

Students representing classes and organizations at Merkel High School met at the Asteroid Restaurant this past Friday and tickets were handed out for selling


A \$15 prize will be given the class or organization selling the most tickets, said Stewart.

"Cards will be mailed to those families or persons being remembered with donor's name said Cox.




