





NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Four Aviators Make Flight Across Pacific Ocean in Three Big Hops.

C ALIFORNIA to Australia by airplane in three hops! For the first time the Pacific ocean has been traversed by the air route, the great feat being accomplished by two Australians, Capt. Charles Kingsford-Smith, war ace, and Charles T. P. Ulm, and two Americans, Harry W. Lyon and James Warner. Their machine was the monoplane Southern Cross, once used unsuccessfully in the Arctic regions by Captain Wilkins.

In constant communication with the mainland and with vessels by radio, the airmen made the flight to Hawaii without much trouble. The worst part of the trip was the next hop, nearly 8,200 miles to the Fiji islands, and during this they ran into repeated storms that were most skillfully dodged by Kingsford-Smith, the chief pilot. This was the longest overseas flight ever made, and if they had been forced down before reaching Suva the enly possible places to light without disaster were two coral atolis in the Phoenix group 1,866 miles from the starting point in Hawaii. As is was they landed safely at Albert park, 34 hours and 33 minutes. Whites and natives of Fiji joined in giving the flyers a rousing welcome. After a brief rest the plane was flown to Naselai beach for the take-off for Brisbane, Australia, 1,762 miles away, the route taking the airmen through a region of frequent storms, south of the Loyalty islands and New Caledonia. From Brisbane they were to fly to Sydney, 500 miles to the south.

Sydney newspapers printed the repert that Captain Kingsford-Smith was on the brink of insolvency and started a campaign to raise a fund for him. When the trans-Pacific flight originally was planned Kingsford-Smith sought the aid of the Australian government and it was promised. Advance payments purchased the plane and the flyer came to the United States. There followed the disastrons Dole flight from Oakland to Honolulu in which seven lives were lost. The Australian government withdrew its support and urged Kingsford-Smith to return home. He refused and continued plans for the California-to-Australia flight on limited resources and finally obtained backing from Allen Hancock, millionaire oil man of Los Angeles. But even with this backing the flyer faces financial ruin.

During the week there were reports, based on alleged radio messages, that Nobile and the dirigible Italia were on Franz Josef land east of Spitzbergen. Search for the missing explorers was continued by the steamship Hobby, by Lieutenant Holm, Norwegian aviator, and by parties of Alpine chasseurs. The Italian department of aeronautics was in communication with Captain Wilkins, hoping to induce him to join in the hunt by air.

S o FAR as the Republican national committee was concerned, Herbert Hoover was given nearly all the contested Southern delegates in the hearings conducted at Kansas City. The contests, however, it was stated would carried before the committee on redentials and possibly before the onvention. In the committee hearngs the secretary of commerce won 65 out of 73 contested delegates, his most impressive victory being in the case of Texas in which he gained the entire delegation. By conservative estimates this brought the total number of Hoover votes to 472, the majority necessary to nomination being 545. The experts then figured that Mellon with his 79 Pennsylvania delegates could put Hoover across the line-if he chose to do so. The contest for the South Carolina delegation, which was for Lowden, was withdrawn by the Hooverites.

Among the politicians gathered in 498,335 have been assessed against Kansas City many expressed the opin-

ton that Senator James Watson of Indiana or Senator Charles Curtis of Kansas would make a good vice presidential nominee. Some Hooverites especially favored Watson for second place, figuring his nomination would

"pull the stinger of the corn belt."

Farmer crusaders of the regions surrouding Kansas City were preparing to move on the convention city in considerable numbers, by automobile and train, and many of them were badges on which was printed this amended version of the Roover slogan: "Who but Hoover? Anybody."

A CCORDING to the partial report of the senate campaign fund committee, total expenditures in behalf of the various Presidential candidates to date have been only \$731,087. Of this sum the Hoover expenditures have been \$380.822. Frank O Lowden is credited with having spent \$60,-922.90. The committee found \$579.50 has been collected and expended by the supporters of Vice President Dawes. The expenses of Governor Smith of New York, leading Democratic aspirant, were \$121,471.04. Collections to the Smith fund amounted to \$120,911.40. The Reed preconvention campaign fund amounted to \$41,-430.64. His expenditures are listed at

GEN. JOHN J. PERSHING made a rush trip from Paris to Cherbourg and jumped aboard the Leviathan for the United States, and both in New York and in France the report was circulated that he was called home hurriedly by friends who were starting a boom for him as a dark horse candidate for the Republican nomination for President.

MARSHAL CHANG TSO-LIN, Northern war lord, gave up his dictatorship and abandoned Peking to the Nationalists. With his household he flet to Manchuria and just as his train reached Mukden it was bombed presumably by Nationalist agents. Some soldiers were killed and Chang himself was so badly injured that his recovery was considered doubtful.

The Nationalist troops gradually oc cupied Peking while forces left by Chang and those of the foreign legations strove to prevent disorder. General Hsi-shan, for years known as the model governor of Shansi province. was appointed garrison commander of the Peking-Tientsin area and at once began the work of reconstruction and development. The Nationalist government asked the immediate evacuation of American troops from Tientsin, where the United States has maintained part of a regiment since the Boxer rebellion. In Washington it was stated that our government could not comply with the request at once.

