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Women Scientists Vially Needed, March of Dimes Grantee Warns

Increasing numbers of young women must be encouraged to become medical research scientists. They are needed to make up the loss of men researchers who more and more are turning to electronics and other technical fields unrelated to the nation's health.

This is the view of Dr. Virginia Tennyson, a medical scientist herself, who sees the day near when there will be an acute and dangerous shortage of science laboratory talent unless hundreds of girls—now in high school or entering college—can be won over to science as a career.

Dr. Tennyson is an anatomist and electronmicroscopist at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York City. Under a National Foundation-March of Dimes grant, she is working today to determine what causes excess fluid in the brain of infants, one of the major birth defects (hydrocephalus) with which thousands of babies are born every year in the United States.

This dread disease leads to gross enlargement of the head, wasting away of the brain, loss of mental powers—often death. Dr. Tennyson has suggested that there is an advantage in having women in some laboratory studies.

"I think it fair to say that in some fields of scientific inquiry, women are better equipped by nature than are men. For instance, few will argue that women aren't more intuitive. In the laboratory, they are more inclined to respect a hunch, which is just another word for disciplined imagination and deduction. We women 'hunch' because we are determined to get a realistic answer.

"Then I also think," she said, "that women workers in science are inclined to be more patient than men researchers. Perhaps it's debatable, but I seem to find, too, that women are more likely to persevere, less prone to give up because of boredom and tedium."

Dr. Tennyson mentioned that The National Foundation offers

today post-doctoral fellowships to promising young individuals preparing for careers in science. In addition to offering aid to prospective research scientists, The National Foundation is taking steps to interest young persons in entering the allied health professions. Under this program, the health organization has awarded almost 1,300 scholarships (each worth \$2,000 if maintained for the full period of four years) in the fields of medicine, nursing, physical and occupational therapy, and medical social work.

The National Foundation offers 615 of these health scholarships each year to students in every state in the nation.

Since Dr. Tennyson is dedicated to the serious task of determining the "why" of hydrocephalus, a person might conceive of her as a granite-faced zealot, oblivious to all save laboratory test tubes, reports and microscopes.

Instead, this slim, auburn-haired and blue-eyed scientist looks like nothing so much as a professional model or dancer, and one endowed with humor. Her chief interests and training all relate to medical science, but when the occasion arises she can whip up the most epicurean crêpes suzette one

would ever hope to taste. She is also a talented amateur artist.

Young women on the threshold of a science career, Dr. Tennyson advises, should realize that in some laboratories exceptional demands are made of them in ability and natural scientific talent. Inevitably, they represent competition with their male colleagues. She puts it this way:

"If a young woman enters a science career with a 'feminist' chip on her shoulder—with the attitude of demanding her rights—she will doubtless arouse hostility, and so will meet with hostility. But I have found that most professional people will accord you more than your 'rights' if you have ability. If you do have it, it will be recognized. Appreciation of it shouldn't be forced down your colleagues' throats."

For all her preoccupation with birth defects research, a field The National Foundation entered in 1958, Dr. Tennyson says she tries to lead a life of "dynamic equilibrium, the rule we find in all nature. I don't spend all of my time with rabbits and mice and peering into a microscope. Fact is, I have so much equilibrium I even go skiing."

It's the Law in TEXAS



"GET OFF THE LINE."

Suppose that you have a party line telephone. One day your house catches fire—or some other grave emergency arises—and you try to call the fire department or the police. Others are using the party line. They refuse to yield the line to you. Your house burns down or the robber gets away.

What is the law on this? The 57th Texas Legislature passed a law which provides a fine up to \$500 (and/or confinement in county jail for up to one month) for refusing to surrender the use of a party line to permit another person to report a fire or summon police, medical or ambulance service in case of emergency.

An "emergency" means a situation in which property or human life is in jeopardy and the prompt summoning of aid is essential. This would include a fire, a robbery in progress, or a critically injured or ill person.

But don't be a smart aleck and ask for the line if there is no real emergency. The law also provides up to a \$500 fine and/or up to one month in jail for requesting the use of a party line

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on the pretext that emergency exists.

If you face a real emergency, want to call help and find the line busy, interrupt and explain briefly and clearly that an emergency exists. Identify yourself and ask the other parties to surrender the line so that you can call the fire department, police, or sheriff, as the case may be. If they refuse, you should insist on your right to the line, informing them that the law so provides.

Violations of this law should be reported promptly to the county attorney for prosecution.

In addition, if a person's property is damaged because someone refuses to yield the line, the property owner very likely may recover the damages in court.

