





Their services may be retained also for busi-ness translations, expert secretarial work, and shopping tours that are so popular with the wives of executives who increasingly accompany their husbands on business visits to Berlin. Private transportation for such guided tours is available by drive-yourself or chauffeured cars.

A special fortnightly briefing keeps the guides up-to-date on everything that's worth seeing and doing in Berlin, whether by day or on escorted visits to the numerous night spots that complement the city's countless scenic, historical cultural, artistic and musical attractions.