PASSING upon two cases arising in the state of Washington, the Supreme Court of the United States has ruled that evidence of prohibition violations obtained by wire tapping is admissible in a criminal proceeding and that a conviction resulting from such evidence is not a violation of the constitutional guarantee against "unreasonable search and selzure." The question was decided by a five to four ruling. Chief Justice Taft wrote the majority opinion. Justices Holmes and Brandeis, in dissenting opinions, scathingly denounced the placing of judicial sanction upon the commission of a crime to detect crime. Justice Butler also filed a dissenting opinion and Justice Stone announced he concurred with the views of Justices Holmes, Brandels and Butler,

In holding wire tapping did not amount to a search and seizure within the meaning of the fourth amendment to the Constitution, Chief Justice Taft said that while this amendment might have a proper application to a sealed letter because of the constitutional provision for the Post Office department and because such a letter is in the possession of the government it could not apply to communication by wire.

U NCLE SAM proposes to get a lot of money from Henry M. Blackmer, the wealthy Denver oil operator who fled to France to avoid the Teapot Dome inquiry. Income taxes, interest and penalties aggregating \$8,408,935 have been assessed against

New York federal courts. Also writs of attachment against any property held by or for Blackmer were filed with 22 companies or individuals, including all financial institutions in which Blackmer is believed to have accounts. In New York city they were also served upon banks with which he did business.

Only a part of the tax, interest and penalties assessed against the oil man was understood to be for his alleged profits in the Continental Trading company, an adjunct of the Teapot Dome

I ITHUANIA'S assertion, in her recently adopted new constitution, that Vilna is the capital of the country was denounced before the League of Nations council by Poland when the council opened its fiftieth session in Geneva. Foreign Minister Zaleski submitted a copy of his note of protest to Kovno in which he asserted this could only envenom the Polish-Lithuanian relations. Lithuania's claim, he said, had no juridical foundation as Poland's rights over Vilna were definitely established by the Vilna and Polish diets and by the ambassadors' conference in 1924. It was not believed this session of the council would do much business as both Briand of France and Stresemann of Germany were absent on account of Illness.

VIENNA received reports, seemingly authentic, that Ahmed Bey Zogu. President of Albania, was getting ready to proclaim a monarchy with himself as the king. He has had a stormy career, fighting with the Democrats and Liberals and once being wounded by an assassin. In Decem ber, 1924, he led a successful revolt against Bishop Noll's rule and next month was appointed President by the national assembly. He is only thirtyfour years old and besides being President has held the offices of premier and commander in chief of the national forces.

PREMIER MUSSOLINI took a good deal of wind out of the sails of his detractors by the restraint of his annual address before the Italian senate. His hearers were especially interested in what he might say about the threatening situation in the Balkans, but the Duce cut out all violent talk and made a plain offer of friend ship to Yugo-Slavia. Then dismiss ing the idea of enmity, he declared Italy could not wait forever for Yugo-Slavla to settle its domestic problems and warned that treaties would be no good anyway if a friendly, moral atmosphere between the two peoples was not developed. He ridiculed the prediction made by a former Yugo-Slav minister that war soon would break out between the two countries, ending with a peace signed at Venice. He had nothing to say concerning the disputes with Austria about Upper Adige. but announced that a treaty would soon be signed with France that would settle all outstanding differences be

tween the French and Italians.

Mussolini spoke at some length about the astonishing growth of the United States in wealth and world power. He said he had no complaint to make against American immigration restrictions and the Italian quota, though deploring the reasons which prompted that legislation. "As for the naturalized Americans of Italian origin," he continued, "they are American citizens and therefore foreigners so far as we are concerned. We limit ourselves to hoping they will continue to be proud of their Italian origin."

A TLANTIC CITY having abandoned its annual beauty contest, the "international pageant of pulchritude" held in Galveston attracted the atten tion of those who enjoy such affairs Selected beauties from many states and a number of foreign countries gathered in the Texas city, and paraded along the sea wall. Miss Ella Van Hueson, the entrant from Chicago, was first chosen as "Miss America," and then, being adjudged the most pulchri tudinous of the whole lot, was crowned "Miss Universe." She is twenty-two years old, tall and slender, with long dark brown hair. The other prize win ners in their order were the girls from France, Italy, Colorado, West Vir ginia, Canada, Luxembourg, Ohio, San Antonio and Tuisa



But it was the lessons learned in that great conflict which brought about the citizens' military training camps as they now exist. In 1920 the National Defense act was passed by congress and in that same year the Military Training Camps Association of America, an organization made up of met who had themselves enrolled in prewar camps in the four years from 1913 to 1916, appealed to the War department for the establishment of camps for the voluntary training of young men, authorized under the National Defense act. The secretary of war, the late John W. Weeks, approved the request and an appropriate item was included in the budget for the next fiscal year. When the proposal was presented to congress by the military affairs committees it was heartily supported by James W. Wadsworth, chairman of the senate committee, and by the late Julius. Kahn, chairman of the house committee, both of whom remained ardent friends of the camps during succeeding years.

