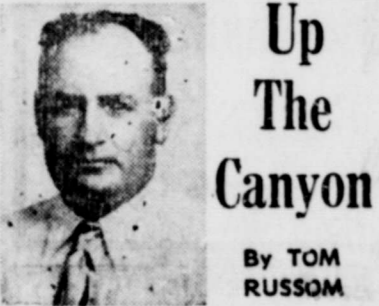

Up The Canyon

The following is a story of Nubia, a once thriving little country town in West Texas, Taylor County, ten miles S.W. of Merkel. Approaching the town site from the north or south on present day Farm to Market Road 126, one would never suspect that there ever was a village there. The present time finds one dwelling (now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Riney), one modern Nubia Telephone Exchange unit, one old vacant building, and one livestock feed ground.

Although the town itself was short lived, it is traditionally a striking example of prestige. Its history is vivid and colorful, dating from about 1887 to 1908.

For an introduction let's use a part of a letter written by Mrs. Jack Beall of Chandler, Texas. Mrs. Beall is the former Ruth Martin, daughter of the Late Dr. and Mrs. J. W. Martin, who was the early day doctor in this story. "Greetings to you from East Texas. We live now among the pines and other large trees, but they never replace the love of the cedars of our early day memories of more than 50 years ago, in the Nubia community. We grew up there with the lovely mountains all around, the white fields of cotton and feed, the cowboys with their big hats, boots and spurs. Then the little church and my love's little Sunday school cards and teacher, my mother and little brothers made a world of joy and beauty in which to live.

Nubia was a little village with a post office, a school, a gin, a barber shop, blacksmith shop, drug store, a bank, and 3 general merchantile stores with groceries and dry goods combined. And last but not least, a church.

We were happy to dwell among such fine and noble people as lived in this village in Mulberry Canyon. Many of my dearest friends have slipped away into fairer fields and some have moved a few miles over on another street, but some of them whom we knew and loved so well still remain near the old Stomping Ground."

Doctor J. H. Martin, the town's only doctor, was one who could be depended on. He went near and

JUNE SURVEY CARD DISTRIBUTION SET

Postmaster Wrenn Durham reminds rural patrons of the Merkel Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Durham explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Alvin Wozencraft, Rt. 1; Weldon McAninch, Rt. 2; Pat Cypert, Rt. 3;

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk

production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Durham concludes.

Driver Education To Begin May 24

The classroom phase of Summer Driver Education will begin Tuesday, May 24 at the Merkel Band Hall, according to instructor, Glenn Reed.

"The phase will take three weeks — a total of thirty hours," said Reed. "The behind the wheel training will also take approximately three weeks. This will depend upon the number of students, until each student drives six hours and observes six hours."

Classes will be limited to eighteen students and in order to be eligible, a student must have parent's consent and be 14 years of age by June 14.

Students interested in the Summer Driver Education course are asked to contact Glenn Reed at the High School.

Eighty students will receive diplomas in the Eighth Grade Graduation Exercises. "This is a record number," said principal Leon Walker, "probably the largest to graduate in fifteen years."

Carolyn Gilmer will present the Class Address for the Eighth Grade Graduation Exercises, with Steve Doan presenting the Class Gift. Terry Carson will ask the invocation.

Songs to be sung by the graduating class are "Sing Unto the Lord," "All Hail Immanuel," "Faith in the Future," "Moments to Remember," and "Invitation to the Bells," sung by the Eighth Grade Girls.

Special awards will be presented by Supt. Fisher, and Walker will present diplomas to the graduating class.

Summer Reading Program to Be Offered Students

Beginning Monday, May 30, library service will be offered to Merkel area students said superintendent Mack Fisher.

Library hours will be from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. "Both high school and elementary libraries will offer this service," said Fisher.

Fisher explained that this service was being extended in order "to encourage children to read more during the summer months. Only one book per week may be checked out at the beginning of this service; however, the book will be subject to renewal."

Records for overdue books must be cleared for each check out before a person will be eligible to check out additional books said Fisher.

