## Tractorcade Shows Strength In Clovis

Over 70 farmers from throughout Parmer County, representing American Agriculture's farm strike movement, drove their tractors to Clovis Tuesday afternoon, giving the residents of the New Mexico city a show of strength on the farm strike.

"It was just a friendly movement. No blockades or picketing was planned," said Ralph Roming, spokesman for the local farmers' group.

The tractorcade converged at the strike headquarters on south Third Street in Bovina just prior to noon Tuesday. They then paraded up

Third Street and then took Highway 60 to Clovis. The group planned to parade down Clovis' Main Street, hoping to draw attention to the strike effort.

Over 35 tractors came to join the group from Friona, and a number came up from the Lazbuddie area. The group from Friona stopped momentarily at the MBPXL plant between Friona and Bovina, temporarily blocking the entrance.

"We had over a million dollars worth of tractors in the tractorcade, and many of them are mortgaged," Roming stated.

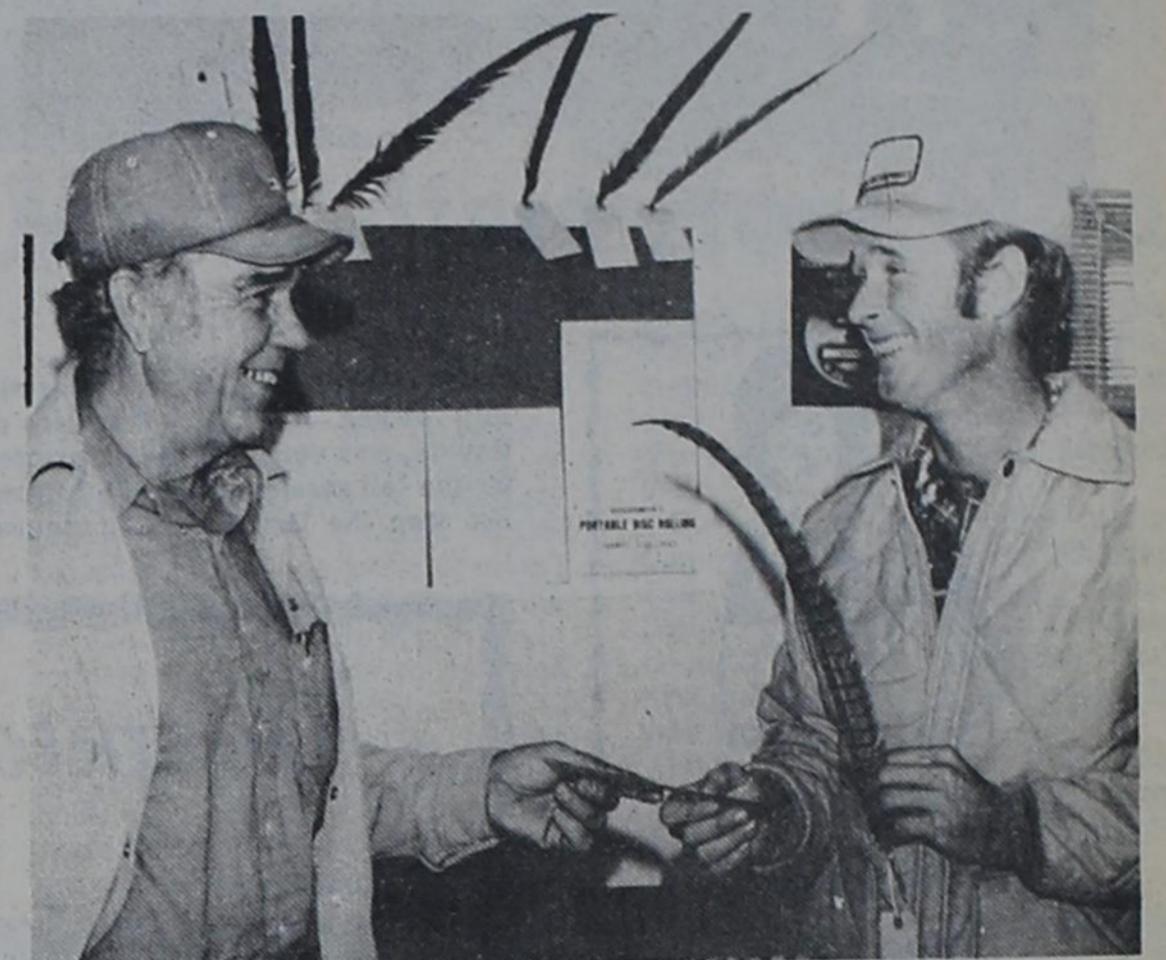
Virtually every tractor had some sort of printed sign to call attention to the strike effort.

