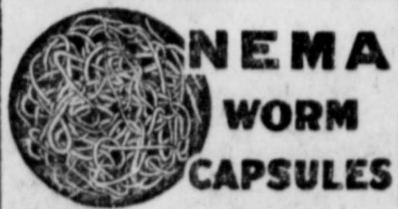

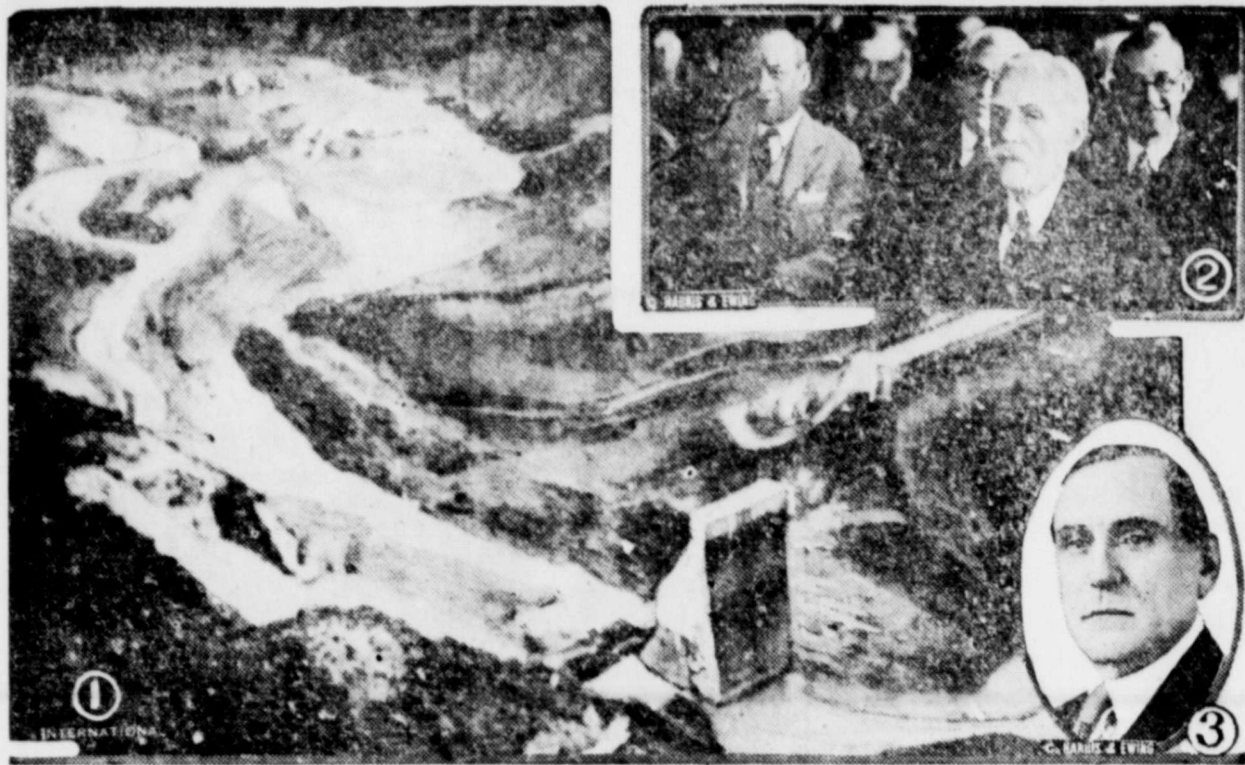

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Wall of Water Carries Hundreds to Death in California.

A TREMENDOUS wall of water turned loose into San Francisco canyon when the giant St. Francis dam burst under pressure of 12,000,000 gallons of water, carried more than 400 sleeping residents of the narrow valley to death.

The great concrete retaining wall, 185 feet high, built less than two years ago to impound water for the city of Los Angeles, gave way with out warning, releasing the flood upon the sleeping inhabitants of the picturesque valley.

