Post woman indicted

Mother charged with capital murder of infant

POST - A local woman could spend her life in prison or be executed if she's convicted for the death of her infant daughter.

On Tuesday, a Garza County grand jury returned an indictment of capital murder against Ashlee Anne Dean for the Feb. 20 shooting death of 22-month-old Alexandria Lee Courtney.

Dean, who marked her 35th birthday about three weeks ago in the Garza County Jail, admitted to investigators she shot her daughter, Garza County Sheriff Terry Morgan told A-J Media in February. Dean has a history of substance abuse and told investigators she used drugs before the shooting, Morgan said.

In Texas, a capital murder conviction can mean one of two things — life in prison or a death sentence.

District Attorney Michael Munk declined to comment as to whether he plans to seek the death penalty, citing pending investigation on certain matters.

Dean remained in the jail Tuesday. Bond is set at \$1 million.

Change in local ordinance designed to curb synthetics

POST - Residents who make a living peddling questionable "synthetic" substances are being put on notice. "Your business enterprise is not welcome in Post."

City Council approved an amended version of the Offenses and Nuisances Ordinance last week in an effort to force this kind of activities out of the area.

The ordinance, which is officially published in today's paper, specifically speaks to a variety of synthetic substances, also referred to as spice, cannabinoids, marihuana, bath salts, cathinones and other stimulants. The list also covers "misbranded" substances.

There seems to be a trend, where makes of these synthetics, of changing part of the ingredients by either name or varying degree of strength to somehow sidestep state law.

Other area towns are catching on and similar ordinances have been passed in Abilene and Lubbock to combat the practice.

The ordinance takes effect immediately upon publication (which is today) and law enforcement officials will now have additional tools to fight these "hair-splitting" practices.

In other council news, officials approved filling the City Pool with water donated by an anonymous donor. The opening date is yet to be determined, but water trucks begin filling the pool on Tuesday and plans are being made

Close City Coop members approve gin merger

POST - Members of the Close City Coop Gin overwhelmingly approved a merger with their counterparts in Grassland by a vote of 33-1. The Close City Gin has been in operation since about 1919, started by J.E. Winder of Ft. Worth.

In 1938, the gin was sold to the coop.

Grassland Coop Gin member voted on the same measure Thursday night after The Post Dispatch went to press. A follow-up article will appear in next week's paper.

CCCG Board President Ronnie Dunn said it this was best for all parties concerned.

"It was discussed by the board two

months ago," he said. "It means more money for the patrons. The merger gives us a better return."

There was plenty of information for the members to digest, but one set of numbers really stuck out.

In 2011, operating costs went sky high because of the low number of bales produced.

Close City had an operating cost of \$355.36 while Grassland managed to keep their number down to \$147.50, more than half the difference.

Greg Taylor, of D. Williams and Co. explained that when bale production is down, the cost of doing business goes up.

Williams has seen a fair amount of mergers similar to this one and said the move by Close City would

be a good one.

"We've got 80 to 160-acre homes out there," Dunn said. "And they have to be able to make a go of it. Getting bigger is better."

According to information presented during the meeting, a new board comprised of four Grassland members and three Close City members will serve over a period of several years until the fourth annual membership meeting. At that point, the board will be comprised of the membership present at that point in time.

The Close City By-Laws will be adopted in the near future because those were the set of rules most recently passed by either coop.

Letters to the Editor

The City of Post would like to give you some important information regarding the city's water situation. First of all let me say thank you all for your support and effort in our struggle to conserve water in the past several months. The drought in our region is taking its toll on our city and surrounding communities. Although, we are still currently in stage 3 of our drought contingency plan, we are striving to secure and will continue to pursue future water sources for our city.

The city is presently in the process of developing a well field in Southland, therefore, securing the city's 3rd source of water for our citizens. The city receives water from White River and Slaton at this time, but without rain White River is relying solely on well water. So, we are using more water from Slaton to relieve some of the strain on White River since we are their biggest purchaser. It is necessary to stay at our current stage of the contingency plan until the 1st phase of the project is complete. Our goal is to be able to revert back to at least stage 2 as soon as the 1st phase has been completed. Hopefully, there will be no unforeseen problems to arise. I will keep you updated on the progression of the project.

