

Early in 1942, Ella was experiencing some financial difficulties, prompting her to ask the court to cite Howard (her ex-husband) for contempt for not making his \$50 support payments on time. During that summer, Simmons had

given Ella \$20,000. And a month later he had borrow back \$5,000 as his cash flow began to suffer. He gave her a 60day note. When it came due, he gave her another note for \$6,000 and a three month allowance. When he didn't honor the note, Ella obtained a lawyer and filed suit against Simmons, receiving a check for \$6,750.

The major oil companies had begun pushing out the independents, and this left a serious dent in his cash flow even though his wealth was well above the million dollar mark. In the end, Simmons wrote the check to Ella and upon learning that she had arrived in Tulsa, in desperation; he decided to come clean with his wife, telling her of his extramarital affair.

Ella failed to get word that Karl Simmons had paid up, and she decided to take matters into her own hands. When she arrived in Tulsa on the morning of March 23, she found the payment had been made and prepared to leave that evening. She was anxious to get back to Fort Worth for she had an appointment with a photographer on the 25th. She was unable to get reservations for the trip back to Fort Worth until the morning of the 25th.

In the meantime, all heck broke loose at the Simmons beautiful home after his confession, causing Karl to leave the house and check into the Tulsa hotel a few blocks from Ella's hotel. Blanch thought, of course, that Karl had gone straight into Ella's arms.

Blanch called George Sheehan, office manager for the Simmons for the past 20 years, and ask him to meet her at Ella's hotel at 6:00 pm. When he arrived, Blanche insisted he find out "that woman's room number." He did, but then became suspicious of her behavior. He hunted through her handbag for a gun. There was none; Blanche had hidden it in her cape.

ing into the district," Marshall said. "We pay medical insurance for the employee and their family and we have housing for administrators."

As with any employment situation, any district official is prohibited from speaking about specifics.

"They made an offer that is very good for my family," Smith said. "It good for my children, my future and my retirement."

As far as the search for a new Post AD and head coach, that process is underway.

The opening was posted and there is a 10-day waiting period.

PISD Superintendent Mike Comeaux said the district will be looking internally first before going outside for a possible replacement.

"We have coaches here with prior AD and head

coaching experience," he said. "It is going to be a matter of who applies for the position."

Comeaux is alluding to any possibilities of current coaches following Smith.

"We have some coaches here with more than 20 years total experience," Comeaux said. "And you just don't find that very coach in Archer City school often down here at our history.

Post has had two very successful years and would like to continue in that direction.

"We have had some success here and we want to build on that," Comeaux said. "We will look inside or outside. But a quicker hire means a quicker move forward."