Everything was swept away—human beings, houses, cabins, workmen's tents, orchards and live stock. Of the estimated 500 persons who were in the narrow canyon and lowlands below at the time the dam gave way, only a few more than a hundred have been accounted for.

Property damage is estimated at from \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000.

Some city officials of Los Angeles declared a preliminary examination indicated the break had been caused as the result of an earth movement or some external force. Passing motorists and valley residents declared sleeping around the buttress might have been the cause.

The canyon bottom and valley were swept clear of all signs of civilization for several miles. In the silt deposit, which in some cases was 30 feet deep, remained the uncounted bodies of the victims, houses, live stock and other ruins.

SUDDEN shifting of a side of Mount Serrat, located in the center of the city of Santos, state of Sao Paulo, Brazil, crashed thousands of tons of earth and rocks without warning onto a section of that place, and left a dead and dying toll of more than 200.

Houses and buildings in the path of the slide were crumpled and buried, their occupants apparently not discerning the impending disaster until it was too late to escape the huge avalanche.

Mount Serrat, with a moderately high peak, is located practically in the center of Santos, Brazil's principal coffee port, with residences and business buildings spread around it on three sides.

THE United States senate published the report on conditions in the bituminous fields of Pennsylvania by the subcommittee which the senate sent into that area on an investigation that lasted five days.

The report declared the conditions to be dangerous to public order and deplorable as to morals, housing, sanitation, and general living conditions. It was unfavorable to the methods of most of the operators and it praised "the splendid courage" of the women folk of the striking miners in the face of "privations which make the mothers' lot always the hardest to bear."

Legislation by congress was recommended for the correction of chaos in the industry which the investigators said, "generally is not in a prosperous condition in this country."

"We most respectfully urge," the senators concluded, "that the investigation by the whole interstate commerce committee of the senate be searching and severe in every detail, looking forward to some solution by legislation that will put the great coal industry of America on a reasonably prosperous basis."

WILLIAM M. BUTLER, chairman of the Republican national committee, denied that he received or handled any part of the \$200,000 in Continental Trading company Liberty bonds advanced by Harry F. Sinclair to help wipe out the committee's 1920 Presidential campaign deficit.

Butler's denial was made public almost simultaneously with the text of a letter in which Senator Borah (Rep., Idaho), called upon Butler to lead the Republican party in a move "to clear

itself of the humiliating stigma" placed upon it by acceptance of Sinclair's campaign contribution.

The letter suggested that Butler would have only to make the appeal and thousands of honest Republicans would willingly contribute "from one dollar up to any reasonable sum" in order that the money advanced to the party's war chest by Sinclair out of the same fund be used to pay Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior, for the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve might be returned.

THE White-Norris constitutional amendment to abolish "lame duck" sessions of congress, and change the Presidential Inaugural date was rejected by the house. The vote was 209 to 157, with two members answering present. This was 36 votes less than the two-thirds necessary for approval of constitutional amendments.

The amendment sought to change the meeting date of congress from March 4 to January 4. This would have abolished the "lame duck" sessions of congress, or those in which sit members who were defeated at earlier elections. To conform with this change, the resolution proposed to have the President take office on January 24, instead of March 4.

SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY Mellon informed the senate Teapot Dome committee that he received \$50,000 of the \$200,000 of Liberty bonds which Harry F. Sinclair advanced to cover part of the deficit of the Republican national committee in 1922, but that he had refused to retain the bonds in exchange for a like contribution.

The treasury secretary disclosed that the bonds had been sent to him by Will H. Hays, former chairman of the Republican national committee, and that when Hays subsequently called on him to explain his purpose, he had declined to keep them as suggested. He added that he had returned the bonds to Hays and shortly thereafter made a contribution in the same amount from his own funds.

