Johnny Bush headlines Oct. 2 OS Roping Dance

Country music legend Johnny Bush will perform at the OS Ranch Steer Roping and Art Exhibit Dance set for Saturdya Oct. 2 at the Post Community Center. Tickets for the event are available by calling 495-3461 or see Wanda Mitchell at the Post Commerce & Tourism Bureau.

If he had done nothing but write honky-tonk standards like "Whiskey River," "Sound of a Heartache" and "When My Conscience Hurts the Most," Bush's place in the country music world would be secure.

If he contented himself with singing standard-setting versions of barstool anthems like "Green Snakes on the Ceiling," "There Stands the Glass" and "A Moment Isn't Very Long," he could look back on a career well spent. If he hadn't fronted his own ensembles, including his Western Swing band

the Bandoleros, Bush could take pride in putting the swing into Ray Price's Cherokee Cowboys and Willie Nelson's early group, The Record Men. With the release of a new album, Honky Tonk, Bush demonstrates in his fifth decade of performing his mastery of country music spans generations. In addition to his old friend, bandleader and mentor, Willie Nelson, Bush is joined on the album by several of Texas' new generation of country rockers

 Kevin Fowler, Cooder Graw and Stephanie Urbina Jones. Bush's career in country music began in earnest in the mid '60s when he landed a deal with a song publisher and began singing demos. Nelson, who was then known as a songwriter and not a performer, produced Bush's first album, Sound of a Heartache, in 1967. A series of regional hits followed, with most of the tunes reaching No. 1 on the Texas charts and the Top 10 or Top 20 nationally.

In 1969, Bush was named the Most Promising Male Vocalist in country music by Record World magazine, and by 1972 he had signed with RCA


During its Sept. 16 meeting, the board of directors for the Garza FQHC, district officials agreed they would like to take a closer look at the Rural Health Clinic program, which also could provide some financial assistance to the clinic operation. Boucher said PNS, the clinic operator, has pledged its assistance in this effort.

In other business, board members:

 Received the indigent care report. At the end of August, 13 individuals were in the program, compared to 11 at the beginning of the month. With one month remaining in the district's fiscal year, the indigent health care program has cost just under \$95,000 of the \$100,000 budgeted.

· Received the monthly report on the operation of the Garza County Health Clinic. According to the report, 564 visits were recorded in August, compared to 590 during the month before. A total of 929 procedures were performed last month, compared to 871 in the previous month. Charges totaled about \$45,500, up almost \$2,000, and patient collections were up more than \$400. Expenses were up approximately \$2,100 to \$38,500 for a deficit of \$14,472 for the month. Boucher said the cost-per-visit improved during the month of August.



Records. His first single for the label, "Whiskey River," was well on its way to becoming the biggest hit of his career, and Bush was headlining in and selling out huge clubs.

A medical condition affected his singing voice, and by 1974 RCA dropped Bush from its roster. The gritty singer, however, continued to fight to maintain his career, recording "When My Conscience Hurts the Most" on his own label. It landed on the charts in 1978, and Bush continued performing.

In 1985, thanks to the help of a speech therapist, Bush reclaimed a large part of his singing range and some limited speech. It wasn't until 1990 that a new treatment allowed Bush's speech to again reach a near normal Several albums later and somewhat to his surprise, Bush has become

something of a mentor figure to younger Texas musicians who revered the honky tonk/hardcore country sound that Bush helped embody. In 2003, he was inducted into the Texas Country Music Hall of Fame, with Nelson on hand to do the honors.





Hazardous Household Products Do you have these products in your home? Bleach, rat poison, mothballs, charcoal lighter fluid, oven cleaner, batteries, mercury thermometers, gas, oil, wood polish, toilet and drain cleaners, shoe polish, bug spray? Household products like these are dangerous for your children!

Household products are called hazardous if they can harm people when not used in the right way. Not every product is hazardous and some are more dangerous than others.

You can use most products safely if you follow the directions on the label. Doing things that are not on the label is risky for your health and your family's. People run into trouble by using too much of a product, or by mixing two products together, for example.

Children can be poisoned if products are stored or thrown away unsafely. Children's bodies are small, so even a little bit of some chemicals can cause big problems.

Eating or drinking a hazardous product is dangerous, of course. Also, just touching or breathing some products*even a very small amount of them*can be harmful. They can burn your skin or eyes just by touching them. Some hazardous products can make you sick if they get into your body through your skin or when you breathe in their dust or fumes.

