Hunger relief program slated for April 25

Post Cares will be one of the many agencies that will benefit from an afternoon tea scheduled for April 25 at College Flowers at 4613 on the Brownfield Highway in Lubbock.

The event is sponsored by the National Organization Share Our Strength's, Taste of the Nation.

Along with Post Cares (which will receive 10 percent of the days proceeds), 70 percent of the ticket proceeds will go to the South Plains Food Bank.

"I think it will be a worthwhile deal," said Dr. James Bell, pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Post.

According to sponsors of the benefit, fully 100 percent of the proceeds raised by the tea go directly towards the organization's goal of hunger relief. Along the 80 percent that is distributed locally, the remaining 20 percent is distributed by the national office to

national and international hunger relief organizations.

Local contacts in Post for the event are Dr. Bell, Zoe Kirkpatrick or Pattie Kirkpatrick.

Tickets for the tea can be purchased through College Flowers, Second Baptist Church, South Plains Food Bank Board members and Danish Imports here in Post. Tickets are \$10 for adults and children aged 12 and under are asked to give one can of food at the door.

"How grateful I am that this event is coming to Lubbock," said Carolyn Lanier, director of the South Plains Food Bank. "There is a large number of people who will directly benefit from this event."

"Each donation and contribution is greatly needed as well as appreciated,"

One hundred cities across the nation will host similar events during the week of April 25 through May 2.

Volunteers needed for summer prog.

With a funding crunch apparently solved, Garza County Judge Giles Dalby is looking for volunteers to help with the summer recreation and education program in the county. Judge Dalby said volunteers are needed to make the summer program work.

"Last year we had such a success with the program," said Judge Dalby of the program that between 100 and 150 Post and Garza County youth took advantage of the activities offered. "Hopefully we can get as good a program this year."

The funding problem was created when the source of last year's money for the program, a Criminal Justice Grant for Garza County was taken out of the picture when the state modified its budget. With the changes in the budget, Garza County will still receive the grant, but the money can't be used for the summer program.

To keep the program operational, Judge Dalby has put together a coalition of city, school and county funding. Judge Dalby asked each entity for \$2,000 for the program.

They all came through and with some of the salaries for youth workers being paid by Job Source, Judge Dalby thinks the program will fly.

The program is really a two fold operation. Along with the recreation and educational programs, an additional grant from the Department of Agriculture pays for two meals a day (breakfast and lunch) Kids participate in recreation four days and five days a week for meals. Last year,

participants went to the swimming pool on Fridays for an afternoon of swimming.

The program is open to all youth of Garza County. Judge Dalby says there are no income requirements. The schools are also donating the use of facilities such as the cafeteria, track and gym.

Along with athletic activities, participants can attend several different educational classes dealing with such things as drugs and alcohol and personal hygiene.

The program is seen as a way of giving Garza County Youth a better alternative than spending the summer without supervision roaming the streets.

"We want to get them so tired that they don't want to go out at night and cause mischief," said Judge Dalby.

But the success of the program this year is tied to volunteers according to the judge.

"We need parents or anybody else who would be willing to come out and help with the program," said the judge. "If people are interested I ask them to step forward."

Currently plans call for the program to get underway either in the first or second week of June. Kids would meet at the Post Elementary School Cafeteria at 8 a.m. for breakfast before moving to the gym to begin the days activities.

The Texas Municipal Courts Training Center is a projects of the Texas Municipal Courts Association which is funded by a grant from the Supreme Court of Texas.

Williams announces resignation

Former Post High School grad and Wellington head football coach James Williams announced his resignation Thursday after 20 years of guiding the Skyrockets.

Williams' resignation is effective at the end of the 1992-93 school year, but he will remain at Wellington ISD as the athletic director.

Williams became Wellington's head football coach in 1973 after coaching at Ballinger for six years. He guided the Skyrockets to the playoffs eight times with three teams winning the area championship in 1982, 1990 and 1991.

In 1991, Williams guided Wellington to the state quarterfinals for the first time in the school's history.