A FEVERISH day on the New York stock exchange March 9 saw the sale of 3,708,500 shares, General Motors being principally involved. The market closed with General Motors at 161. The following day the market was checked at 156, but General Motors had regained more than a point at the close. Several things caused the orgy of speculation: A decrease of \$25,000,000 in brokers' loans, removing the likelihood of the Federal Reserve bank board immediately raising the discount rate; a widespread feeling that General Motors will be able to compete successfully with the new Ford, and the news that the Managers' Security company, owned by General Motors executives, had bought 200,000 shares of stock, reflecting the confidence of the executives in the continued prosperity of the concern.

THE coal industry held attention during the week as the senate's committee continued its investigation. John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, testified that in his belief laws should be passed to permit the closing of uneconomic mines, to prevent railroads from exploiting mines by their insistence upon cheap coal, and to curb the use of injunctions in labor disputes. W. G. Warden, head of the Pittsburgh Coal company, attacked the union on the witness stand. He said he believed in democracy in government but in a "benevolent despotism" for business. An attorney for the union miners charged that the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ were planning a report to "whitewash" the operators of blame in the present strike and its consequences.

RODMAN WANAMAKER of New York and Philadelphia died March 9. He was reported to be the most heavily insured man in the United States. Policies on his life totaled \$7,500,000.

He was one of the foremost merchants of the world. He inherited the widely known Wanamaker stores in New York, Philadelphia and Paris from his famous father, the late John Wanamaker. Long known as an aviation enthusiast, he gained his chief fame along that line by backing the

successful flight of Commander Richard E. Byrd to France last summer. At the time it was said he had spent \$500,000 on proposed transatlantic flights, about half of that amount being for the Byrd expedition.

AMERICAN LEGION officials are mobilizing their forces for what is heralded as the greatest peacetime offensive ever attempted in this country in the interest of legislation providing for the universal drafting of man power and the control of labor and industry in the event of another war.

Backed by Secretary of War Davis and many high army officials, the former service men of the nation will make their seventh effort since the war to convince congress and the American people that steps should be taken in peace time to guarantee the President the widest dictatorial powers in case of another national emergency.

A PROVISIONAL estimate by the census bureau placed the population of the United States as of July 1, 1928, at 129,013,000, an increase of 14 per cent over the 105,710,020 actual count on January 1, 1920. The next federal census will not be taken before 1930.

The new total was arrived at by estimating the increase since 1920 on the basis of the best available returns on births, deaths, immigration and emigration.

THE automobile industry is perturbed over the realization that it may be forced to pay a certain wheel-maker upward of \$300,000,000 for using wheels on automobiles. A patent granted to Edward P. Cowles, of Sparta, Mich., in 1914, on interchangeable wheels gives the manufacturer who today owns its license rights the authority to make this huge collection from the industry, in the opinion of many lawyers.

PLANS for breaking down all obstructions to American supervision of the Nicaraguan elections next October have been under preparation at the State department following conferences between Secretary of State Kellogg and Senator Borah (Rep., Idaho), chairman of the senate foreign relations committee.

American officials, it is asserted, are determined to carry out their pledge and give the Nicaraguan people a fair election. Opinions expressed indicate the administration is prepared to furnish such marine forces as are necessary.

FORMIDABLE naval preparations were announced in the Italian chamber of deputies by Admiral Sirlanni of the Italian admiralty. Italy now has under construction one billion four hundred million lire (\$73,920,000) worth of armed vessels, which include 20,000-ton cruisers and twelve submarines, started under the 1924 program, the admiral revealed. All these will be in operation within two years. This year's program includes two new cruisers, four destroyers, and four submarines, he said.

JONATHAN DIXON MAXWELL, pioneer automobile manufacturer and one of the three men who built the machine now preserved in the Smithsonian institution, believed to have been the first automobile, is dead.

Mr. Maxwell, whose name was given to the Maxwell automobile originated by him and manufactured by the company of which he was president, was associated with Elmer Apperson and Elwood Haines in building the machine believed to have been the predecessor of the modern automobile.

