

Parade, Coronation Highlight Homecoming

The new queen is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grady Sorley. She was chosen for the honor by members of the Mustang team. The football hero, selected by the Pep Club, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Wiseman.

There's a McGovern in this week's paper. Worthy of your attention it is.

Notice, too, that the Texans who signed the ad as leaders of McGovern's campaign in Texas, Bob Armstrong and John White, are elected office holders in this state. They were, incidentally, elected on the Democratic ticket and are supporting it.

That's admirable. Not all Texas "Democrats" are that dedicated to their party.

He purchased the farm years ago, needless to say, and it wasn't a big one by today's standards, 40 acres, he says. The farm, though, had a three-room house and a peach orchard. That shows how much inflation can change the country's economy in the lifetime of one man.

With the aforementioned McGovern-Shriver ad came this bit of information quoting popular Plainview, and Texas, agriculture leader Frank Moore:

Plainview farmer Frank Moore says cotton farmers were misled by the U. S. Department of Agriculture last spring when they were advised to plant more cotton. "The farmers followed recommendations of the USDA in the spring of this year and increased their acres of cotton considerably. Now they are blessed with a bumper crop but cursed by low prices. And after this recommendation had been followed by farmers, the Nixon administration is doing nothing to relieve the disastrous price situation." The price on some cotton has dropped to 12 cents per pound since the record crop was announced.

Moore is co-chairman of Rural Texans for McGovern-Shriver. He said, "I see where Red Woodson, Farm Bureau President, is trying to talk Secretary Butz into authorizing a price support program for cottonseed. Not only is the price for cotton very low this year, but also, the price on seed is way down. Texas farmers are only receiving 52.6 per cent parity on their cotton seed. This is a particularly harsh blow because of the low price of fiber this year."


Moore said he thought farmers would be less likely to listen to the USDA in the future in light of the bad advice given on cotton and because of the wheat scandal. "They will certainly not want to listen to anyone in the Nixon administration for advice on their farms," Moore concluded.

More Expensive Than Expected --

Make Tower Repairs

Repair of Bovina's water tower and its 50,000 gallon storage tank turned out to be a more expensive job than originally estimated.

Original plans called for repainting the inside of the tank and repairing the leak(s), with the estimated cost in the \$1500 range.

After the tank was drained, however, it was found to be in worse condition than expected. The contractor for the repair job offered to fix the tank and guarantee it for 16 years against leaks for \$8400.

This bid was accepted by the city council at a special Wednesday night session. The company doing the work is American Tank and Tower Co., which headquarters in Joplin, Missouri. The company's representative here, who made the deal with the city, is Byron Howell.

The repair job began last week and was estimated to take some 10 days. Thus, it should be completed by late this week. While the storage tank is being repaired and not in use, other

city storage tanks are providing the water for use. This was expected to lower the water

pressure, but this has not been the case and the pressure has remained constant.






To Serve In Japan --

Reflections From The Blade

TEN YEARS AGO
October 11, 1962

Coach Hallie Gee's Bovina Mustangs, sporting a 3-1 record at season's midway point, take on the Class AA Friona Chiefs there Friday night at 8.

The Chiefs are expected to unleash more than two years' worth of frustration at the Mustangs -- it's been that long since they won a football game.

Competition was fierce in Bovina Businesses Cotton Bowl Football Contest last week.

With the five college games coming out with the favorites winning and only one upset in the high school slate, a total of 35 people of the 123 entered got nine or 10 of 10 correct answers -- more than ever before in history of the contest which is now in its third year.

An employee of Bovina Wheat Growers escaped serious injury Tuesday morning when the grain truck he was driving was struck by a train at the east crossing in Bovina.

Bovina's Mustangs racked up their third win in five starts during the 1962 season here Friday night as they took an easy 31-8 win over Meadow Broncos.

The Mustangs completely dominated the non-district clash, but it could prove to be a costly victory to them -- star Halfback Jerry Frazier, the team's leading scorer, suffered a shoulder separation midway through the third quarter and will be lost to the team indefinitely.

SIX YEARS AGO
October 12, 1966

Another first time entry, Bovina Mustang football End Alfred Stanberry, named the most winners in the fifth weekly Bovina Businesses Cotton Bowl Football Contest.

Second place winner was John Wilson and third place was taken by Bess Rea. All three, plus three others, chose seven winners and Stanberry was closest on the tiebreaking score, picking Bovina to win, 22-13. Final game score was 30-16.

