Local farmer remembered at service

POST - By all accounts, George Benard Wilke, was a quiet, unassuming and helpful person who love antique tractors almost as much as he loved ice cream.

"GB", as his friends and family knew him, was remembers by those same people last Saturday at First Baptist Church.

With a bevy of antique tractors out on the street and nearly 400 people packed in the church, John Bill Hedrick eulogized Wilke, armed with stories and anecdotes he had collected via a call for information on Facebook.

Hedrick read Gloria Abraham's recollection of discovering what G.B. stood for, while waiting for the school bus one day.

"We were in the second grade and were in

the bus room waiting to get on the bus to go home," she wrote. "I asked him what GB stood for and he looked at me and said for me to guess. So I looked at him and out of the blue I said George Bernard.

"You should have seen the look on is face! He said, 'Who told you!' I said, no one. He couldn't believe I guessed his name. He was a real sweet guy all the way through school," Abraham said.

Wilke could usually be found helping someone with some project or another, as this is what a tight-knit farming community does for each other.

"Over at this barn, people just met there in the evenings after work and sat and visited and it was just the place to go and he would repair your equipment, give you anything you needed. He was just that way," said Terry Laws.

For as much as he loved tractors, he also had a sweet tooth in the form of deserts, especially ice cream.

Debbie Ethridge Hanks recalls, "GB loved my cooking, especially sweets; cookies, cobblers and ice cream and I would sneak them out of the house for him. Damon always wondered where the other half of the deserts disappeared to."

As for tractors, Sandy Smith summed it up appropriately. "Several years ago, during one of our family reunions, we brought out four-year-old granddaughter. My uncle was giving her a ride on one of his old tractors. GB went to his house and drove one of his regular farm tractors down, gave our granddaughter a ride. When she climbed down she said, 'Now that's a tractor.' GB had the widest grin on his face."

Head-on accident claims two

FLOYDADA - A three-vehicle accident at 7:45 p.m. Aug. 19th claimed the lives of two of the drivers, one of which was a Garza County resident.

George "GB" Wilke, 60, was fatally injured when the 2011 Chevy truck he was driving was struck head on by a 2006 Chevy Silverado driven by 19-year-old Hunter Schwertner, of Floydada. He was also pronounced dead at the scene.

Wilke's brother, Robert, 46, was also in the truck and sustained non-life threatening injuries, but in critical condition, and was transported to UMC in Lubbock by air ambulance. He is now listed in satisfactory condition.

The accident occurred on Texas State Highway 207, nine miles south of Floydada.

According to DPS reports, the Chevy pickup driven by Schwertner was following a Jeep Cherokee, driven by Nancy Cooper, 49, of Matador. The vehicles were north-bound on SH 207.

Schwertner was traveling at a higher rate of speed than Cooper and struck the back of the Jeep, which came to rest in a field on the east side of the highway.

County commission deals with routine business

POST - If there is anything such as a routine meeting of the Garza County Commissioner's Court, it happened this past week.

From shifting staff and paying the bills, to finding some money in the budget for an upcoming purchase to routine line item transfers, it was business as usual.

Terri Laurance is moving from the County Clerks office to the Tax Collector's office, which was expected when County Clerk placed a help wanted ad in the Post Dispatch two weeks ago.

Plummer is in the middle of the Special Election for the State Senate 28 seat and early voting spans

the Labor Day weekend. Polls will reopen on Tuesday for voting to continue.

Two amendments for the 2013-2014 budget were under consideration.

Commissioner Gary McDaniel made a motion to transfer \$25,872.32 for the purchase of the Young Building office, also known as the juvenile office. The motion was seconded by Jerry Benham and passed unanimously by those present.

McDaniel also moved to approve a transfer of \$2,193 to the clerk's office and \$6,097.23 to the District Attorney's office. Benham seconded both and both were passed by unanimous vote.

Finally, during the budget-

hearing portion of the meeting, the sheriff's office is getting help from both the county and the City of Post for the purchase of new equipment. The service vests will improve the safety aspect of the deputies' job.

The various departments including Garza Wildlife Damage Association, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Office, the Community Recovery Center and the Giles Dalby Correctional Facility filed the usual reports.

The County Court will hold a public hearing on the budget next week on Sept. 4th at 6 p.m. The court will hold additional meetings on Sept. 8th, 18th and 22nd in order to finalize the 2014-2015 budget, which will take affect Oct. 1st.