62 Year Old Men And Women May Be Losing Money

Nobody wants to lose money. Yet this is happening every day, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., manager of the Abilene social security office.

This is true because many people who are 65 or older do not seem to know that they do not have to quit work completely to get all or some of their social security benefits during the year.

Under the social security law, if you are eligible for retirement benefits, you can earn up to \$1,200 a year and get a benefit check for all 12 months in the year. If you make more than \$1,200, you will still receive a check for any month in which you do not earn more than \$100 or do not render substantial ser-

VICES in self-employment.

In addition, even if you earn more than \$1,200 a year and work all months in the year, you may still get some benefit checks during the year. For earnings over \$1,200 and up to \$1,700, benefits are withheld on the basis of \$1 in benefits for each \$2 earned. On earnings over \$1,700, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$1 earned. Therefore, the benefits a person or family can actually receive when the person earns more than \$1,200 a year depends on both his total wages and the total amount of benefits due.

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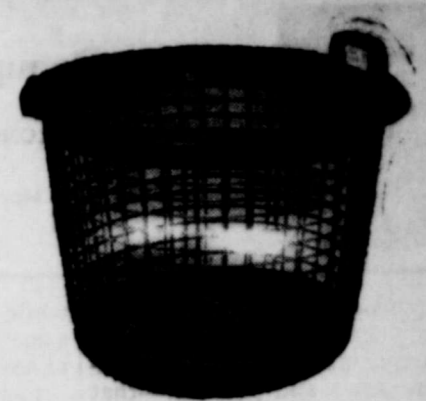

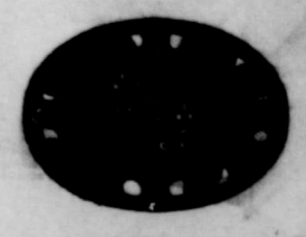
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Home Demonstration Notes

Every food contains some calories but some foods contain as many important nutrients — vitamins, minerals and protein — that every calorie is virtually "loaded." The calories in meat, eggs, vegetables, fruits, milk and whole grain or enriched cereals are loaded with such nutrients. That's why they are so important even in reducing diets, according to extension foods and nutrition specialists of the AM College of Texas.

Foods that contain a lot of fat and or sugar have less of the nutrients, but are high in calories. Excess calories can pile on pounds

while your body is starving for some of the needed vitamins, minerals and proteins.

Learn to choose "loaded" calories. It can mean better health, an improved morale and appearance.

Family members may enjoy rating their eating habits. A new Extension Leaflet, "Are You A Good Eater," provides an easy check list. It lists the foods needed daily and describes some of the most common symptoms for food deficiencies.

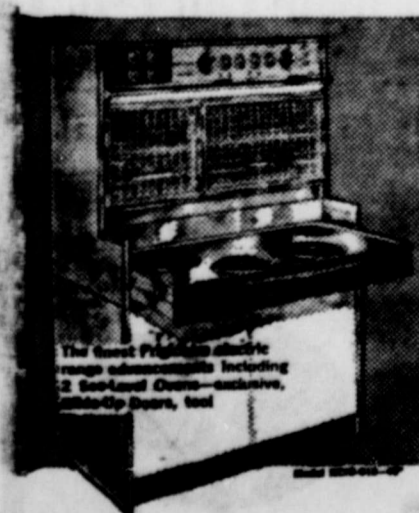

Sprinkle or crumble Fleischmann's Yeast into warm (not hot) water. Stir until dissolved. Scald milk. Pour into large mixing bowl or into large bowl of electric mixer. Add sugar, salt, and shortening. Cool until just lukewarm. Stir in one cup flour. Mix in dissolved yeast. Add egg and beat hard. Stir in 1 1/2 cups flour. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons of the remaining 1/4 cup flour on bread board or pastry cloth. Turn dough out on flour and knead, adding more flour as needed to make a soft dough. Knead until dough is smooth and satiny (about 5 minutes). Shape into smooth ball. Wash mixing bowl and grease lightly. Press top of dough ball into bowl, then turn dough over. Cover with damp cloth and let rise until doubled (about 2 hours). Punch down. Cover and let rest 5 to 10 minutes. Roll into a rectangle about 10" x 18".

Brush with melted butter. With spatula spread apricots on dough. Beginning with long side roll up like jelly roll. Seal edges together with fingers. Place on greased cookie sheet, making a circle with dough. With scissors, clip ring almost to cookie sheet leaving about 1 1/2 inches apart. Brush with remaining butter. Cover with damp cloth and let rise until doubled (about 1 hour). Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes. While still warm, glaze with Apricot Glaze and sprinkle with coconut.