In a regular meeting of the school board of Bovina Independent School District Monday night, discussion was held on the possibility of paving the road between the school building and football field, Otis Spears, superintendent, said.

Bovina Mustang Band is one of 10 area bands invited to participate in homecoming activities at West Texas State University on Saturday, according to Joe Wayne Harper, band director.

Coach Roy Stone's Bovina Mustangs have drawn the undefeated Sudan Hornets for District 3-A openers. The game, Bovina's first in the new league after being promoted from Class B last year, will be played here Friday night.

Grain sorghum harvest is 40 to 50 per cent complete, elevator operators in Bovina report, but this year's grain crop will be down from last year's high production.

The Lettermen's Club, composed of Mustang football players, have installed sliding glass doors in the trophy case at Bovina High School, according to Coach Roy Stone. The work was done at a cost of \$88 and was financed entirely by the Lettermen's organization.

The Bovina Mustangs got their second win of the five-game-old season here Friday night as they blasted the Class AA Morton Indians, 30-16.

For the Mustangs, it was one of their better games of the season. They drew first blood with a touchdown in the opening quarter and never trailed, though the score was tied 8-8 and 16-16 in the second period.

This Friday night has been designated "Dad's Night" for the Sudan-Bovina football tilt, when fathers of the football players will be honored, Coach Roy Stone said.

Editors are Nancy Pettit and Janie Hawkins, both seniors at Bovina High School. Co-editors are Judy Dendy and Eugene Bowman.

Last minute plans are being made for the annual Bovina High School Homecoming to be here Friday, Oct. 21, when the Mustangs host the Springlake-Earth Wolverines.



Final Non-District Clash --

Mustangs Win Everything But The Score

Plains Takes 14-0 Decision

Bovina's Mustangs won almost everything but the score here Friday night. The Plains Cowboys came out on the top end of the 14-0 count, but the home team had the upperhand in everything but the scoring plays.

Penalties at inopportune times, fumbles and pass interceptions handicapped the Mustangs in their attempts to get across the goal line. They had three drive-killing interceptions against them and lost the ball twice on fumbles.

Even though the Ponies weren't able to penetrate the goal line, their showing against the powerful Plains team was encouraging to their fans. The Cowboys are strong contenders for the Class A loop south of here and are considered to be an outstanding team. They beat Farwell earlier this year, 52-8.

The Mustangs carried the fight to the highly-favored Cowboys and led in total offense yardage, 263 to 155. Bovina was able to move the ball up and down the field with consistency, but wasn't able to make the scoring

play. The Mustangs made 19 first downs to only six for the visitors.

The Cowboys got on the scoreboard on their second possession as Halfback Lowell Trout took a pitchout and dashed 65 yards for the counter. The play originated on the Plains' 35. Trout circled his right end and broke into the clear for the scoring jaunt.

TD No. 2 for Plains came early in the second period and was set up by an interception of a Mustang aerial on the Bovina 26. The touchdown came six plays later, after a 15-yard penalty against the Cowboys, on a 24-yard pass play from Quarterback Joey Lowe to Halfback Tony Winn. That boosted the score to 12-0. Fullback Mike Blount bulled his way for the dual extras to make it 14-0.

The scoring was over for the night, but the partisan homecoming crowd still had hopes at that time that their team could get back in the contest.

Bovina missed a field goal attempt early in the second

quarter as Kim Rundell's kick was short and to the right after the Mustangs had driven to the Plains 16 and were faced with a fourth down situation at that point. Also in the second period, the Maroons shoved inside the Plains five yard line before loosing the ball on downs at the two.

On the next possession, they advanced to the Cowboys' 20 only to lose possession of the pigskin on a pass interception.

Just before the half, the hosts again advanced deep into Plains territory only to lose the ball on a pass interception at the 17.

The loss evened Bovina's season record at 2-2. This was the final non-district opponent for the Maroons. They open district play here this Friday night against the Vega Longhorns, last year's District 3-A champions.

Offensively, the Mustangs had as much diversion and spark as they've had this season, except for the inability to cross into paydirt. Quarterback Rundell and Tailback Billy Shelby combined to complete seven out of 21 passes for a total of 90 yards.

Shelby and Jeff McCormick were the leading fanfrenzy men for the Mustangs. Shelby carried the mail 26 times for a net of
