MERKEL STUDENTS WIN ELECTRIC COOPERATIVES' WASHINGTON TRIP

Mike Dudley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Dudley, and Mary Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Johnson won the "Youth Tour to Washington," in placing first in Taylor Electric Cooperative's annual oratorical contest.

The contest which "was open to any boy or girl at least 16 years of age, required speakers to give a 5 to 8 minute talk on the subject "Rural Electric Cooperatives — Helping Texas Grow."

Mike, a sophomore at Merkel High School, spoke to the group on "Dawn to Evening; a Day in a Cooperative." His speech compared a day in man's life with a day in a cooperative. The four main points or parts of a day

are dawn, morning, noontime, and evening. Each of these was linked to the growth of a cooperative from birth (dawn), youth (morning), adult life or the present (noontime), and the future (evening).

"The Dawn for the rural electric cooperatives was in the spring of 1935," said Mike. "The Rural Electrification Administration was created that year, thus opening the way for the birth of rural electric cooperatives across the nation."

"Morning is a youth time when action, dreams and adventures are molding his character. The rural electric cooperative surviv-

ed its slow beginning and today in the noontime of its life has become big and powerful.

"Day has reached its evening. Evening is the future of the rural electric cooperative, and that future is bright with hope."

Miss Johnson, a senior at Merkel High School, highlighted the rural electric cooperatives by speaking on "The Giant of the Big Country."

"Prior to the advent of the Electric Cooperatives, only one farm in twenty enjoyed the benefits of rural electrification," said Miss Johnson. "Today 98 per cent of all farms have rural electrification service."

"Hundreds of Big Country 4-H and FFA members have seen the personality of this "Giant" as he displays his interest in each member. He aids them in many ways, bringing club programs, supplying trophies and awards for stock shows, giving educational aid, and helping in many ways to make the programs for rural youth a success."

Miss Johnson concluded her speech with "The rural home reaps the greatest benefit from our Electric Giant. Anything which makes life better for rural America makes life better and stronger for all Americans."

Mike's activities include 4 - H

with projects in lambs, calves, swine, and gardening; youth work in and a member of Merkel's First Methodist Church, and is president of Mulberry Canyon 4-H Club.

An interesting item concerning Mike's winning is that he will "celebrate his 16th birthday June 15 while on his Washington tour."

Miss Johnson is a present Area IV FHA officer and is working on state degree. She has contributed greatly to 4-H Club work by acting as junior leader for the years 1965 and 1966.

Both Mary and Mike will leave for Dallas June 8 with stopovers in Little Rock, Ark., Nashville,

Tenn., Roanoke, Va., and then Washington, D.C. June 12. The Congressional Breakfast, Youth Day, and Washington Tour will be conducted June 13, 14, 15 and 16.

They will leave Washington D.C. June 17 and arrive back in Dallas June 20.

Upon their return home, "each participant will receive from T. E. C. a picture record of their tour on slides."

The trip is being sponsored by Taylor Electric Cooperative and the cost will cover transportation, food, lodging, program and entertainment, color slides, and accident insurance coverage.

School Board Election Set For April 1

The trustees of the Merkel Independent School District have ordered an election to be held on Saturday, April 1, to fill the expiring terms of Dr. Jarrett Williams and Odis Griffin.

Anyone wishing to have his name on the official ballot "must file his name or have his name filed in the office of the local school superintendent according to law on or before March 1, 1967 by 3:30 p.m."

Clyde Bartlett, school tax assessor - collector, will "act as clerk for absentee balloting." Absentee balloting will begin on March 12 and end March 28, and may be done between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday during the absentee period.

Balloting will also be conducted at the City Hall.

Election judge and assistants will be announced by the trustees at a later date.

MERKEL TEACHERS TO ATTEND MEETING

A series of 21 two-hour regional conferences to explore with local school people and those in teacher education in Texas colleges and universities some of the vital issues concerning social studies programs for grades 1-12 will be held during the months of February and March under the sponsorship of the Texas Education Agency.

All conferences will be held for the two-hour period between 3 and 5:30 p.m., stated Edgr.