At least one Lake Alan Henry property owner has formally requested change in the City of Lubbock's shoreline restrictions. In an undated letter from attorney Jerry Corbin of Midland, property owner Joy Moore Hogan asked the City of Lubbock to grant her permission to construct a boat dock at her Lot 5 site in the Northridge development. Hogan, described in the letter as 'disabled,' requests that she be allowed shoreline ramp access and a boat dock under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Without these accommodations, Corbin states, she is unable to access the lake shoreline. Quoting the U.S. Department of Justice, the letter reads, "Access to civic life by people with disabilities is a fundamental goal of the Americans with Disabilities Act. To ensure that this goal is met, Title II of The ADA requires state

and local governments to make their programs and services accessible to persons with disabilities. This requirement extends not only to physical access at government facilities, programs and events, but also to policy changes that governmental entities must make to ensure that all people with disabilities can take part in and benefit from the programs and services of state and local governments."

Garza County Sheriffs Department arrested two suspects Tuesday after receiving a phone call from a confidential informant. The two suspects were arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance. Garza County Sheriff, Kenny Ratke after receiving the call, turned the information over to Deputy Sheriff Clent Schoonover for processing of the paper work. Lieutenant J.W. Jolly and Sheriff Ratke then went to the location and observed marijuana growing in the

suspect's back yard. Deputy Schoonover drove to the location with the proper paper work and the three officers made the arrests without incident. Upon entering the residence 2.85 ounces of processed marijuana was found to be drying in the oven and 13 marijuana plants were found growing in the back yard. The two suspects are charged with possession of a controlled substance, a Class A misdemeanor.

 - Special Program Participants**—All children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), can get free meals. Children attending Head Start, Early Head Start, and Even Start are also eligible for free meals.
 - Foster**—Foster children under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals. A foster child is eligible for free meals regardless of the income of his or her resident household.
 - Homeless, Runaway, and Migrant**—Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told about a child's status as homeless, runaway, or migrant, please call or email [Steph Maris 211 West St., Post, Texas 79356, Phone 806-495-3414 Ext. 4021].
- Should I fill out an application if I received a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free meals?** Carefully read the letter you received and follow the instructions. Call your child's school at [insert phone number] if you have questions.
- My child's application was approved last year. Do I need to fill out another one?** Yes. Your child's application is only good for one school year and the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for this school year.
- I get WIC, can my child(ren) get free meals?** Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals; please fill out an application.
- What if my income is not always the same?** List the amount that you normally receive. Even if you missed some work in the last month, put down your usual pay. If you normally get overtime pay, include it. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- We are in the military. Do we include our housing allowance as income?** If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. If your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. Is combat pay counted as income? No. If combat pay is received because of deployment in addition to basic pay and was not received before deployment, combat pay is not counted as income.
- May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen?** Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced-price meals.
- Will the information I give be checked?** Yes, and we may also ask you to send written proof.
- If I don't qualify now, may I apply later?** Yes. You may apply at any time during the school year. If your household income or circumstances change, you may become eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
- Who should I include as members of my household?** You must include yourself as well as others living in your household who share income and expenses—related to you or not (grandparents, other relatives, or friends). You must include yourself and all children living with you. Do not include others who live with you who are economically independent—that is anyone you do not support, who does not share income with you, and does not pay a pro-rated share of expenses.
- What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application?** You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to [Mike Comeaux, Superintendent, Post ISD, 501 S. Ave. K, Post, Texas 79356 or call 806-495-3343].
- My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for?** To find out how to apply for other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or 2-1-1.

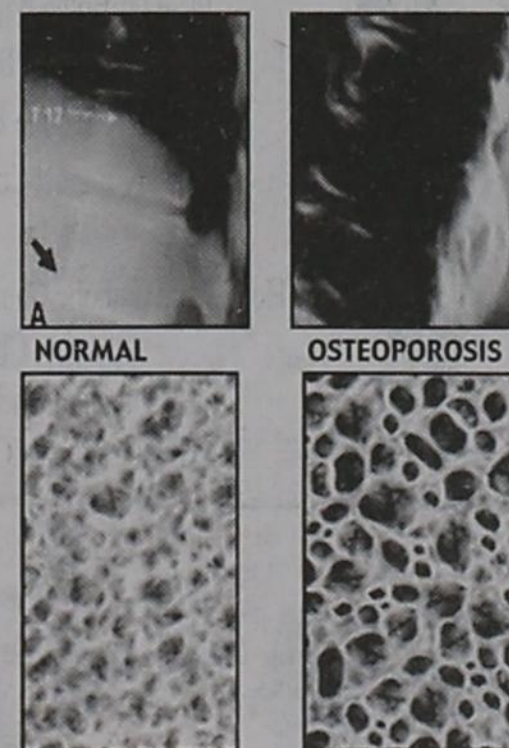

Nancy's Notions Another car seat recall

As a certified Car Seat Technician, I received recalls car seat almost daily. Car seats are tested and approved before being released for sale as many variables go into providing the maximum protection for our children. I have a book as thick as the Lubbock phone book of recalls and you can also look the safety information up online. Know your car seat and its history.