Williams' various honor include the

Top of Texas Football Magazine Hall of Fame in 1983, Amarillo Chamber of Commerce Coach of the Year in 1982 and 1992, Amarillo Referees Association Coach of the Year in 1988, Texas Coaches Association Recognition in 1987 and the Top of Texas Football Magazine Class 2A Coach of the Year in 1990.

He was an all-district player at Post in 1957, and was later named All-America as a quarterback at San Angelo Junior College in 1960. He received his bachelor's degree at East Texas State where he was an all-Lone Star Conference athlete for two years, then returned to ETSU in 1986 to receive his masters degree.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Williams.

Let me tell you what we envisioned: a theater with live performances throughout the year, an arts center where classes could be taught continually, arts in education in the schools.

The theater is recognized throughout the state; the art center is active, with children's classes here and at Southland and Tahoka; adult college credit classes; regular meetings of the Post Art Guild and Caprock Photographers; annual and semi-annual art and photography shows which bring many artists and photographers to Post, and other events that are arts related.

The Arts In Education programs have been instituted in the Post Schools with the Hispanic Heritage and Black Legacy programs the past two semesters; teachers have had the advantage of summer workshops developing the arts into the teaching of history and other basic education classes.

The Rendezvous of Arts during Founder's Day brings outstanding artists to Post, and visitors by the hundreds. New businesses are making plans.

Some of us who have spent our lives here seldom realize the beauty of the Caprock areas, but others marvel at it. We have an ideal location for artists who love the outdoors and several are already making plans to move to our area, either inside the town or along the caprock.

These happenings are being brought to the door of the CCA almost daily. All this is so exciting, yet has brought on much more work than our staff is able to handle and we have had to hire additional personnel.

The Arts Industry in Post is very much alive and is adding to the popularity of Post far and wide. Each day we hear talk of how active and how pretty Post is. The CCA takes great pride in being an active part in the progress of Post.