Until we are able to come out of Stage 3, there will still be no outside watering or filling of pools. We encourage using recycled water to water your trees and plants. However, the city council will allow the city pool to be open. This will be possible due to a major joint effort from Garza County, and local transport companies. Water will be hauled in from the county not from the city's water supply. We believe the pool is a value to our community and especially for our youth.

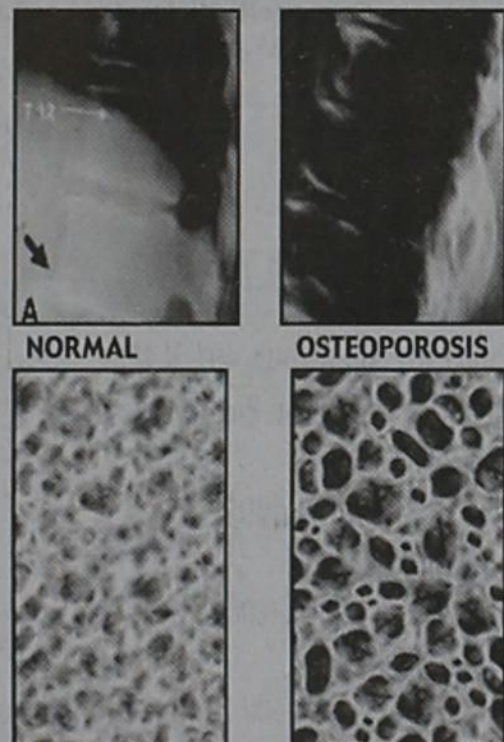

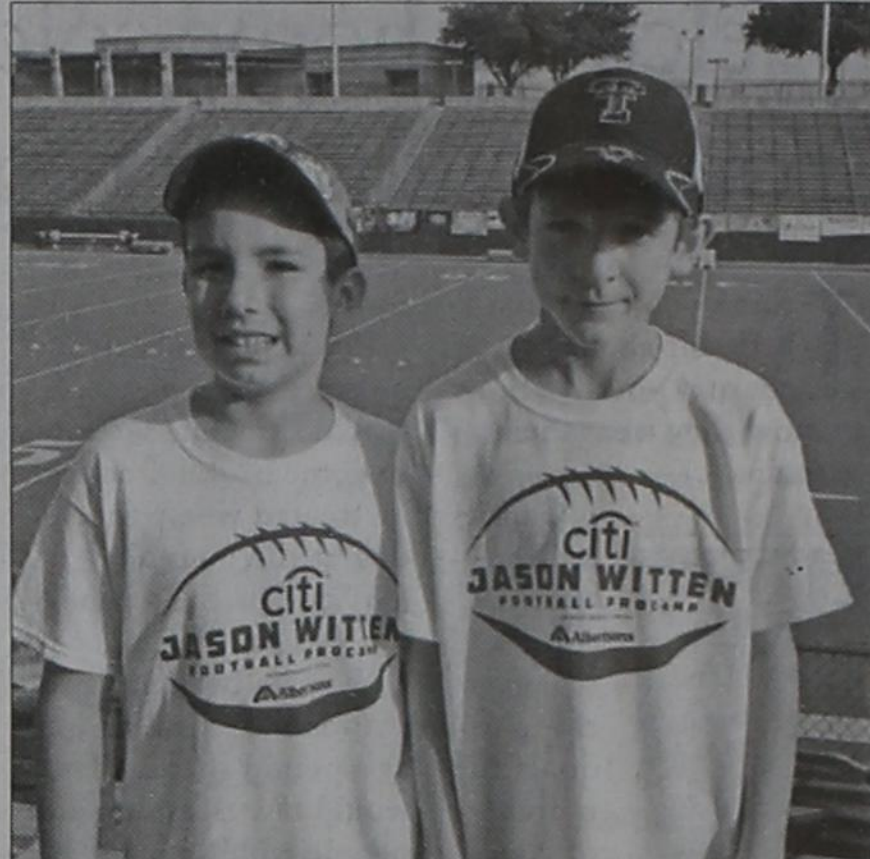
40 yrs ago

It takes several hundred years to produce one inch of soil. Therefore, soil lost now because of wind or water erosion will not be replaced during our lifetime. Surface soil, or "topsoil" as it is often referred to, is the most productive and most vital part of the soil profile. With each inch of surface soil loss also goes part of that soil's ability to produce crops. If all the surface soil is removed, a soil's ability to produce at an economical level is lost. Organic matter and fertilizers must then be added to bring that soil back to an economical production level. Loss of surface soil is actually like a loss of money. If crop production is to be kept at a high level, the fertility that is lost must be replaced artificially, which costs money.