Never buy a used car seat from someone you don't know like Post online or any garage sale. If the car seat has ever been in an accident, they are weakened and possibly no longer offer maximum protection. If you do purchase a used car seat, make sure you inquire about the history of the seat. You also need

the instruction manual that comes with it for installation guidelines including tethering options or requirements. Never use the infant carrier without the base or add additional products to the seat for the 'comfort' of the child. The seats were tested as sold. Finally, make sure the identifying labels with height and weight limits, are still attached to the actual seat. OK, off my soapbox! I'm including the stages and appropriate safety choices according to the CDC.gov; Injury Prevention and Control: Motor Vehicle Safety.

Birth up to Age 2 - Rear-facing car seat. For the best possible protection, infants and children should be buckled

in a rear-facing car seat, in the back seat, until age 2 or when they reach the upper weight or height limits of their particular seat. Check the seat's owner's manual and/or labels on the seat for weight and height limits.

Age 2 up to at least Age 5 - Forward-facing car seat. When children outgrow their rear-facing seats they should be buckled in a forward-facing car seat, in the back seat, until at least age 5 or when they reach the upper weight or height limit of their particular seat. Check the seat's owner's manual and/or labels on the seat for weight and height limits.

Age 5 up until seat belts fit properly - Booster seat. Once children outgrow their forward-facing seat, (by reaching the upper height or weight limit of their seat), they should be buckled in a belt positioning booster seat until seat belts fit properly. Seat belts fit properly when the lap belt lays across the upper thighs (not the stomach) and the shoulder belt lays across the chest (not the neck). Remember to keep children properly buckled in the back seat for the best possible protection.

Once Seat Belts Fit Properly without a Booster Seat - Children no longer need to use a booster seat once seat belts fit them properly. Seat belts fit properly when the lap belt lays across the upper thighs (not the stomach) and the shoulder belt lays across the chest (not the neck). The recommended height for proper seat belt fit is 57 inches tall. For the best possible protection keep children properly buckled in the back seat.

Set a good example by always using a seat belt yourself.

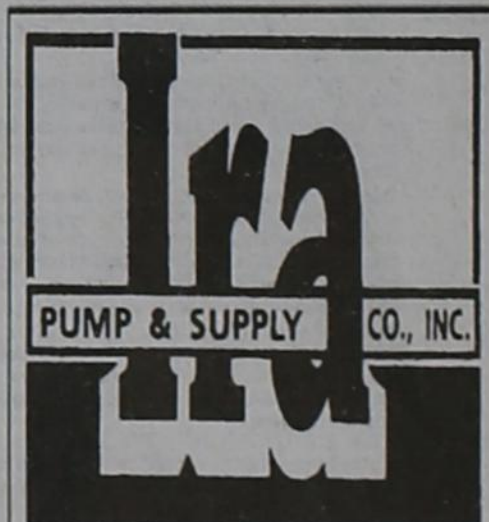

POST - A new season, new coach, new district, and some soon-to-be new facilities - everything is coming up roses for the Antelopes.

Well, maybe. It's could be a rollercoaster season. Because of UIL alignment last spring, sports now has six classifications. Post is in the Class 3A, Region 1, District 3, Division 2, which is the small school part of Class 3A.

The Lopes will have to contend with the likes of Ballinger, Coahoma, Coleman, Colorado City and Stanton.

Ballinger and Coleman present some travel problems, as both are three hours away. Fortunately, only one of the schools is a road game in either season of the two-year rotation.

Post is right on the low end of the district at 222 students, while Ballinger will play at just over 300 students.

At least two of the pre-season forecasts have Post

Post went to the area round last season and will need a stout defense to get further this season.

Alejo Rodriguez (5-10, 160) anchors the linebacking corps in the 3-4 defensive schemes. He logged in 135 tackles last season on a defense that lost six starters.

"Our defense hasn't been bad," said first year coach Michael Pittman. "I'm pleased with the flight to the ball. We have lots of tackles."

Pittman is an experienced coach overall, but starting again as a head coach here in Post.

"We show flashes of being pretty good," he said Monday. "We saw improvement from the first scrimmage to the second."

He had high praise of Rodriguez.