A GAIN the attempted conquest of the western passage of the North Atlantic by aviation has failed and Capt. Walter Hincheliffe and Miss Elsie Mackay, who set out from an English airfield for a flight to America, went down somewhere in the Atlantic. No trace of their airship, has been found.

AN APPROPRIATION of more than \$1,000,000, to be used in reforestation of denuded areas and in other conservation activities, is asked in a bill introduced in the senate by McNary of Oregon.

NOVEL HOT BREADS

Hot breads add much to the pleasure of breakfast, luncheon and that coziest of all meals, the informal Sunday night supper. With a hot drink of tea, coffee or cocoa and a jam or marmalade, one can almost make a meal of hot bread. If there is enough of it. Muffins, waffles, biscuits and scones are all well known, but have you tried these:

Sunday Hot Bread.—Cream together three-fourths cupful of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one-fourth teaspoonful of salt, add one egg well beaten and mixed with two-thirds of a cupful of milk, then add one and one-half cupfuls of flour, sifted with three teaspoonfuls of baking powder, add two tablespoonfuls of orange juice and spread the mixture with granulated sugar and the grated rind of an orange. Bake twenty to twenty-five minutes in a hot oven. Serve hot.

Orange Waffles.—Cream one-half cupful of butter with one cupful of sugar, add two beaten eggs. Sift two and one-half cupfuls of flour with one teaspoonful of cinnamon, add alternately to the first mixture with one-half cupful of sour milk to which a teaspoonful of soda has been added. Add the juice and rind of an orange and bake on a hot waffle iron. Serve with orange marmalade.

Golden Corn Bread.—Sift together one cupful of flour, one cupful of corn meal, one-half cupful of sugar, two and one-half teaspoonfuls of baking powder, add one-half cupful of milk and one-half cupful of orange juice. Mix well and add the beaten yolk of an egg and two tablespoonfuls of melted butter. Bake in a moderate oven forty to fifty minutes.

Rice Delight.—Add one-fourth of a cupful of cooked rice, one cupful of scalded milk, one beaten egg, cook over water until smooth and the egg is cooked, adding three tablespoonfuls of sugar, salt to taste, one-half cupful of orange juice and a little of the rind. Serve with whipped cream.

Planked Meats.

It is necessary for many cooks to get away from the idea that planked meats are fussy and too much bother to prepare. The contrary is true. With a good well seasoned plank kept for meats alone another for fish, one has a convenience which may be used frequently and is always a welcome dish on the dinner table.

Steaks and chops are expensive but there are any number of good things that one can prepare with leftovers or small pieces of meats as well as the cheaper cuts.

The great advantage of the planked food is that the entire main part of the meal can be served on it thus eliminating several serving dishes.

Another point not to be forgotten is that the plank holds the heat much longer than the usual platter, so the food is kept hot.

The more a plank is used the better and more valuable it is. An eighteen inch plank will serve four generously, and six if other dishes such as a substantial salad are served.

Planked Chicken.—Cut up a fowl and stew as usual, adding plenty of seasoning. Remove the larger bones and roll the meat in seasoned flour, place on a plank and surround with mashed potato piped around in nests, in which to place hot buttered peas, just before serving. Prepare the mashed potato as usual, adding to each quart two egg yolks and the stiffly beaten whites, added at the last. Put the chicken with fat and brown in the oven. Fill the nests and serve.

Planked Ham.—Take broken slices (these being less expensive), cut into two-inch pieces. Rub the ham with a mixture of mustard, brown sugar, a clove of cut garlic and a little vinegar. Place on a hot plank and surround with halved sweet potatoes which have been spread with sugar sirup and dotted with butter. Fill the spaces between with flowers of cauliflower, sprinkled with grated cheese. Bake as usual.