Many signs simply stated: "On Strike for 100 per cent parity."

One professionally printed sign said "It may be peanuts to Carter, but my farm is my life!"

Another sign proclaimed "The amber waves of grain are giving Carter a pain—Carter is one pill we don't want to swallow anymore!"

One tractor had the slogan "Stop Beef Imports" painted in the window of its custom cab. Others were labeled "Goonbuggy."

## Stone Captures County Honors

Jessie Stone of Bovina was named this week as Parmer County's champion pheasant hunter, in the annual "longest tailfeather contest" sponsored by the Parmer County Game Management Assn.

Stone's winning entry in Bovina measured 25 1/4 inches for first place and \$15.00. He also captured second place, with a feather measuring an even 25 inches. Donnie Shamblin of Amarillo and Barty Bartlett tied for

third place with entries measuring 24 3/4 inches.

Stone took county honors by being the only hunter to turn a feather as long as 25 inches.

Ralph McClendon of San Marcos had the winning feather in Farwell's contest, at 24 and 13-16th inches. Dale Schueler was the winner at Friona with a 24 1/4 inch tailfeather.

By winning the county title, Stone will receive a belt buckle with a hand-painted pheasant emblem.

## War Declared On Stray Dogs

A new enforcement program is being implemented by the City of Bovina to stem the problems caused by dogs roaming the streets of Bovina. City Manager, Clayton Williamson, stated that the program, approved by the Bovina City Council in special session on December 29, is three pronged in approach. "The first step is to vaccinate and tag all owned dogs in the city." To accomplish this, a public vaccination clinic will be held this Thursday and Friday, January 5 and 6, from 1-5 p.m. at the Bovina Fire Station-City Barn. A private veterinarian will vaccinate animals for a small fee and 1978 Bovina Dog Tax Tags can be purchased at that time for \$1.00 each.

Step 2 of the program will begin after the vaccination clinic. According to the City Marshal, Jerry Atchley, owners of dogs who allow them to roam will be written citations. "It is an offense to let your dog run free or for it not to be tagged. A person letting a tagged dog run free will receive one citation while a person with a freely roaming untagged dog will receive two." A dog owner can be fined \$100.00 an offense. To avoid citations, dogs should be kept in a humane manner that will prevent roaming, such as fencing them in.

The third step is to eliminate the unowned, stray dog population of the city. Williamson reports that untagged dogs will be impounded by city police and employees. "The dogs will be held 48 hours as provided by city ordinance. Persons wishing to reclaim an impounded dog will have to pay a \$2.00 impoundment charge plus \$1.00 for each day the dog is held." The owner will also be written citations at the time the dog is reclaimed.

Williamson stated that the City Council is determined to implement and continue an effective animal control program. "We are receiving numerous complaints each week about the dog problem. The City Council feels this program, based on tagging owned animals and then citing irresponsible dog owners who let their dogs roam free, is the best approach. The City can then dispose of stray dogs." Williamson also suggested that owners of dogs currently vaccinated bring written proof of vaccination to the clinic and obtain city tags. Anyone bringing a

dog to the clinic should have it on a leash.