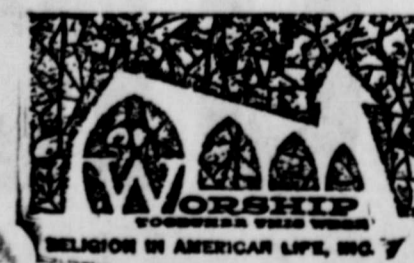

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Tex.—Storm clouds of protest boiled up quickly among consumers, clerks and merchants during the first week of application of Texas' almost-general sales tax.

Reaction was not so much against the cost of the new tax, but more to the principal, inconvenience and confusion. Natural resistance to any new levy always is evident, and there's certainly nothing "hidden" about a sales tax. Noticeable were strange new surpluses of pennies in pocket and purse. They were bothersome. Arguments also ensued over what is subject to tax, and what isn't.

Although State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert issued bulletin after bulletin explaining what is covered by the tax, it was evident that much time will have to pass before everyone concerned clearly understands the new law.

No one would venture a guess as to how many telephone calls were received by the Comptroller's office during the first week. The multitude of businessmen converging on the Capitol to seek information or lodge complaint gave Comptroller Calvert not a moment's peace.

Meanwhile at the other end of the line—the direct contact point for collection of the extra pennies—clerks, especially those in super-

markets, were equally harried. There had been so little time for them to bone up on the many exemptions and intricacies of the new way of taxing Texans.

Probably the most universal scheme to beat the tax emerged in coffee shops across the state. If the coffee tab for the group came to 25 cents or more, there was no sense in one person picking it up and having to pay an extra penny.

CHICKEN PRICES FIXED?—Texas chicken eaters who have been enjoying their favorite fare at phenomenally low market prices this summer have been given something to think about by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson.

"I want to determine if there is an effort to price the Texas poultry producer out of business," he said as he launched an investigation into the matter. "If our Texas broiler raisers are squeezed out of the market with below-cost prices, the ultimate result will be scarcity and sky-rocketing retail chicken prices."

Wilson said that since August, 1960, there has been a decline of some six cents per pound in the price paid broiler producers in Texas, to a low of 12 cents or less. He pointed out that 14 to 16 cents per pounds is the usual cost of raising broilers.

DRIVERS SLOW DOWN—State Highway Department survey indicates a continued slow-down in average speed on Texas highways. This year the study indicated an average of 55.3 miles per hour for passenger cars clocked by hidden radar at 25 locations over the state.

This compares with 55.9 mph in 1960, and 56.2 mph in 1959. Average speed for trucks was 50.1 mph, compared with 51.2 mph last year. Buses slowed down slightly from 60.7 mph last year to 60.5 mph in the recent survey.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR'S RACE SHAPING—Many eyes of Texans are beginning to look in the direction of the Lieutenant Governor's office, vacated by Ben Ramsey's appointment as Railroad Commissioner.

One candidate, Republican O.

W. Hayes of Temple, has announced he definitely will be in the race. Other definite possibilities include House Speaker James A. Turman of Guber, Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillshoro, Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr. of Paris, Sen. Preston Smith of Lubbock, Sen. Bob Baker of Houston and Don Yarborough of Houston. Yarborough ran against Ramsey last time.

NEW IDEA FOR PADRE ISLAND—Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler tossed a new idea into the breach of controversy over what should be done with the playland potential of beautiful Padre Island.

The beaches he said, should be turned into a state park—not over to the Federal government for a National Park as has been proposed. He said the proposed Federal project would take about 200,000 acres of submerged lands which already have yielded more than \$12,000,000 for the state's

of Abilene said.

TOUGHER SECURITY FOR GATESVILLE—Recent serious trouble at the Gatesville State School for Boys has led to tighter security measures.

Dr. James Turman, Executive Director of the Texas Youth Council, reports that horses and jeeps will soon be placed in service for patrol purposes, and men will be equipped with walkie-talkies.

"We want to give evidence of authority," he said.

Although guards will not be armed, he pointed out that "every man knows he can use physical force to control his company." He also noted that many problems will be eliminated with completion next year of a maximum security unit to be known as Mountain View School, one and one-half miles from the Gatesville school. A double fence with barbed wire on top will surround this unit.

"We are not dealing with Boy Scouts or Sunday School classes," said council member Robert W. Kneebone.

