

"I was born in the Noodle communtiy," said Wheeler, "but when I got a chance to wrestle Joe Reno, who was a professional, I couldn't turn it down. So to Hillsboro I went."

When asked about his training. Wheeler said he got most of his best training at "Old Farmer Burns' Athletic School, up in Omaha, Neb."

"Some of the world's best wrestlers got their training there." said Wheeler. "There's Frank Gotch, Frank Farr and even Gus Frank Gotch held the world's championship for years," said Wheeler.

"I remember, said Wheeler, "I was wrestling Frank Farr to see which one of us would get to wrestle Gus Callilo. Frank and I wrestled for two hours and nine minutes but it was finally a draw. Neither one of us threw the other one. This was back in about 1926."

Wheeler explained that wrest-

ling rules are different today than "when they were back in my wrestling time."

"We went by the Police Gazette Rules," said Wheeler. "And that meant no hitting, no kicking, no judo tricks. We just started wrestling. We could block holds, to get them, and break them, strictly wrestling. No jokes like wrestling has today.

Wheeler recalled his son started questioning him about his wrestling, after watching a wrestling match on television.

'Dad," he said, "could you whip those wrestlers on televi-

"I told him that in my day, we did scientific wrestling, not any of that kind you see on TV today." Another incident Wheeler recalled was about two young men who wanted to really test his

"I was out in the field when these fellows came up," said Wheeler, "and they began to question my wrestling ability. They finally made a deal with me. Said if I could really keep them from choking me with a rope around my neck, they would build me a fence. And if I couldn't do what I said, I would have to go plow for them."


