One thing about it, the incident taught me to stand behind the backstop while the game was going on, especially when Sam Sudderth was batting.

WE ENJOYED the days at Oklahoma Lane. We think you've missed something if you never attended a "country school." Just seems like you come out with more experiences, at least. And as far as I can tell, it didn't hamper my educational process to attend a small school (some of you readers may disagree with this).

Included in the plans is a dam on Catfish Draw north of Bovina.

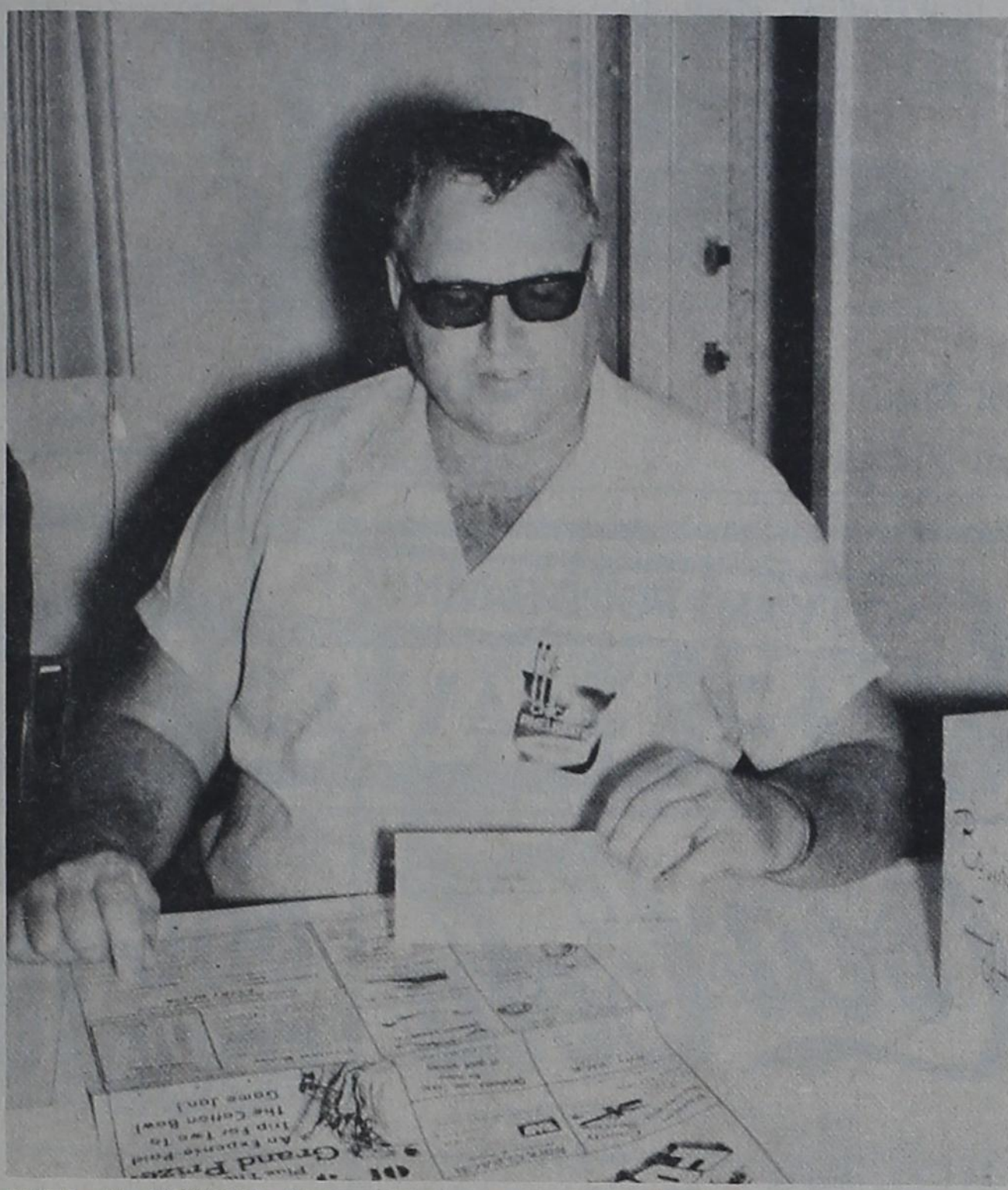
Evans told us Monday that the project, which has been in the mill from 12 to 15 years, finally has been funded by the federal government.

