Garbage Ordinance Passed At Tuesday Council Meeting

Topping the agenda for the Merkel City Council at their Monday evening meeting was the discussion and adopting two ordinances concerning garbage disposal and parking within the city limits of

Merkel. Passed on the first reading was an ordinance prescribing methods for depositing garbage, trash on streets, vacant lots, and set out requirements for containers

used for garbage and designated places for garbage pickup. The ordinance definitely states that "it shall be unlawful for any person to sweep, haul, throw or deposit any garbage, handbills,

trash dirt, concrete rocks, brick, plaster, tile, etc. upon or along any drain, gutter, alley, sidewalk, parkway, street or vacant lot or upon any public or private premises within the corporate limits of the city."

"Every owner, occupant, tenant or lessee using or occupying any building house or structure within the city limits, shall provide and maintain garbage cans and receptacles of sufficient number and type," the ordinance continues.

In designating place for garbage container to be placed, the ordinance specifies "containers be placed adjacent to the alley for collection, in order that they may be easily accessible to the collector from the outside of any fence that may surround the premises."

"In the event trash is of such a nature that it cannot be put in the regulation containers, it shall be placed in disposable containers tightly tied and bundled and placed adjacent to the alley or on the edge of the alley," said Mayor Horace Hargrove.

Hargrove also reminded Merkel residents that the Landfill Operation officially goes into effect after midnight, Oct. 31.

"Your city council is fully aware of this deadline," said Hargrove, "and have been working continuously toward this fulfillment. We

STATE REPRESENTATIVE SPEAKER AT LIONS CLUB NOON LUNCHEON

Oil Depletion Allowance and its effects was the topic of discussion when State Representative Frank Calhoun spoke to members and guests at the Lions Club noon luncheon Tuesday.

"Tax reforms measures, presently under fire in Congress could have a forceful effect on Texas," said the Representative. "Decreased or eliminated entirely the de-

pletion allowance on oil and gas products will vitally affect the state local level concerning education and area economy."

Calhoun pointed out that any reduction in depletion allowance "will probably cause tax increases."

Speaking to a good sized crowd of members and guests, Calhoun emphasized the fact that "we

have a substantial investment in education and it should not be cut back. We would have to increase taxes or cut back educational advantages and certainly that would not be the desire of any here."

The representative recalled that in forty three years no Congress has seen fit to change the allowance, "but now we're faced with it."

He encouraged those attending to write Congressman Omar Burleson and state their views concerning the oil depletion allowance.

"We are your representatives," he said, "and the only way we can know your thinking is to hear from you."

Prior to Representative Calhoun's speech, members heard a report from Lion Herman Carson that to date \$219 had been collected during the light bulb sale, with "several members yet to report."

MEDAL PRESENTED TO SGT. WINTER

Mr. and Mrs. Norman Winter received a message this week from H. W. Buse Jr., Lt. Gen., U.S. Marine Corps, that their son, Sergeant Robert H. Winter, has been presented the Navy Commendation Medal "for heroic achievement while serving as a Squad Leader with Company L, Third Battalion, First Marines, First Marine Division in connection with combat operations against the enemy in the Republic of Vietnam."

Lt. Gen. Buse's message continues:

"On 12 May, 1969, Company L was participating in a search and destroy operation in Quang Nam Province when the Marines came under a heavy volume of small arms, automatic weapons, and rocket propelled grenade fire from a large and well-concealed North Vietnamese Army force. Reacting instantly, Sgt. Winter quickly deployed his men and commenced leading them in an attack upon the enemy positions. Moving throughout the fire-swept terrain with complete disregard for his own safety, he shouted instructions and words of encouragement to his men and skill-

fully directed their fire upon the hostile unit.

"Alertly observing several seriously wounded Marines lying in positions dangerously exposed to the intense enemy fire, Sgt. Winter unhesitatingly rushed to their location and, after rendering em-

ORDINANCE NO. 348
An ordinance of the City of Merkel, Texas, prescribing methods for depositing garbage, trash, etc. on streets, vacant lots, etc.; Prescribing duties of owners, occupants, etc. of cans or containers, setting out requirements as to containers used for garbage and trash; Designating the placing of garbage and trash cans for collection; Providing rules for trash not in containers; Prescribing the duties of owners, occupants, etc.; Providing method for disposal of dead animals; Providing for disposition of waste from building operations; Providing for the disposition of waste from tree trimming operations; Providing that collection etc. be carried on in a systematic and efficient manner; Requiring owners, occupants, etc. to see that cans and receptacles are emptied

and that a report be made if same are not emptied; Providing that garbage and trash must be drained before placing in can or receptacle and that animal matter be wrapped in paper; Providing for a City Dump Ground and regulations at the City Dump Ground; Providing duties of the Health Officer as the inspection and enforcement of ordinances; Providing a penalty; Providing for publication; and Providing severability of parts of ordinance.

has the landfill in operation, with a few "kicks" yet to be ironed out, but fully expect to be fulfilling requirements of the new law by Oct. 31."

Residents were also reminded that with purchase of encapillar leader for the landfill operation, trash haulers will be increased to 75 per cent.

Also passed was an ordinance prohibiting the "stopping, standing or parking of motor vehicles in certain places within the city of Merkel."

The ordinance designates prohibitive parking of a motor vehicle on a sidewalk, in front of a private or public driveway, within an intersection, within fifteen feet of a fire hydrant, unless otherwise marked on a crosswalk, within twenty feet of a crosswalk at an intersection, and within thirty feet upon the approach of any flashing beacon, stop sign or traffic control signal located at the side of a roadway.