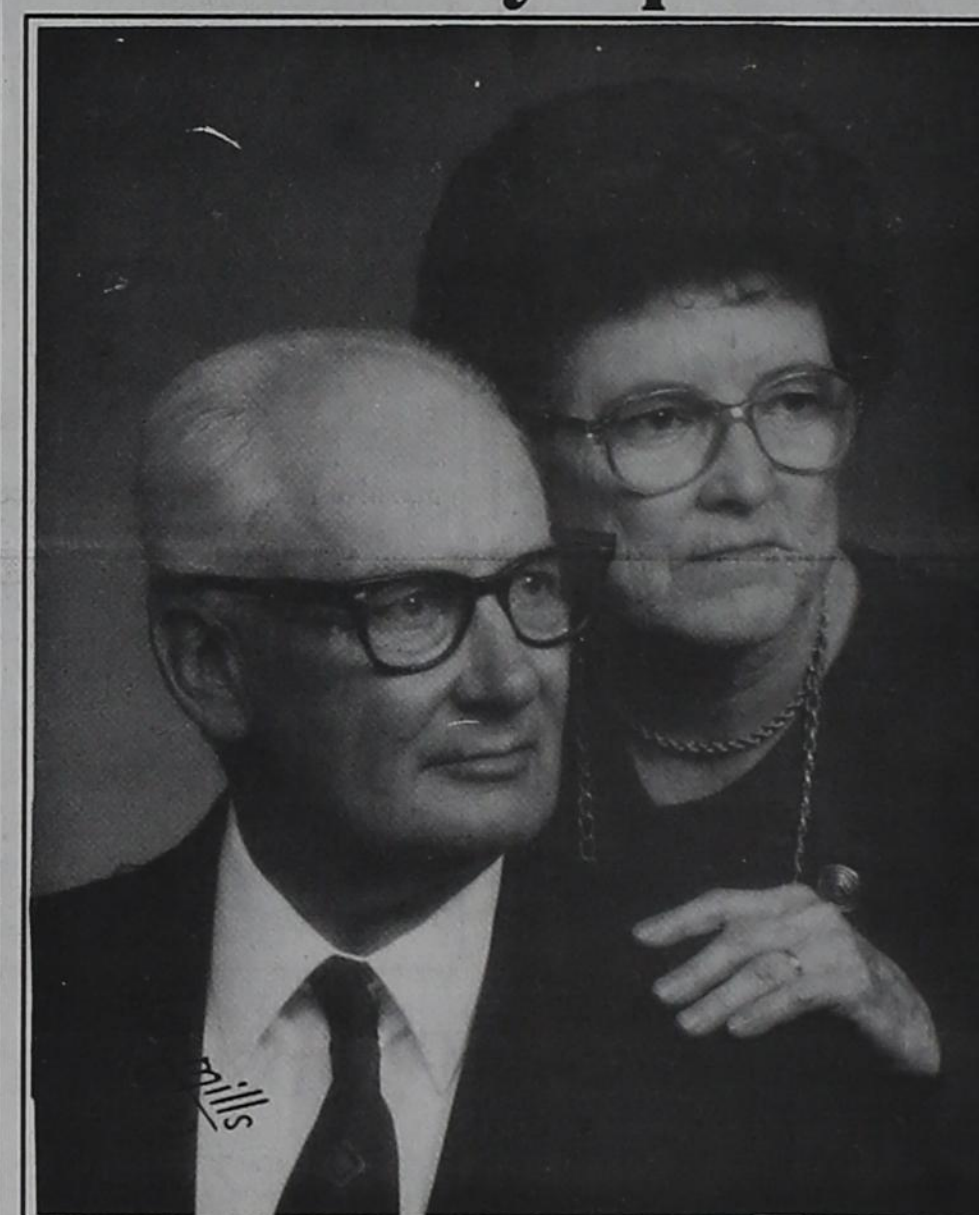

Post Antelopes sweep to District track crowns

'Lopes and Lady 'Lopes repeat as champions

Break out the brooms. The Bold Gold Antelopes swept away all comers as they dominated all three divisions of the District Four 2A track meet held Friday, April 16 in Post winning district crowns in boys varsity, junior varsity and girls varsity. A steady stream of 'Lopes and Lady 'Lopes earned gold as Post garnered 28 event titles in the three divisions.

The boys junior varsity led the way, picking up gold in 12 events. The junior 'Lopes cruised to the district title with 224 points.

"Our boys did a tremendous job of competing against the other teams," said J. V. coach Bart McMeans. "They scored 224 points with only 12 boys on the team. They worked hard all season and it showed."

This is the second consecutive year for the junior 'Lopes to win the district title.

The Lady 'Lopes started the day with a bang which was climaxed with a thrilling stretch run by senior LouAnn Ammons in the anchor leg of the 1600 m relay. They easily outdistanced runner up Idalou, 196 to 110.

The Lady 'Lopes dominated the morning's field events, with Christie Oden winning both the shot put and discus throws, Ammons taking the long jump and triple jump. Jamie Hawkins and Amber Cooper added to the morning's good start, finishing second and third in the high jump.

Speed and endurance played a major roll in the Lady 'Lopes efforts in the afternoon session. The ladies dominated the sprint relays and individual sprints and both long distance races.

Chelisa Williams took the 100 m dash with Andrea Wallace a close second, only .25 of a second back. Wallace picked up her own gold in the

200 m dash, overcoming another Williams, Melissa, beating her teammate by a scant .32 of a second.

Not to be outdone, Aleida Marin won both the 1600 m and 3200 m runs. In doing so all she did was set a new school record in the 3200, shattering the old school mark by almost a full fifteen seconds. Her winning time was 13:09.28, bettering the old mark of 13:24.

Ammons made her last appearance on the Post track a memorable one, picking up four gold and one silver medal. Her silver came in the 1600 m relay as she was unable to overcome a 30 plus meter deficit in her 400 meter anchor leg.

"These girls did a great job Friday," said head coach Bill Gordon. "We had girls run hurt who displayed a great deal of courage. We qualified for regionals in 14 events and look forward to going to Abilene to compete."

