At the same time, we'll admit there is already so much going on that it's almost impossible, in fact is, for one individual to get in on all the activities.

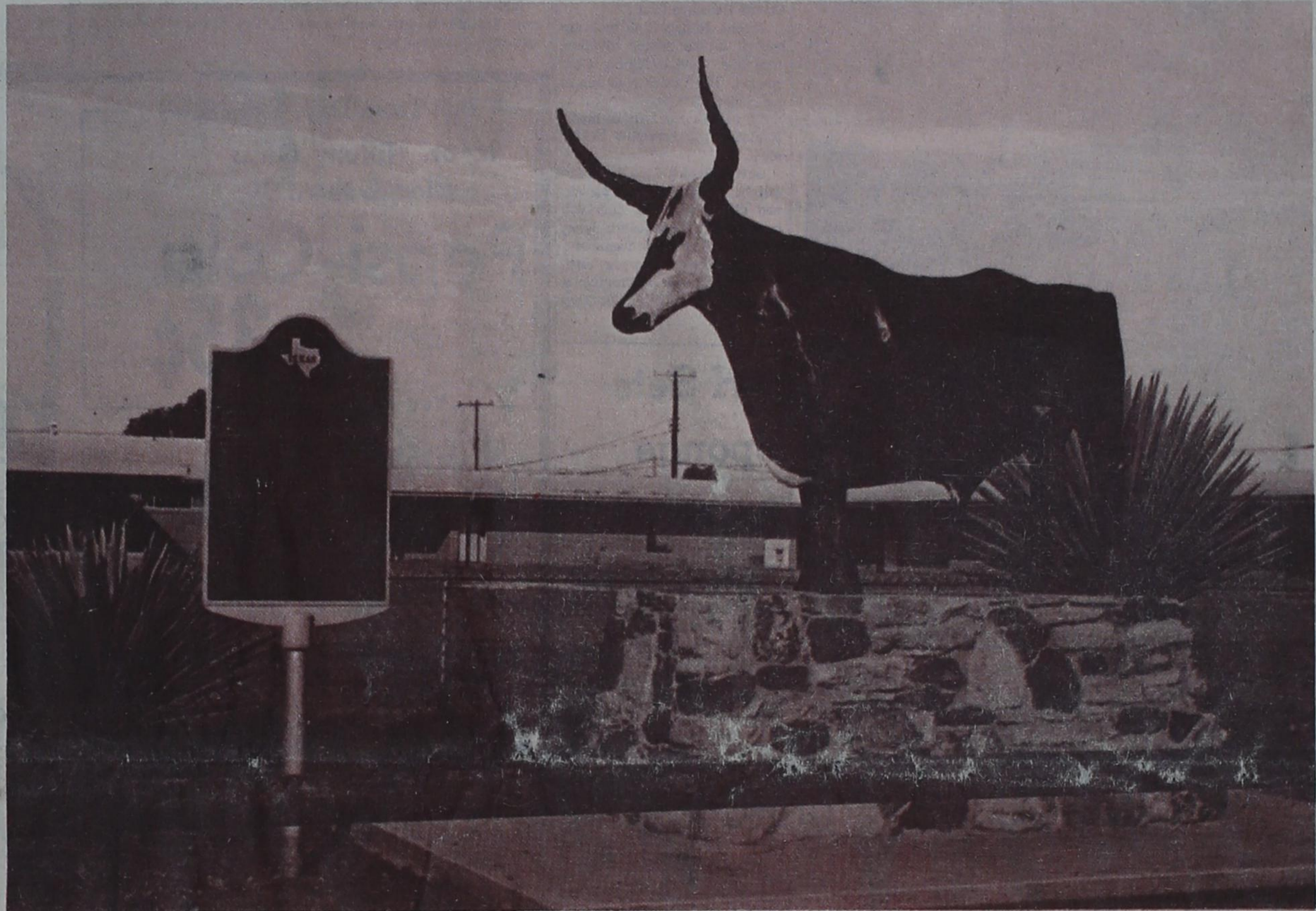
This Bull Town Days 1972 edition of The Blade is being sent to a few hundred non-subscribers across the county on a sample copy basis.

### Church Slates Gospel Meet

John McCourt of Winnsboro, La. will be the evangelist at a series of gospel meetings at Bovina Church of Christ next week -- Aug. 20-23.

Services will be conducted twice daily -- at 10 a.m. and 8 p.m., during the four-day meeting, according to Cecil Bunch, minister of the church. Regular times will be observed at the Sunday morning services with the Sunday evening service set for 8.

Until recently, McCourt was a minister of Southwest Amarillo Church of Christ. He is a native of Arkansas and a graduate of Sunset School of Preaching in Lubbock.

During the past nine years, McCourt has preached for two Texas churches and one in Oklahoma. He preached on Sunday appointments with the church in Gould, Okla. from 1962 to 1965. He worked with the Garland congregation in Plainview from '65

to '68. In '68, he began work with the Southside congregation in Amarillo. After that time, the Southside congregation merged with the Southlawn congregation to form the Southwest Amarillo congregation.

Some of the boards and committees he has served on are boards of development of LCC, vice chairman of the board of Amarillo Christian Schools, chairman of the Circle "K" committee of the South Amarillo Kiwanis Club and coordinator of Top of Texas Herald of Truth.

## Bovina Invites Everyone To Ninth Annual Festival

This is Bull Town Days Week in Bovina. The ninth annual celebration officially gets underway at 6 p.m. tomorrow (Thursday) and will continue through Sunday. Highlight of the four days of action-packed festivities will be the free barbeque scheduled Friday afternoon at 6 p.m.

Some 3,000 hungry visitors are expected for supper on Bovina's Main Street.

Cow calling contests, men's and women's divisions, will kick off the festivities this year. Scheduled to begin at 6 p.m., the contests will be at the roping arena on the eastern edge of town, in easy walking distance of the downtown block.

Beard growers of the area will have their facial fuzz judged at 6:30 p.m., immediately after the cow calling events.

Five contestants will vie for the title of 1972 Bull Town Days Queen at 7 p.m. at the roping arena. The girls will be judged on horsemanship, 60 per cent, and personality and appearance, 40 per cent.

Performing a riding routine before out-of-town judges will be Christie Trimble, Ginger Fitts, Cathy Trimble, Michelle Bonds and Dian Roming.

Immediately following the queen's contest, the spotlight moves to the Bovina Schools auditorium for the performances of the Roosevelt County Good Times Grand Ole Opry Show. The show gets underway at 8:30. Admission will be \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children.

The new queen will be announced at intermission of the show. Plaques will be awarded the winners in the cow calling and beard growing contests. Miss Bonny Jones, 1971 BT.D. Queen, will present the '72 Queen a bouquet of roses and a silver trophy belt buckle.

Friday's activities get underway bright and early with an old fashioned chuck wagon breakfast at 7 for the early risers and continuing until 9 a.m. Members of Bovina Roping Club will prepare and serve scrambled eggs, sausage, bacon, hot biscuits, and plenty of hot coffee for those wishing an extra spurt of energy to carry them through the busy day.

Old timers and ex-Bovinites will begin registering at the city marshal's office on Main Street at 10 a.m. for the community-wide basket luncheon at the Masonic Lodge Hall. Bovina Woman's Study Club is in charge of arrangements for the luncheon and registration. Awards will be presented Friday night to the oldest old timer and the person traveling the farthest to attend the celebration.

Also beginning at 10 a.m. and continuing until 2 p.m. is junior horsemanship activities at the roping arena.

Awards to top contestants in junior and senior divisions will be presented in barrel racing, pole bending, flag racing and

western pleasure. The 1972 Queen, will present the awards. Junior division includes those 13 and under and senior division is 14 and over, according to members of the Roping Club. A \$2 entry fee for each event will be required.

Beginning at 4 p.m., the Bull Town Days parade will wind through the city's streets with awards given in three categories; floats, senior riding clubs and junior riding clubs.

Downtown Bovina will be roped off Friday afternoon after it is cleaned in preparation for the free barbeque to be served at 6. Beginning at 5 in the roped off section will be the fiddler's contest. Fiddlers will compete for cash prizes of \$50, \$35 and \$15.

Carnival booths set up in the downtown block will offer Bull Towners their choice of a variety of activities. Darning boards, bingo games, wet sponge throwing, cake sales, bean guessing contests and any number of homemade food booths plus soft drink stands will be operated by various civic, church and school organizations. The booths were a popular addition to last year's BT.D. festivities and are expected to be again this year.

The "open to the world" free barbeque will be served at 6 p.m. with four lines set up on the downtown block to facilitate serving. Members of the Bovina Chamber of Commerce will handle the serving chores.

Along with some of the best barbeque in the southwest, supper guests will be treated to Bovina-grown cantaloupe and onion slices, courtesy of Chas. Flynn at Gateway Farms, and pinto beans, prepared by about 40 Bovina cooks.

Next item on the agenda, following the barbeque, will be presentation of awards on Main Street at 8:15. Parade winners, the oldest old-timer, winners in the fiddling contest and the person traveling the farthest to attend the celebration will be presented awards.

After the presentation, the square dance club will take over a portion of the downtown block with clubs from a number of cities in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico being invited to compete. Ed Gunnels of Clovis will be calling for the contest.

Afterwards, open square dancing will be held from 9 p.m. until the last dancer has quit the street.

Also at 8:30 p.m., jackpot calf roping will begin at the roping arena. A number of contestants are expected to enter the contest, which is being arranged by the Roping Club.

For members of the younger generation, the focus will be on the American Legion Hall where "The Friends," a group from Amarillo, will be playing from 9 until midnight. Admission will be \$3 per person or \$5 per couple. Mrs. Elton Venable, who is in charge of the arrangements, says,

Anyone may enter and all are welcome, Hart says.

Winning the float division in '71 was Quinton Jenkins of Amarillo with a team of Percheons pulling a fancy wagon. Second place went to Bovina Woman's Study Club and third place to Bovina Boosters Club.

Frona Riding Club took top honors in the senior division with the Bovina Roping Club second. The Texico club won in the junior division.

Parade awards will be made following the barbeque Friday night.