Planked Lamb.—Take two pounds of the neck of lamb, cut into pieces and cook in boiling water to which salt, peppercorns, celery, onion, mint or bayleaf have been added. When tender cool and drain; roll in seasoned flour after removing the bone, if desired. Place on a hot greased plank with molds of curried rice surrounding it. Dot each mold with butter and place hot buttered carrots and peas between the molds of rice. Bake as usual and serve garnished with parsley.

A oak plank is considered the best and should be well seasoned before using.

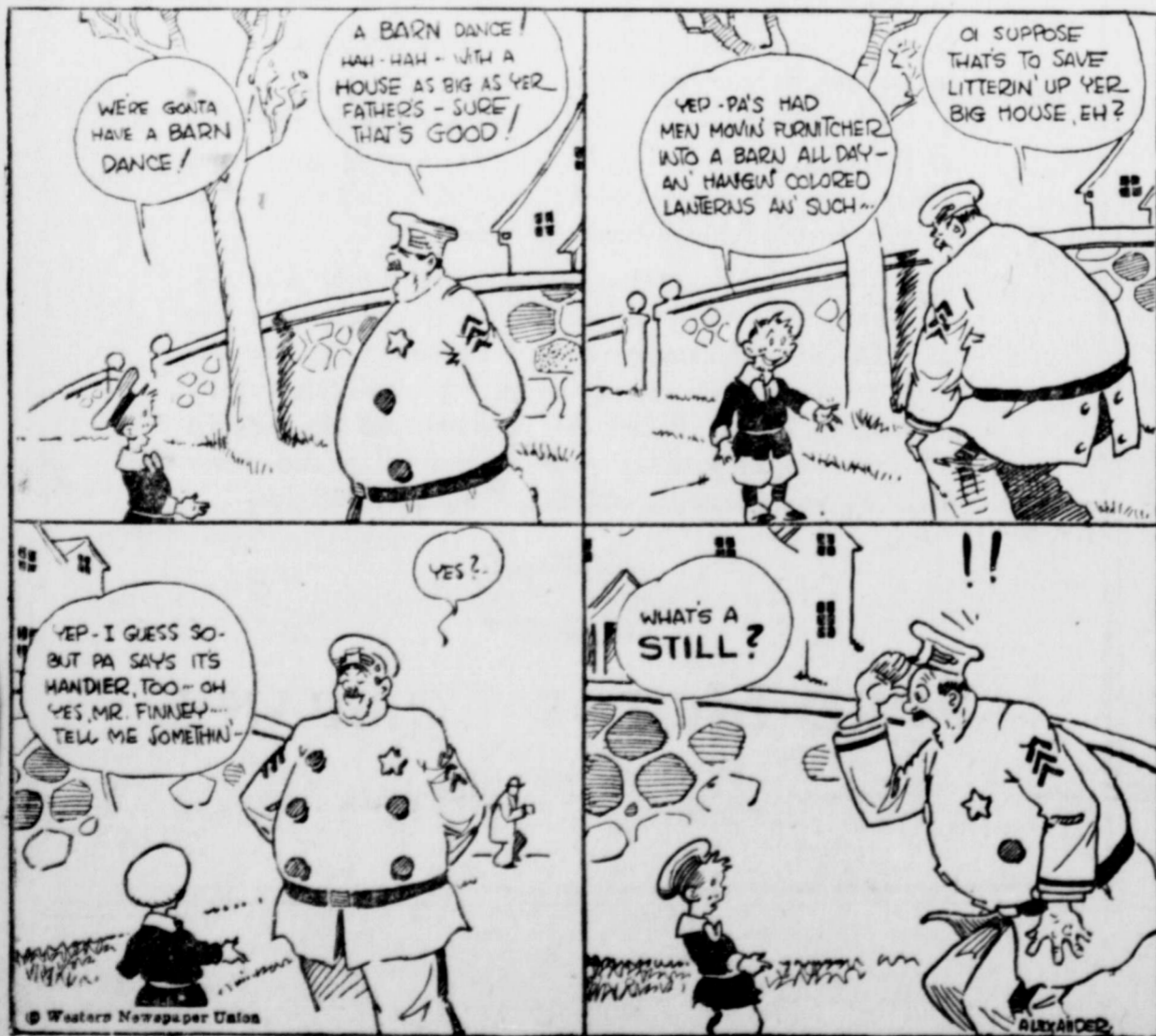

How the Useful Plants Came to Mankind

By T. E. STEWARD

Wheat

MAN and wheat seem always to have been together. Wheat is in the picture of the life of mankind at the earliest point at which science, research and investigation have been able to give that picture an outline. Its cultivation in China goes back at least 2700 years B. C. In the remotest civilizations of the Valley of Mesopotamia, of which any record has been obtained, wheat was a staple crop and staple food. The scientist Unger found grains of wheat in the bricks of a pyramid at Dushur, Egypt, which is believed to date from 3339 B. C., and wheat grains of the same form have come from Stone Age remains and rubbish heaps in the Swiss lake country and in Hungary.

Whether Aryan, Chinese, or Stone Age European of a type long since disappeared, mankind has had wheat at every point at which science has revealed anything accurate of his life.

The distribution of wheat, therefore, and the manner in which it was spread from one country to another cannot be described. The dispersal of this immensely valuable food grain had been accomplished by the most primitive men before history begins to depict them.

From this situation it might seem probable that wheat, ages ago, grew wild at a great many different places and was brought under cultivation by man, not at one isolated spot, but at different places about the globe. This assumption is probably a wrong one. The best evidence obtainable, which is slight, together with the greatest probability, which is very strong, is that wheat is a native of the Mesopotamian region.

That wheat did originally grow wild in Mesopotamia was stated by one Berosus, a Chaldean priest, whose statement has been preserved by the historian Herodotus. The "Odyssey" of Homer, telling of the travels of Ulysses, relates that wheat was found wild in ancient Sicily. Others have made the same claim, but as yet it remains unsubstantiated as far as modern science is concerned.