To report problems with dogs call 238-1116, 8 a.m. to noon and 1-5 weekdays. Calls will be handled as employees are available to do dog complaints. "It is not a problem we can solve overnight," Williamson said, "but one that will take time and hard work. And the public's understanding and cooperation are essential to solving the problem."

In instances of a serious nature involving dogs after normal operating hours, call the Bovina Police Department at 238-1133.

## City Starts Late Charge On Utilities

The following announcement on delinquent city utility bills has been released by City Manager Clayton Williamson:

City utility bills will be mailed to all customers at the first of the month. A 10 per cent penalty shall be due on all bills not paid after the 12th day of the month. If the 12th day falls on a weekend, the penalty shall not begin until after the next business day. A second notice shall be sent to all delinquent customers on or about the 16th day.

During the second week of the next month the customers having delinquent bills still outstanding shall be mailed a final notice that payment is due. If payment is not received within four days, water service will be discontinued.

Payment of the delinquent bill in full, as well as a \$2.00 service charge for reconnecting the water service must be made before water service will be provided.

In making her announcement, Mrs. Felts, a county resident since 1946, said "It has been a pleasure to serve as Parmer County Treasurer since 1974. I am now asking that the voters of this county support me for a second term of office."

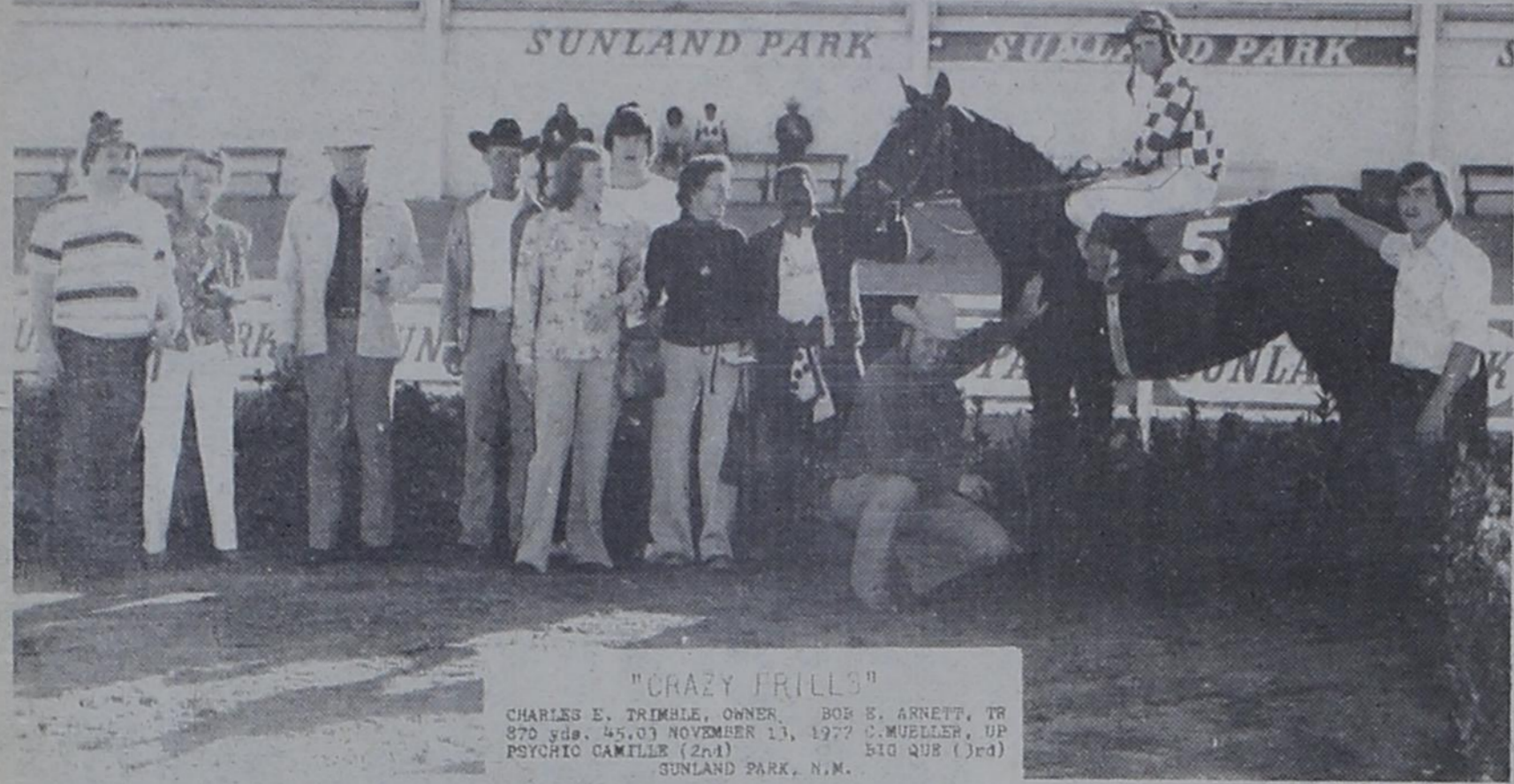

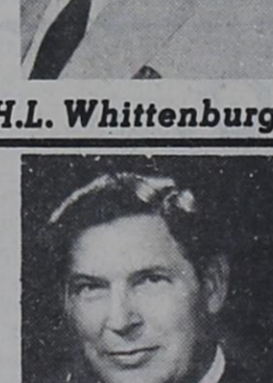

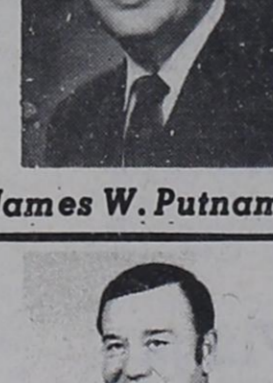

# Fillies Led By Balanced Attack

The Bovina High School Fillies, who stood at nine wins and six losses at the Christmas holiday break, are being sparked by a balance offensive attack and an equally tough defense, according to mid-season statistics released this week by coach Joel Nelson.