Bovina Roping Club members will be in charge of the parade and riding with the club will be the 1971 BTJ Queen, Bonny Jones, and the new queen who will be crowned Thursday night in Bovina Schools auditorium at the Good Times Grand Ole Opry Show.

Featured in the western show will be "Minnie Pearl" and a three-piece band along with other acts.

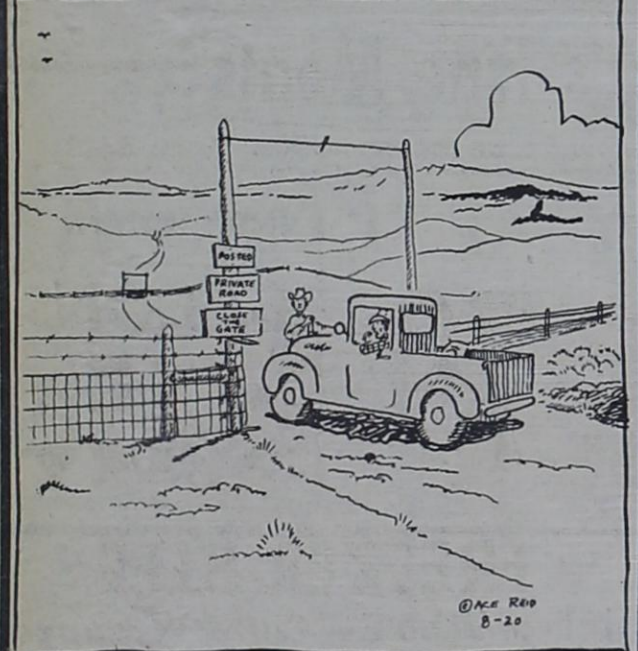
At intermission of the show, winners will be awarded plaques in the cow calling and beard growing contests.

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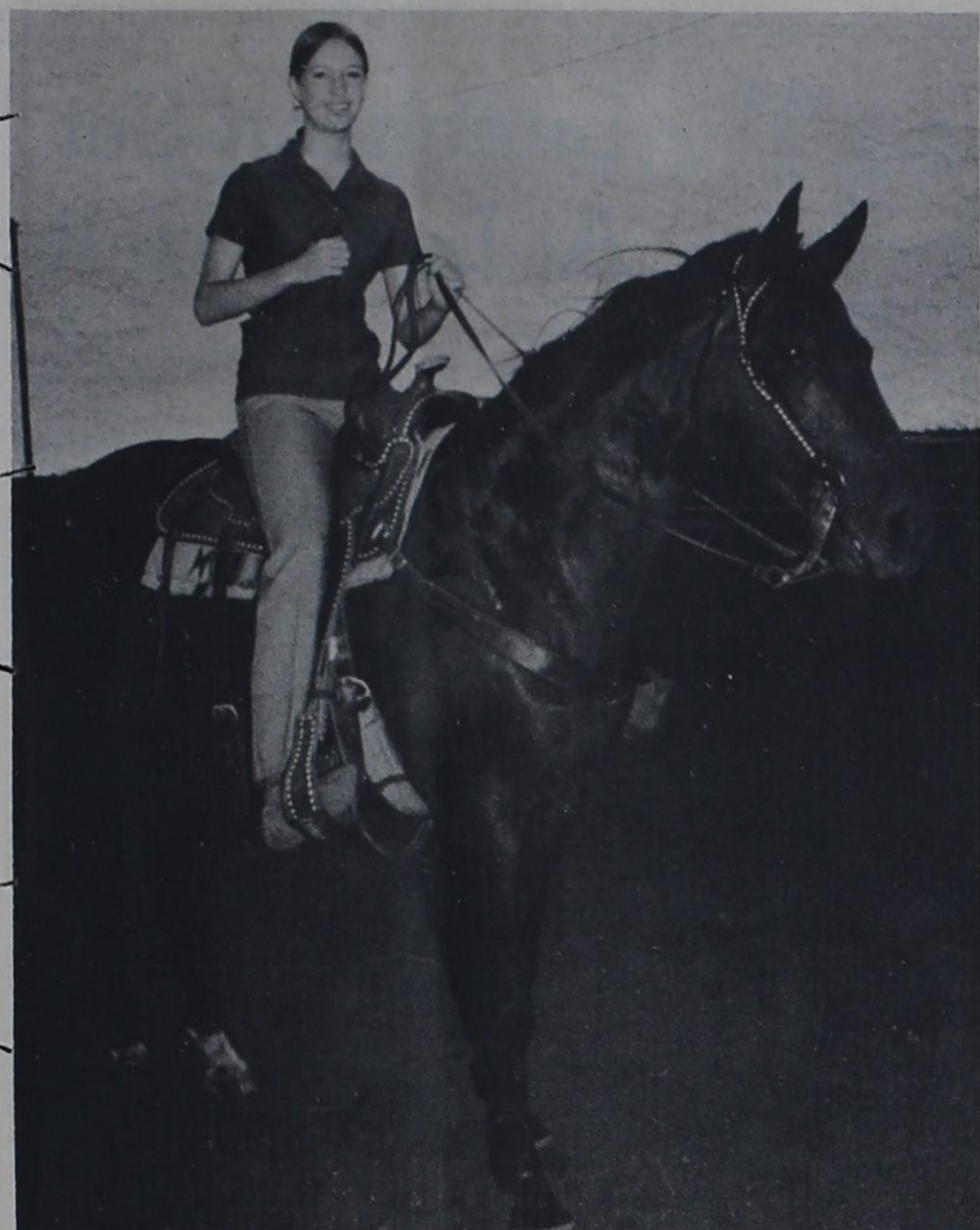

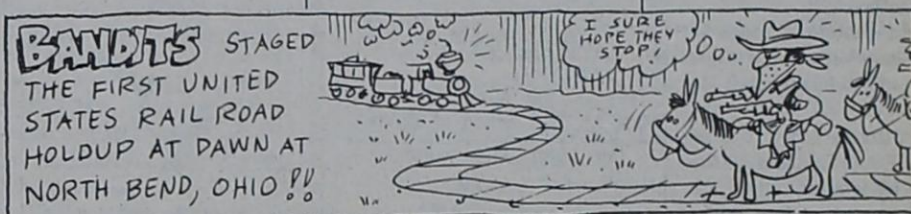
# Five Girls Vie For '72 Title

Crowning the new queen and presenting her with a silver trophy belt buckle and a bouquet of red roses will be Miss Bonny Jones, 1971 BTD Queen. Trophies will be presented the first and second runners-up in the contest. The five girls will be judged at 7 p.m. tomorrow (Thursday) at the Bovina Roping Arena on the eastern edge of the city limits. Judging is based 60 per cent

on horsemanship and 40 per cent on beauty, personality and appearance. Queen candidates and their sponsors are Christie Trimble, Bovina Roping Club; Cathy Trimble, Bovina Woman's Study Club; Dian Roming, Parmer County Spraying Service; Michelle Bonds, Gaines Hardware; and Ginger Fitts, Aero-Farm Chemicals. Mrs. C. C. Naegle is chairman of this year's contest. She is assisted by Mrs. Sonny Jones. Rules of the contest specify that candidates must be between 14 and 18 and never married. They must have been a resident of Parmer County for one

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 7 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 16)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows: "Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission."  
(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.  
(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature.  
(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants

shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them.  
(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article.  
(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.  
(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 9 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 20)  
General Election, November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to Directors of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. A member of the Legislature shall not be eligible to serve as a Director of a Soil and Water Conservation District. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 58)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation."  
"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles; the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller for each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty three years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."  
Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office."

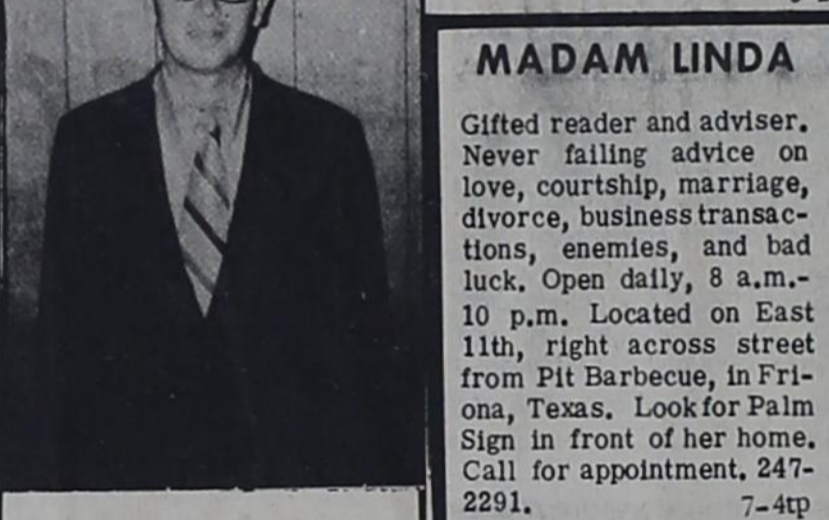

# Expect 3000 Diners At Barbeque

Sufficient boneless beef chuck for 3,000 persons will go on the grills at 1 p.m. tomorrow (Thursday) in preparation for the focal point of the three-day Bull Town Days celebration -- the free supper set for 6 p.m. Friday.

Ralph Roming was in charge of a crew of men who went to Clarendon last week to pick up two truck loads of wood for the barbeque fire.

Members of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture will be in charge of serving the meal.

Ezell said he expected Vega and Farwell to furnish the toughest competition in the district. "I look for Sudan to be tough as nails. recorded in the show, probably due to the later date.


The Bovina show is American Quarter Horse Association approved.

# Vestals Operate Corn Grinding Mill Here

A High Plains "blue" north-er greeted the Jessie Vestal family at Dimmitt, just 30 miles

from their destination of Bovina, on March 13, 1925.

"We near froze to death that day," recalls Mrs. Cora Vestal today.

She and her husband, who died in May of this year at the age of 88, and their three children -- Johnny, Pete and Martha June -- made the then rigorous trip from Iowa Park out west to Bovina, a distance of about 300 miles.

In spite of their introduction to the area where they would make their home for the next 47 years of their married life, the Vestals weren't entirely unfamiliar with this part of the world.

