

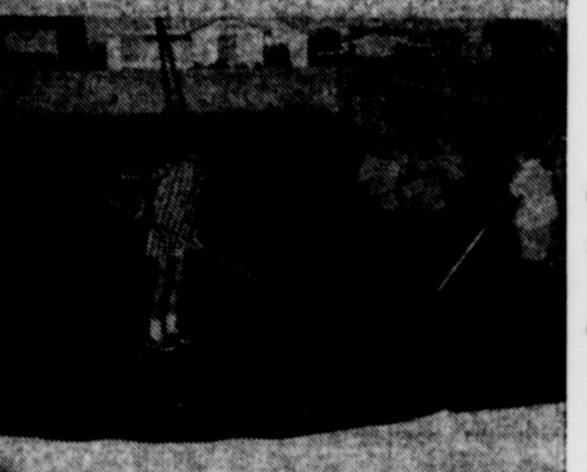
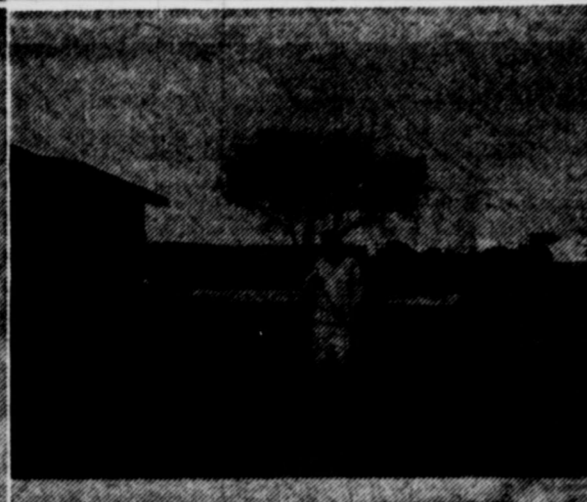