AUTOMATIC TAX CHECK DUE—Internal Revenue Commissioner Mortimer M. Caplin, on a recent visit to Austin dropped the hint that automation in the processing of income tax returns may ultimately eliminate spot-checks and permit scrutiny of every return in detail.

He said an automatic processing system soon will be put into service that will quickly spot individuals and business firms failing to file returns, check mathematical accuracy and other data.

Center of the tax accounting system will be in Martinsburg, West Virginia, where a master file of business and individual taxpayers will be contained. Returns from district offices will be sent to nine regional centers where data will be magnetic-taped to be sent to the computer center for processing.

Plucky Stevie Helps Science Toward Answer to Arthritis

For plucky Stevie Vardol, 10, life much of the time is just an unhappy succession of giving samples of his body to science.

But Stevie, who would rather be swimming and roller skating in Minneapolis (if he only could) than spending endless hours in the Children's Rheumatic Clinic of the University of Minnesota Medical School, doesn't feel sorry for himself. He knows he is doing a job that must be done: that the doctors' appraisal of the tissue samples from his swollen knees, specimens of knee-joint fluid, and of his blood may in time prevent in other children the affliction that befell him three painful years ago.

Stevie has juvenile rheumatoid arthritis in the knees, hands, wrists.

Throughout the nation, another 30,000 Stevies—or their small sisters—also suffer each year from this excruciating disease. With March of Dimes funds, The National Foundation (which made possible development of the Salk polio vaccine) is today supporting the University of Minnesota's Children's Rheumatism Clinic with a research grant. Other arthritis research projects are under way at the Rockefeller Institute, at New York University, the University of Buffalo and at other famed scientific institutions, all financed by the March of Dimes.

Additionally, The National Foundation has established arthritis study centers at Columbia University, the University of Rochester (N. Y.), the University of Texas at Dallas and the University of California at San Francisco.

The doctors confidently tell Stevie they will solve the enigma of rheumatoid arthritis in time, and find a preventive, given enough support. But they don't delude this valiant little boy or his puzzled father and mother who ask, despairingly, "Why should this happen to us, to Stevie?" The medical scientists look him squarely in the eye and say, "We just can't promise we'll make you well again. But then again, perhaps eventually we will."

Stevie's stout answer is to roll up his sleeve for another ten cc's of his blood (which contains an abnormal protein, a mark of his disease); or to pull up his trouser leg to give up another specimen of lubricating fluid from his knee.

In the laboratory, Stevie's blood is compared painstakingly to normal blood in the incessant search for an answer to what is wrong with Stevie and with the other 30,000 children. Perhaps what is wrong is an abnormal development of antibodies. Antibodies are the substance that combat bacteria. Then, samples of the connective tissue around his knees are studied and photographed under the giant electron microscope and compared to normal tissue.

Stevie doesn't cry although his doctors say that the pain he suffers at times beggars description. He is not a "guinea pig" in the full medical sense of the term. But the resolute and uncompromising bearing of this young gentleman of only 10 is evidence that he knows he is a volunteer of the fight against the nation's No. 1 Crippler—arthritis which, in one or another form, strikes at 11 million Americans.

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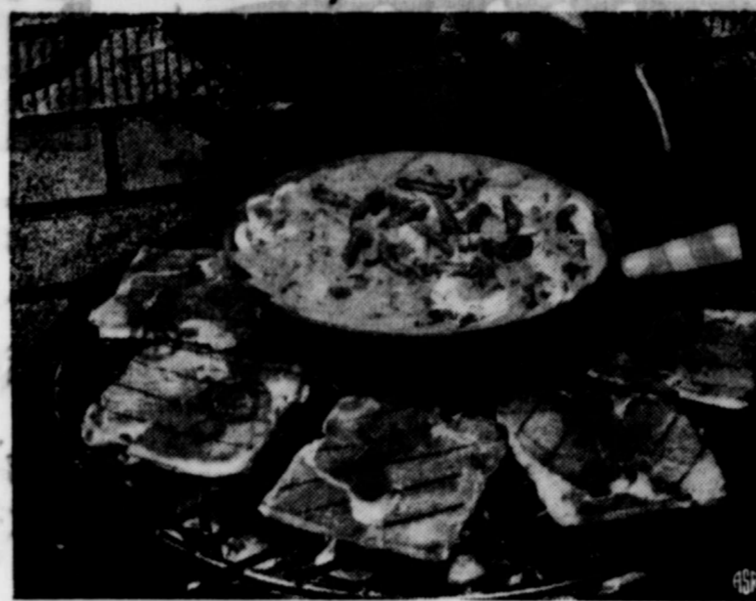

Good Dove Season Will Depend Upon Weather & Weeds

AUSTIN — With fewer than 30 days until the opening of the mourning dove season in the North Zone, Sept. 1, there is still a great deal of speculation as to how plentiful this year's crop will be. According to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, some hot, dry weather is needed to ripen feed seed, and darken considerably the green effect of the present abundance of foliage.