Jessie, a native of North Carolina, and Cora, who was born in Jack County, were married in 1910 at Taiban, N.M.

They lived in a half-dugout and farmed at House for several years before moving to Iowa Park. The Vestals lost a boy and girl in early childhood.

Jessie and Cora farmed with teams of mules and horses before coming to Bovina. "We made some of the best crops back then with our teams," Mrs. Vestal remembers. They planted maize and Indian corn at

House and cotton at Iowa Park where they lived from 1915 until they came to Bovina.

Once established on a farm here, Mr. Vestal purchased a well drilling rig and brought in water wells from Hereford to Fort Sumner, N.M., until his retirement about 15 or 20 years ago.

In addition to drilling wells, he owned perhaps the only custom mill in this area at that time.

Vestal leased a railroad car to bring his tractor and other farm equipment from Iowa Park. The family drove out in a Studebaker and their work car, a Model A Ford.

When the Vestals arrived in Bovina, there was only one house between their place (the intersection of Eighth Street and the Dimmitt Highway) and what there was of town. The post office was in a home which caught on fire shortly after they moved here. The next location was in Mr. Ezell's home (Gene

Ezell's father), remembers Cora.

At that time, there were no paved streets, no electricity, no natural gas and only several hundred inhabitants in Bovina. "We rented a couple of rooms in the old two-story hotel when we arrived. Put our wood cook-stove up there and stayed until we built our home later that year.

"Jessie had to charter a railroad car to bring the lumber and building materials from Iowa Park. There weren't a whole lot of trees around here," Mrs. Vestal said.

"As I remember it, it was mostly cattle country even then, pretty open with very few fences and not too much farming going on."

The Vestal farm covered from what is now about Avenue E to the Running Water Draw just south of Bovina.

"We bought the place on credit. In 1928 my son and I picked the cotton which made one and one-half bales to the acre that year and paid off the note on the place."

Mrs. Vestal makes light of her chores during those years, saying only she "... just kept house for Jessie and kept the children in school."

"I always planted lots of flowers wherever I lived as I did when we moved here. Mr. J. Sam Gaines used to admire my flowers when he happened by. We bought milk and eggs from Mrs. J. Sam when we first came here."

Some of Mrs. Vestal's neighbors that she can recall included Loudie and Maggie McGee, Mr. and Mrs. Ayers (Mable Ellison's parents), Mr. and Mrs. Ezell, Mr. and Mrs. Gaines and Mrs. Pearl Moore.

"I got acquainted with Pearl when she ran over one of my old setting hens and brought it to me."

Mrs. Vestal, who never learned to drive, was a familiar sight as she walked around town taking care of her various chores and visiting neighbors.

"Jessie told Pearl one day, when she came to visit and I was gone, to just sit still awhile and I would zip by shortly."

Mrs. Vestal recalled that Jessie drilled the third water well in Bovina for a Mr. Sam Camp, brother-in-law of Henry Leake and uncle of Clifford Leake. Camp owned one of the two service stations in Bovina at that time.

"My daughter came home and told me that her daddy was drilling a well for a Mr. Drip, or something like that. Turned out to be Mr. Leake. She really had his named mixed up, I guess."

As Pete grew older, he helped his father on the rig. Later on, he built his own rig and

drilled wells for a number of years until he moved to California where he lives today. His brother, Johnny, also lives in California and Martha June lives in Aztec, N.M.

"Jessie began milling in New Mexico and ground corn for people for many a year.

"He sold his mill to Rusty McGee several years ago.

"Sometimes he would take as many as 50 to 100 sacks of meal at a time to the grocery store."

The Vestals started with burlap bags and later switched to paper sacks. Mrs. Vestal sewed

each bag up after it was filled. The burlap bags, as well as the paper sacks, bore the legend:

Custom Mill  
(picture of ear of corn)  
Corn Meal  
Every Sack Guaranteed  
Manufactured by  
J. F. Vestal  
Bovina, Texas

The mill was operated off a tractor pulley and used the stone grinding method. "Sure did beat this old meal we get today," Mrs. Vestal stated emphatically.

When quizzed about the process of turning ears of corn into the good yellow meal, Mrs. Vestal remarked that they grew most of the corn they used, but if they didn't have enough, they bought corn from the neighbors. Mrs. Vestal helped with the process from planting to bagging.

"After the corn had dried, we would nub it (clean it), shell the corn and then wind it several times before it was ready to grind."

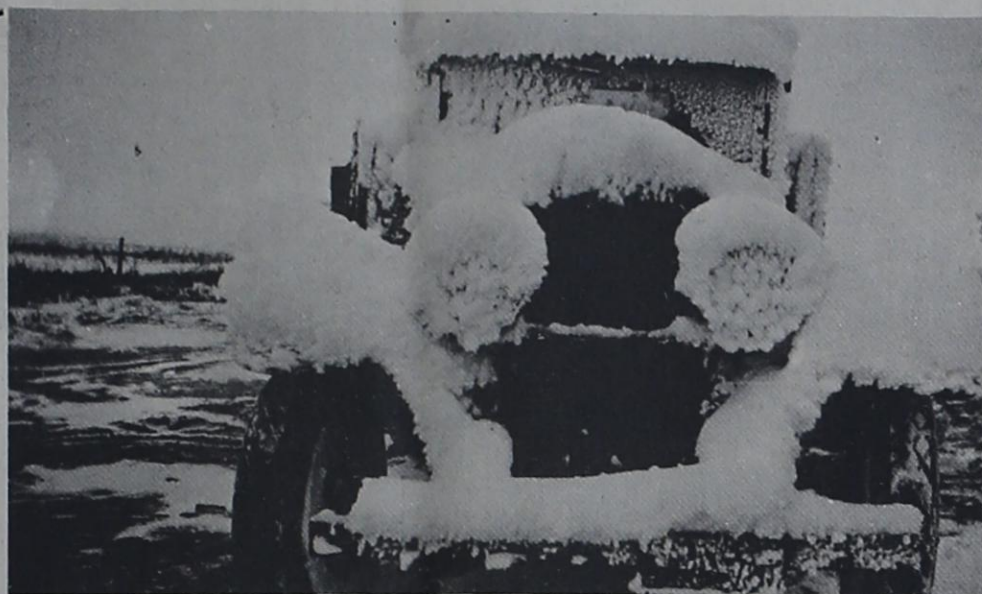

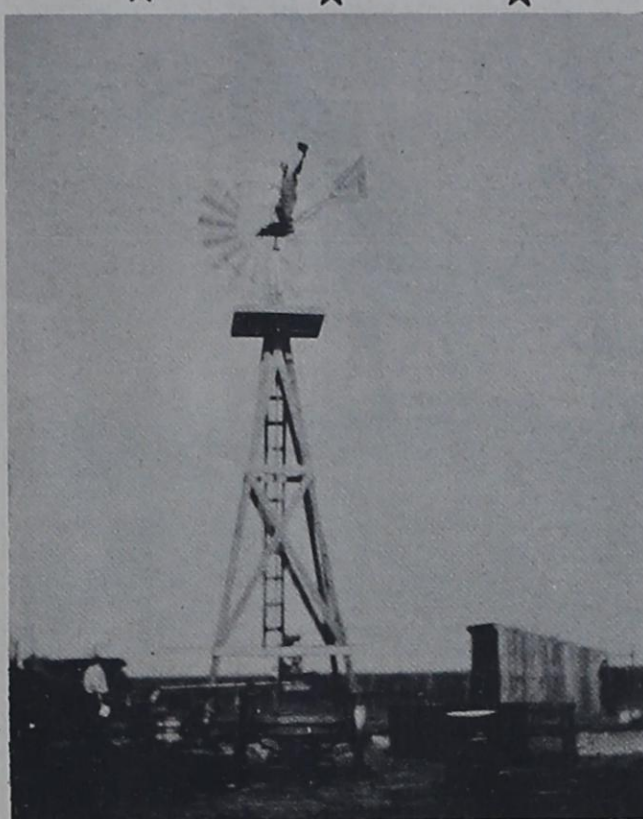

WINTER OF 1926 --- Frost and snow decorate the Vestal's Model A Ford and heralds the beginning of their first full winter in Bovina.

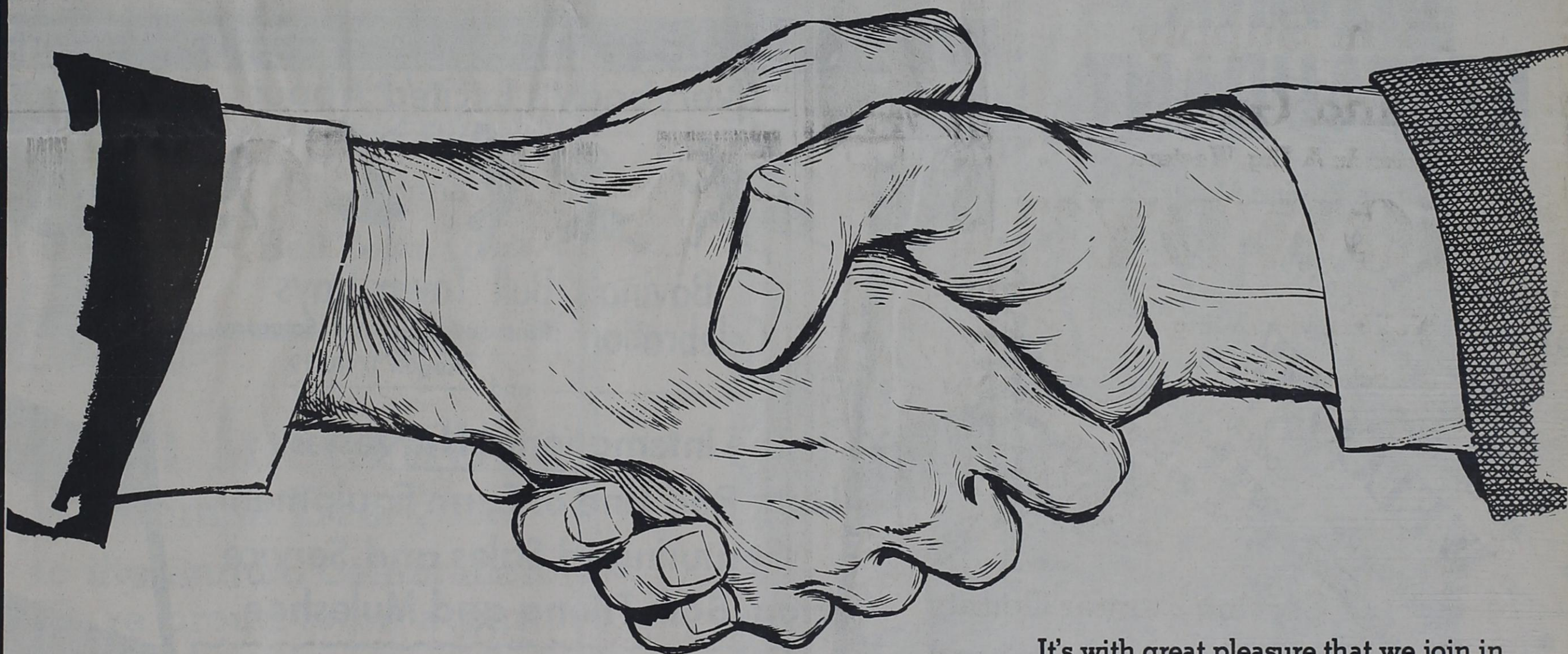

1900's, Mrs. Vestal could remember the sand storms most vividly.