Moody Takes First In Weekly Contest

The first week of Bovina Businesses Cotton Bowl Football Contest got off to a mediocre start here with 163 entries, some 48 entries short of last year's 211 in the first week of the contest.

However, it took 10 winners on a scorecard to win any of the prize money at all this week, with three contestants picking that many.

Weldon Moody of Bovina took top prize money of \$5 by picking all 10 winners. He picked Bovina to defeat Boys

Ranch, 20-12, some 20 points off the tiebreaker score. Actual score of the game was Boys Ranch 12, Bovina 0.

Taking second place and \$3 was H.J. Charles of Bovina, who picked all 10 winners and was 22 points off on the tiebreaker score. He picked Bovina to win, 21-13. Winning third place and \$1 was Bill Moore, who also picked 10 winners and guessed the score at 17-6, some 23 points away from the actual score.

Some 10 contestants—Jay Be

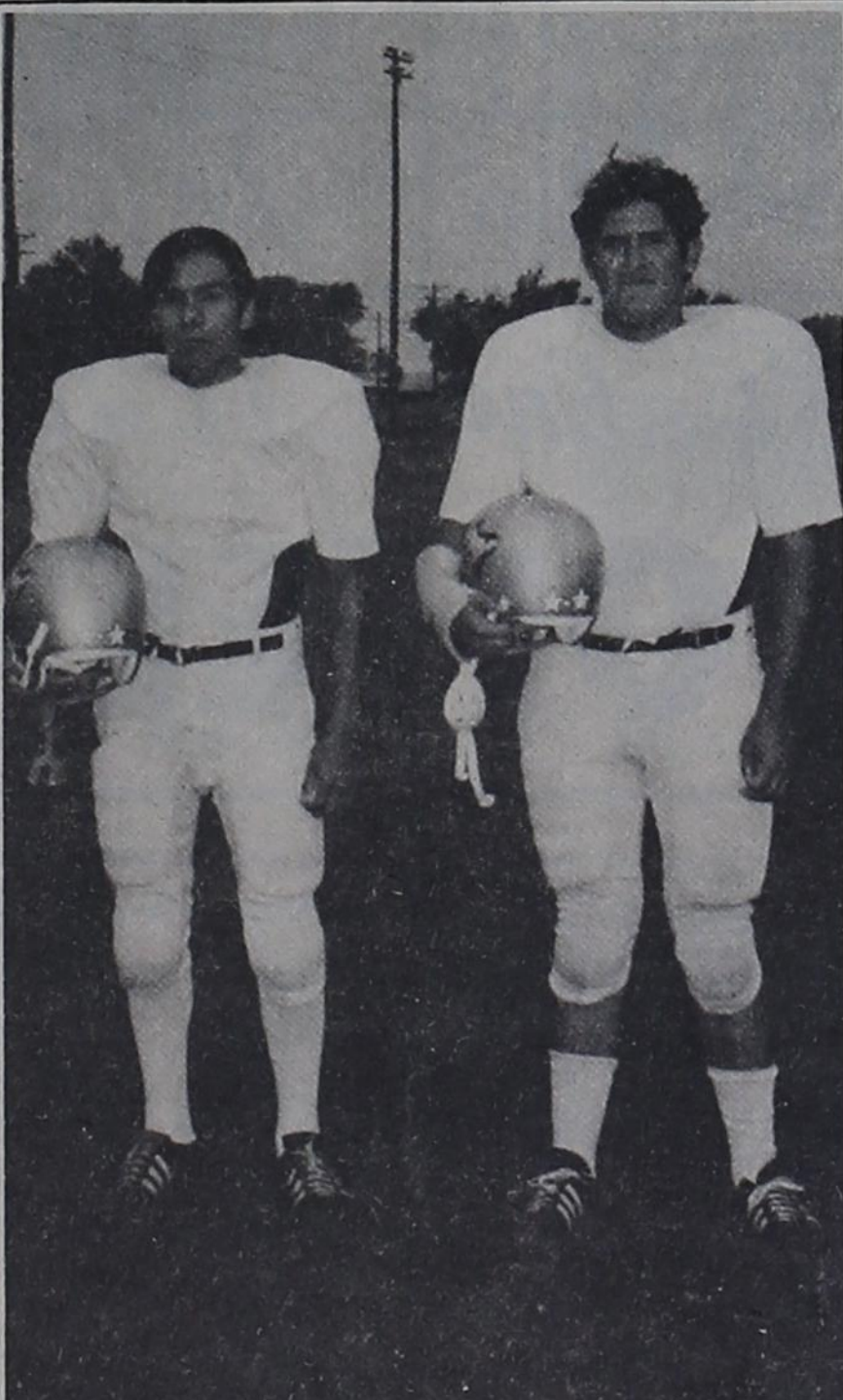
A total of 32 picked eight winners, 45 had seven right, 44 had six winners, 23 had five, five had four and one had three correct guesses.