The boys varsity made their own haul of gold Friday, picking up first place medals in seven events. Speed and strength helped the 'Lopes pick up 190 points, to outdistance runner up Idalou.

Anthony Martin left little doubt who the fastest competitor was at the district meet, winning both the 100 and 200 m dashes. His primary competition came from teammates Alvin Reed and Lemuel McDonald. The trio finished 1-2-3 in the 200 meter dash and 1-3-4 in the 100.

Middle distance runner Brad Lawson picked up three gold medals, cruising to a comfortable win in the 400 m dash before teaming with other 'Lopes to win the 400 m relay and the 1600 m relay in near record time.

Post's domination of the middle distance races continued when Jaime Ayala cruised to a win in the 800 m run. Right in his heels was Post sophomore Cody Bain who used a well timed kick in the final turn to move in to second place and a silver medal.

For the second time this season, senior Ricky Jefferson has set a new standard in the triple jump. Jefferson bettered his leap of 42' 5" he made April 3 in Idalou, leaping 42' 10.25" to finish second with the new school record.

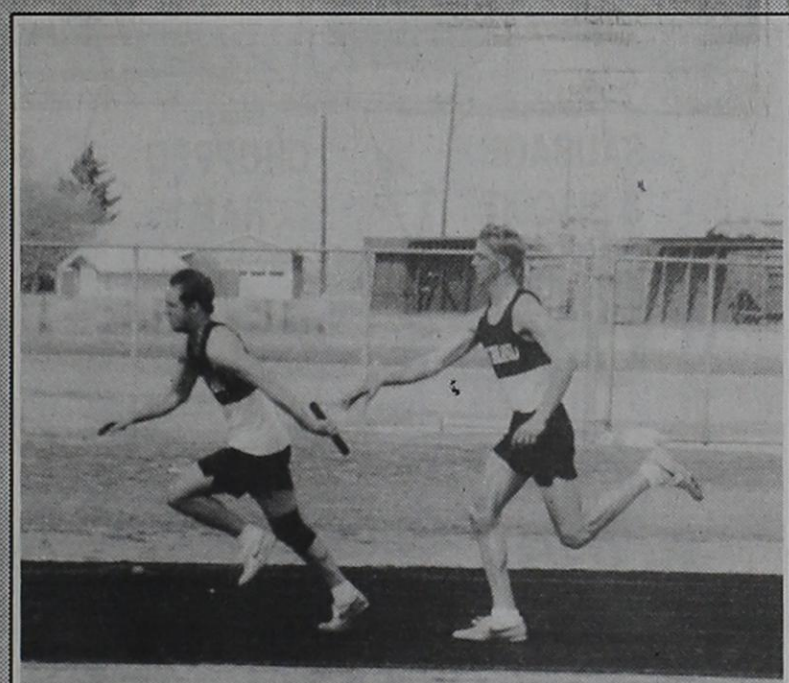

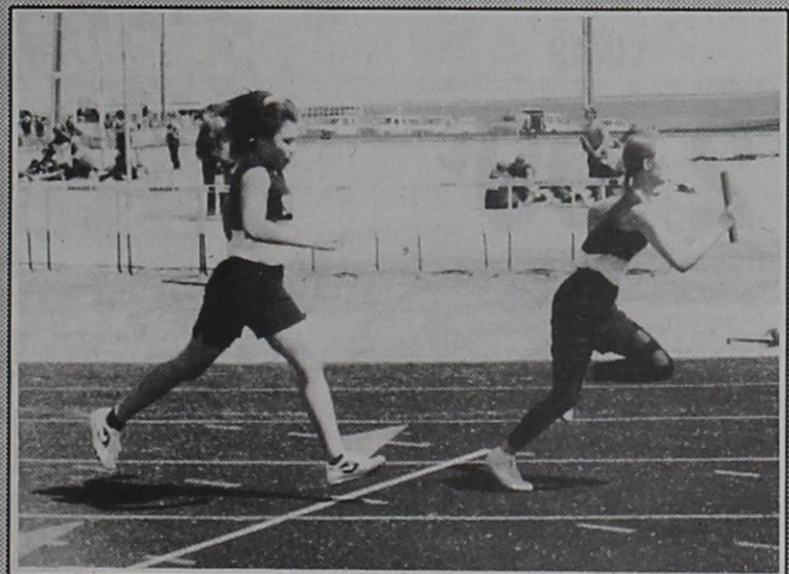

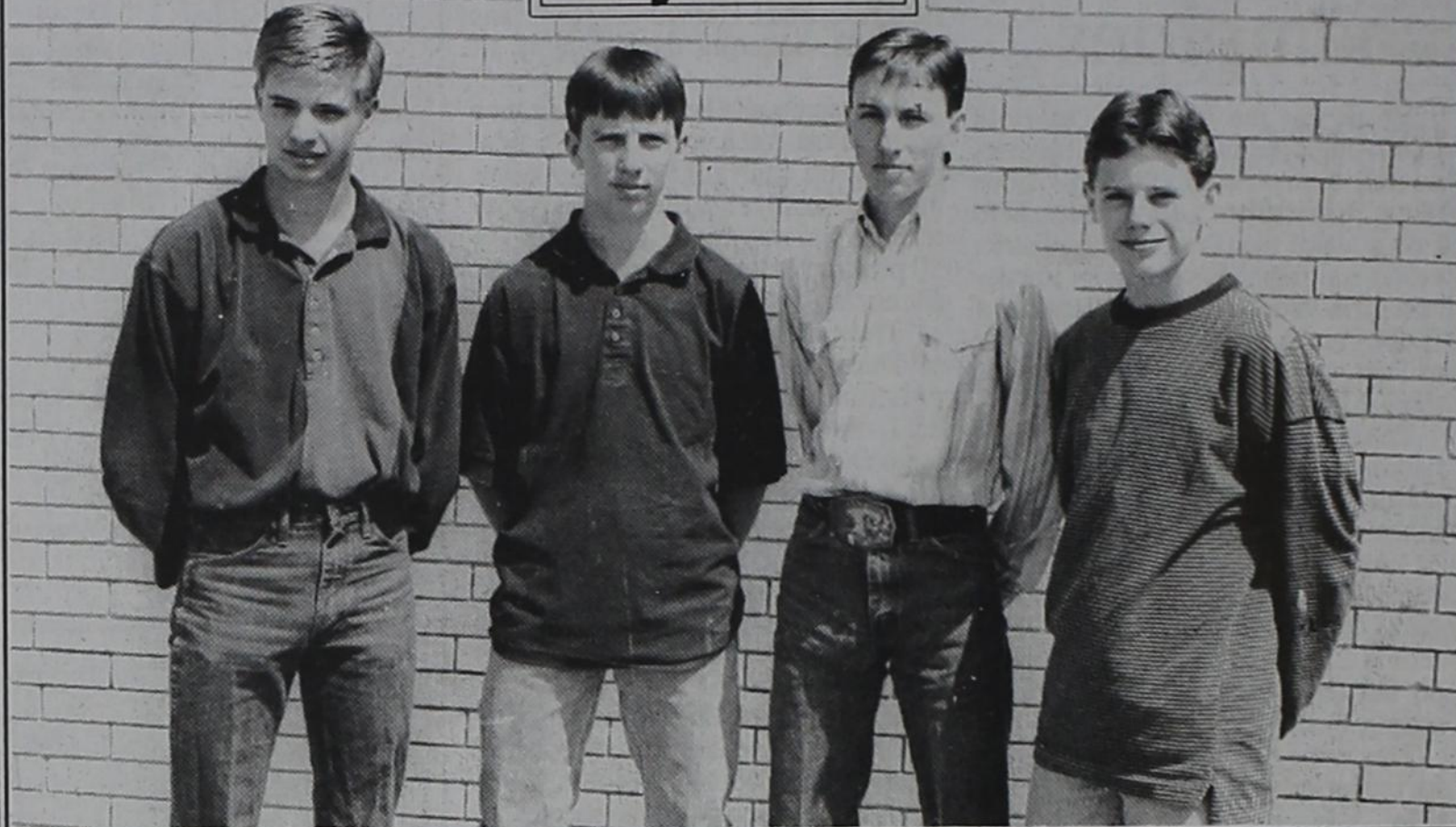

Bullock behind interim study

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock charged the telephone lobby on recently with attempting to bulldoze the legislature into rushing a decision on telecommunications which could mean a huge increase in rates for consumers and businesses.

