

## **Farm Bureau Reviews Session**

WACO (Spl.) - Texas Farm Bureau recorded another successful session in the 60th Legislature, according to C. H. DeVaney, president of the state's largest general farm organization.

'We were able to carry out Farm Bureau policies on 35 different legislative issues," DeVaney said. "This included helping secure passage of 18 bills in line with Farm Bureau policies and helping defeat 17 more that were contrary to farmers' interests," he added.

Some of the major bills in which TFB was instrumental in helping pass included one establishing a Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory, another implementing the law on assessing farm land at its agricultural productive value, and other bills pertaining to shipment of such commodities as citrus, eggs, milk and livestock from other states in to Texas.

However, you must file a separate return from your husband. You can split the community income, but if you file a joint return your dad can not claim you.






