New Herbicides Help Control Johnsongrass

Two new herbicides are available this year for use in area cornfields, reports an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

They are Accent, a Dupont product, and Beacon, made by Ciba Geigy. Both have proven excellent for controlling johnsongrass or shattercane in corn on the Texas High Plains, says Dr. Brent Bean, Extension Service agronomist in Amarillo.

Both herbicides are translocated throughout the plant and into the root system of johnsongrass, Bean said. "Where tests have been conducted, the population of johnsongrass has been markedly decreased the following year, indicating good root kill," he said.

The herbicides should be applied when corn is between four and 20 inches in height. Johnsongrass should be between six and 12 inches tall for maximum control. However, good control has been achieved when the herbicides were applied to 18-inch johnsongrass, the agronomist said.

Both herbicides are relatively

expensive with a full rate of each costing about \$18.50 an acre, Bean said. But he said in plots heavily infested with johnsongrass, he has observed increases in corn yield by as much as 150 bushels an acre after treatment.

The 1990-91 Muletrain yearbook was dedicated to John Gulley. This award was presented to Gulley, by the annual staff, at the awards program held recently.

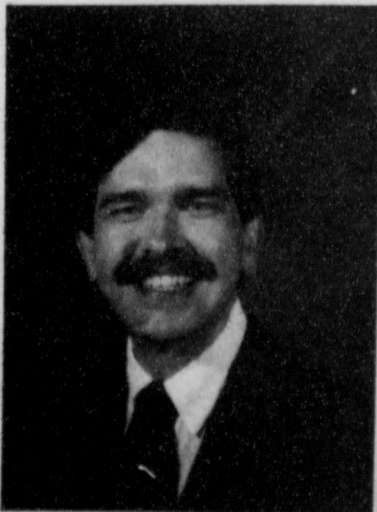
Gulley attended Texas Tech University and gained his degree in Foreign Language. He now teaches Spanish II and French.

Family Night

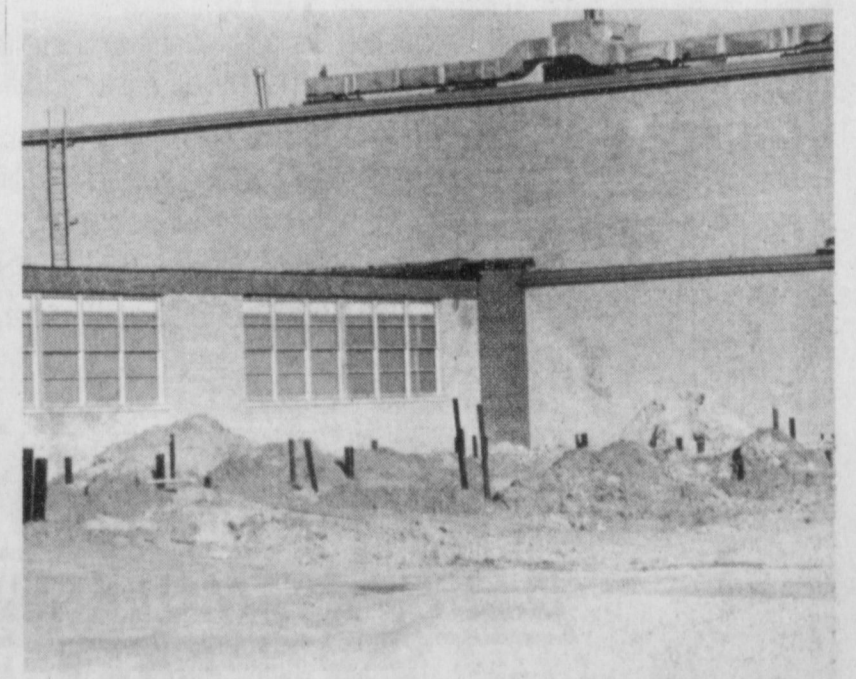

Introductory Computer Course Offered At Halfway

A computer spreadsheet software program allows farmers to do basic record keeping, financial planning and budgeting and is something no producer using computers should be without, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To help farmers use this versatile tool, the Extension Service will conduct a two-day shortcourse here June 6-7 on the most popular of the spreadsheet programs, Lotus 1-2-3. It will be taught at the new Texas A&M University System Computer Training and Education Center at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station facility, 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. Hwy. 70.

Registration will be limited to 14 to allow hands-on participation. Training is from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day. The fee of \$100 includes workshop materials and catered lunches. Motel accommodations are available in Plainview.

"Spreadsheets allow the user to do 'computer programming' without learning a computer language," said Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension Service economist and management specialist, who will conduct the shortcourse. "It lets the user address problems specific to his needs and situation."

Leading computer software spreadsheet programs include Visi Calc, Super Calc, Quattro and Excel, but the all time best

seller of such programs is Lotus 1-2-3, Smith said.

"This two-day course will provide an opportunity to learn the basics of building and using SPREADSHEETS WITH Lotus 1-2-3," Smith said.