Sometimes you know right away if with a hazardous product. You may feel sick to your stomach or dizzy. Your water or hurt.

Other problems don't show up until later, like cancer or harm to your lungs. Also, coming into contact with chemicals can affect a child's growing

You can protect your children and yourself from illness and injury. Use hazardous products safely. Store them carefully. Dispose of them properly. The following will help you learn more. Use Safely

Do you use hazardous household products safely?

* Read the label. That is one of the poisoning worse. most important steps in using

* Look for words like caution, "Products". warning, flammable, harmful, danger, poison. These tell you that a product may be hazardous. If you see these words on a label, take extra care.

"Wear protective clothing." This means wear goggles or safety glasses, gloves, long sleeves, or other coverings. The right clothing can prevent burns or keep chemicals from going into your body through the skin.

* Never mix products unless the label says it is safe to do it. For example, never mix products containing chlorine bleach with products centaining ammonia. You will make a deadly gas by mixing these together.

* Keep children and pets away while you use hazardous products.

*Always put the cap back on and put you or your child has come into contact away the product right after you finish

* Never leave the product or container skin may itch or burn. Your eyes may where children can see it or reach it. * Don't eat, drink, or smoke when

using hazardous products. *Be ready in case there's an accident: Put the Poison Control Center telephone number, 800/222-1222,







Receive holy spirit ... use of Greek word "epi"

in the context of receiving holy spirit, there are at least five areas in the book of Acts that use the Biblical Greek word "epi." This word is mostly translated "to fall upon," "fall on" or simply "upon" (among other uses). In The Companion Bible, E.W. Bullinger provided the following definition of epi, "With the Accusative [case] it implies the downward pressure on that upon which a thing rests; active motion being suggested (e.g. 2Cor. 3:15. 1Tim. 5:5). Hence, it denotes any extended motion downward (Matt. 13:2; 18:12; 19:28; 27:45) from heaven to earth (Mark 4:20. Acts 11:15. 2Cor. 12:9)...epi marks the point to be reached." (Appendix 104 ix 3). Although the word epi is used many times throughout the New Testament, its uses in the context of receiving holy spirit warrant more attention.

The first usage of epi, as related to holy spirit is found John 1:33, "And I knew him not: but He that sent me to baptize with water, the same said unto me, 'Upon [epi] whom thou shalt see the spirit descending, and remaining on [epi] him, the same is he which baptizes with the Holy Ghost." Now, because Jesus is the risen Lord and Savior, it is available for holy spirit to permanently come upon anybody. This condition is unique to the period of time known as the Administration of the grace of God (Ephesians 3:2-6).

Acts 1:8, "But you shall receive [lambano] power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon [epi] you..." During the past teachings it was established that to receive holy spirit means the point in time that people speak in tongues. Here, we get more information. After people start speaking in tongues,

Continuing on the subject of speaking in tongues the holy spirit is considered to be pressing downward from heaven to earth, and has truly reached its mark (see above definition of "epi").

> Acts 2:3, "And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon [epi] each of them." This scripture directly ties speaking in tongues with holy spirit pressing downward from heaven to earth, having reached its mark (Greek word, epi). Please notice that "epi" is not used in the context of being filled with holy spirit, but with speaking in tongues. The first 12 were first filled with holy spirit. Then they got the vision of cloven tongues sitting upon each of them, and they immediately began to speak in tongues.

> Acts 8:16 "For as yet he was fallen upon [epi] none of them: only they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus." Seen in the context of verse 15, the word "epi" is used in direct relation to the condition of receiving [lambano] holy spirit.

> Acts 10:44, "While Peter yet spoke these words, the Holy Ghost fell on [epi] all them which heard the word." How did they know this? See verse 46, "For they heard them speak with tongues."

Acts 19:6, "And when Paul had laid his hands upon them, the Holy Ghost came on [epi] them; and they spoke with tongues..." The laying on of hands was according to specific revelation from God, and was not a generally required condition for people to speak in tongues. Once again, from the context of verses 2-6, speaking in tongues is inextricably tied to the use of "epi" in the context of holy spirit.