"I used to get a chill whenever I would see those old black clouds boiling up.

"Seems like the weather was a lot cooler back then and we had a lot more snow than we get nowadays."

Recalling the social life, Mrs. Vestal said she could remember attending the Pentecostal Church in a tent each week in the same location the church building is today on First Street.

"Jessie played the banjo then, sometimes for dances. We used to have big suppers at the school.

Each family would bring something for the pot and we would make a big washtub full of soup. I can remember one time when Mrs. Langer killed and dressed a bunch of her guineas for the soup. (For those who do not remember guineas or have never seen them, they are a breed of gray chickens, smaller than the average chicken and a little larger than the Banty breed.)

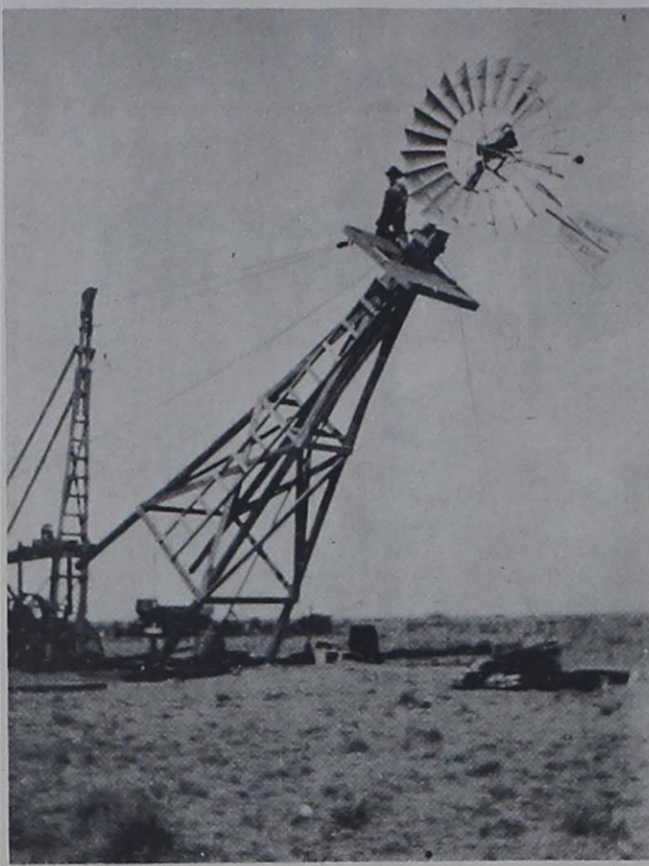
Perhaps the most remarkable thing about Mrs. Vestal's story is the fact that she never dwells upon, or even mentions, how difficult things must have been in those days, especially as it would seem to those of us who are accustomed to having the gamut of automatic electrical appliances from washing

machines and dryers, automatic heating and cooling, modern ranges and refrigerators, to other electrical gadgets by the score that we take for granted.

Her only comment during the interview was "... we used to have lots of fun."

Up until the past several years, the 78-year-old Mrs. Vestal could still be seen "zipping" around town taking care of her chores and "doing" for her neighbors. According to her friends, she wouldn't let people "do" for her and still prefers it that way.

Although she admits to being a "little slower these days," there is still a sparkle in her eye and an active interest in others around her.



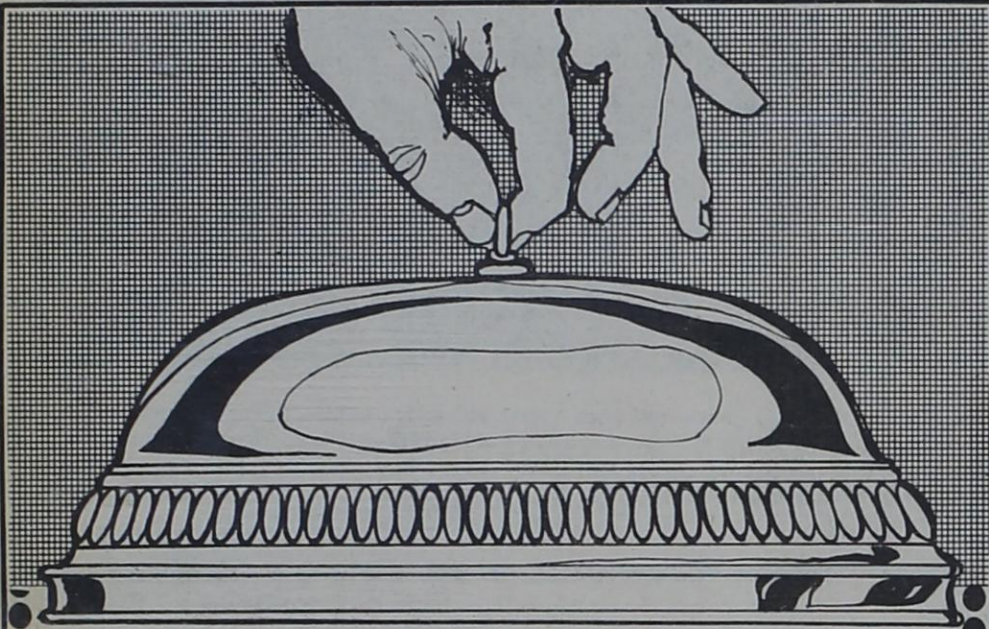
NEW WINDMILL GOES UP --- Vestal rides a windmill up as it is raised into position on the prairie somewhere around Bovina.

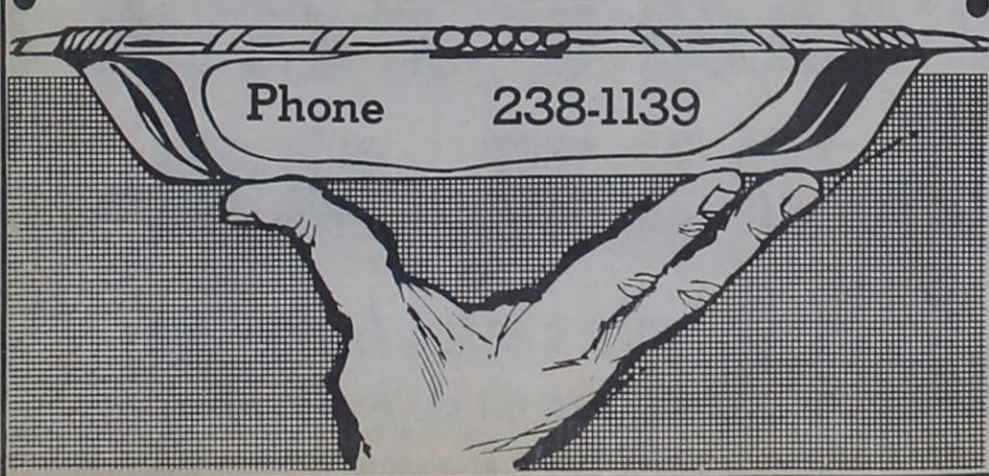

# Farmcast

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Compiled From Sources  
Of The Texas Department of Agriculture  
John C. White, Commissioner

**LIVESTOCK** moving from Texas, Oklahoma, Puerto Rico and parts of Arizona, California and New Mexico must be inspected and certified free of screwworms before being moved interstate.

The regulations will be in effect through Nov. 30 of this year, and from April 15 through Nov. 30 in future years until the present screwworm infestation is overcome.

State and federal veterinarians, state and federal livestock inspectors and accredited veterinarians are authorized to make the necessary inspections, supervise pesticide applications and issue shipping certificates.

**TEXAS** stocks of grain in all positions as of July 1 are estimated at 190 million bushels. This compares with 141 million bushels a year ago. The largest increase is in sorghum stocks followed by wheat, corn and rye. Stocks of oats, barley and soybeans are down from a year ago.

Sorghum stocks are estimated at 129 million bushels compared with 86.9 million bushels in 1971.

Nationwide, large increases were noted in corn, sorghum grain, wheat and rye. Stocks of corn, oats, barley, and sorghum totaled 81.7 million tons, 35 percent more than 1971.

Feed grain disappearance during April-June totaled 44 million tons, 17 percent more than for the same quarter in 1971.

**EARLY** destruction of cotton stalks in the Lower Rio Grande Valley as well as throughout all of the state is urged. Mandatory deadline is Aug. 31 in the Lower Rio Grande Valley counties of Cameron, Willacy and certain portions of Hidalgo and Starr counties under the pink bollworm act.

Early destruction of stalks will help prevent build-ups of pink bollworms and other cotton insects for the 1973 crop.

