



Many of you will soon be getting pot plants of poinsettia and wonder what to do with them.

The popular Christmas poinsettia is a native of Mexico and tropical American countries. It is double and single and colors vary from scarlet to creamy white. A less showy poinsettia, hard and wild in the south, is often called Mexican poinsettia.

In the lower Rio Grande Valley, Christmas poinsettias are grown as large shrubs. In Central Texas they thrive as perennials. They die to the ground during the winter but come up from roos and bloom in fall and early winter. In the most northern part of the State, the plants are grown in pots because heavy freezes kill the



### Loans Available To Rural Groups For Water Needs

Rural communities together with heighboring farmers may now obtain loans from the Farmers Home Administration to develop the water resources they need according to John D. Wolf, Jr., the agency's local county supervisor.

"Recent legislation has broadened this credit aid, Individual farmers and rural residents with water problems can team up to obtain a loan for securing a good water supply and distributing the water to their farms and homes. Rural communities may also use water development loans to develop water supplies necessary to attract industry as part of the rural areas development activity." An association loan for water Social Security development or soil conservation

purposes may be made for as much as \$1,000,000 if the funds Claims Highest are supplied by a private lender and insured by the Farmers Home Administration, or up to \$500,000 if made from direct funds appropriated by the Congress, Mr.

The interest rate on an Association loan varies from 41/2 to 5 percent depending on the source of funds and the money market at the time the loan is made. Loans are scheduled for repayment over periods up to 40 years.

Water development and soil conservation loans may be used to finance water supply reservoirs. systems, pumps, pumping plants. apelines and other facilities necessary for an adequate water system.

These loans may also be made to develop or improve soil construction and repair of terraces. such as incorporated irrigation. drainage and water supply districts, cooperative water users' as-
