Commissioners continue work on budget with Sept. 23 for final decision

Work on the new fiscal year's budget continued Monday in the Garza County commissioners' courtroom.

County officials reviewed and revised the budget proposal for the upcoming year but postponed its formal approval until later in the month. Commissioners agreed to meet Sept. 23 to take final action on the budget and to set the corresponding tax rate.

The new fiscal year begins October 1.

The court also established taxpayer guidelines for the upcoming year. As in the past, no "early payment" discount or split payment option will be allowed.

The conscious victim with a partial airway obstruction should be encouraged to cough. Do not interfere if coughing is strong and forceful indicating adequate air exchange. When the victim is unable to cough effectively and air exchange is poor, the Heimlich should Maneuver be administered.

Note Do not use the Heimlich Maneuver in a woman in late stages of pregnancy or on an infant.

A conscious victim with complete airway obstruction will often use the universal sign of choking - hands clutched at the throat - and display a panicked look on their faces. They will not be able to speak or cough. Respirations are absent, the person quickly becomes unconscious and death is imminent.

Everyone should be trained in airway obstruction procedures and CPR. A choking victim without adequate air exchange must have immediate intervention.



The Roosevelt Revolution in the 1930s was not a revolution of arms. It was not a revolution of armies. Nevertheless, it counts as one of the most dramatic and monumental events in American history. It not only altered America's way of life, it also shattered the moral, ethical, political, and economic foundations on which American society had been what happened in the 1930s.

Perfection being impossible-and human nature being what it isthere were, of course, exceptions that crept into the system. But the guiding moral and ethical principle of our ancestors was simple and fundamental: "You don't take what doesn't belong to you, not even when reform. " Being themselves products of the public-school system, they you want to do good things with it. It is wrong to steal."

And they believed that a private act of immorality-stealing-taking what doesn't belong to you to help another-could not be converted into a moral act by running it through the legislature.

Americans' antipathy to stealing, private or public, throughout the 19th century, was the reason our ancestors said no to such things as Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, public schooling, Meals on Wheels, and the like. Government programs that took money from one person in immoral.

Thus, throughout the 19th century, Americans were free to accumulate years of warfare. unlimited amounts of wealth, for there was no taxation on income. They were not forced to assist the elderly, the poor, or anyone else. Everyone pervades America. was free to decide for himself what to do with his own money. And the massive accumulation of capital and the enormous extent of voluntary charity did more for those at the bottom of the economic ladder than any government program in history.

In the 1930s, without even the semblance of a constitutional amendment, American society moved in an opposite direction . Franklin Roosevelt decreed that from that day forward, it would be the guiding principle of government in America to take money from those to whom it belonged in order to give it to others who Roosevelt said deserved it more. (See

"FDR and the End of Economic Liberty," *Freedom Daily*, August 1991.) To ameliorate people's conscience, Roosevelt told them not to worry: America's system of freedom was not being changed, but rather being saved. It was the beginning of what would become a dark and sinister life of the lie that the American people and their descendants would live destroyed with the welfare narcotic? For the mind-set of welfare-state for the rest of the century. At first, Republicans opposed Roosevelt's New Deal, primarily on moral grounds, but also on economic ones. They said it was wrong to steal, even when it's done to help the poor and needy. And they continually warned of the disastrous economic consequences that would result from the abandonment of moral principles. But gradually, Republicans threw in the towel. They recognized that the American people liked this new way of life-a life of plunder, immorality, debauchery, stealing, and welfare dependency. They realized that opposition all too often meant electoral defeat. Faced with the choice of prevailing at the polls or sticking to their moral principles, scape goats. The most popular one today is, of course, immigrants. "If it Republicans chose the former. So, Republicans began seeking office with proposals on how to make the welfare state more efficient. Their campaign slogan became: "We believe in free enterprise, welfare reform, and regulatory reform. We'll reduce the waste, fraud, and abuse of government programs, but we promise you that we will never dismantle them." Thus, election after election, no matter who was in office-Democrat or Republican—the cancer of the welfare and regulatory state grew exponentially. And the only ones left to sound the warning of what lay ahead were the libertarians. In 1944, Friedrich A. Hayek published his famous book, The Road to Serfdom. Hayek was a libertarian. (One of his most famous essays is "Why I Am Not a Conservative.") He would go on to win the Nobel Memorial Prize in Economic Science. His book outraged both Democrats and Republicans. Hayek warned: If you continue traveling this road—the road to the New Deal—the road to the welfare state—the road to the regulatory society—the road to the bureaucratic government—the road to serfdom you will be pursuing the same philosophy— the same programs—as the totalitarian countries that you profess to oppose. Democrats and Republicans recoiled in anger. "How can you suggest that we favor socialist and fascist economic beliefs and policies?" they asked. "Why, look at all the governmental controls that we have implemented in order to save free enterprise." The expansion of the welfare state continued throughout the 1950s. Then, there was a great leap forward with Democrat Lyndon Johnson's Great Society programs. Richard Nixon, a Republican, showed how an expansionary tax and regulatory system could be used to go after political enemies . In the '70s and '80s, Democrat Jimmy Carter and Republicans Ronald Reagan and George Bush did what Democrats and Republicans had been doing since FDR: promising, during electoral campaigns, "smaller" government and tax, regulatory, and welfare reform and then expanding the welfare-state programs after the election. And the results? They were predictable, at least by the libertarians. Everywhere in the world you look today- Cuba, Russia, China, North Korea, Sweden, England, and the U.S.-the welfare state is in crisis. Social Security? Busted. Close hospital, remove taxes