Donaldson Resigns; Hire 3 Teachers

Three new teachers were hired for the faculty of Bovina Schools and one resigned last week, according to Superintendent L.F. Jacobs.

Roy Donaldson, elementary physical education teacher, assistant high school girls basketball coach and girls track coach, resigned last week. Donaldson cited increasing farming responsibilities as his reason for resigning.

He received his five-year pin as a member of the Bovina faculty this past year.

Mrs. Frances Willard has been assigned to a position as assistant girls basketball coach and volleyball coach. She will work with the junior varsity Filly team.

Mrs. Elizabeth Peak has been employed as a resource teacher under Plan A, according to Jacobs.

As a speech therapist, she will be working with all

students in grades one through eight who have either a speech or hearing disability. She will be employed on a 50-50 basis with Farwell.

Mrs. Peak, a native of Lubbock, received her BS degree from West Texas State University at Canyon. This is her first year to teach. She and her husband live in Friona.

Jerry Wayne Peckinpaugh has been employed as a resource teacher under Plan A to work with all students in grades one through eight who have learning disabilities.

Peckinpaugh, who has a masters degree in education from Eastern New Mexico University at Portales, has five years teaching experience at

Roswell and two years in Australia. He has also taught at private schools. He is married to the former Mary Cherry Looney of Bovina. Mrs. Peckinpaugh is a member of the faculty at Farwell Schools this year. They live near Bovina.

Mrs. Donnie [Cynthia] Cartel has been employed as elementary physical education teacher, replacing Donaldson in that capacity.

She is a graduate of Farwell High School and Eastern New Mexico University. This is her first year to teach. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glen Phillips of Farwell. Cartel is a Frionan and is attending ENMU where he is on the Greyhound football squad.

Jacobs reported that eight girls from the junior class have enrolled in a cosmetology course at La Plata Beauty School in Hereford. Mrs. Pauline Wines has been employed as the bus driver for the girls who attend school there in the afternoons. Jacobs said six girls from Friona have enrolled in the course and are being picked up daily by the Bovina bus.

As of Monday morning, enrollment in Bovina Schools stood at 628, an increase of 10 over last week.

The number of students, however, remains lower than at this time last year when 656 students had enrolled.

AFTER WET SPELL

Rainfall Stops; Farming Starts

Tropical Storm Delia ranged inland enough last week to bring widespread moisture to this part of Texas, with Bovina

receiving a generous one inch of rain Friday.

The rain was accompanied by much cooler weather than normal, with many people switching suddenly from air conditioners to heaters Thursday.

Although more rainfall was predicted for Monday, only a light sprinkle occurred here, but the overcast skies kept the temperature on the cool side.

On Tuesday, clearing skies and ground-drying sunshine prevailed.

Although Bovina farmers welcome rain, whenever and wherever possible, the dry weather was welcome.

The recent rainfall has slowed down the sowing of winter wheat crop. Also delayed by the moisture was harvesting of vegetables and cutting of ensilage in the area.

