

This season has been set apart and designated as the Third National Tuberculosis Day by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis. How to Slide Down a Rope. Sliding down a rope is not so simple as it seems. Few boys know how to do it properly. The easiest and safest method you can employ is that used by firemen sailors. Standing upright, throw out your right leg and give it a turn round the rope. Next put the rope in the crook of your right elbow and clasp it tightly, not in your hand, but

In that way you can silde to safety without the slighest trouble. The rope cos not touch any part of the body that is not protected by clothing and your speed can be regulated by either straightening or cramping your leg. Once learned, this method of sliding down a rope may prove in an emer-gency the means of saving your life r the lives of other persons.-Youth's

Remedy for Gapes.

Gapes in chicks is well known by most poultry-raisers. The worms by attaching themselves to the trachea or windpipe cause the chickens to choke or breathe with difficulty. These gape worms come from the soil, and only warmth and dampness are needed to start the eggs into development. The problem of eradication is therefore mainly one of soil sanitation.

Yellow-Striped Beetle.

If other remedies fail, spray the cu cumber vines with arsenate of lead. It destroys the yellow-striped beetle, which is the most dangerous enemy of the cucumber and requires the

most vigilant watching. Arsenate of lead will not destroy the black squash bug and other sucking insects. They must be picked off by hand and squashed.