When Liberators Become Occupiers

When asked in April 2004 whether they viewed the U.S.-led coalition as "liberators" or "occupiers," 71 percent of all respondents said "occupiers." According to another poll taken in July, two-thirds of Iraqis were either "strongly" or "somewhat" opposed to the foreign military presence in their country.

In history, U.S. forces often have been seen as liberators—for example, when they drove foreign armies out of occupied countries. The United States led the forces that drove German troops out of France in 1944. We were seen as liberators; by our acts, and by the sacrifice of thousands of American soldiers, the United States freed the people of France from the yoke of Nazi oppression. U.S. forces, joined by British, Canadian, and other allies, liberated the Dutch

Letters of Marque and Reprisal

(Editor's Note: The following statement was issued October 11, 2001. Had the Congress and the President taken this opportunity, perhaps the mess in Afghanistan and Iraq would have been avoided. Congressman Ron Paul today (10/11/01) presented Congress with

the "Marque and Reprisal Act of 2001," legislation designed to give President Bush an additional tool in the fight against terrorism. He also introduced legislation that changes the federal definition of "piracy" to include air piracy.

The Constitution gives Congress the power to issue letters of marque and reprisal when a precise declaration of war is impossible due to the vagueness of the enemy. Paul's bill would allow Congress to authorize the President to specifically target Bin Laden and his associates using non-government armed forces. Since it is nearly impossible for U.S. intelligence teams to get close to Bin Laden, the marque and reprisal approach creates an incentive for people in held promise of a new world order - where brutality will go Afghanistan or elsewhere to turn him over to the U.S.

"The President promised the American people that the federal government would use every available resource to defeat the global effort." terror network," Paul stated.

"Congress should immediately issue letters of marque and reprisal to add another weapon to the U.S. arsenal. The war on terrorism is very different from past wars, because the enemy is a group of individuals who do not represent any nation. Western intelligence in the Middle East is exceedingly limited, so we should avail ourselves of the assistance of those with better information to track, capture, or kill Bin Laden."

The Act allows Congress to narrowly target terrorist enemies, lessening the likelihood of a full-scale war with any Middle Eastern nations. The Act also threatens terrorist cells worldwide by making it more difficult for our enemies to simply slip back into civilian populations or hide in remote locations.

"Once letters of marque and reprisal are issued, every terrorist is essentially a marked man," Paul concluded. "Congress should issue such letters and give the President another weapon to supplement our military strikes."



Garden Checklist for September

1. Rejuvenate heat-stressed geraniums and begonias for the fall season by lightly pruning, fertilizing, and watering. Caladiums require plenty of water at this time of year if they are to remain lush and attractive until fall. Fertilize with ammonium sulfate at the rate of 1/2 to 2 pounds per 100 square feet of bed area and water thoroughly.

2. Don't allow plants with green fruit or berries to suffer from lack of moisture Hollies will frequently drop their fruit under drought conditions.

3. Prune out dead or diseased wood from trees and shrubs. Hold off on major pruning until midwinter. Pruning now may stimulate tender growth prior to

4. Divide spring-flowering perennials such as irises, Shasta daisies, gaillardias. cannas, day lilies, violets, liriope, and ajuga. Reset divisions into well prepared soil with generous amounts of organic material worked into the top 8 to 10 inches.

5. Prepare the beds for spring-flowering bulbs as soon as possible. It is important to cultivate the soil and add generous amounts of organic matter to improve the water drainage. Bulbs will rot without proper drainage.

6. Plantings at this time can provide landscape color for three seasons in central, east, and south Texas. Annuals set out early enough will bloom as soon as Thanksgiving, and frequently last until Memorial Day. Annuals that should soon be available in nurseries and garden shops include petunias, calendulas pansies, snapdragons, stock, sweet peas, and violas (from seed).

7. Continue a disease-spray schedule on roses, as blackspot and mildew car. be extremely damaging in September and October. Funginex, used every 7 to 14 days, will usually give excellent control.

8. Christmas cactus can be made to flower by supplying 12 hours of uninterrupted darkness and cool nights (55 degrees F.) for a month, starting ir. mid-October. Keep plants on the dry side for a month prior to treatment.

9. Replenish mulches around trees and shrubs, and water every 3 to 5 days Start cool-season vegetables, such as mustard, lettuce, arugula, broccoli, carrots and turnips, from seed in well prepared beds. Harvest okra, peppers, squash and other vegetables often to encourage production.