"We will not be bullied into rushing a decision on something so important to the future of this state," Bullock said. "We will create jobs, we will protect consumers, we will build a state-of-the-art telecommunications system that will change the face of education, medicine, business and improve the average life of Texans."

"But, we will not do any of this without study, without first deciding who is to pay and without giving the matter the thoughtful consideration it demands."

Bullock said that while the study, without first deciding who is to pay and without giving the matter the thoughtful consideration it demands."

Bullock said that while the Texas Telephone Association is promising to invest \$1.4 billion in telecommunications infrastructure, they are asking for average Texans to bear the cost.

"Should this come out of the pocket of the ratepayer? Or, should Southwestern Bell—which enjoys about 74% of the total telephone revenue in Texas—be asked to reinvest some of its profits?" Bullock asked.

The lieutenant governor noted that Southwestern Bell has a return on investment that is almost double that of the other Bell operating companies. But, Southwestern Bell reinvests less in infrastructure than other Bell company even as they are investing in Mexico, cable TV systems in other parts of the country and the San Antonio Spurs.

Beyond the question of who pays, is the matter of the type of system Texas

needs for the 21st century. The entire telecommunications system is undergoing a revolution worldwide. The method of regulating telephone companies must evolve to meet the change.

"The Texas Telephone Associations proposal has been on the table for only a few months. We need to know more about the future face of telecommunications—the services that may potentially be available, how these services are regulated in other places, which will be competitive and which won't," Bullock said. "We need the best minds and the most knowledgeable experts working on this complex issue—not just promises from Southwestern Bell."

Bullock—whose position has the support of consumers, a variety of business interests, newspapers and elected officials—said the two-year study is the best course for Texas and Texans.