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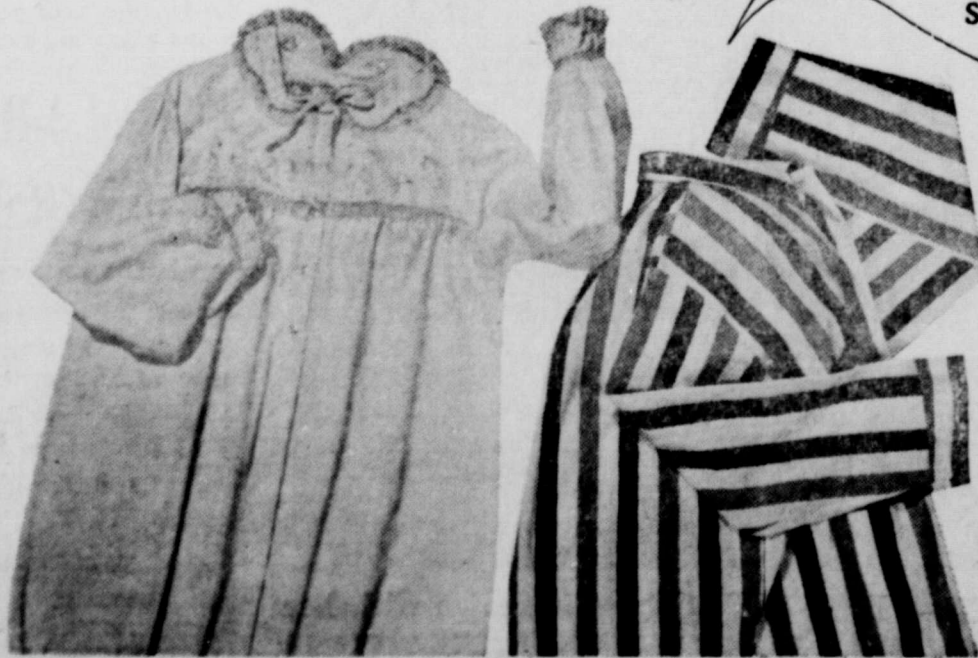

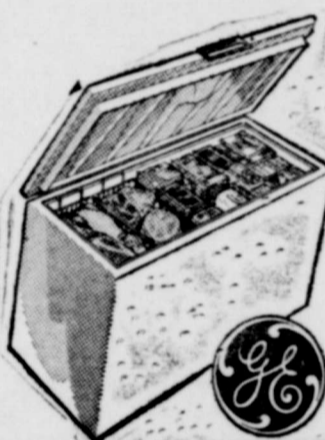

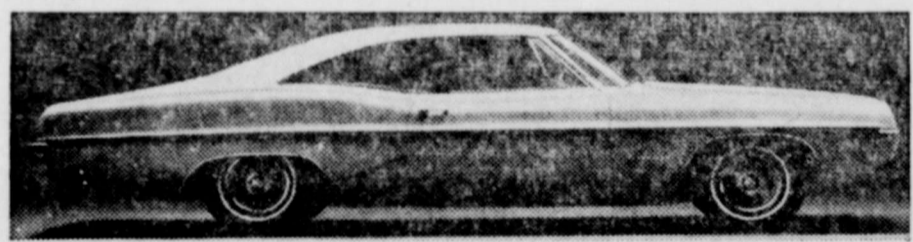

WEEKLY REPORT 60TH LEGISLATURE

The 60th Legislature now knows all the rules of the game and the serious business has begun. Governor Connally's message to a joint session of both the House and Senate last week is causing quite a stir all across the State.

The Governor laid out his proposals for financing his program for the 1968 - 69 biennium, and some businesses got hit right in

the pocketbook. Others breathed a temporary sigh of relief knowing full well that there will be many alternative taxes suggested before the tax bill is finally approved.

The most dramatic step taken by the Governor was his recommendation that the Legislature legalize liquor by the drink and impose a 5 - cent per ounce tax. This alone would net \$15 million in new tax money for the biennium. The limitation to present "wet" areas and a heavy (\$2,000) annual bar license fee to be shared by the State, city and county may have the effect of giving the measure the impetus that it needs to carry both Houses.

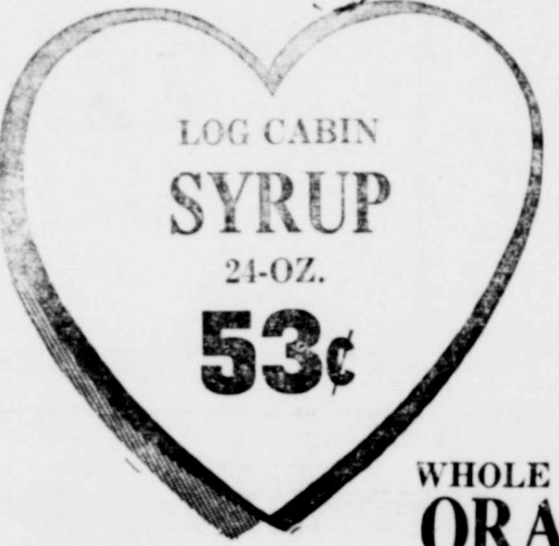
