

161 RATTLESNAKES CAPTURED IN AREA

Sweetwater doesn't have all the rattlesnakes — Merkel claims a few of her own.

A total of 161 rattlers were found on the ranches of Sam Swann, Ernest Meeks and Tom Russom

this week.

Howard Brown and John Perry, retired farmers, captured 139 snakes on three different occassions. They captured 31 on the Tom Russom ranch and 108 on the Ernest Meeks ranch.

Perry stated that the largest rattler captured measured approximately 60 inches in length while the shortest measured approximately 8 inches.

An additional 22 rattlers were killed Friday by Mr. and Mrs. Don Jones on the Sam Swann ranch. Jones stated that they killed thesnakes with 22 rat shot. The largest measured five feet and three inches, he said. The shortest was two feet in length.