It has been no secret that for the past several years the Garza Memorial Hospital (GMH) has not operated with enough patients to warrant its full-fledged hospital status, as GMH board members acknowledged in last week's announcement about plans to close the facility.

Since that announcement tax payers have been posing the question, "well, at least we won't have to pay that tax any more, will we?"

Obviously, since the hospital district taxing authority was approved for the purpose of operating a hospital, if the hospital is closed, then one must expect that its original purpose for taxation must also cease. Any attempt to continue taxing beyond September 30, 1996 will certainly be challenged.

It is just as obvious that any government operated or funded facility, whether it be hospitals, schools, parks, dance halls, libraries, museums, art galleries or all the other myriad of "social" services, are not proper functions of government. And, yes, they are guilty — or I'm wrong in tarring all congressmen with the same brush. Pombo but just a little bit. They can be blamed mostly for lack of courage, and Shadegg have introduced House Resolution 2270, the Enumerated Powers bill. If passed, this law would require Congress to specify the authority under the United States Constitution for the enactment of laws it passes. They would have to point to the specific constitutional language. In their "Dear Colleague," Pombo and Shadegg had the courage, perhaps unmitigated gall, to reprint Article I, Section 8 of the United States Constitution, which

Legalized plunder steals money from travellers to cushion local government

In the words of that famous lover of liberty and freedom, the noted Frenchman Frederick Bastiat, when government agents take money from one set of people and give it to another... that's legalized plunder. It continues unabated in Garza County with highway revenue agents interfering with highway travel, by stopping, detaining and issuing citations for various state statutory regulations regarding the right to free travel.

During the month of August, the two Garza County Justices of the Peace collected \$20,190.50 to be shared by the county and state. Justice of the Peace Precinct 1 reported 181 total traffic and misdemeanor cases, issuing fines to 85 and dismissing six cases. There were 24 citizens assigned to driver safety courses, 11 deferred disposition and six dismissed following proof of financial responsibility. Total revenue for state and county was \$10,589.

Precinct 2 collections resulted in \$9,601.50 on 85 incidents. There were 66 citations issued by Texas DPS officers, three by the Texas Parks & Wildlife, five by the lake ranger and 11 from other DPS units.

The majority of traffic citations were for offenses which did not incur a violation of any person's constitutional rights, therefore, since there were no victims or injured parties, the citations take on the "color of law," which in itself violates the rights of the citizen upon whom the fines were imposed.

Had any of these cases been transferred or adjudicated in a court of common law, there would be no fines or punishment, since there is no violation of law unless there is an injured person or a victim. Texas citizens who are interested in taking advantage of their constitutional right (U.S. 7th Amendment) to trial at common law may contact the Bexar District Court of Common Law Pleas clerk Thelma Luttrell in Lubbock at 745-1690.

U.S. Constitution Amendment 7

"In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right to trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law."

Rally for the rights of youth



Do we really want to do things like Lubbock?

I have neglected to write due to the fact that I am not a resident of your fine city. I have noticed though that portions of the Post Paper are being mailed and faxed around the state and country as well as discussed on various sections of the internet so I have decided to comment on the issue of teen curfew that is before your city at this time.

I can speak from personal experience with my son's curfew violation. Perhaps I can raise some questions for you to consider before you rush to embrace curfews.

My son is an honor student, a boy scout, and his life revolves around computers and church activities. I allowed him to spend the night with a church friend from a far better side of town than we live in and he and his friend were arrested and locked up at 1 a.m. for throwing water balloons with the kids next door who also had friends over and were in on the "fun". He admitted guilt and agreed to take whatever punishment was dished out for this hideous crime. He was punished by me first. (parents are still allowed to do that as far as I know.....until "the village" notifies me of a change)

A policemen woke me at 4 a.m. to inform me that my son was being held. The city informed me that he could also be fined up to \$500. Ultimately he was fined only \$39 if he would serve four nights on teen court and do 90 hours of community service scrubbing floors and rinsing bedpans at the hospital. He did all of this. He felt he had somehow shamed our family and he deserved the punishment. THEN I received MY fine of \$39.! I was told this was my punishment for not "keeping and eye on my kid" I refused to pay it due to the fact that I BROKE NO LAWS nor did I injure any party on this night. I had entrusted my son to someone else's care and I could not sit and monitor him at their house. I also refused to pay on constitutional grounds. That is when my education began. I was taken into a little office where the city marshall of Lubbock, Texas informed me that this was a city ordinance and it had NOTHING to do with my constitutional rights. I asked if he charged the parents of gang punks with murder when their sons commited a drive by shooting and he jumped to his feet and in a raised voice said "You want to compare apples to oranges huh? Do you want to compare apples to oranges?" I am not sure what that meant but it did cause me to stop and think about about the cops

weighing the decision of patrolling the dark streets of east Lubbock (where I live and have been robbed and vandalized) versus the water ballooners on south Quaker and choosing to arrest a clean cut apple or two over a gang of oranges that might kill them.

