JUNE SURVEY CARDS TO BE DISTRIBUTED

Postmaster Wrenn Durham reminds rural patrons of the Merkel Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Durham explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are Alvin Wozencraft, Rt. 1; W. R. Cypert, Rt. 2, and Pat Cypert, Rt. 3.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these

cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important decision, Mr. Durham concludes.

Mrs. Haynes presented the officers and members with a glad-iola bulb to plant, "in order to take root and grow into a bigger, more productive club."

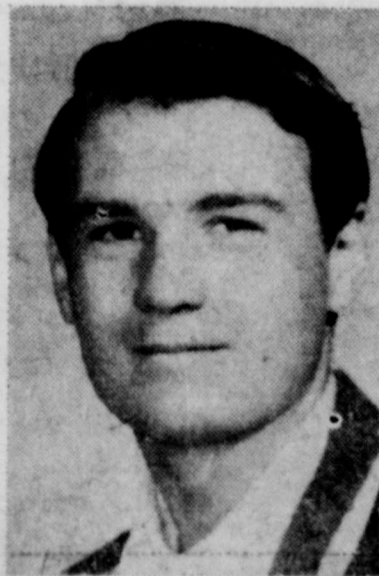
APPRECIATION SUPPER
