

It's easy to get a little down by watching the news lately. After all, the constant chatter about the recession and the banking meltdown makes me seriously wonder what the future holds and entices me be stingy with my money.

Then there's that outdoor thing... I love the outdoors and want to be out as much as I can. Let's face it though: traveling to far away places isn't cheap and if you hunt, well you know which way the price of hunting leases are headed.

So what's an outdoor enthusiast to do in these times of lean living? Luckily, you and your family can still do things that are inexpensive and fun.

Visit public land

State parks are made for recreation and are family friendly. In our general area we are lucky to have lots of public land in proximity. There's Caprock Canyons State Park, Quartz Mountain State Park, and Copper Breaks State Park for starters. When you are ready to learn more about astronomy, check out the Comanche Springs Astronomy Campus between Paducah and Crowell and attend one of their star parties held regularly throughout the year.

Go fishing

In my opinion, kids and fishing are made for each other. For my kids the experience of just getting to go out is as special as catching fish. Therefore, I take them angling whenever I can.

Since most kids are okay with catching just about any fish, plenty of inexpensive opportunities exists for taking the family on an angling excursion. 

Only two historic Texas lighthouses are still in use: Matagorda and the Lydia Ann Channel Lighthouse.

During the Hurricane of 1900, 200 The doorway was now underwater. Galveston, Texas residents made their way to the highest point of land and shelter, the Bolivar Peninsula

Lighthouse. To escape the rising water, Light Keeper, H. C. Clariborne, strung a lifeline of rope between his home and the lighthouse to guide terrified men, women and children as they crowded into the spiral stairway.

A half mile away a train from Beaumont, Texas, was derailed by the vicious storm. Of the 95 people on board 10 decided to brave the rising water and make their way to the safety of The Bolivar Lighthouse. Those 10 people were the last ones to find shelter in the crowded structure. Once safely inside, the tide rose,

Throughout the night the people listened to the hurricane roar. Battered by 100 mph winds the lighthouse creaked and swayed. At 8:30 the light keeper and his wife attempted to light the flame but the hurricane wind shattered the glass. The now bloodied keeper was forced to return to the crowded stairway. By morning over 6000 Galveston residents were dead, including all the train passengers stranded on the flooded tracks. Among the survivors were the 200 people who had taken refuge in the Bolivar Lighthouse. Once again a lighthouse and its keeper had sheltered people from a storm.
