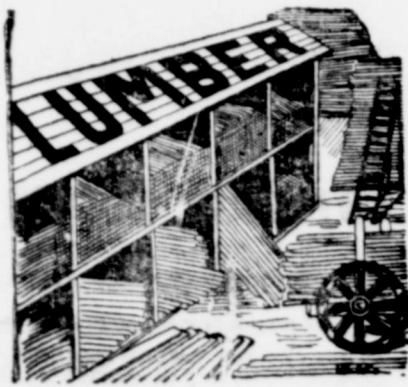

He thinks because he is well known there is no use for his exerting himself to draw the trade. The merchant, on the other hand, lays in his supply and begins at once letting people know what he has to sell by taking a space in the newspaper, etc., keeps an eye on the front door and puts in his spare moments making his establishment more attractive and inviting. Do you know which of the two gets in the lead and stays there? We can answer that by asking another. Where do the people prefer to trade, at a store where the owner does not invite you, or the store that invites you week after week?

The farmers and ranchmen should belong to the Hedley Commercial club. It is just as important that they belong to it as the business and professional men of the town. It is to the farmer's and ranchmen's interest and they should help to keep the organization moving. It is a necessary organization in any town that has the enterprising spirit. Hedley has an organization composed of as good men as the town affords, but the people of town and country do not belong to it as a whole, and we must urge the entire citizenship to become members of the club and help in the upbuilding of Hedley and the development of the country.

Fanatics may abuse and attack whiskey all they like, but they do it in a cowardly way. If they will give old John Barley a fair holt and stay with him, I'll guarantee he will lay 'em out every clatter. Some very expert wrestlers have managed to throw him a few times, but if they will only keep up the game he will finally land 'em flat on their backs and they will never get up without the aid of an undertaker. In fact I believe the old man merely lets the boys get the best of the game a few falls just to encourage them and at the proper time he lands them in the gutter for keeps. Hedley is much in need of some good roads and Hedley Commercial club might begin to work up some plans for building some good roads to open a larger trade territory.

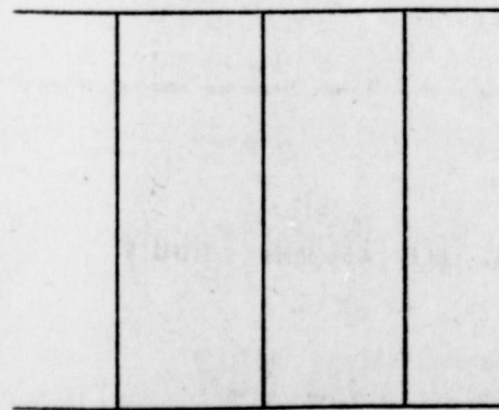

MIGHTY RULERS OF EARTH

Elizabeth of England and Theodore of Abyssinia Had Many Traits in Common.

Elizabeth, queen of England, had many claims to great distinction. Her very name was Tudor, a contraction, it seems, of Theodore, "the gift of God," an epithet of happy omen associated with the mighty rulers of the earth, among whom may be mentioned the African king, Theodore of Abyssinia. This monarch is described in the Encyclopaedia Britannica as a "man of education and intelligence, superior to those among whom he lived, with natural talents for governing and gaining the esteem of others. He had a noble bearing, and a frame capable of enduring any amount of fatigue, and he was the best shot and the best horseman in Abyssinia. He was generous to excess and free from cupidity, but subject to violent bursts of anger."

Elizabeth also possessed many of these royal traits of character, although Coke said her name was not really Tudor but rather Owen or Meredith, though "God would not suffer her to have a str name because by his grace and goodness she should deserve for her imperial virtues to be called Elizabeth the great." "She was," said Coke, "the phoenix of her sex; she was Angliæ Amor," familiar with French, Italian and Spanish and learned in Latin and Greek; and "as the rose is the queen of flowers . . . she was the queen of queens. You cannot question what rose I mean; for take the red or the white, she was not only by royal descent and inherent birthright, but by roseal beauty also, heir to both."

Whether or not Elizabeth deserved this praise, and even if she had no right to bear the royal name of Theodore, she was fortunate enough to lend her own to the most glorious period of her country's history.—Yale Review

GETTING A PLEASANT VOICE

One Should Practice Low, Sweet Tones and Speak Thoughts of a Kind Heart.

Would you have a voice that is musical and pleasing? Americans should listen while a foreigner talks and then compare their voices with the soft sounds of the people of other lands. Practice the low sweet tones that are possible to every one, if but a little time be taken to give the voice a musical intonation. The habit will grow, like most habits, and reward the one who has devoted her thought to it.

One must start in youth and be on the watch night and day, while at work and while at play, to get and keep a voice which shall speak at all times the thought of a kind heart.

But this is the time when a sharp voice is more apt to be acquired. You often hear boys and girls say words at play with a quick, sharp tone, almost like the snap of a whip. If one of them is vexed you hear a voice which sounds as if it were made up of a snarl, a whine and a bark.

Such a voice often speaks worse than the heart feels. It shows more ill-will in tone than in words. It is often in mirth that one gets a voice or tone which is sharp, and which stays with him through life. "Some people have a sharp home voice for use, and keep their best voice for those they meet elsewhere. Use your best voice at home. Watch it by day as a pearl of great price, for it will be worth more to you in the days to come than the best pearl hid in the sea.

Ancient Coins Discovered.

Building operations in the Rue d'Arasant in Brussels have led to the discovery of a metal case containing about 130,000 ancient coins. Of these 80,000 are English, Irish and Scotch, and the remainder were minted in Belgium in the time of Henry III. of Brabant.

It is supposed that the coins belonged to a knight of Brussels, who died about 1264, and that he was killed in fighting and carried with him to the grave his secret, which was to remain hidden for nearly seven centuries.

Yet all these men had definite views and comprehensive views of the periods of which they were writing—views which it took them one or more volumes to expound, and which we are not going to appreciate by reading a dozen pages every fifth chapter.