The cotton crop still has time to mature, providing September and October weather continues to be not and dry and the first freeze of Fall holds off to a normal date.

The moisture was considered beneficial to grain sorghum

which is in the maturing stage now.

Harvesting of the potentially high-yielding corn crop here is scheduled to begin in the next week, if the weather permits.

TEN YEARS AGO-SEPTEMBER 11, 1963
In an effort to break an eight-year drought, the Bovina Mustangs meet their oldest rival, the Farwell Steers, here Friday night in the season's second football game for both ball clubs.
The Steers have won the annual contest for the past eight consecutive years but that has failed to dull the enthusiasm Bovina football players, coaches and fans have for the game.
A survey will be made to determine the need for additional classrooms for Bovina Schools.
That decision was made at a regular meeting of members of Bovina School Board of Trustees Monday night.
The present building can accommodate 700 students at the most, Superintendent Warren Morton says. And that many can be taken care of only if the students are properly proportioned according to grades. Enrollment is now over 600 with majority of the students in lower grades causing congestion on that end of the building. That situation will possibly get worse in future years, members of the board feel.

Bovina Quarterback Club has the most members it has had in its four-year-old life. The club now has more than 170 dues-paid members.

Bovina Businesses Fourth Annual Cotton Bowl Football Contest got started in a big way last week as 133 entry blanks were submitted. Mrs. Jay Sherrill was the first place winner, being the only contestant to pick nine of 10 winners. Winning second and third were Joe Tarter and C.R. Brandon, respectively.

Arrival of Bovina's new fire truck has been delayed because of a labor strike at the plant in Anderson, Ind., where the truck is being assembled, Bill Denney, fire chief, announces.

A Bovina farm laborer is dead and Les Alford of Bovina has been charged with murder as a result of a family feud which came to a climax Saturday night near the Curry County fairgrounds at Clovis.

Playing before a larger-than-average crowd here Friday night, Bovina Mustangs opened the 1963 football season by falling four touchdowns behind Springlake's Wolverines and then rallying for eight points of their own to lose by a respectable 25-8 count to the Class A school.

Bovina's city council granted a requested rate increase to Pioneer Natural Gas Co. at a regular monthly meeting Thursday night.

Bill Denney has resigned as city marshal here effective Friday, the 15th of this month.

Denney, who has done law enforcement work for the City of Bovina since March of '62, has accepted a position with the Friona police department.

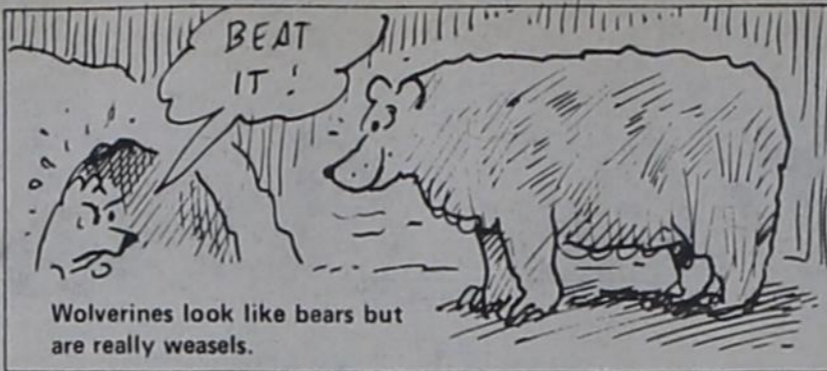
Over 60 young people of the First Baptist Church attended a kidnap breakfast last week at The Spot.

Mustangs Drop 14-0 Tilt To Roughriders

A few bad breaks and a lack of offensive punch combined to give the Bovina Mustangs a 14-0 loss to the Boys Ranch Roughriders here Friday night in the season opener.

The Mustangs were never able to get their offensive machine rolling, being hampered by costly fumbles and pass interceptions.

The Class AA Roughriders scored touchdowns in the second and fourth quarters, however, were unable to convert on either extra-point attempt.

The game was played on almost even terms the first half, however, the Roughriders came out of the dressing room at halftime and dominated the

game from that point on.