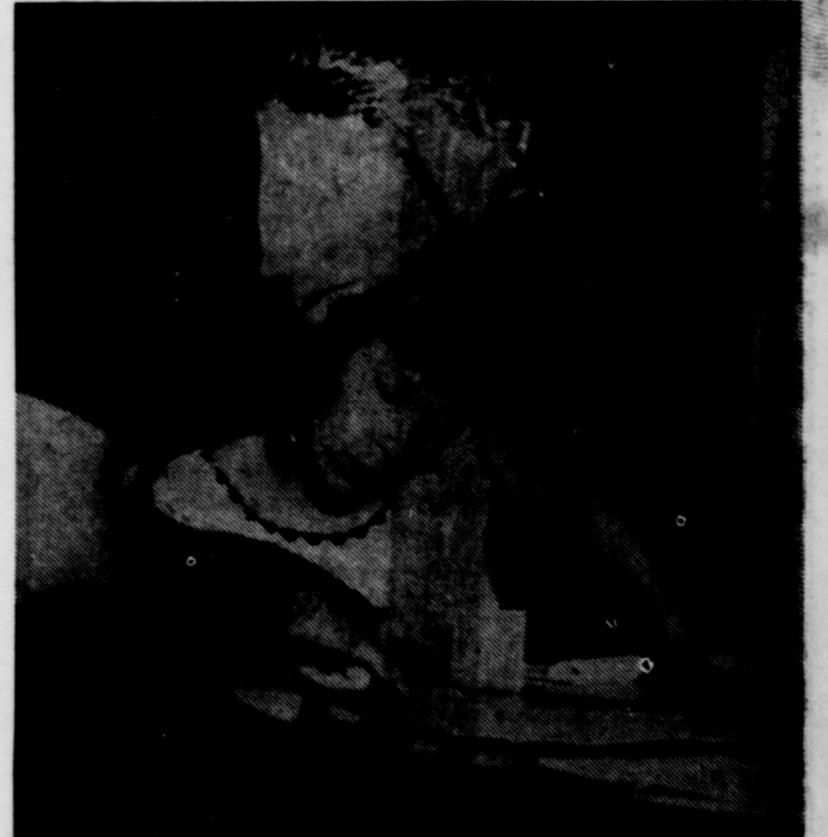
Jaycee Auction This Saturday

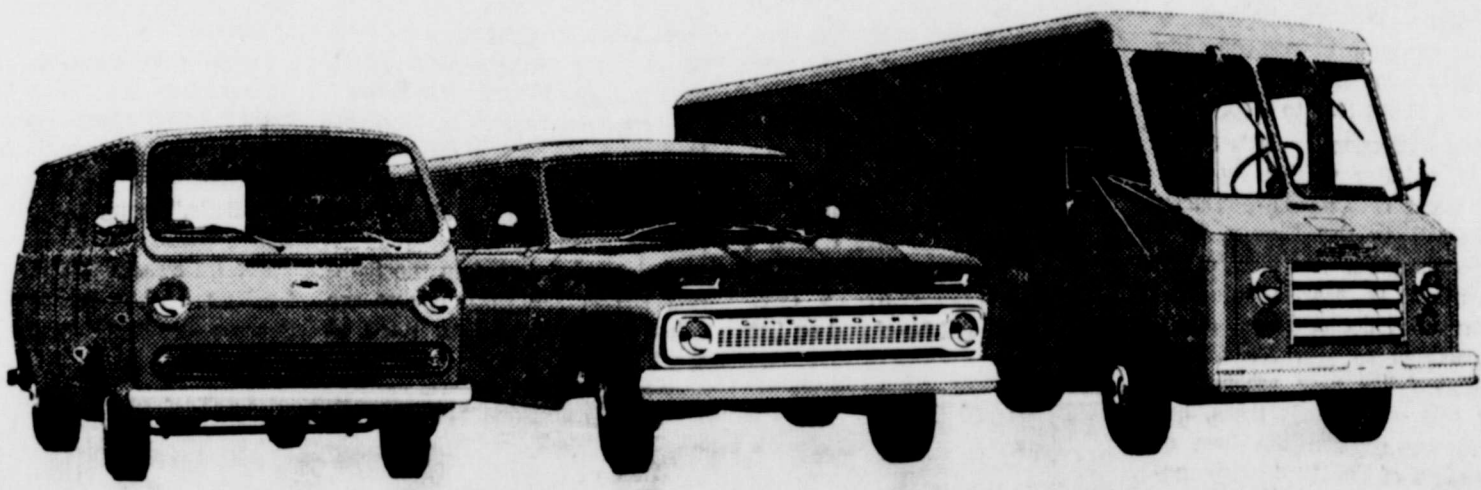

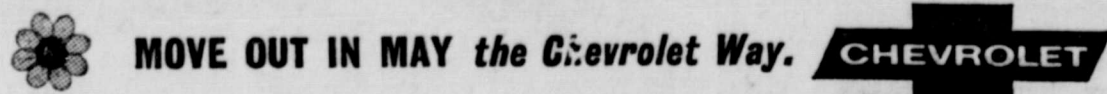

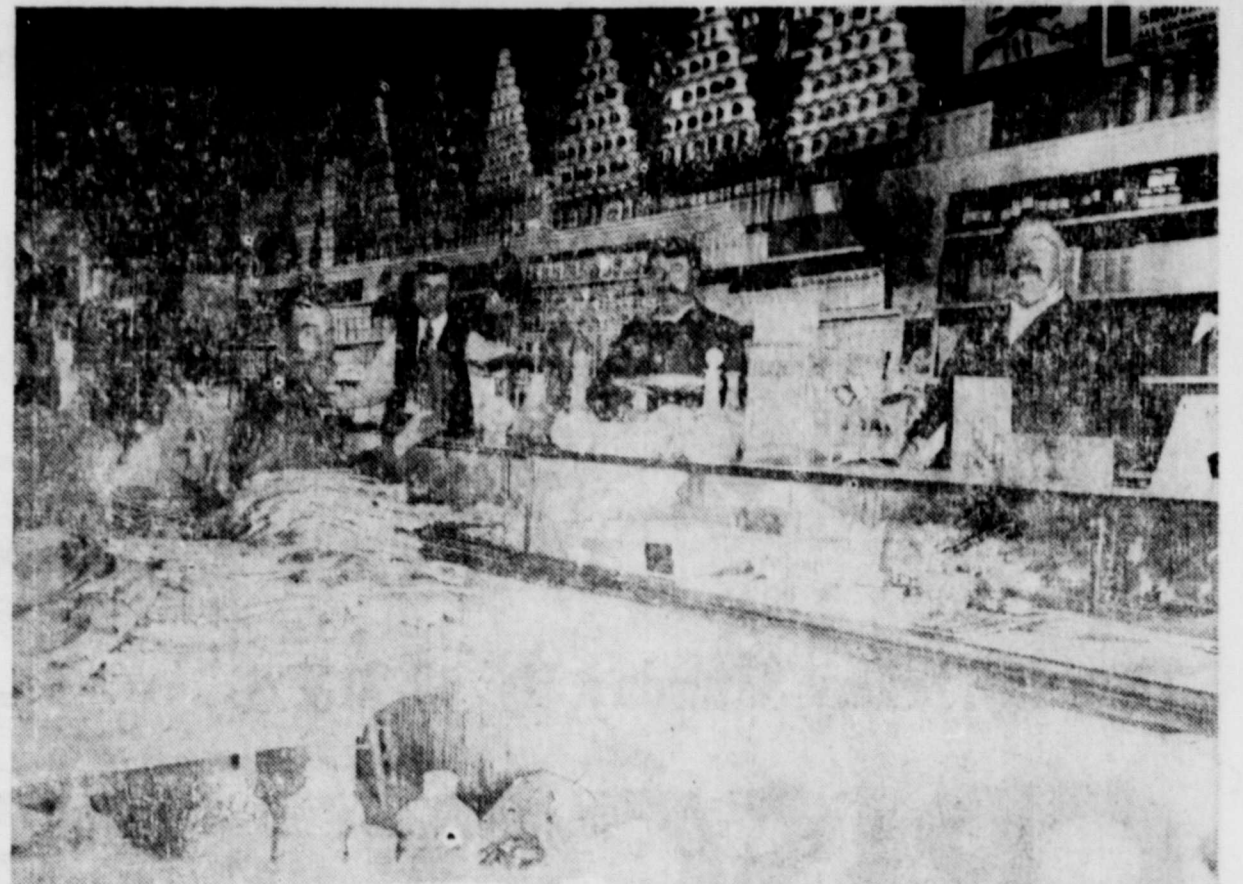
Merkel P-TA Meet Installs Officers

far, riding little sorrel mares to a buggy. It never got too hot for Doctor Martin to go visit the sick, and he received such little pay. He also ran the drug store in Nubia.

Prior to 1900 there was a cotton gin at Nubia. It was a small one stand gin with no suction pipe and no mechanical press. Farmers had to use a basket and put the cotton through a scuttle hole. After the cotton was ginned it was piled on the floor and then put in the press. It had to be pressed by hand.

There was lots of cotton. Farmers from a large area brought cotton to Nubia to be ginned.

Editor's Note: A very thorough history of the town of Nubia has been compiled and ready for print in the Mail; however, space does not permit a complete printing of this edition. A continuation of the history of Nubia will be printed next week.