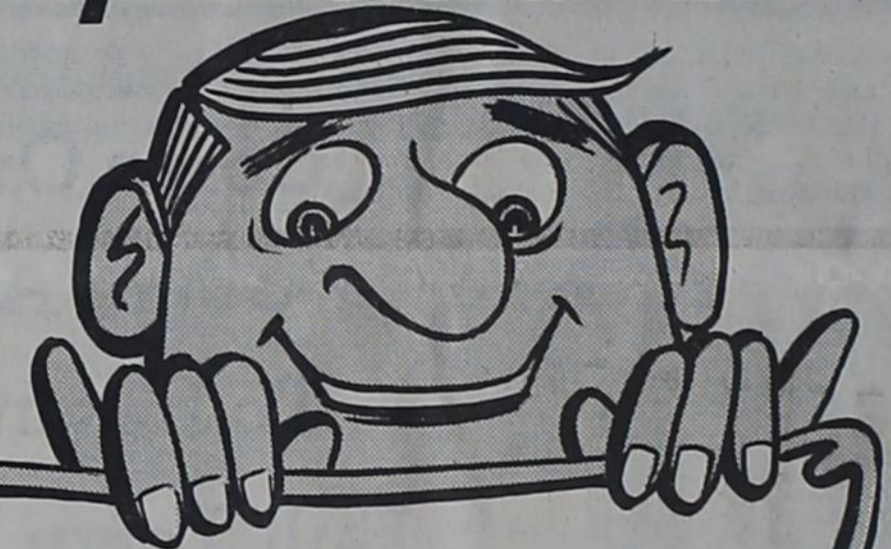

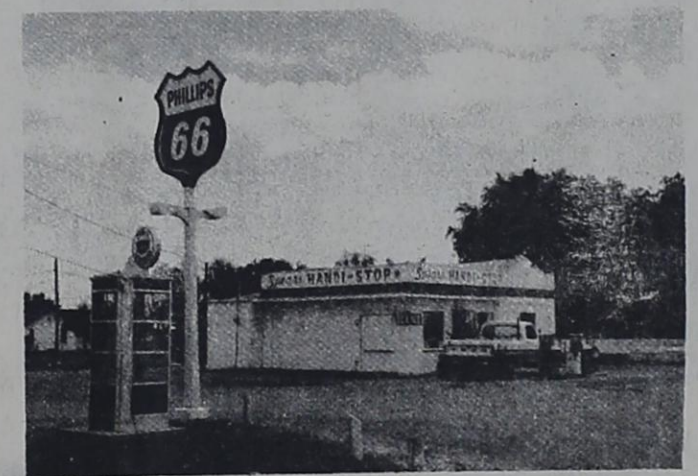

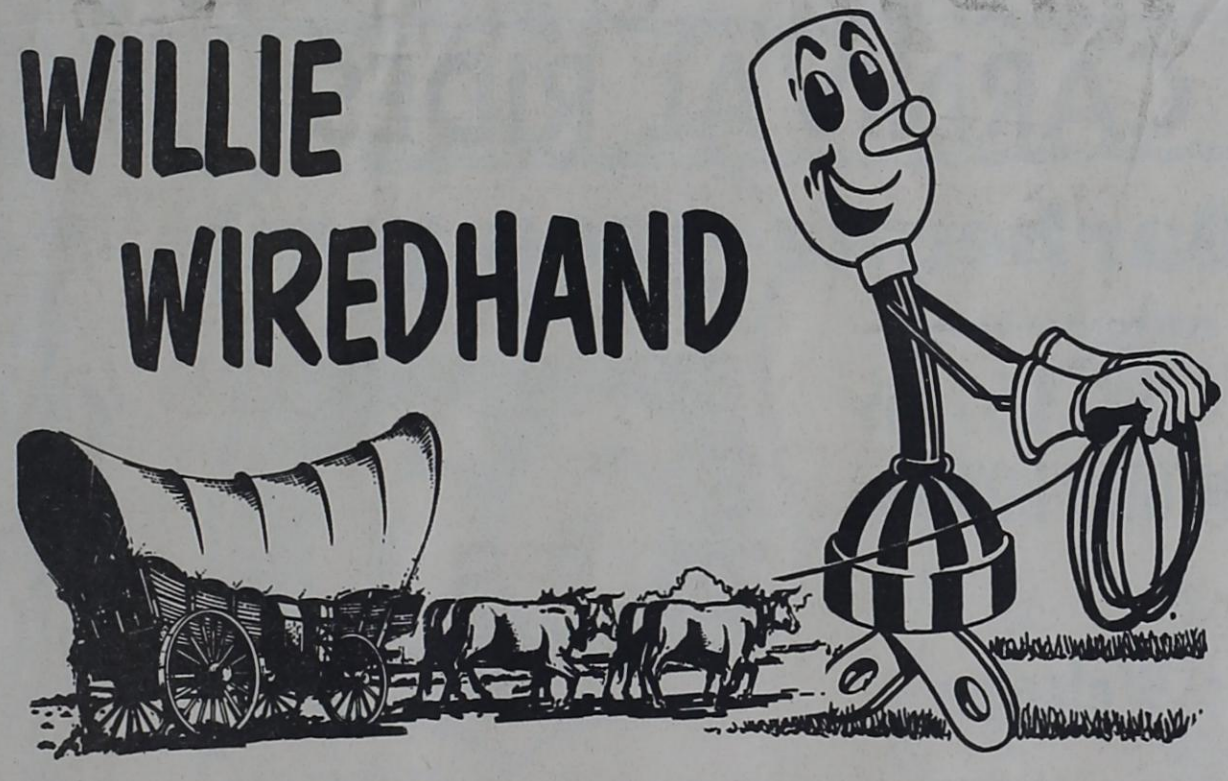

With Peace Corps Project --

## Richard Carson Tells Of Trip To Africa

Three of the four sons of Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Carson of 902 Ninth St. are well known in this community for their adventurous spirit.

Alan, number two son, has toured the U.S., Canada and Mexico on his motorcycle and attended the University of Mexico at Mexico City.

Gary, number three son, spent one summer in Seattle, Wash., working for a lumber company.

Alan and Galen, number four son, have planned a canoe trip -- the hard way -- for the summer of 1973. Their itinerary calls for the trek to begin at the mouth of the Mississippi River in the latter part of February or early March. They will travel UP the river to its head where they will switch over to a river in Canada and plan to end their trip at the Arctic Circle in August.

Joan, the only girl in the family, is still a "little too young" to attempt topping her brother's adventures. Or, at least, Marion and Dixie hope so.

However, Richard, at 24 the eldest son, has thus far in the Carson family odyssey, traveled the farthest in his quest for adventure.

After receiving a BS degree in economics from Texas Tech University at Lubbock in Jan-

uary 1971, Richard applied for a Peace Corps project in Cameroon, French West Africa.

He was one of eight candidates selected from 13 applicants at a pretesting meeting in Denver in January of '71.

### Training Begins

Richard flew to Philadelphia in March for his shots and orientation and then to St. Thomas in the Virgin Islands for eight weeks of intensive training in the French language.

Five of the eight men were to be sent to Cameroon. All were just out of college and had some background in the cattle industry.

Besides Carson, the men headed for Cameroon were Danny Dean from Ft. Worth, Dean Johnson from Douglas, Wyo., Rick Carron from Pocatella, Idaho, and Zane Walker from Lynchburg, Ohio.

"It was vital for us to learn the French language," said Richard, "because most of the government officials we would be working with in Cameroon spoke French and Fulani (the native African dialect)."

"We were in class from six to seven hours a day. We started out by repeating French words and phrases and then progressed to workbooks and reading.

In addition, we had cross-cultural classes -- information on where we were going, customs of the people and some history of that part of Africa."

The trainees were quartered in the Estate Mandahl, a language training center for the Peace Corps for the past 10 or 12 years. About 85 trainees were there at that time -- all going to Africa or some other French speaking country.

"We had three hours a day, Saturday afternoon and all day Sunday off" said Richard. The men toured the islands and spent a lot of time at the beach.

After their seventh week of training, the director of the animal husbandry department in Cameroon flew over to interview the five men who were assigned to his territory. Richard commented that the State Department arranged the trip and took the official on a tour of the U.S. after the interviews.

At the conclusion of the eighth week, the trainees were given a government test on language proficiency. The test was rated on a scale of 0 to 5. A minimum grade of "two" was required. "... then they assume you are capable of taking care of yourself, languagewise, in that country."

After the French training was completed, the five men were flown to the University of Wis-



consin at Madison for two weeks introduction to the Fulani language. There, they sat in a classroom eight hours a day, studying only the language. "We had had about enough of that -- French was at least similar in some ways to our language -- but this was entirely different. It really made our heads spin," Richard commented.

"Our instructor was the son of a missionary and he had been reared in the town we were being sent to. Eight months later, he and his family were in our locale. He was on a leave of absence to study another African dialect. He was about 35, had a doctorate in African language and spoke about 10 or 11 different dialects. We became real good friends."

### Cameroon-Bound

After the training period at the university was over, the men were scheduled to fly from John

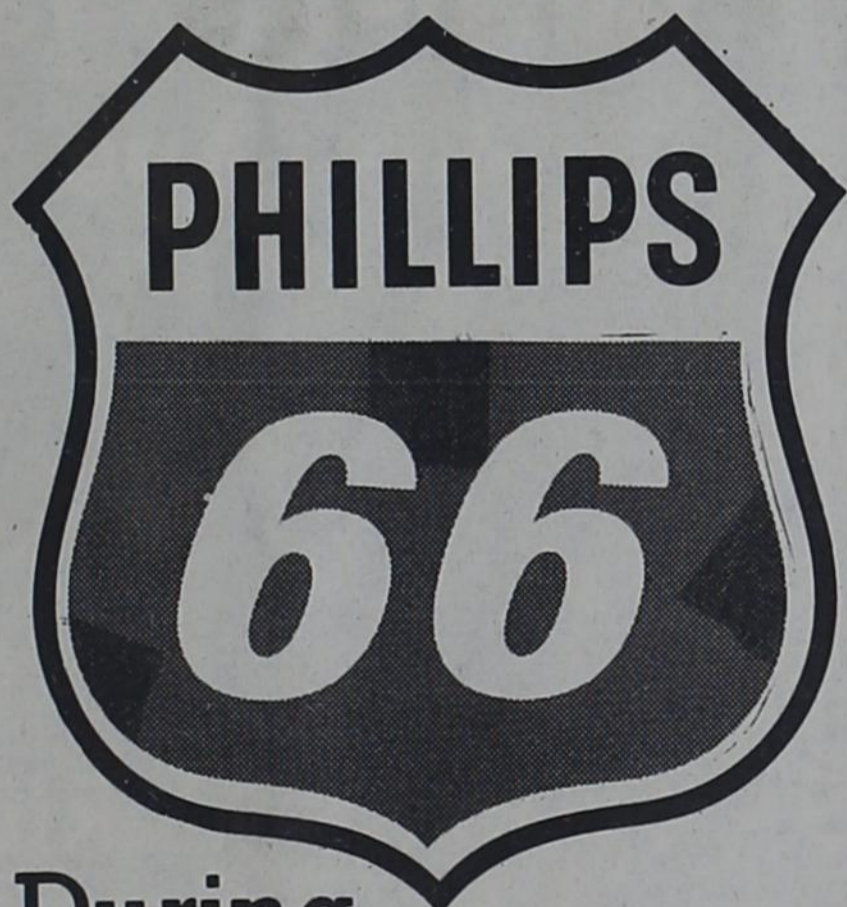
F. Kennedy Airport to Paris to Douala, Cameroon, to the capital city of Yaounde and then on to Ngaoundere.