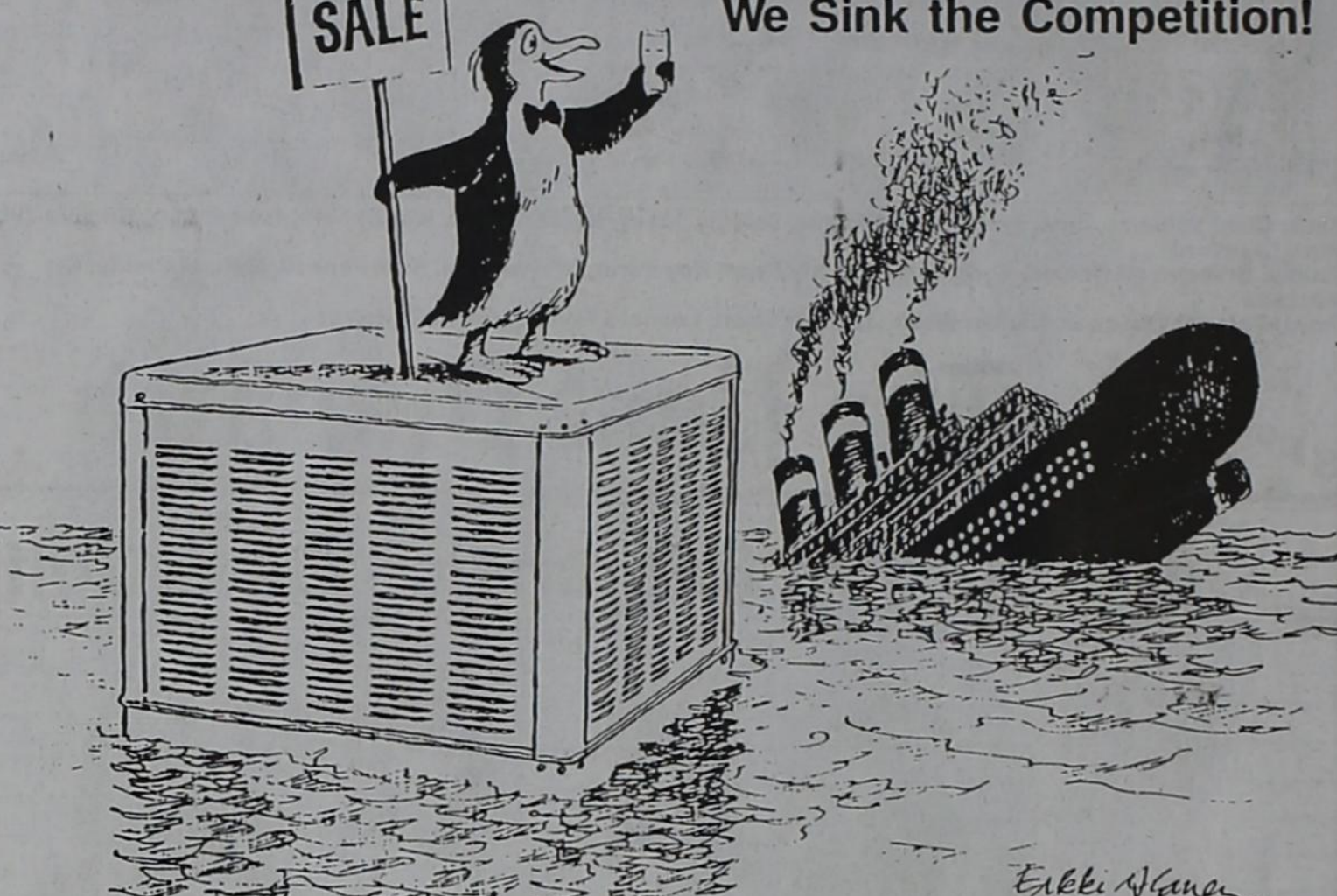

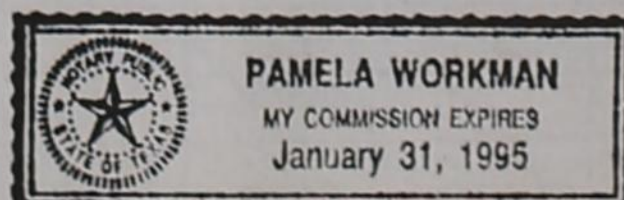

National Cancer Control Month observed in April

The prospects for beating cancer have greatly improved during the last decade. Today, there is a 50 percent survival rate for those diagnosed with the disease, as compared to a 10 percent survival rate in the early 1920's.

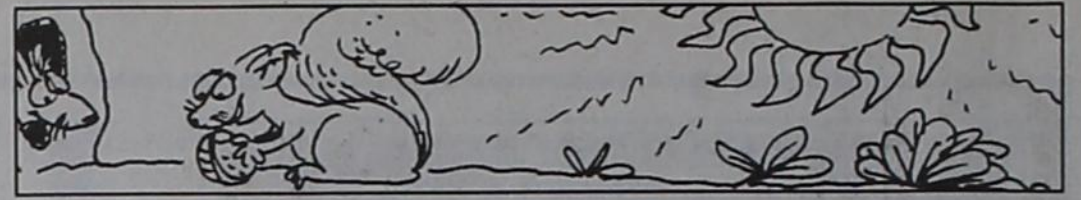
The increase in the cancer survival rate is due mainly to better treatment programs, coupled with early detection of the disease.

According to Sue Reese, R.N., oncology nurse specialist at Methodist Hospital's Hodges Cancer Center, early detection plays a major role in beating the disease. For this reason it's important to be aware of the seven cancer warning signs.

- A change in bowel or bladder habits.
- A sore that does not heal.
- Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
- Thickening or lumpiness in the breast or elsewhere.

Other signs of the disease may include unusual fatigue, a low-grade fever and persistent headaches accompanied by behavioral or vision changes.

"As a general rule, if any of these symptoms persist for more than two weeks, a physician should be consulted immediately," said Reese.