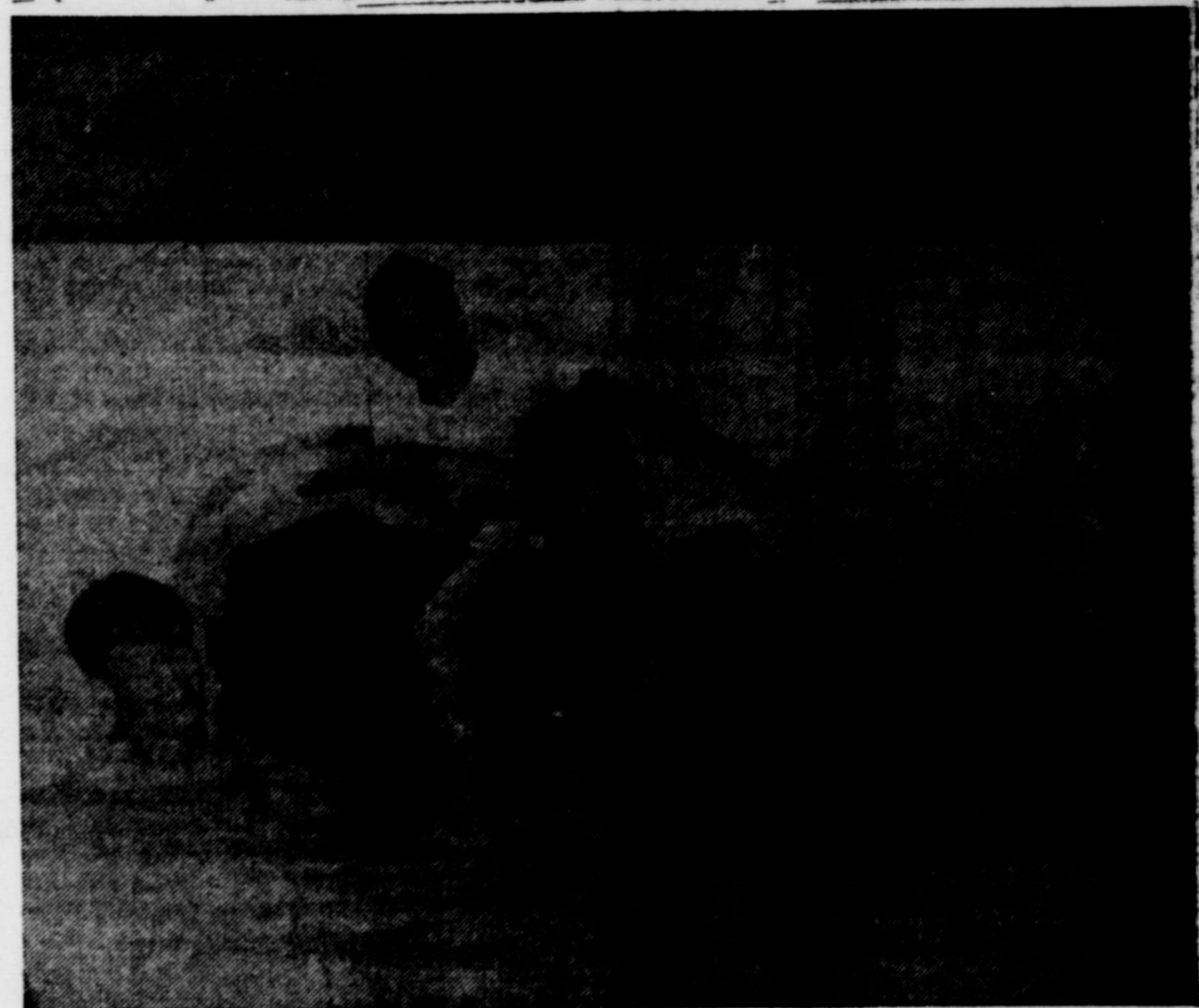

The aims and goals of the Study Club were read by Mrs. Knight, preceding installation of officers for the 1965-66 year.