The men had filled out information for their passports two months prior to their departure. Peace Corps officials told them that their documents would be waiting at JFK. "When we got there -- no passports. Everyone we talked to was a complete blank. We were supposed to fly out on a new 747 jet, but we missed that plane." The passports were finally located in a mail storage room in the basement of the airport building. All five expressed disappointment at not being able to fly the 747, which was just being introduced to the airways. Instead, they took a 707 flight and landed in Paris at night. "We just had 45 minutes to get across town from Orly to Le Bourget. All we got to see of Paris were the street lights."

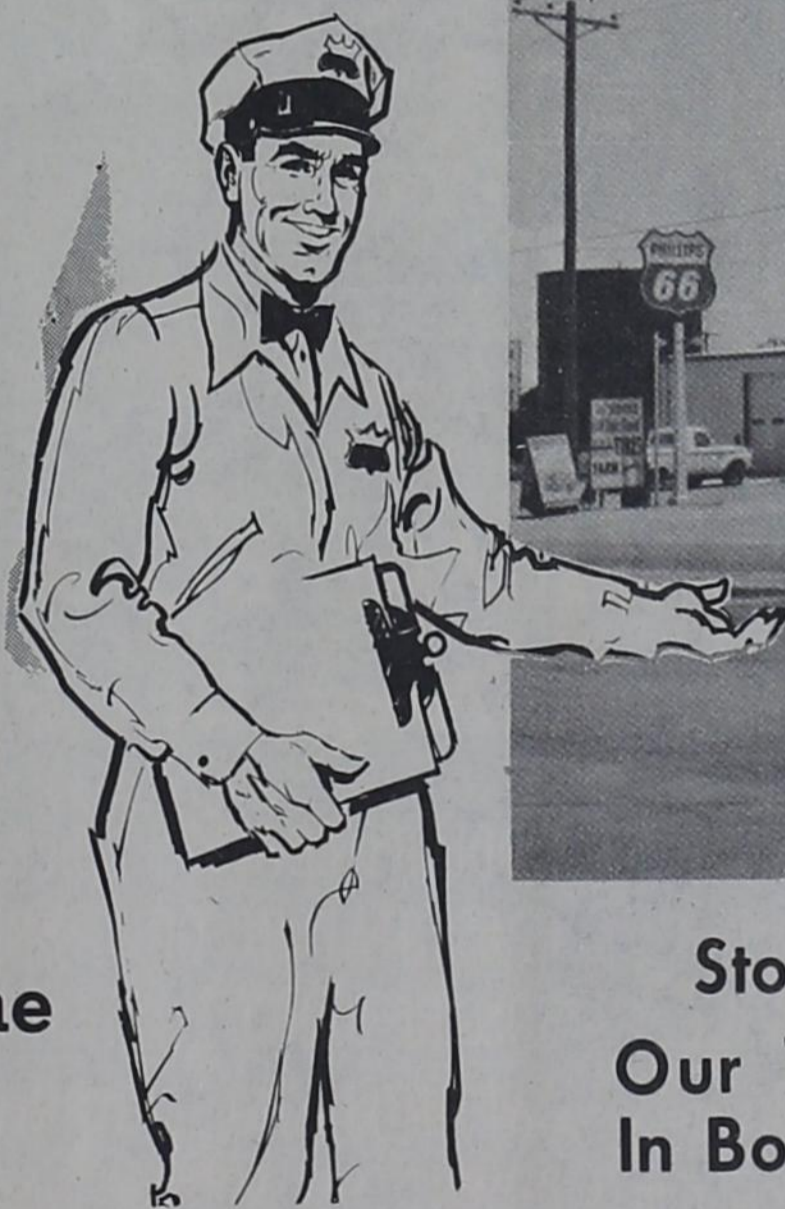

"After we had been in Cameroon a few months, that got to be sort of an inside joke about the street lights of Paris." However, Richard did say that he got to see a lot more of Paris on his return trip.

After the men arrived in Ngaoundere, they underwent a two-week additional training period in French and Foulani with orientation in the department and region in which they would be working. They also got acquainted with the people they would be associated with, especially with the official

(homologue in French) assigned to each one of the men. The homologue could speak some French and was fluent in Foulani. "He was our interpreter when things got a little above our head. He could converse with the Foulani or French."

## Into The Bush

Finally, after 12 weeks of training -- out into the bush. Their vehicles were British Land Rovers, the equivalent of pickups here except heavier. Each volunteer was assigned to a group of five men making

five teams in all or about 25 people working on the project. Objective of the project, Richard said, was an analysis of the cattle industry on the plateau area surrounding Ngaoundere -- an area of about 73,000 square miles.

According to the project's coordinator, Jim Nash, who was directly responsible to the Peace Corps for the project, "... this was like breaking new ground. No one knew just exactly how we were going to handle the thing."

Ngaoundere, according to their information, is probably the largest cattle producing area

in Africa. The Cameroon government wanted to know the number of cattle on the plateau, the migratory habits of the natives and other information.

"Our primary concern, as far as the natives knew, was to vaccinate the cattle," said Richard.

The primary cattle disease in the area is sleeping sickness caused by the Tsetse fly. The cattle contract the disease during the migration -- when they move the herds from the high plateau area to the low country. A Tsetse fly never gets over three miles from water and the cattle are driven along the rivers and streams to the low country.

"When we went out into the bush to work, the research team visited the village chieftain first. He took care of us -- gave us a place to stay and sometimes even fed us.

"Their main staple was 'couscous' made of pounded manioc root mixed with some type liquid and formed into a ball. It is dipped in a meat sauce. We didn't eat any more of the couscous than we had to.

"The natives grew okra, onions, garlic and pepper. Everything they eat is highly seasoned. Sometimes the chief would feed us chicken which was

a real special treat to them.

"To a Foulani, the more cattle he owns the richer and more respected he is. However, they sell more of their herds, especially the five-year-old steers, than the government thought when we went in there.

"Every other herd we vaccinated, we took down statistics on each member of the herd -- sex, age, breed, coat color and markings. We talked to the owner of herd and found out how many calves he had, how many had died, why, and the causes and types of diseases.

"With all this information compiled and analyzed, the government hopes to get some idea of the potential in the area," Carson said.

"I figured that I looked at some 11,000 cattle while I was there. I got to where I could just look at one and tell how old it was after I had looked into the mouth of about 1,000 head."

The Department of Elevage (livestock) set up a program of free vaccinations in the bush. Each village has a vaccination corral. On the appointed date, the team would be in the village for a series of vaccinations and interviews.

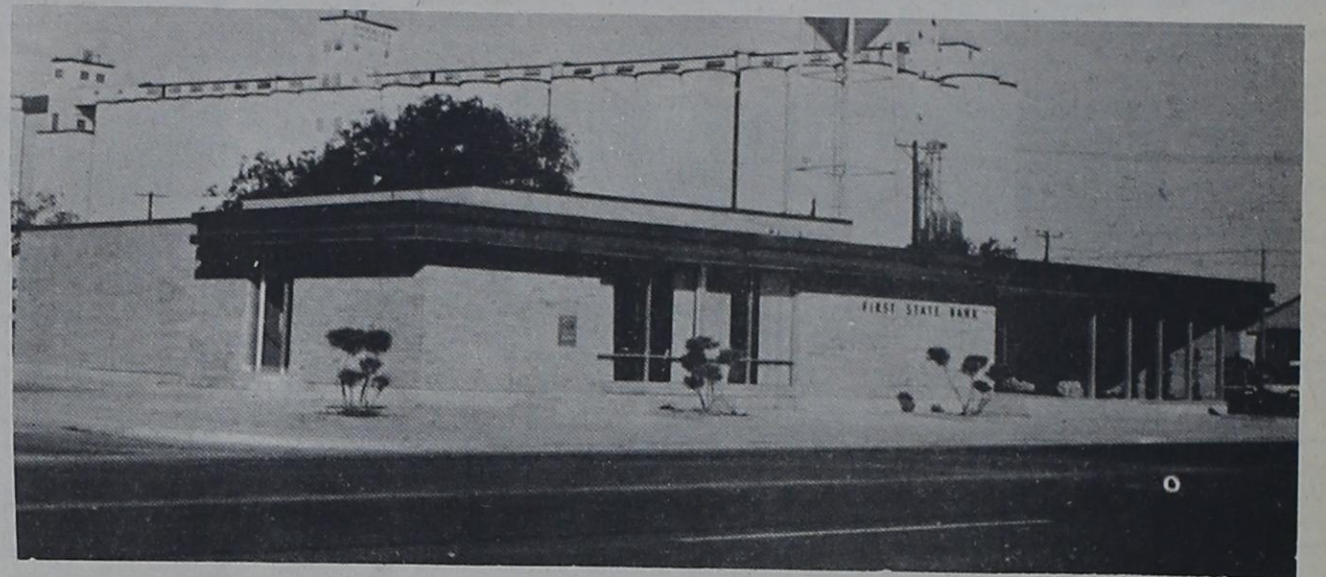

"Zane and I built a crude squeeze chute in the Lutheran workshop at Ngaoundere and gave it to the research team. They 'thought' they had heard of it before but they weren't sure."

