## Garza County Blotter

A log of arrests and offenses

POST - This is the first of what will be an on-going weekly look at what we used to call "The Police Blotter".

Each month, the Garza County Sheriff's Office will provide the Post Dispatch with a composite look at the lawless activity in the county.

While some of these capsules have already been made into individual news stories, there are other activities that deem mentioning.

These batches of offenses are from April and this report will show up earlier in the month, so as to attempt to stay current.

### Assault

An incident in the 400 block of 11th resulted in the arrest of a Hispanic male on a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

A caller advised that someone was pointing a gun in her son's face in the parking lot of Stripes Gas Station, and the activity had continued to an unknown location on 11th Street. All Deputies on duty were called to respond and began an investigation.

A weapon was found in the suspect's car under the center console and was identified as the weapon from the incident.

Johna Garza, 19, was identified at the scene and subsequently arrested and charged.

### Burglary

A house in the 500 block of 14th Street was the scene of a break-in. The resident, Anthony Soto, returned home after a lengthy absence and reported the back door had been kicked in. There was also a large boot print on the door, which would need repair.

Reported taken out of the home were four rifles of varying size, .17 caliber, a

## Run-off early voting begins next week at courthouse

POST - Early voting for the state primary run-off elections will begin Monday at the county's only voting location. Garza County Commissioners voted to combine the election process at Monday's meeting.

In an effort to save money, and by agreement of both political parties, the Garza County Courthouse will be the lone voting location for all precincts in the county. Doors will be open at 8 a.m. and close at 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The county chairpersons for the Republican and

## Local game warden aids drowning victim

LUBBOCK - There is a lot to be said for cross training in certain professions. Just ask Drew Spencer.

According to published media reports from over the Mother's Day weekend, Spencer took what he knew and made a life-saving event out of what could have been tragedy.

Spencer has been the county's game warden for some time now. He is also trained as an Emergency Medical Technician.

While in the Lubbock area of Buffalo Springs Lake, Spencer got wind of a possible drowning victim. As a first responder, he changed hats from game warden to

EMT and proceeded to the scene.

According to reports, Spencer hurried to the area in a boat where he was flagged down.

The unidentified man's friends had just pulled him into their boat. Spencer transferred the man to his boat and returned to shore, where local medical techs were there to take over.

"Things weren't that great," Spencer said, "but they weren't dire, either."

The man is presumed to be fine, but the Post Dispatch has not been able to confirm his condition because of patient confidentiality issues.

Spencer said his desire to become an EMT came

All of these great academic minds and not a clue among them...

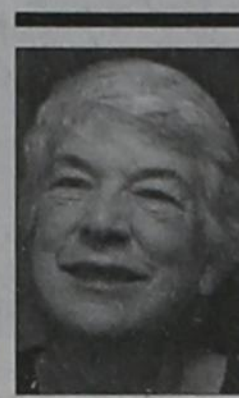
But what do I know? I'm just a simple product of the Amarillo and Lubbock Independent School Districts.

# The 501 Don't Snooze Through the Test Drive

Buying a car is a serious undertaking. It's like buying a new mattress. A test snooze or drive helps you make a more informed decision. I must have been snoozing when I bought my new car.

Technically speaking, it's not really new. But it's new to me, and, like a brand-new car, it came with an official EPA mileage rating - 28 on the road and less (I don't

remember the exact figure) in town. The documentation affixed to the windshield proclaimed those two ratings in big numerals. One of the salesmen said 26 was more likely on the road. I wish he'd been right. I'd be thrilled with 26.

Where the rubber meets the road, the story is different. My new car is a failure, even with a tailwind. On our first road trip, the MPG was 18.75. Not good. Originally I'd thought the deal was a trade-off. I was giving up a substantial car for a flimsy one, a bigger engine for a smaller one and so-so mileage for better mileage. Instead it was a lose-lose-draw.

How could this happen to me?