Wheat is frequently referred to in the Hebrew scriptures. Ancient Greek and Italian writings attribute its origin to some deity, such as Ceres, after whom the cereals are named. Isis or Triptolemus.

There is no exact proof of the locality in which wheat originated, but the best guess, if guess it must be, is that it came from the principal region of ancient civilization, the Mesopotamian district between the rivers Tigris and Euphrates.

Tea

TEA grows wild in abundance in the mountainous region that separates China from India. It also is found in Cochinchina and other parts of the Flowery Kingdom. Records show that it has been known in China for more than 4,000 years, so little doubt remains that it came into cultivation in that land, where it is also native. From there its cultivation spread, little by little, probably reaching into India earlier than to Japan.

A Japanese legend relates that a priest who came to China from India about 519 A. D., having gone to sleep at a time when he wished to remain awake for the purpose of praying, was so angry with himself that he cut off his eyelids and hung them on a bush. From this bush sprang the tea shrub, with its qualities of sleep prevention.

This legend, however, has as little truth with respect to the time of tea's discovery as it has with the "origin of species," for the Chinese book, "Pentsao," a compendium of knowledge, mentions tea as far back as 2700 B. C. Other books written 300 to 600 B. C. also reveal a full knowledge of the plant and of the drink made by steeping its leaves.

Although tea-growing is today one of the major agricultural industries of India and Ceylon, and tea probably spread into those countries from China before it reached Japan, it is not of very ancient cultivation in the Indian peninsula as there is no word for tea in the Sanskrit, or ancient Indian language.

Up to the middle of the Eighteenth century tea was little known in western Europe and was one of the delicacies brought from the Spice Islands of the Far East by the trading fleets of Holland, Portugal, France and England. Of the plant which produced it almost nothing was known, and the great Swedish botanist, Linnaeus, writing of it, said there were two principal varieties, the green tea and the black. Today it is known, however, that the same plant, generally speaking, produces all teas, the difference in color being due to different processes of curing and manufacture and to the different places on the plant from which the leaves are plucked.