"He knows football," he said. "He makes plays you wouldn't think he would."

If there is any struggling on this team, it will be the offense.

From a size standpoint, the offensive line Jaybren Rodriguez and Russ Morris are the only 200-pounders on the roster. They will have their work cutout for them in the areas of run and pass blocking.

However, a quick-hitting run game, with some timely passing mixed in, may keep

opponents off balanced enough to work in Post's favor.

Austin Garza will be the signal caller this season with AJ Reed, Auggie Menchaca Sammy Soto and possibly Christian Saucedo in the backfield. Saucedo is hobbled at the moment with a knee injury.

In the receiving corps, Carson Kirkpatrick, Shandon Wiley, Dylan

Pearson, Christian Pearson and Jarred Curtis will be sharing duties and in any combination of players.

There are only five seniors on this squad but 14 juniors and a handful of sophomores.

The combination begs the question: will youth and quickness be enough to take the Lopes back to the playoffs this season? Only time will tell.

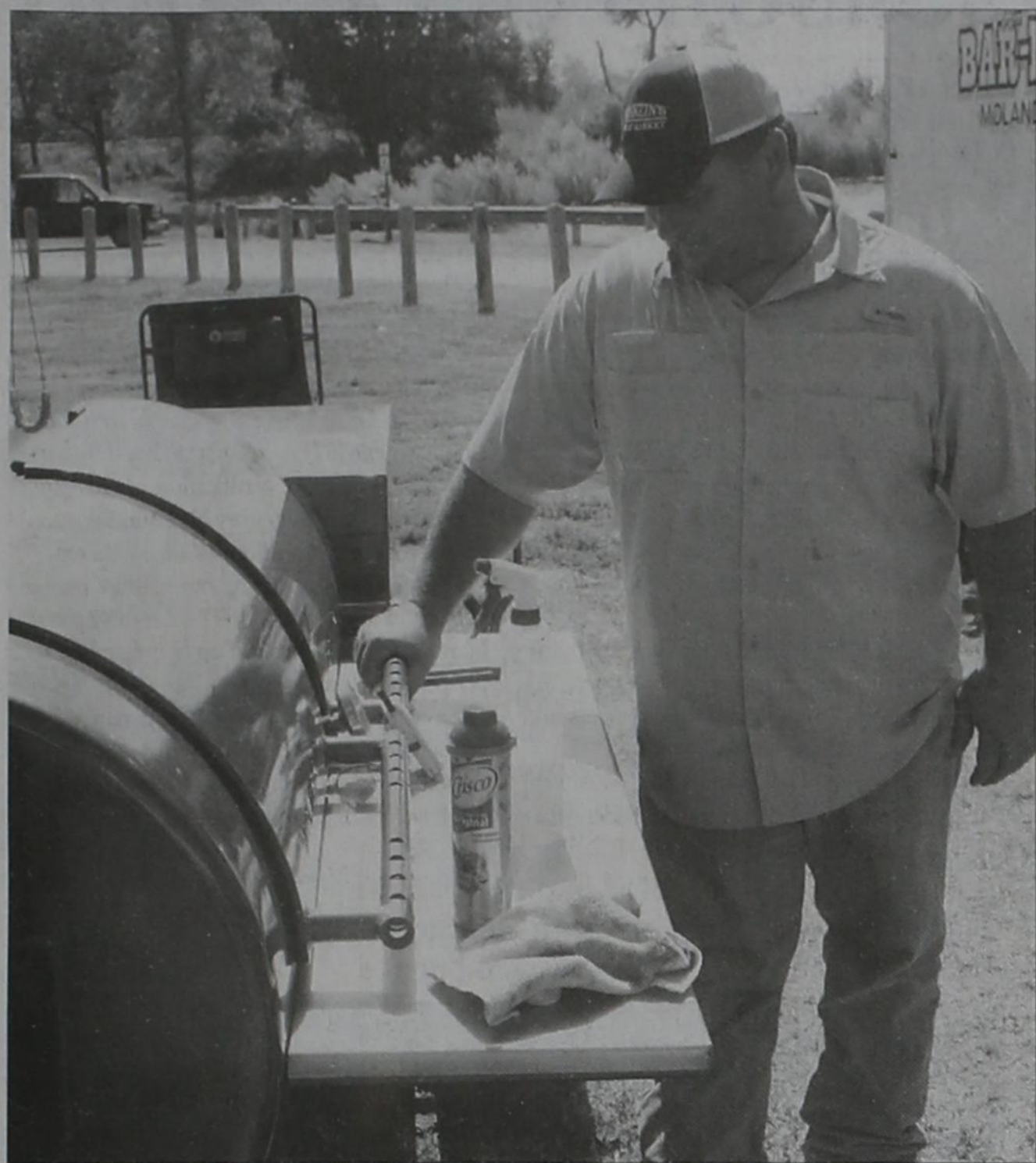

DPS to increase DWI patrols

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is increasing DWI patrols through September 2, which includes the Labor Day holiday weekend. DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent. The enhanced patrols that target impaired drivers are funded through a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT). "DPS is committed to helping keep Texas roadways are safe for all travelers, and these enhanced patrols are aimed at saving lives by getting impaired drivers off the road," said DPS Director Steven McCraw.