In parts of West Texas where there hasn't been too much rain, weed seeds are now ripening, according to information received in Austin. In these cases, the doves seem to be plentiful at the present time. However, the abundance of rain in Central Texas has vegetation very lush, and weed seeds are not yet ripening. Since water holes have been filled completely, this will tend to scatter late evening dove shooting around the water holes.

So, according to the executive secretary, it is anybody's guess as to how good the dove season will be. On the other hand, the quail crop right now looks to be in top condition. There are still a few nesting birds, but for the most part there have been heavy hatches in practically every part of the state. As a result, a big crop of birds is reported in areas where there were practically no birds last year.

Under the general laws, the quail season will open December 1. The Game Commission will set the quail season in regulatory counties at its quarterly meeting early in October.

Farm Bureau Objected To Fund Deletion

WACO—(Spl.) The president of the Texas Farm Bureau said Governor Price Daniel's deletion of \$15 million in the second year of the Colson-Briscoe farm-market road appropriation fund was made over the objection of the Texas Farm Bureau.

J. H. West of Bishop said, "however, the Texas Farm Bureau will work in every way possible on the Governor's proposal to restore these funds together with adequate provisions for maintenance of farm-market roads from other funds."

West stated that the entire rural road construction program would have been jeopardized if Farm Bureau and other groups had not been able "to prevail upon the Governor" to leave the \$15 million in the first year of the biennium appropriation.

"This the Governor did agree upon and approve," the farm leader said. Farm Bureau leaders and others met with the Governor at his request on the day before the veto statement last week. The appropriation for the coming fiscal year was left untouched as agreed upon at the meeting, West added.

The Farm Bureau state president said Governor Daniel has agreed to re-submit the general fund appropriation at a special

session of the Legislature to work out the problem of maintenance of farm-market roads.

"The Governor was very anxious to solve the maintenance problem during his present tenure of office" West said. Farm Bureau officials also realize the importance of working at this problem at the earliest possible time.

The farm leader said he has invited Governor Daniel to attend the Texas Farm Bureau annual convention Nov. 12-15 in Galveston to explain his proposal by which the second year appropriation would be restored together with provisions for future maintenance of farm-market roads.

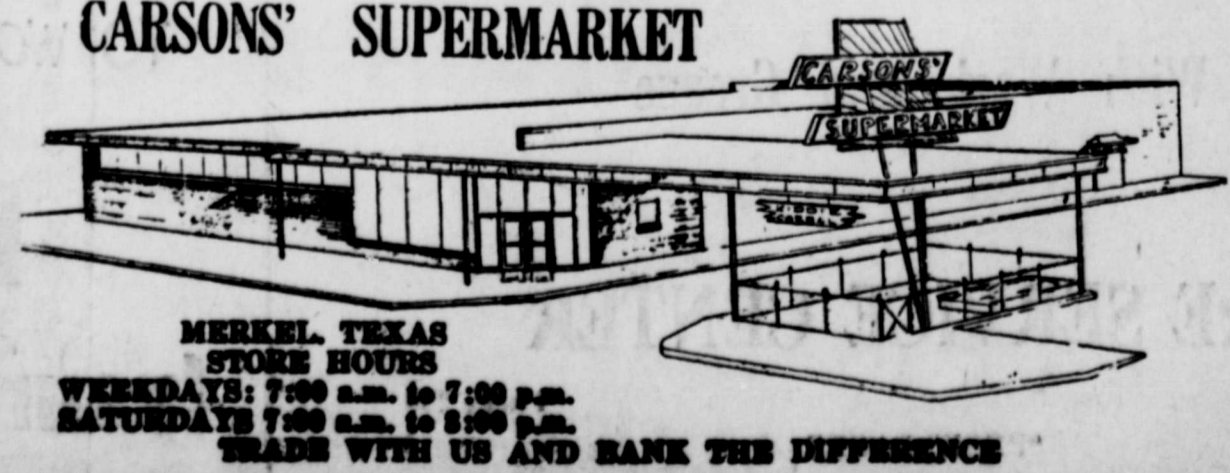