The Boys Ranch team received the opening kickoff and punted on a four-in-and-five situation from their own 39. The kicker fumbled the snap from center and got away a short punt which the Mustangs returned to their own 41-yard-line.

From there, the Ponies picked up three yards on the first play with Alton McCormick adding five, making it third down and two. Billy Snelby was stopped at the line of scrimmage for no gain, forcing the Ponies to punt away their first possession. Dennis Willard got away a 30-yard punt.

Boys Ranch moved the ball

only four yards on the following possession with the Mustangs taking over on the 37 yard line.

The Ponies picked up two first downs on the running of Billy and Elbert Snelby, but bogged down on the Boys Ranch 40 yard line when an offside penalty nalted the drive. Boys Ranch failed to make a first down on their next possession and the first quarter ended with the Ponies in possession of the ball at the 49-yard line.

From there, the Ponies drove to the Boys Ranch eight-yard line where they were faced with a third and three situation. On the next play, Elbert Snelby was thrown for a three-yard loss. An offside penalty on the Ponies was refused by the Roughriders and that ended Bovina's scoring threat for the half.

The Roughriders came out throwing, completing three of six passes, combined with a strong running game to advance to the Mustang 38-yard-line before losing the ball on downs.

The Mustangs racked up one first down and on the first play of the following series, Eddie Wiggins intercepted a Billy Snelby pass to give the Roughriders the ball on the 20-yard line. Nine plays later the Roughriders Walter Nogel pushed across the touchdown from the three yard line with 1:09 remaining on the clock in the first half. The extra-point kick attempt was blocked by a herd of Ponies.

The Ponies received the kickoff at the start of the second half and moved the ball

for a first down and had a three and one situation on the 39-yard line when Willard fumbled with Nogel recovering on the 38-yard line.

The Roughriders picked up two first downs before incomplete passes and untimely penalties brought their drive to a halt.

Again the Ponies couldn't sustain a drive and the

Roughriders kept the ball, scoring on an 18-yard strike from Quarterback Jim Wallace to Wiggins with 9:38 remaining in the final period. The running attempt for extra points was stopped short of the goal line.

From there, the two teams exchanged possession of the ball repeatedly with neither team able to mount a scoring drive.

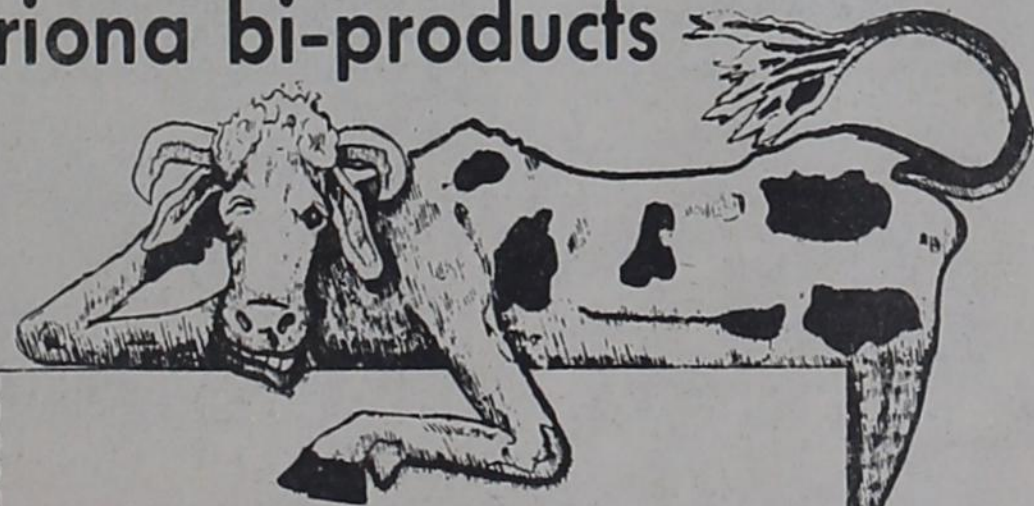
Lung Ass'n. Slates New Scholarship

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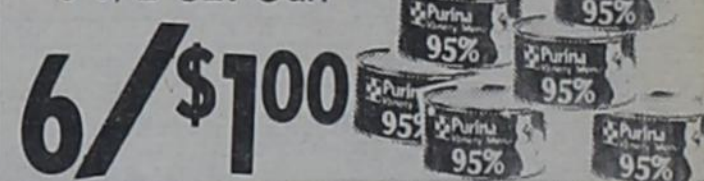