News flash:

Life is not fair.

But we want it to be, don't we?

Otherwise we wouldn't deify Justice and somehow expect the EPA to hold automobile manufacturers to their promises.

Now that I've complained, I'll admit I

didn't read the owner's manual before I bought the car. Who does?

If I'd looked at the fuel section I would have noticed my new car requires higher-octane fuel - 88 instead of 87, meaning I have to buy 89 because nobody sells 88. Nobody I've found yet. The higher the octane, the higher the cost. You knew that.

What's more, I really think the octane requirement was posted along with the mileage ratings - just in much smaller print. Always read the fine print.

Sure enough, when I bought a tank of the higher-octane stuff, the mileage improved considerably - not to 28 but into the low 20s. I don't have the calculations at hand. They're in my new car. It's in line for repairs to its rear bumper from a little crash that - yea! -- wasn't my fault.

Fortunately, I still have my old car. I'm not selling it until the other one gets fixed.

I'm happy. What's not to like about a car that's content with the cheapest gas, leaps when you let out the reins and only gets a bumper scratch when it totals a Neon? (My fault.)

Now that we've made that equine comparison, let me say that letting go of an old car is like letting go of a horse. Maybe I'll find it a good home. I'd rather put it out to pasture.

Meanwhile, our extended time together has been my second chance to say good-bye and appreciate all the things I should have appreciated more sooner.

I smell a moral.

If your car is happy with 87-octane fuel, think about it the next time you sidle up to a gas pump. Life could be worse.

## Legends

This week I would like to share the family history of Henry Edward (Bud) Smith, reared in Mississippi, but came to Texas soon after the Civil War. Bud was 27 years-old when he married

15 year-old Winnie Robinett in 1909. Like many young couples, they lived in a dug-out over in Scurry county. They came to Garza County by wagon in 1914, settling on the Cross place. They lived there until 1924 until they were able to buy 160 acres five miles northeast of the Grassburr community

where he built a small box and plank house. It took him two years to clear and break the land for plowing.

Those were tough times as they battled range fires, and then one year the grasshoppers came. They covered everything, destroyed the crops. Then there were the blizzards like the one in January of 1918. Many cattle were lost, and quail that had taken refuge in the woodpile were frozen to death.

"In the winter of 1922, we were crossing the Catfish River (now known as White

River); when the rear wheels of the car fell into quick sand. We walked out with the children packed on our backs and the ice coming swiftly down the river, cutting our legs. A log fire was built to dry us out and the car was saved after much difficulty."

Smith recalled pleasant memories of the rabbit drives held each year in the springtime. "This was an annual affair that served to rid the farmers and ranchers of the jack rabbit pests. Each man brought dinner with them and was spread together at lunch time. One year one of the guys brought some hog head cheese to the rabbit drive in a washtub. The zinc in the tub poisoned the cheese and four of us got sick including the Crosby County Sheriff. I thought I was going to die, but I didn't"

[Linda's note] I am forever amazed at the strong will of those early pioneers who worked from before dawn until after dark just to peck out some resemblance of a living for their families. It wasn't only the men, but every member of the family. Did you ever hoe cotton in the summer to make some extra funds? Remember how great it felt when a cloud passed over. Felt like AC in the field. We made one dollar per hour, hum, not much money but built a lot of character for sure. See you next week.