Brazil is the country in the Western hemisphere where tea growing has been introduced most successfully.

New Location Found for Garden of Eden

Europe may have been the Garden of Eden, and the "missing link," which has so far eluded scientists, may be found on that continent, according to the theory of Sir Arthur Keith, one of England's most prominent scientists, one of the leading officials of the Royal Institution and head of the British Association. Sir Arthur advanced this theory following the discovery by a German geologist of a "Heldberg jaw," which the British scientist said is the earliest European human now known to science. He asserted that the discovery is one of the biggest of its kind concerning the origin of humans. "There thus really seems to be a chance that Germany is going to produce the 'missing link,' and it looks very much as though Europe really was the 'Garden of Eden,'" Sir Arthur said.

Education by Mail

To meet educational needs of families living in remote parts of Manitoba and of children unable on account of physical handicap to attend school, a system of correspondence instruction has been inaugurated by the provincial department of education. It is estimated that about every fourth person in the province of Manitoba is seeking by study to reach a higher educational standard.

In Saskatchewan, where an outpost's correspondence school has been maintained for two and a half years, enrollment has reached 247. It is believed that about 20 per cent of the students are of foreign extraction.

Collections of ancient coins in Soviet museums will be augmented by rare specimens to be handed over by the State Bank of Moscow. Among them are 54 Macedonian coins with images of Alexander the Great and King Philip, 16 Roman coins, two of Carthage, double gold coins bearing images of Czarina Sophia, Czar Ivan and Peter the Great, coins of the Scythian ruler Hosroy, and Armenian coins of King Tigran's times.

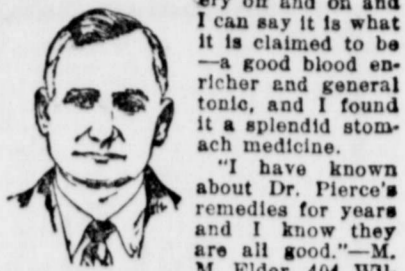

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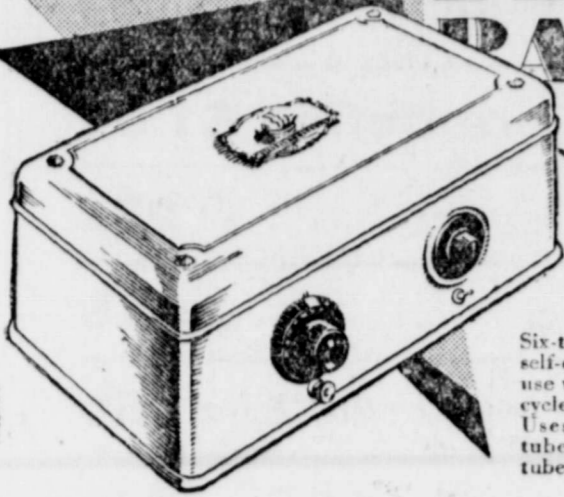
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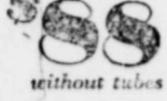

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EASY LESSONS IN AUCTION BRIDGE

By PAUL H. SEYMOUR

Article Twenty-Nine. The Squeeze Play

THOSE who followed the radio auction bridge games will probably remember that the squeeze play was used quite frequently and may have wondered why they have never encountered it in their own playing. The reason is very simple—it is an unusual play and is, as a rule, recognized only by unusual players. Cases where it might be used occur with great frequency but the declarer, all unconscious of the possibility, plays his winning cards and concedes the last trick or two to the adversaries. The conditions which make it possible should be studied with care and every player should be on the alert to detect the preliminary setting for it.

Simply explained, the squeeze play is compelling the adversaries to discard either a commanding card of a suit in which declarer holds the second best, or a guard for a stopper of a suit in which declarer holds several.