Describes Cattle

Carson said they worked with two breeds within the Zebu tropical-type cattle.

The Mborro is the ancient, traditional Foulani cattle. They are long, tall and rangy. Carson said they could remind one of a cross between a Longhorn and a Brahman. Both breeds strongly resemble the Brahman. The Mborro are hardy, according to Carson, but not good beef producers. "They look sick all the time and are pretty wild."

The Goudali are colored predominantly white with red spots, sort of like an Appaloosa horse. That breed is shorter, wider and with a bigger hump. "The Goudali are a little better milk producers than the Mborro. They probably give almost a pint a day," Carson said they were warned, however, not to drink the milk because of prevalent diseases, particularly tuberculosis.

"The Foulani we came in contact with were friendly and maybe a little suspicious but interested when they found out we were Americans. One of our Black homologues knew something of our racial problems over here. He was a little antagonistic toward us, but it was mostly curiosity."

In explaining the cattle buying and selling system in Cameroon, Carson said that a cattle buyer would make a run through the villages and buy a steer here and there until he would collect about 40 head. From Ngaoundere to Douala, where the buyer sells to butchers, it was a 36-day walk for the buyer and his herdsman.

Carson said the tribesman received about \$100 to \$125 (equivalent to American money) for a steer. The buyer gets about \$160 from the butcher.

One sidelight brought out by Carson was that non-Moslems are not allowed to be butchers. There are certain rules to be followed, such as the steer facing in a certain direction to be killed. After the steer is butchered and dressed, it is quartered and put on a table in the open market to be sold.

Ngaoundere

The altitude of Ngaoundere is about 3500 feet. Up on the plateau, the average rainfall is about 80 inches with the rains falling between April and November.

"The cattle are all up on the plateau then and everything is green, cool and beautiful. After the dry season begins, the Foulani burn off the grass and take the cattle to low country, Carson said he believed the grass is burned largely to control the brush and trees, which are similar to Mesquite.

Ngaoundere, the main city in the northern region, has about 20,000 people. The main nationalities are French, Lebanese and Foulani.

Carson said there were two paved streets in the town. The higher income group -- the French, government officials and Lebanese -- live in one section of town with the Foulani in another.

Two Lebanese cousins owned almost the whole shopping district in the French section. Each had a grocery, hardware-general store and service station. One had a trucking company and the other a bakery.

There were about 25 Lutheran missionaries in the city. The mission was the largest in northern Cameroon and maybe the whole country, Carson stated. The men and their families at the French research station completed the higher-income bracket of the population. An Army recruit training center was also in the city.

The missionaries, government people and Frenchmen lived in European style homes with all the comforts.

The remainder of the population lived in the traditional African-Moslem round (as opposed to square) mud huts with grass roofs. Maybe a well-to-do native would have a walled-in compound with several huts and a well.

Some of the Foulani owned cattle, Carson said. Some owned "manny wagons" which is the public transportation. A "mammy wagon" is a vehicle between a Volkswagen van and small school bus. "The people were jammed into benches in the wagon with their possessions piled on top."

They shopped at an open market. The people brought food, clothing, pots and pans and a lit-

tle bit of everything to the market every day.

"When we were in Ngaoundere, from May until September, we stayed at the Wakwa research station, some 15 kilometers from town."

Carson said the Foulani did not particularly believe in education. They might send their sons to the Lutheran school or to a Moslem school where they learned to read and write Arabic, the Moslem language, which wasn't of much use in Cameroon.

"When we were in orientation, they warned us about the different types of diseases we might contract and about eating the food and drinking the water. However, after we had been there a while, we forgot most of it except boiling the water and none of us ever caught any of the terrible things they warned us about."

Each village had at least one sewing machine and seamstress. The machine stayed busy all the time making the traditional Foulani garb.

Carson said the white smock-type garment the men wore over their clothes was decorated with colorful stitching. "The Foulani men managed to keep their white smock much cleaner than we did when we were out in the bush."

He said he felt they stayed clean because they were Moslems and must pray five times a day and must be clean each time they pray.

Richard noted that there were very few horses in Cameroon. A village chief might own a few but they were used mostly on ceremonial occasions. "I didn't see but one or two shoats all the time we were over there and they looked as if they had every kind of disease in the world. Pork is 'unclean' to a Moslem, so they have no use for pigs."

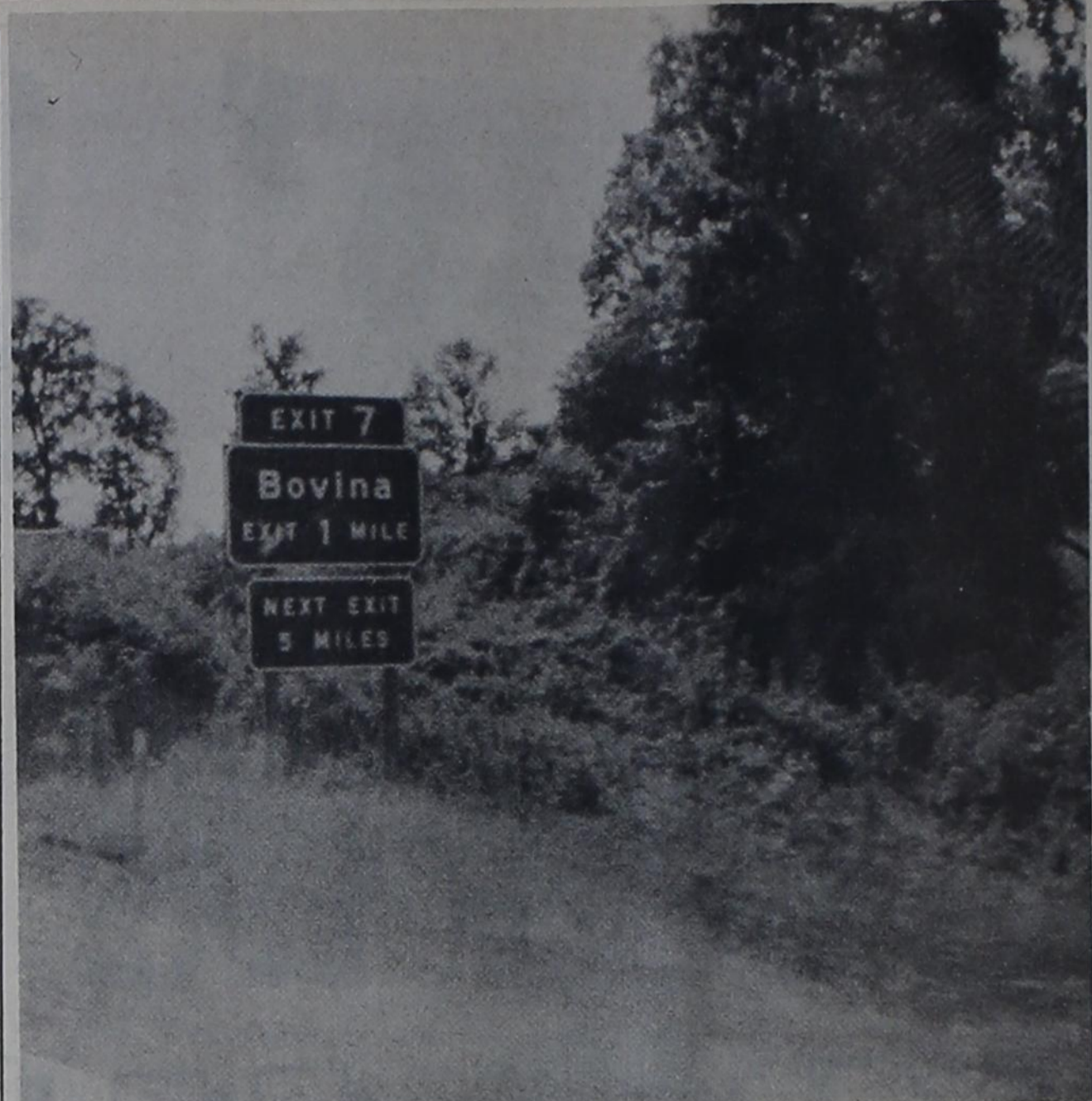
"They gave us two years to complete our part of the project. We had the survey, which was the major portion, completed in eight months. All that remained to be done when we left was to compile and analyze the results of the survey."

Missed Showers And Ice Cream

Richard and Zane had to come back early -- Zane in January and Richard in May. Carson received his draft notice and came back for that reason. The other three men are still in Cameroon. "The last time I heard from them, they asked me to keep sending The Blade because they had really missed it after I left," Richard said.

