Christmas Shopping, Buying Started Early -- Continuing

MERCHANTS AGREE BUSINESS BETTER

Merkel merchants agree that "Christmas shopping (and buying) is better this year than has been in a long time."

In a door-to-door check of businesses in downtown Merkel, business heads were quick with their answer, "business is good."

Of the three questions asked business men — What is the shopping trend? Are people buying? and Is business as good this year as the same time last year? almost all answers agreed:

"People started shopping earlier this year — even as early as the first of November."

"Definitely."

"Much better than last year," Mrs. Almeda Bullock of Bullock Hardware commented that "Christmas buying has definitely started and we are very pleased with the results."

"Best ever," was Onis Crawford's comment. Owner of Crawford's Men's Wear, he said that "it began with early layaways and it's getting better all the time."

"Christmas shopping started in November and has increased greatly since," was Mrs. Dee Grimes' surmise of the Christmas buying. She is owner of Bragg's.

Merkel Drug Store owner David Gamble, summed up the buying trend as "very good. Much better than last year."

Meyer Mellinger of Mellinger's commented that "Christmas buying had started out real good and is holding up, fine."

Woody Wilson of Wilson's Jewelry and Johnny Hammond of Ben Franklin Store both agreed that "there has been a noticeable trend in shopping this past week and business is really picking up."

In answer to another question "What is causing the early buying trend?" merchants agreed that "perhaps people are beginning to realize that choice and quality items are easier to get before the last-minute rush begins."

Booth Warren, president of Farmers and Merchants National Bank had this to say concerning

the optimistic buying trend:

"Conditions are improved materially over a year ago. People are in better shape financially than they have been in a long time."

"The improved financial conditions are due primarily to a very satisfactory crop yield this year, good weather conditions and a record harvest, with very little waste or loss."

Merchants agreed that "buyers are a little more selective now."

"People are waking up the realization that sooner or later they are going to have to pay for purchases made, and they have become more selective," said Warren.

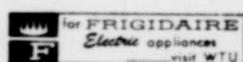

SORGHUM-SUDAN MAKES QUALITY HAY

The W. H. Cothrum Ranch of Sisterdale won a champion ribbon at the State Hay Show at Houston recently. Their sample came from a field of Sudax Brand, SX - 11, and was the top entry in the sorghum - sudangrass division.

What does it take to produce top quality hay? Newman Stutts, ranch manager, explains:

"We plowed down 300 lbs. of 0-20-0 and 50 lbs. of actual nitrogen to start with. The field was disced and harrowed down to a fine seed bed. We seeded 65 lbs. of seed per acre. The first cutting was made when it was about 45 inches tall. After the hay was

taken off, we top-dressed with another 50 lbs. of nitrogen. Since it was dry, 40 acres of the SX-11 was irrigated. We baled four cuttings during the year and then grazed it the rest of the fall. This crop gives us good tonnage of palatable hay. The quality speaks for itself."

Following is the judges' score, based on chemical analysis and physical score of the Cothrum Ranch entry:

Crude protein	9.7
Digestible protein	6.0
Net energy	46.9
Total chemical score	91.2
Visual score	90.0
Final score	90.6

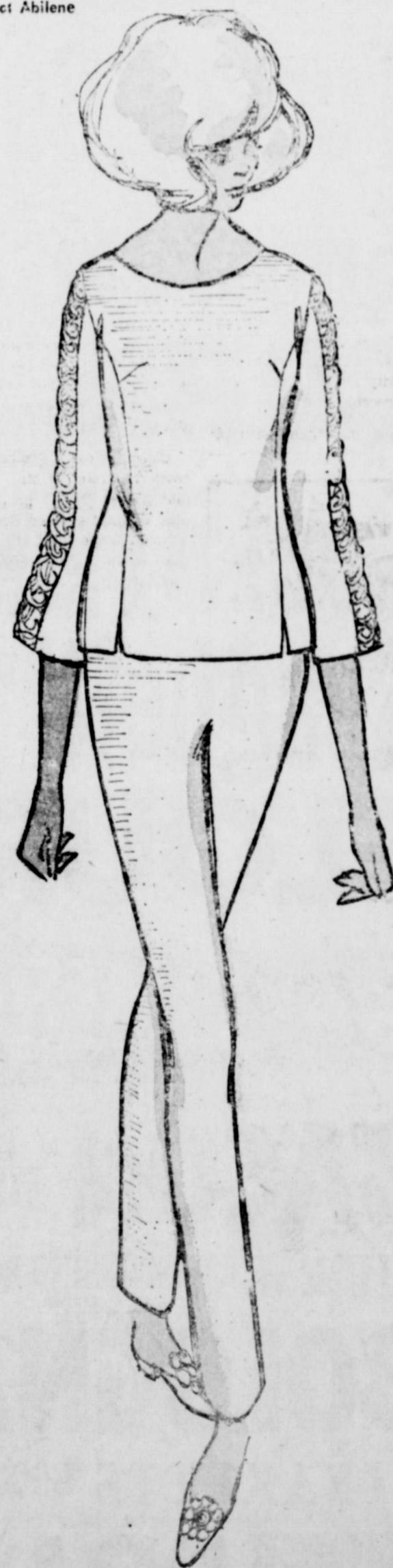