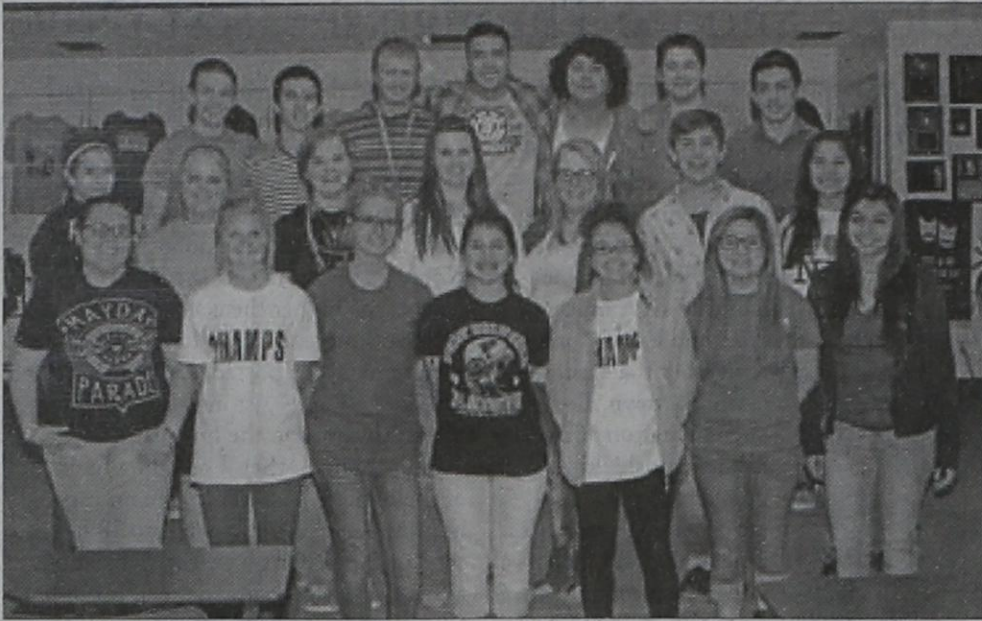

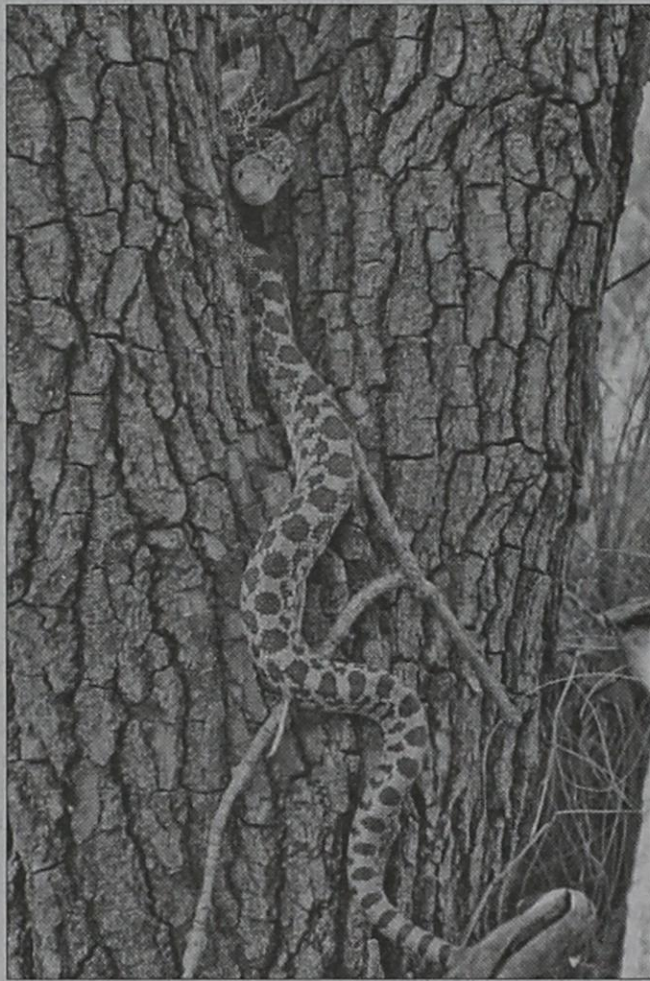
## Wilder's Nature Journal Bull Snakes

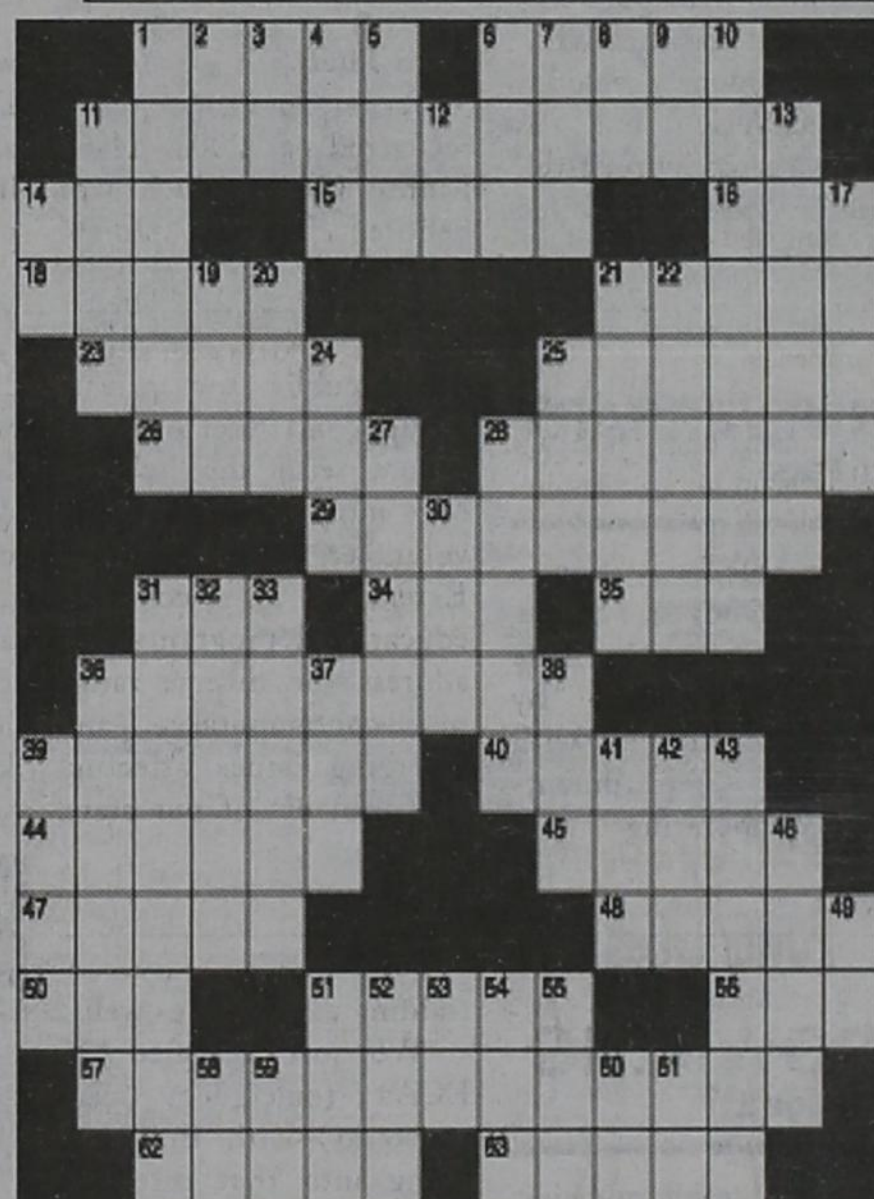

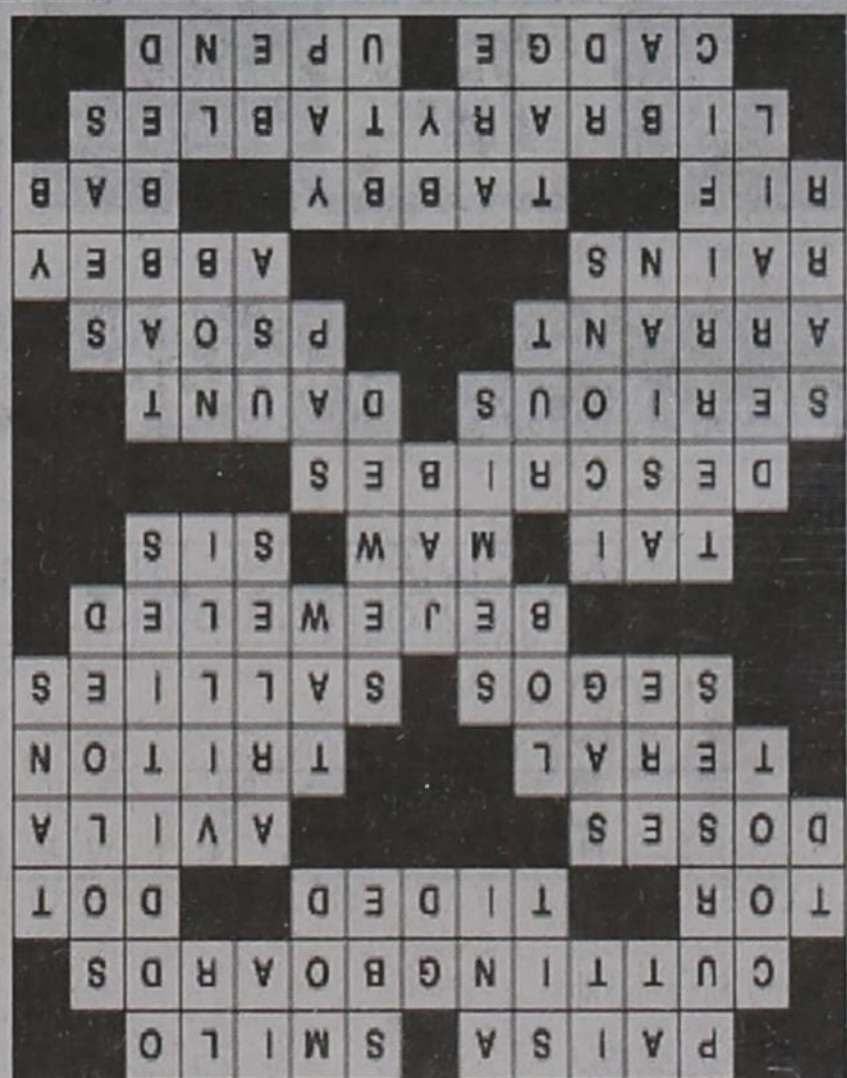

On the Republican side of the ballot, incumbent David Dewhurst is facing Houston State Sen. Dan Patrick for the Lt. Governor's race.

State lawmakers Dan Branch and Ken Paxton have advanced to a runoff for the nomination for attorney general.

The Republican race for Texas agriculture commissioner is between Sid Miller and Tommy Merritt.

Brian Babin and Ben Streusand were the top two vote getters in the 12-man race to replace US Rep. Steve Stockman, but no one in the crowded field won a majority.

On the Democratic side, David Alameel of Dallas and Kesha Rogers out of the Houston area will face off for their party's US Senate slot.

Alameel is a dentist, while Rogers is a perennial candidate. The winner will face current U.S. Senator, John Cornyn.

Kinky Friedman and Jim Hogan are running for Ag. Commissioner. This is Friedman's third run for state office.

Garza County Voters who may not have voted in

the Texas Primary, may cast a ballot provided they show proper identification.

People are required to show some form of a valid photo Texas ID.

A US military ID, a citizenship certification or a passport is also accepted form of identification.

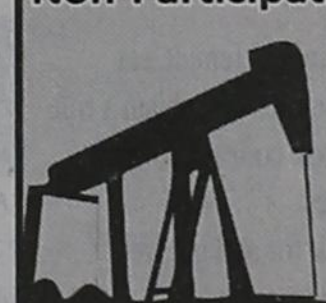