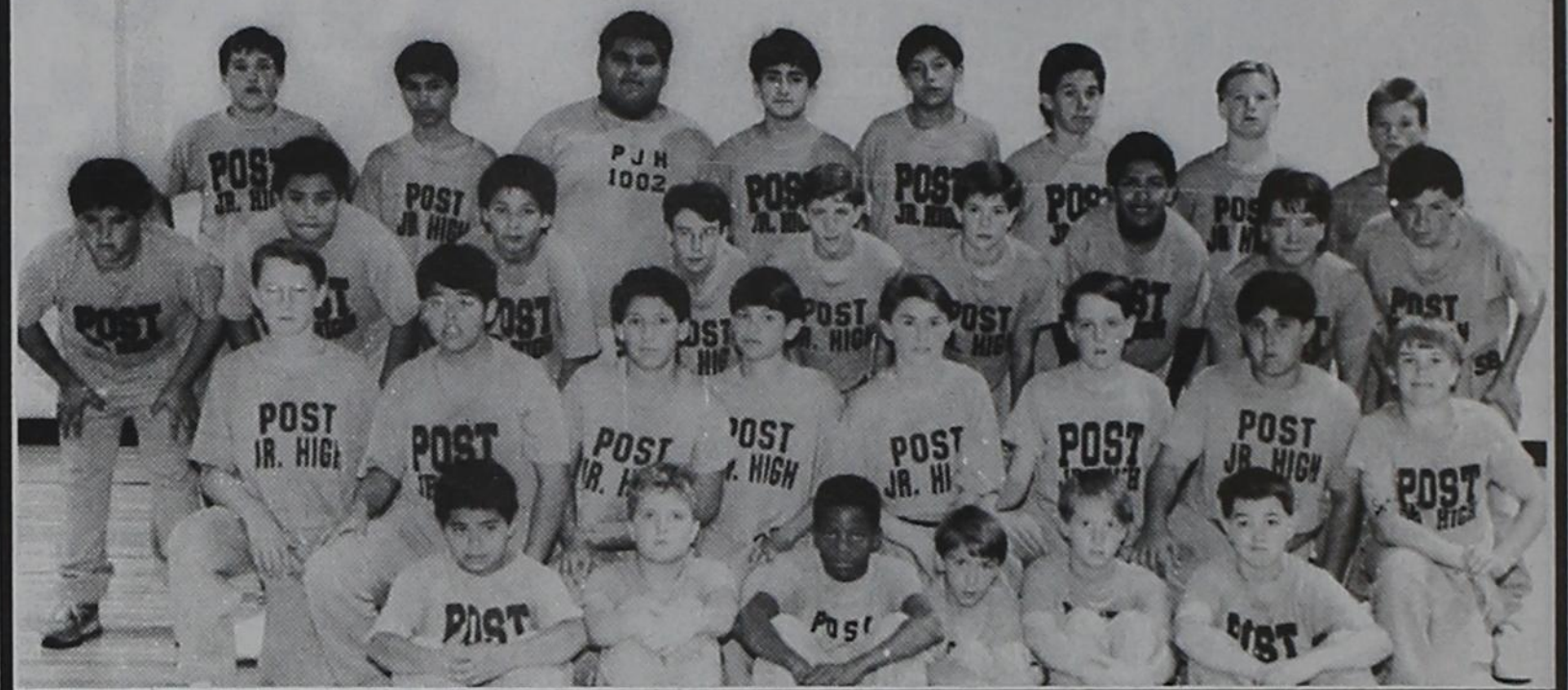

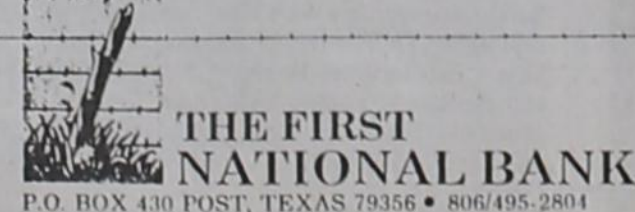