Coach Nelson says he is well pleased with the progress of his team to this point. Although the team's record is 9-6, they could be 12-3 just as easily.

"We lost in overtime to Lazbuddie, and lost two other games by just one point. We could have a 12-3 record if we had scored just four more points for the season—and at the right time," Nelson says.

The team's record is quite a credit since they have played tough class AA teams, Tulia, Muleshoe and Friona, plus Class A Hale Center. The Fillies split two games with the Mulettes, are 1-2 against Tulia, and 2-0 versus Friona.

Mid-season statistics show that four players are pushing double-figure scoring averages, led by Belinda Shelby, averaging 15.6 points per game. Next comes Denise Read, a sophomore, at 14.6, and Elyse Moody, a freshman, at 12.2.

Pat Shepherd, who has split her playing time between forward and guard, is averaging 7.3 points. Last year, Miss Shepherd carried the bulk of the scoring load.

Miss Shelby also is the team's top shooter from the field, with a nifty 43.3 per cent completion average, hitting 94 goals in 217 shooting attempts.

Miss Moody is second in this category at 37.4 per cent, on 61 of 163 tries, and Miss Read a close third on 59 of 164 attempts, 36 per cent.

From the free throw line, Miss Read is the whiz, and has a sparkling 74.1 per cent average. She has made 84 of 116 attempts from the line.

Miss Moody is also runnerup in this category, with 24 points out of 41 shots, a 58.5 per cent accuracy average.

On defense, Sandi Sides is the team leader in defensive rebounds, with 111 in 15 games. Kim Naegle has 49 and Carol Ware 45.

Miss Sides also has seen some action on offense, as Coach Nelson is blessed with talent that is just as comfortable playing on either end of the court.

After visiting Lazbuddie on Tuesday and hosting Adrian on Friday, the teams will host Kress next Tuesday, January 10, in their first district outings.