This may be done by leading a number of good cards in no trump or in a trump declaration after the trumps have been exhausted. For instance, suppose that declarer is playing no trump and his hand is reduced to the following four cards: hearts—King and nine; diamonds—ten; clubs—five. Senior has: hearts—Queen, eight and six; diamonds—Jack. Dummy has: hearts—Ace, ten, seven and two. Junior has no diamonds or clubs, and two small hearts have been discarded. Declarer leads his good five of clubs and senior is caught in the squeeze. If he discards his Jack of diamonds declarer will win the last three tricks with the ten of diamonds and the Ace and King of hearts; and if he discards a heart declarer will lead hearts, catch the Queen on the second lead taken by dummy's Ace, and the ten of hearts will be good for the last trick.

The following complete deal illustrates this play and is also worthy of note regarding the bidding:

East deals and bids one spade, the higher suit of his "two-suiter." South bids three hearts, jumping the bid unnecessarily in an effort to stop West from supporting his partner's spades. West and North pass and East shows his second suit by bidding four clubs. South can count only six sure tricks and so must pass, hoping for help from his partner. West decidedly prefers spades to clubs; therefore changes the bid to four spades. This is not a raise and does not indicate to his partner that he has a raising hand, but simply states that he prefers spades. North bids five hearts and all pass.

West leads his singleton club, dummy spreads his cards on the table and declarer counts his losing cards. One spade and one club seem to be losers—can he get rid of them? He can finesse the diamonds and if he is successful and can establish the suit a grand slam will be easy; otherwise he must wait and see what develops.

Declarer wins a grand slam.

At trick 7 declarer saw the possibility of a squeeze play and so discarded a spade and saved his small club. Upon the tricks 9 to 11 the discards from dummy were governed by West's discards. If West had thrown away his Queen of diamonds dummy's six would have been made good, but it was discarded on trick 11 because West still held the Queen. On trick 11 East was caught—his discard of the King of clubs made declarer's eight good; while if he had thrown the Queen of spades dummy's two of spades would have been good.

Derogatory Appellation
The word "doughface" was first coined by John Randolph of Roanoke. It means a person who is pliable and yielding. Randolph applied the term to northern politicians who truckled to the slave-power. He branded the Missouri compromise as "a dirty bargain, helped on by eighteen northern doughfaces." The epithet immediately passed into the slang vocabulary of politics. One authority suggests that possibly Randolph was improperly quoted and that what he really meant was "blue-faces," referring to the meekness of the doe. It seems more probable, however, that in its original application the term compared certain yielding politicians with the kneadable character of dough. James Russell Lowell defined "doughface" as a "contented lickspittle, a common variety of northern politician."—KANSAS CITY STAR.

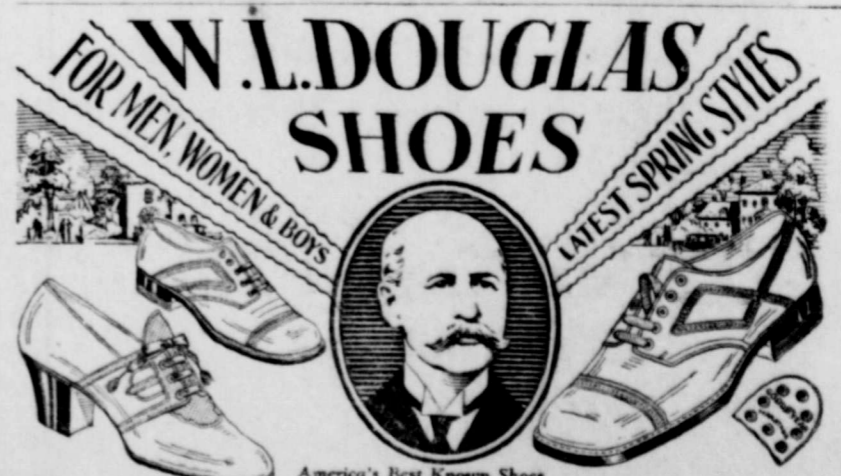