Participants will build some crop and cash flow budgets as well as use spreadsheets already built by others. No prior computer experience is necessary.

Computer spreadsheets are basically blank computer screens which can be used like a pad, pencil, eraser and calculator, the Extension Service economist explained.

"However, unlike numbers set down on a piece of paper, values set down on the

electronic screen can be altered and all dependent values recalculated instantly."

Spreadsheet programs are widely used by farmers to help make decisions, Smith said. Some of the best applications include cash flow budgeting, crop and livestock enterprise budgeting, and farm program analysis.

"The spreadsheet allows the user to quickly evaluate numerous possible outcomes for several different combinations of prices, yields and other factors in a cash flow or crop budget," Smith said.

Additional information about the shortcourse is available from local county extension agents or by telephoning Smith at Lubbock, (806) 746-6101.

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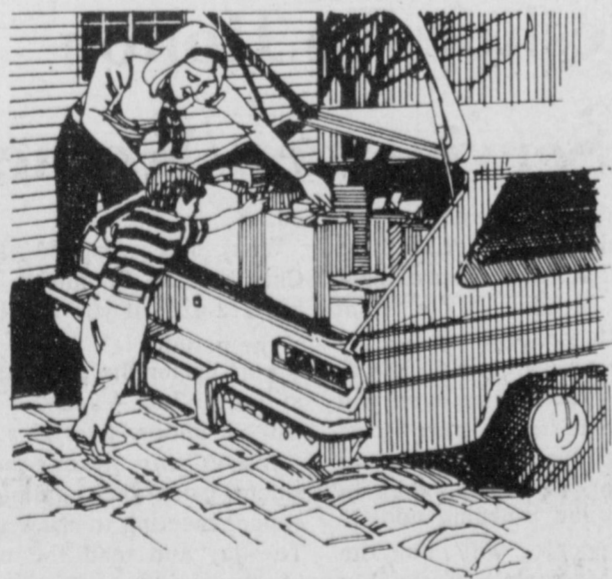
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DeShazo Awards Assembly Enjoyed

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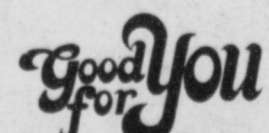

A crop oil or surfactant should be added to the treatment to improve plant absorption of the herbicides, he said.

The labeled rate of Beacon is 0.76 ounce applied in a single application, or an initial application of 0.38 ounce followed by a second application of 0.38 ounce if regrowth occurs. A recent change in the Beacon label allows for the second application to be made up to corn tasseling.

The Extension Service agronomist said that under good growing conditions, he has observed season long control with the initial 0.38 ounce treatment.

"However, under stressed conditions, the second 0.38 ounce treatment will be necessary and may be superior to a single application at the full 0.76 ounce rate," Bean said.

Texas Producers Gearing Up For Another Year

Railroad Commissioner James E. (Jim) Nugent told Panhandle producers today that the state is swimming in natural gas reserves, a tide of demand for the clean-burning fuel will be building, and Texas producers and regulators must be ready to "catch the wave."

Delivering the featured address at the annual meeting of the Panhandle Producers and Royalty Owners Association, Nugent said state and federal clean air legislation already on the books will mandate the conversion of hundreds of thousands of vehicles to natural gas in Texas and millions more nationwide. Also riding the clean air wave, many industries and electric utilities will be burning gas to comply with stricter emission standards.

"Natural gas service stations are starting to appear in the state," Nugent said. "And legislation has been filed in Austin giving electric utilities some real financial incentives to burn gas instead of oil or coal. There's a wave of demand building, but we've got some work to do to catch it."

One of the first things that

needs to be done is chop away at the tangle of rules and regulations that grown up over the years at the Commission, according to Nugent.

"Instead of building a firm base of support for natural gas producers, our complex maze of rules have actually hindered their ability to grab markets," Nugent said. "Sophisticated producers who can master the labyrinth of rules and regulations gain unfair advantage," he said. "They can increase their share of production in a field at the expense of other operators. They can catch the wave while others drown."

Nugent said the Commission needs a fresh start, building from scratch a new system of rules governing the exploration for and production of natural gas in the state. "I believe we now have such a system before us in draft form and we need to move swiftly to implement it," he said.

The 12-year Commission veteran said the Commission is looking at a greatly simplified rules system that began with an outline he drafted last fall and had published in the *Texas Register*.

"We're looking at a simpler,

fairer, more accurate system that should boost producers' chances for catching the market wave while saving the Commission and industry about \$4 million a year in reduced regulatory and administrative costs," Nugent said.

A key feature of the new system is setting gas production for a year instead of month by month, according to the commissioner. Producers could plan production a year at a time which may encourage more stable, longer term contracts with pipelines and end users. They would also have the flexibility to raise and lower production as the tide of market demand ebbs and flows, Nugent said.

"Texas gas production has been in the doldrums for a decade," he said. "Finally, markets may be improving. We've got to be ready to catch the wave."