He regrets having to come home early because he had planned to travel to the other countries in Africa before returning. When asked what he missed

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

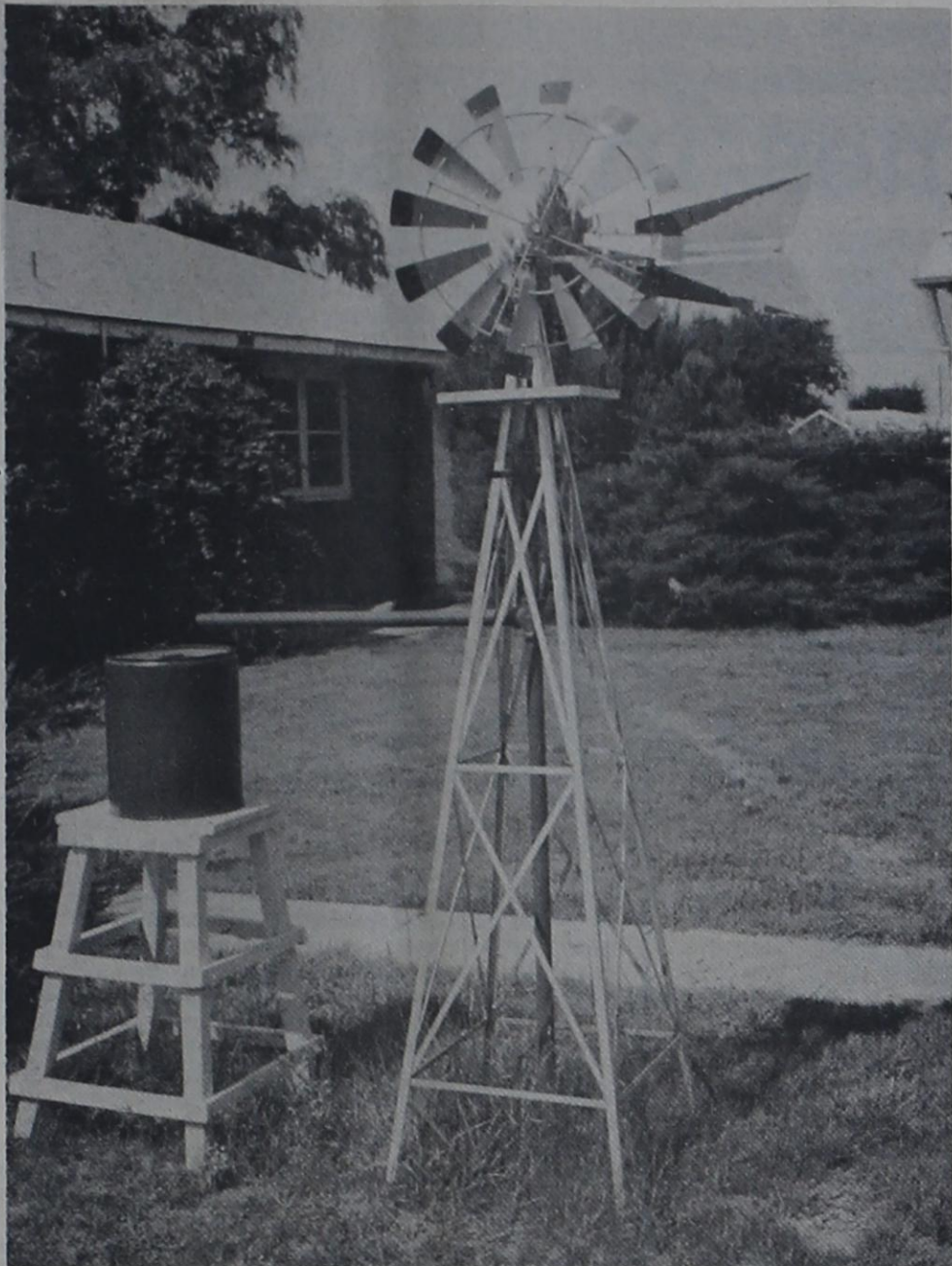

the most while in Africa, Richard quickly and emphatically answered, "hot showers." He said they had to take cold showers while in the training sessions on the Virgin Islands and were told it was to prepare them for Africa. "I really believe they just didn't have the facilities at the training center."

Two other things he missed the most were his chewing tobacco and homemade ice cream. Mrs. Carson said it cost so much to mail a carton of chewing tobacco that they had to stoo, Richard said he chewed betel nuts, the native habit, instead.

We kept track of world news through the New York Times and I knew what was happening in

Bovina through the Blade. But we lost track of what was going on on the sports scene.

His mother said the quickest they ever got a letter from Richard was six days "... which is faster than the mail from Alan in New Mexico at times."

Carson came home after 14 months with few souvenirs because of luggage restrictions. However, he did bring home innumerable slides of his experiences, a couple of the lightweight cotton Foulan smocks and an eight-foot long boa constrictor skin he bought off a trader.

His plans are indefinite as of now. Since he returned home, he has been helping Marion at the farm. Tentative plans call for a return to school in the near future.

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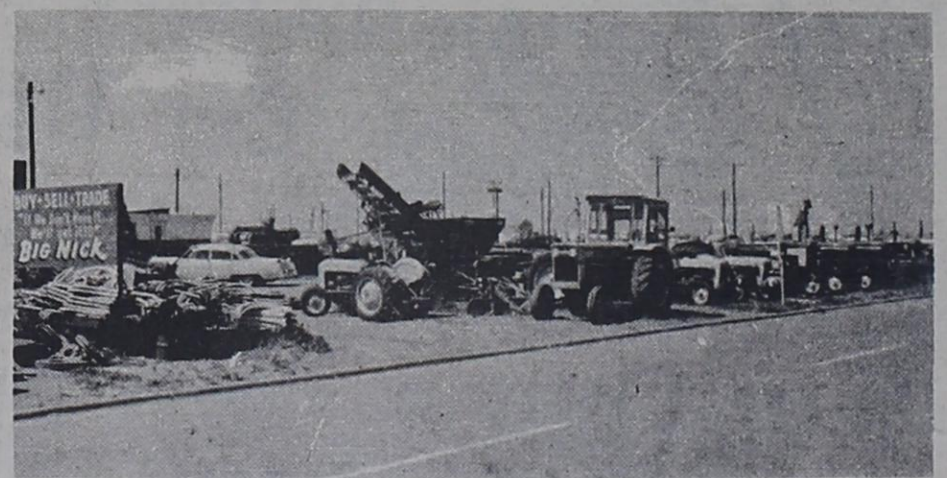

walls of several businesses advertising wares of all kinds. Garage sales attract any number of people -- the curious, the bargain hunters, the antique collectors, just lookers and sometimes even the "plain nosy." This Blade reporter interviewed several local women, who have had one or more ga-

rage sales, about their experiences.

 In answer to the query, why did you have a garage sale, we solicited the following statements:  
 Mrs. Tom Ware -- "To get rid of all my junk."  
 Mrs. Mac Glasscock -- "To

make money and get rid of stuff."  
 Mrs. H. H. Kelso -- "Because I had many useful things I wasn't using and didn't need and I felt that it would be a help to those who couldn't afford to buy the same things new."  
 Mrs. Travis Dyer -- For two reasons. The main one was that

I had a number of things I didn't need any longer and couldn't use and I thought someone else could."  
 Mrs. Earl Whitten -- "To get rid of things because Earl said he was going to leave if I didn't. I cleaned out the closets and the basement because he threatened me."

Did you have any special plans for the money you made off the sale?  
 Mrs. Ware -- "I'm going to buy some new clothes, I sold all my old ones."  
 Mrs. Glasscock -- "Sometimes I save for something special, but I usually just go out and buy more 'stuff'.  
 Mrs. Kelso -- "I bought some

beautiful living room drapes which I couldn't have afforded otherwise. I really enjoy sitting there and thinking about how I got the money to buy them."  
 Mrs. Dyer -- "I usually buy school clothes for the girls."  
 Mrs. Whitten -- "I'm going to buy some every-day dishes and cookware. I sold all of the old ones."

hold goods sell real well such as curtains, bath mats, pots, pans and skillets. They will sell before anything else. Also, toys, old underwear and old bicycle parts. They either rebuilt or built bicycles out of old parts picked up in sales.  
 "I've discovered that some of the people buy things just for the harvest season and throw them away when they leave. They say they don't bring good things along because it is usually torn up during the trip."  
 Mrs. Whitten -- "Children's clothes and old dishes."

What do you do with the leftover things?  
 Mrs. Ware -- "Either save it for the next garage sale -- give it away -- or throw it away."  
 Mrs. Glasscock -- "Save it for another sale."  
 Mrs. Kelso -- "Save it for the next sale or put it in the Good Will box."  
 Mrs. Dyer -- "I save it for another sale."  
 Mrs. Whitten -- "I took it to the Salvation Army. I don't think I will ever have another sale. That turned into hard work."

How do you price the items?  
 Mrs. Ware -- "On stuff I really want to get rid of, I mark it real low."  
 Mrs. Glasscock -- "I mark it just as cheap as I can without giving it away."  
 Mrs. Kelso -- "It's just a hit or miss situation when it comes to pricing things -- just like the jelly glasses."  
 Mrs. Whitten -- "I price it at what I think people will pay for it. I have sort of judged by what we did at the Study Club's rummage sales."

What items sell best?  
 Mrs. Ware -- "Usually children's clothes, old underwear and ladies pants, one little tiny girl bought one of my old maternity tops once and she was so proud of it. She wore it back the next day."  
 Mrs. Glasscock -- "Old linens and baby clothes."  
 Mrs. Kelso -- "Real good things don't sell unless they are marked down to nothing. My daughter-in-law tagged a new \$10 blouse that still had the original tag on it for \$2 and it wouldn't sell, but people will buy worn out blouses for 25 cents each. Old dishes sell pretty well. I had jelly glasses marked six for a quarter and they wouldn't sell. The next day I marked them five cents apiece and they sold like hot cakes."  
 Mrs. Dyer -- "A lot of house-

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
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
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 "I had a man come up to me in the post office one day when I was putting up posters. He asked me if I didn't know that I was putting others out of business with my garage sale. I told him that some people could afford to buy at garage sales where they couldn't at a second-hand shop or a retail store," said Mrs. Kelso.  
 "I've found that a sale needs to run more than one weekend. That's because some people just have so much money they can spend each week. If they see something they want, they'll come back next weekend if they know you will continue the sale," she continued.

For each additional family member, add: \$500 per year to the income level.  
Eligibility determinations are made on family basis, that is, all the children in the same family attending schools under the jurisdiction of the same food authority are to receive the same benefits, a free lunch or a reduced price lunch, not some a free lunch and some a reduced price lunch.

ELIGIBILITY STANDARDS FOR FREE AND REDUCED PRICE LUNCHES --- The table above indicates the family income limits for children in Bovina Schools in regard to the free and reduced price lunches. School officials have adopted this family size-income scale to assist in determining eligibility. The income brackets are in the second and third columns. Families whose incomes are within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships may apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent to the principals' offices. Applications may be submitted anytime during the year. Under the provisions of the policy, the principal will review the application and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the principal, he may request a hearing to appeal the decision. A copy of the policy is on file at the school and may be reviewed by any interested person.



If a child consistently misbehaves in spite of the punishment, increasing the punishment may not be the answer. Psychologists say that such misbehavior may be a bid for attention, and that some children would rather be spanked than ignored.