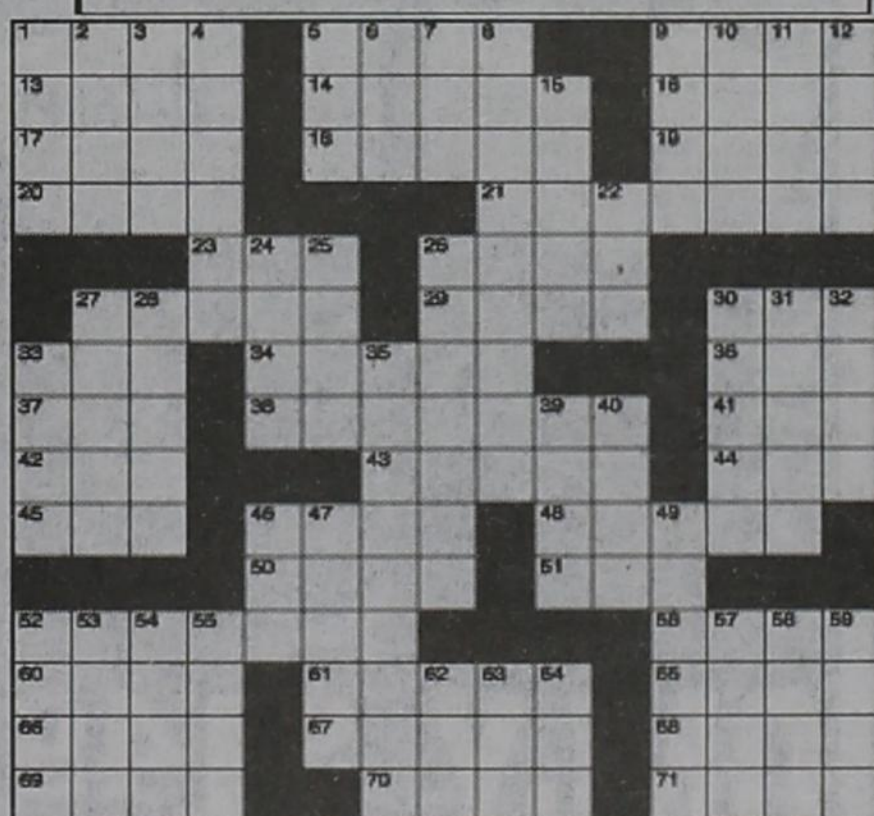

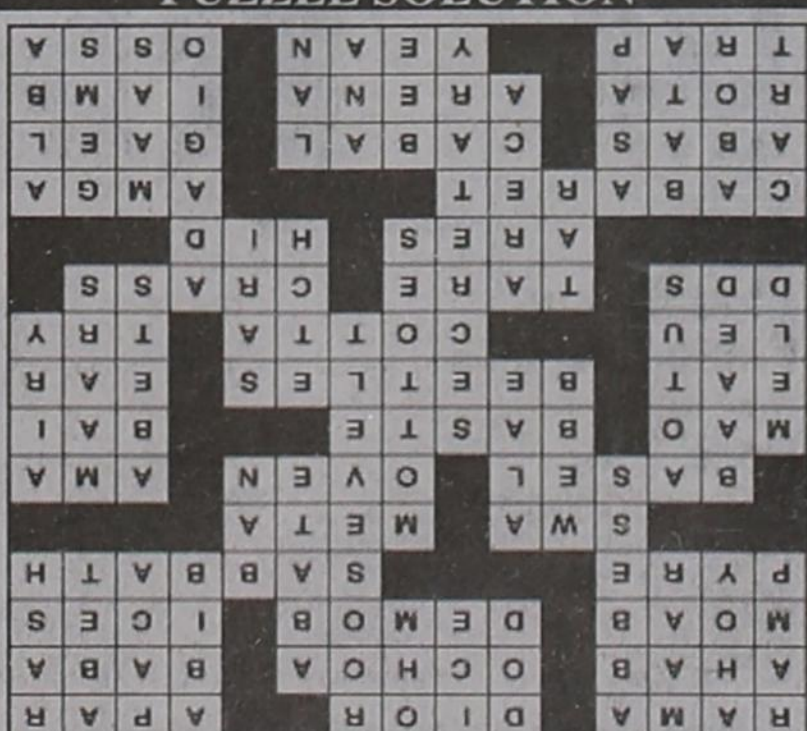

POST – Hold on to your hats, Garza County, badminton is coming to Post.

Badminton is a centuries-old sport that has roots back to the 17th Century. It is even an Olympic sport.

As of this week, three master-level players will be in town and will hold an exhibition Friday beginning at 4 p.m. at the junior high gym.

Three Scottish lads, Dan Travers, 58, Chris Wight, 54 and Colin Hepburn, 68, will be presenting the exhibition.

Travers is from Perth and was a performance coach for a professional team from 1997 to 2007. He won a gold medal in 1986 at the Commonwealth Games, which are held every four years, opposite the Olympics. Countries from around the world with ties to the United Kingdom participate in the games. The year he won, Edinburgh hosted the games. He was not eligible for the Olympics because of his

professional status.

He was paired with Billy Galliland and they were #2 in the world rankings through most of the 1980's.

"The boys are really excited to play over here," Travers said. "We would like to see a club formed in Post with our good friend Ian."

And of course, Travers is referring to Ian Torrens, who owns and runs the Hotel Garza Bed and Breakfast, where the lads are staying.

Wight played for East of Scotland and toured Ireland in 1998 and again in 2004. He currently coaches for disabled athletes.

Hepburn, the senior member of the trio, won the World Masters Doubles over-55 division in Edmonton in 2005 and the World Masters in the over-65 division in Torino, Italy.