"The Department urges all drivers to do their part this Labor Day holiday - and every day - by obeying traffic laws and not drinking and driving."

During the Labor Day enforcement effort last year, DPS troopers made 1,682 DWI arrests, and approximately 218 of those were the direct result of the increased patrols.

Last year during this same time period, DPS enforcement also resulted in 24,443 speeding citations, 3,541 seat belt/child safety seat citations. In addition, troopers made 1,223 fugitive arrests and 977 felony arrests during routine patrol operations.

DPS offers the following tips for safe travel during the Labor Day holiday:

Don't drink and drive. Designate a driver or take a cab.

Eliminate distractions, including the usage of mobile devices.

Buckle up everyone in the vehicle - it's the law.

Slow down - especially in bad weather, construction areas and heavy traffic.

Slow down or move over for police, fire and EMS vehicles as well as tow trucks and TxDOT vehicles stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated - it's the law.

Don't drive fatigued. Drive defensively, as holiday travel may present additional challenges.

Make sure your vehicle is properly maintained before your trip begins.

Dove and teal seasons open soon

Get set for three popular hunting seasons opening in September:

Dove - Regular season begins Sept. 1 in the North and Central Zones, Sept. 19 in the South Zone and Special White-winged Dove Area.

Fall alligator - Sept. 10

Early teal - Sept. 13

See a zone map and the full season dates for the county where you'll be hunting in the Outdoor Annual. The season will be 70 days this year, in accordance with U.S. Fish and Wildlife regulations. The daily bag limit statewide is 15, which includes both mourning doves and white-winged doves. The possession limit is 45.

Read the dove forecast in Texas Hunting 2014, a digital extra from Texas Parks & Wildlife magazine.

Brush up on 2014 dove season basics with this brief video describing zones, split seasons, bag and possession limits, license requirements and more.

Need a place to hunt? For just \$48, an Annual Public Hunting (APH) Permit provides year-

round hunting on nearly one million acres of land, including wildlife management areas, state parks and approximately 120 dove and small game areas leased from private landowners. Youth under age 17 may access these areas for free with a permitted adult.

Here's what dove and teal hunters will need to be legal in the field:

Every hunter needs a valid hunting license.

To hunt dove or teal, hunters are also required to have a Texas Migratory Game Bird Stamp Endorsement (\$7) and a free Harvest Information Program (HIP) certification, a brief survey of previous year's migratory bird hunting success conducted at the time licenses are purchased.

Every hunter (including out-of-state hunters) born on or after Sept. 2, 1971 must carry proof of hunter education certification or deferral on their person while hunting.

Licenses and stamps may be purchased at a license retailer near you. They may also be purchased online or by phone (800-895-4248) with a \$5 convenience fee required for each transaction.

"I was hired as Chief of Police, however, I also read meters, did maintenance and backhoe work. I helped install pipe in water fields, I assisted in repairs to residential lines, conducted water testing and obtained a Class D water license in the past year and a half," he said.

WRMWD Manager Tom Fulton respectively declined comment saying he does not comment on matter of personnel.

Clark cites several instances in the letter, but because there was no motion made by WRMWD board members to have the letter entered into the official meeting minutes, the letter cannot be printed in its entirety. It mentions instances and meetings with other people, which have not been corroborated.

"Mr. Fulton does not allow me to do the job I was hired to do," Clark wrote. "He tries to control everything regardless if he has the knowledge to do it. He has shown a lack of trust in me and my opin-

ion (sic) in several ways." "The reason that I am making my resignation public is I do not want any retaliation from Mr. Fulton," he said, "and I do not want any false rumors started."

The letter was sent by email to the Post Dispatch by a White River resident. As Clark himself did not send it, it was not deemed a "letter to the editor."

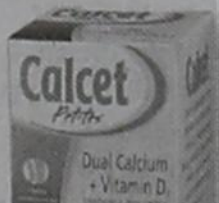