Also, within fifty feet of the nearest rail or a main line railroad crossing, within twenty feet of the driveway entrance to any fire station, upon any bridge or other elevated structure, at any place where official signs or markings prohibit standing or beside any curb painted in color.

In Time of Emergency Supplies for Home Fallout Shelter Called Vital Part of Preparedness

Supplies and equipment stockpiled in home fallout shelters, or readily at hand to take to home shelters, would be vitally necessary for shelter occupants to be self-sufficient in event of a nuclear attack. And persons in home shelters would have to be more on their own than those in public shelters, where a variety of supplies, equipment and skills would probably be available.

During the period of up to 2 weeks after an attack in which people would have to stay in fallout shelters to avoid harmful levels of radiation, they could not do without water, food, sanitation supplies, and any special medicines or foods required by family members (such as insulin, heart tablets, dietetic food and baby food). In addition to the absolute necessities, there are other items that could save lives or at least would add a degree of comfort.

This article tells what major supplies and equipment, both essential and desirable, that people in a home fallout shelter would need.

Complete List of Supplies

WATER. This is even more important than food. Enough water should be available to give each person at least 1 quart per day for 14 days. Store it in plastic containers, or in bottles or cans. All should be tightly closed. Part of the water supply might be "trapped" water in the pipes of a home plumbing system, and part of it might be in the form of bottled or canned beverages, fruit or vegetable juices, or milk. A water-purifying agent (either water-purifying tablets, or 2 percent tincture of iodine, or a liquid chlorine household bleach containing hypochlorite as its only active ingredient) should also be stored. This is in case it is necessary to purify any cloudy or "suspicious" water that may contain bacteria.

FOOD. Enough food should be kept on hand to feed all shelter occupants for 14 days, including special foods needed by infants, elderly persons, and those on limited diets. Most people in shelter can get along on about half as much food as usual. If possible, store

hand a two-week stock of infant supplies such as canned milk or baby formula, disposable diapers, bottles and nipples, rubber sheeting, blankets and baby clothing. Because water for washing might be limited, baby clothing and bedding should be stored in larger-than-normal quantities.

COOKING AND EATING UTENSILS. Emergency supplies should include pots, pans, knives, forks, spoons, plates, cups, napkins, paper towels, measuring cup, bottle opener, can opener, and pocket knife. If possible, disposable items should be stored. A heat source also might be helpful, such as an electric hot plate (for use if power is available), or a camp stove or canned-heat stove (in case power is shut off). However, if a stove is used indoors, adequate ventilation is needed.

CLOTHING. Several changes of clean clothing, especially undergarments and socks or stockings, should be ready for shelter use, in case water for washing should be scarce. **BEDDING.** Blankets are the most important items of bedding that would be needed in a shelter, but occupants probably would be more comfortable if they also had available pillows, sheets, and air mattresses or sleeping bags.

FIRE FIGHTING EQUIPMENT. Simple fire fighting tools, and knowledge of how to use them, could be very useful.

A hand-pumped fire extinguisher of the inexpensive, 5-gallon, water type is preferred. Carbon tetrachloride and other vaporizing-liquid type extinguishers are not recommended for use in small enclosed spaces, because of the danger of fumes. Other useful fire equipment for home use include buckets filled with sand, a ladder, and a garden hose.

GENERAL EQUIPMENT AND TOOLS. The essential items in this category are a battery-powered radio and a flashlight or lantern with spare batteries. The radio would provide a link with the outside world, and a means to receive information and instructions, especially for advice on when to leave shelter. Other useful items: A shovel, broom, axe, crowbar, kerosene lantern, short rubber hose for siphoning, coil of half-inch rope at least 25 feet long, coil of wire, hammer, pliers, screwdriver, wrench, nails and screws.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS. In addition to such practical items as matches, candles, and civil defense instructions, some personal convenience items could be brought into the home shelter if space permits. These might include books and magazines, writing materials, a clock and calendar, playing cards and hobby materials, a sewing kit, and toiletries such as toothbrushes, cosmetics, and shaving supplies.

The information in this story was furnished by U.S. Department of Defense, Office of Civil Defense, to help people prepare for a nuclear attack and learn what actions to take in case an attack should occur. Local government authorities are responsible for supplying the public with more detailed survival instructions for this area. This information was drawn from the OGD publication "In Time of Emergency" (H-14), which is available without charge at local civil defense offices.

Don't throw away old eyeglasses and sunglasses, says Ocie Hunt of Sweetwater, who has been collecting glasses for several years which he sends to the New Eyes for the Needy.

"These old glasses can be used to provide the precious gift of sight to the needy who cannot afford it in this country and areas of the free world," said Hunt.

Upon specific requests, New Eyes ships re-usable glasses to such areas of the free world as the Philippines, France, Oman, Arabia, Labrador, India, Africa and South America.

Hunt says that any individual or organization wishing to contribute to this cause may send the glasses and other precious metal scraps such as old watches, broken or outdated jewelry (real or costume or antique) dentures with bits of gold, damaged silver, etc., to him at 105 W. 3rd Street, Sweetwater, Texas 79556.

"The metal framed glasses and metal scrap are sold to a refinery and the redeemed cash is used by New Eyes to purchase new prescription glasses and artificial eyes for the poor in the United States," Hunt explained. "The reusable plastic framed glasses are tested, classified and sent abroad to medical missions to provide better vision for the poor of the world. Sunglasses are sent to leper colonies."