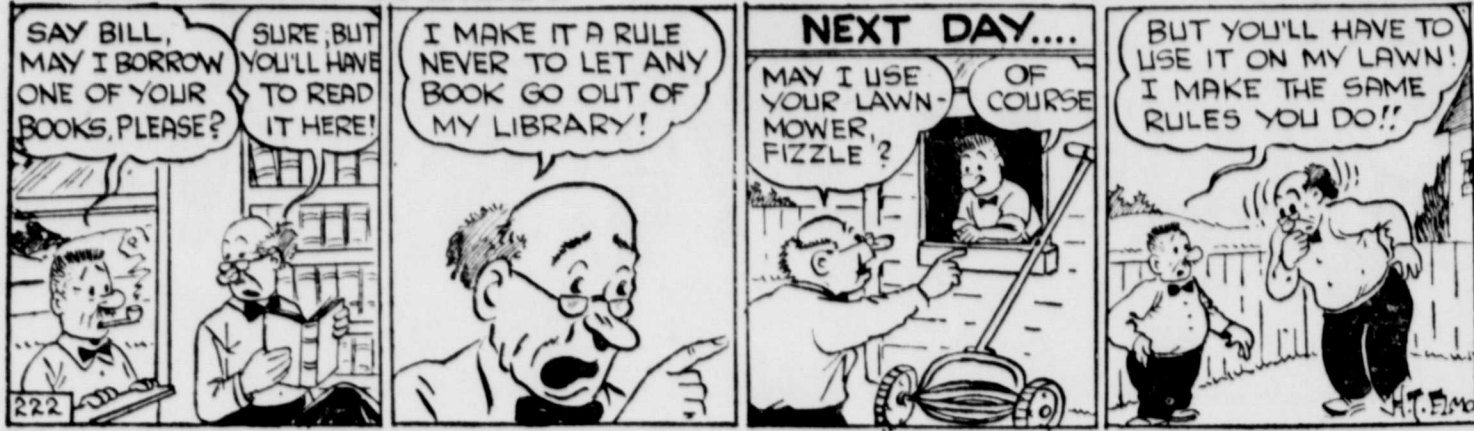

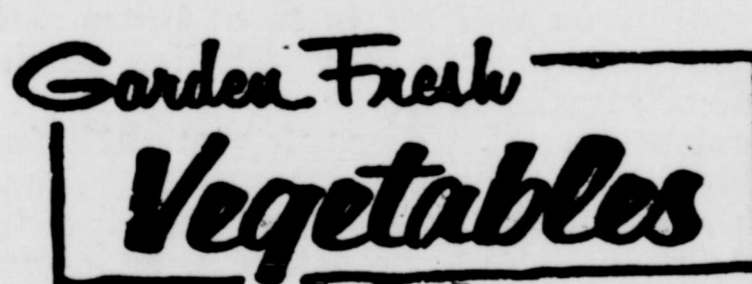

## Homecoming Set At First Baptist

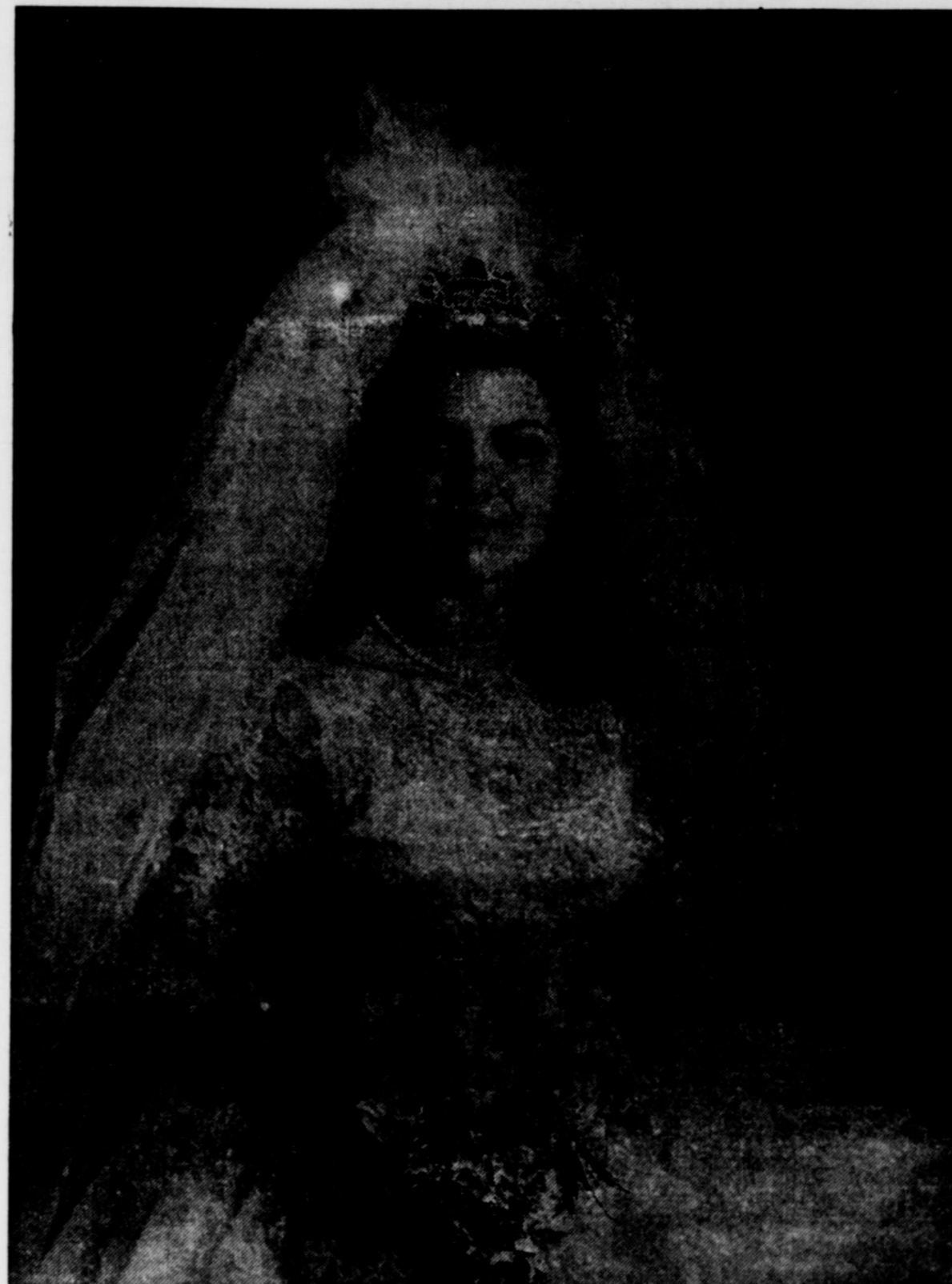
The First Baptist Church of Merkel have plans in readiness for a Homecoming Revival Effort, according to the Rev. W. D. Tanner, pastor.