Ponies Meet Class AA Chieftains Friday

The second game on the Bovina Mustangs 1973 gridiron schedule is set Friday night at 8 at Mustang Field against Friona's Chieftains. This will be the second Class AA foe for the Class A Bovina squad to meet in as many outs.

While licking their wounds from an unexpected defeat by the Boys Ranch Roughriders last week, the Maroons are expecting much tougher com-

petition this week from their Parmer County rivals.

The Chieftains will be heavily favored after their 34-0 romp over the Farwell Steers last Friday night in their opener.

Area football "experts" have predicted that "...with good size and fair speed, if the Red and White machine learns its lessons early, they might just terrorize a few folks like it did last season." The Chieftains are

apparently well on their way to "learning their lessons early" as the opener proved.

Coach Roger Ezell of the Mustangs described Friona as "having a well balanced squad this year with few weak spots."

In their game with Farwell last week, Friona piled up 209 yards rushing from a backfield that wasn't supposed to excel at running. The Chieftains scored 21 points in the second quarter,

seven in the third and six in the fourth. Farwell's only time inside the Friona 30 yard line came with reserves in the game during the final period.

The Chieftains are led by Clay Bandy, 145-pound junior quarterback. Other standouts for the Friona squad are Teddy King, 160-pound senior halfback who rushed for 85 yards against Farwell; Dale Parsons, 170-pound tailback, a senior transfer from Olton who was all-district end there; James Perea, 200-pound senior guard-tackle who is touted for all-state honors; and Terry Thompson, 180-pound senior guard and right linebacker.

Friona will have a weight advantage over the Mustangs, averaging 179 pounds on the line and 169 in the backfield on offense and 182 on the line and 159 in the secondary on

defense. The Chieftains scored a 26-6 win over the Ponies last year. In 1971, the Ponies fought to a 6-6 tie, the first deadlock in 12 meetings between the two clubs. Friona holds a nine out of 13 win-loss record over Bovina.

This will be the second of four non-district clashes for the Mustangs. The Ponies will have an open date next week and will travel to Sanford-Fritch Sept. 28. The team will then travel to Plains on Oct. 5, closing out the non-district slate for 1973. The Maroons will open the district schedule with Vega and close with Hart.

Although the games with Class B Lazbuddie have been deleted from the Mustangs' schedule, Bovina scrimmaged the Longhorns to remain the only county team to play all three of the other schools in Parmer County.

In regard to the Boys Ranch win over the Ponies, the first in four years, Coach Ezell commented that "I thought we played a good ballgame in the first half except for about three minutes, but we were real flat in the second half."

Although the Ponies were plagued with miscues, fumbles and other woes, Ezell pointed out that there were some fine individual performances in the game. He singled out Tony Serna, offensive and defensive lineman, and Joe Delgado, defensive back, as turning in good games for the Ponies. "Elbert Shelby also did us a good job in the backfield," said Ezell.

Injuries took its toll Friday night with three Ponies suffering minor to perhaps major injuries. Ray Martinez, sophomore halfback, suffered a knee injury; Robert Tienda, sophomore guard, suffered a dislocated finger; and Billy Shelby, senior quarterback, sustained an ankle injury. The extent of Martinez and Shelby's injuries will not be known until later this week. Tienda should be ready to play Friday, Ezell said.

"Our team is young, but we will come around in time," Ezell commented.

"We will have to sharpen up when we play Friona. They are a better passing team than they were a year ago, but look a little weaker on the run in some respects."

Friona runs a Power I and slot I on offense and a "27" on defense.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session.

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed, unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million.

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified.

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

Article XI of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations heretofore issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations heretofore issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."

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