Torrens and the trio will travel to Ruidoso, NM the following week for an exhibition match. They will be in the area for two weeks.

Torrens hopes to spark some interests in the area for a club team to host indoor leagues in Post.

Director of Marketing and Public Relations for LCHD. "We will get with the board again on this matter to discuss it further. We will continue to provide the best care possible and continue to upgrade our equipment when possible and needed."

The importance of a hospital facility closer to Post and Garza County residents is equally important.

According to an election official, who did not want to be identified, said there was equal concern for the aging school district facilities in Tahoka and that residents just simply did not want two bond issues on their taxes at the same time.

Two locations, besides Tahoka, are at least 30 to 40 minutes way in the directions of Snyder for south-county residents or University Medical Center in Lubbock for trauma patients.

Tahoka residents alone cast more votes against the issue

(373) than the entire district cast for the issue (333).

Of the other voting areas, only Wilson had a passing favor towards the proposition 64 votes for to 42 against.

New Home sent the overwhelming sentiment of 78 votes against as opposed to just five votes for.

Less than 1,000 votes were cast on the issue in a country that has 4,000 registered voters.

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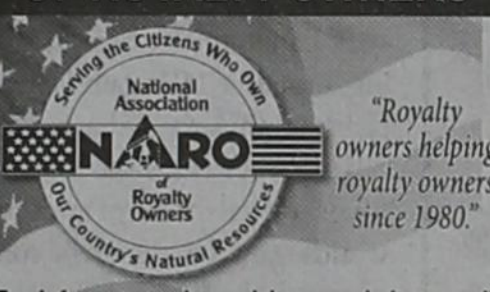