Your officials will make the same call. I was told I could fight this in court if I wanted to or pay the city \$300 because I had not paid the \$39! They issued a warrant for my arrest.

I wimped out and paid the \$300 because I felt the time and money of a legal battle would cost more and because I don't feel that I could ever get justice in Lubbock County (this was before the common law court was established).

I now feel I shamed my family by not having the courage to stick to my convictions. I learned later that of the three boys detained for this offense, each paid a different fine and did different amounts of community service hours basically depending on the court's mood at the moment.

I also asked the marshall: if a mom who had custody of a child allowed the child to spend a weekend with a divorced father and the dad allowed the child out past curfew would the mom be fined?

The city marshall informed me that whoever is the legal guardian will pay.

Think about this Post! Is this fair? Isn't the whole concept of taking away freedoms to gain a little security only punishing the law abiders?

Do you really want to be like Lubbock?

Would you respect a teacher who kept the whole class in from recess because two kids could not behave?

Would you want a coach who made the whole team run extra laps if the star QB got caught drinking?

This is the mentality of punishing your decent kids because you don't have the courage to deal with the vandals. The good kids in Post deserve better.





Sports 'Lopes rip Floydada 29-8

The Post Antelopes started off their season with a bang last week, blowing away the Floydada Whirlwinds in a 29-8 home game.

The 'Lopes took the opening kickoff from their 31-yard line and drove it 69 yards in nine plays, eating up more than five minutes of the first quarter, to score their first touchdown of the '96 season. Quarterback Josh Grisham scored the touchdown on a 21-yard option play. Ten-yard runs by Grisham and Israel Perez fueled the impressive drive. Kicker Anthony Flores added the extra point.

The Whirlwinds, not to be outdone, took possession of the ball and drove down to the Post 24-yard line before the Antelope defense took charge and held on a key defensive stand. Taking the ball over on downs, the Antelopes began their second scoring drive of the night, running nine plays and 76 yards for a touchdown scored by Orlando Castillo on a four-yard run. A 13yard run by Todd Terry and a 12-yard scamper by Sam Woods boosted the drive which was topped off by another successful extra point by Flores.

The Antelope defense continued to prove stingy, forcing a fumble on the Post 35-yard line during the Whirlwinds' next possession. Two more Floydada possessions deep in Post territory were thwarted by the defense, giving the Antelopes at 14-0 lead at the half.

The teams traded punts again before Post logged another scoring drive, this one 10 plays for 66 yards. The 1-yard touchdown run was made by Castillo, who also ran in for the two-point conversion and final score of the game.

Head Coach Richard Gorman said his team executed their game plan very well.

"We weren't able to throw the ball as much as we wanted to but we really didn't need to because we were able to get it done on the ground," he said.







AUSTIN - Gov. George W. Bush announced new rules on ethics last week to prohibit lobbying by former staff members.

Bush asked his 184-member staff to sign a promise that if they leave their jobs, they will not lobby the governor's office for at least one

"My administration will uphold the highest ethical standards. We must all continue to conduct ourselves in a manner which makes Texas proud," Bush said in a memo to his staff.

In July, Diane Allbaugh, the wife of Gov. Bush's executive assistant Joe Allbaugh, resigned as a lobbyist for AT&T and Texas issues to be considered in the 1997 legislative session. Also that month, it was reported that three former Bush aides, Dan Shelley, Reggie Bashur and Cliff Johnson worked as lobbyists after leaving the governor's staff.

The governor said he was troubled by the appearance of a conflict of interest and said he would initiate a policy to deal with such situations. The new policy, however, does not forbid former staffers from lobbying state agencies or the

Statesman her ethics policy "goes far beyond what my predecessors did and what the law requires." Rail Line to Be Studied

In hopes of relieving traffic congestion along Interstate 35, the Texas Transportation Commission wants to see whether building a commuter rail link between San Antonio and the city of Round Rock, 10 miles north of Austin, has merit.

The agency approved a study that will show how much an 80-mile passenger rail would cost and how it would be operated. The state will pay half the cost of the study, which could cost up to \$500,000.

Insurance rates for Texas drivers covered by Allstate and State Farm Insurance companies may increase under new rates filed at the Texas Department of Insurance.

State Farm said its average rate in Texas will increase by 2.9 percent on Oct. 29. Individual customers

could see smaller increases or no increase based on where they live and their driving records.

Allstate reported it would raise overall rates by 1.3 percent. That change will take effect Sept. 9.
