when the notion strikes him.

I am inclined to go along with this easy-does-it kind of catfishing.

Fishing is not much of a hurry-up proposition, anyhow. You've got to relax to catch fish. And learning to relax is maybe the best thing about this sport.

**Dove Shooters Proper**

Turning to the hunting situation — reports coming in here say the North Zone shooters are doing pretty well, and there are plenty of birds, though some are small.

Scattered rans around the state have not been heavy enough to change the birds' watering habits. One complaint of the dove hunters is that their birds fall in the dense sunflower patches and can't be found.

Whitewing hunters will be numerous in the Valley about now; the season being Sept. 13-15-17.