War.

The first appropriation was sufficient for the training of 10,000 young men at ten different centers throughout the country. The minimum age of admission was fixed at sixteen years and plans were made for a series of three courses-the Red. the White and the Blue giving one months' training in successive years. Later the minimum age was placed at seventeen and a preliminary course, the Pasic, was added. Congress made the graduates of the last, the Blue course, eligible for examination leading to a commission in the organized reserves.

The citizens' military training camps have unlformly received favorable consideration by congress, which year by year has granted larger funds for their maintenance. The only difficulty has appeared in the estimate by the house and the senate of popular demand for this training. A constantly increasing appropriation for this purpose has been insufficient each year to provide room for all the young men who desired to enroll. Campcapacity has grown from 10,000 in 1921 to 39,000 in 927, but even in this last year there were 20,000 more applications than places. In fact the total: for the six years show the amazing fact that 158,000 young men have enrolled in these camps since their establishment in 1921. Ninetysix thousand more, an average of 16,000 each year, applied for admission but could not be trained for tack of room. The "call of the camps" drew a quarter of a million young Americans to seek admission!

There can be no doubt that the growth of the camps and the numbers seeking admission each year has come about through a greater appreciation by our youth and their parents of the opportunity that their government, in providing four weeks' training course with all expenses paid. Is offering them. For the attractions of the camps are varied and many and the thousands who have enrolled have done so for any one or more of the following reasons: A desire for change, for physical development, for athletic training, for greater capacity, for advancement as students or employees, or because they responded to the judgment of men whom they respected and to the wishes of their own parents.

Athletics, no doubt, bring a large part of the enrollment, for one of the features of the camps is a chance to participate in a large variety of sports and games under skilled instructors. The government furnishes much necessary equipment and this is supplemented by donations from the Military Training Camps association and other patriotic societies and civic committees. Many of the training camps are located on the seast-ore or on inland takes and rivers with ample opportunity for bathing and water sports. At other camps the War department has established adequate, hygienic and attractive swimming tanks The Red Cross arranges systematic courses of instruction, leading successful candidates to final credit as life guards.

Baseball diamonds and equipment are provided for all men who seek to qualify for the company teams and to take part in intercompany and regimental games. Tennis courts are to be found everywhere; boxing is taught for men of every

equally popular. Each year an increasing nomber of high school, normal school and college football teams, sometimes with their own coaches. find in the summer camps a fine opportunity for preliminary practice for their regular schedules.

In the daily program they find means to greater physical vigor and control. Military drill brings proper carriage, quickness of response and exac co-ordination of nerve and muscle. Masa calis thenics emphasize these qualities through chythmic movement. Adequate, varied, nutritious and appetizing diet for thirty days contribute its share. to a bodily growth, measured by inches of height and chest expansion and many pounds of weight. Regular hours establish a proper habit of ffe Systematic medical inspection wards off any danger of undue exertion and it is supplemented by hospital care in case of need.

Academic credit and rewards are a definite incentive for thousands of high school and college students who always make up a large percentage of the enrollment, Boards of education in many states have authorized high school credit for camp enrollment and a considerable number of higher institutions have recognized this training toward graduation. In addition, many military schools, public secondary schools, colleges and universities offer for competition in the citizens' military training camp of the various corps areas scholarships bearing free tuition. Most of these are renewable, on the basis of good scholastic record, to the successful winners throughout the course. Sixty or more institutions have united in this patriotic plan with a forecast of a total anauai value of fifty thousand dollars in these scholarships within the next two or three years.

Economic considerations lead many young men to the summer training. A large and increasing tions for infants in arms, and children percentage is made up of young men from offices, stores and factories, who go to the camps under the expressed approval of their employers and with the sound conviction that a good record in the training center will be a factor in future pay and advancement. Some companies grant an extra two weeks without wages; most give the full month with pay and a few allow attendance for four weeks with pay in addition to the usual

Six years have demonstrated the value of the citizens' military training camps, for which there is no better proof than the increasing desire of young men to return for a second year, coupled with the unanimous approval of parents

The government stands today firm in this defi-

nite policy of voluntary training-physical, civic and military-of young men. It offers in the citizens' military training camp no vacation in the sense of purposeless squandering of time in idle pursuits or useless diversions, such as indifferent youth may fancy. The camp schedule is not arduous, but for every hour there is a definite aim and occupation. Military drill fills the mornings with short intervals for rest and for the ever-welcome milk period, wisely ordained for those still fastgrowing youths. Afternoons are devoted to a wide variety of sports and games, in one or more o' which each candidate must take his part. After a long day of outdoor work and play, men welcome eagerly the recreation of the evening hours. The hostess house, under the direction of sympathetic and experienced women, affords the comforts and quiet enjoyment of a home or club Chess and checkers, billiards and card games fill many a happy hour. Dances are organized at every training center with partners furnished by committees and clubs of neighboring communities. The Liberty theater offers moving pictures with professional and amateur concerts and plays. Most camps have their own citizens' military training camp band and sometimes their own orchestra and dramatic and debuting clubs. From reveille, to taps the program is full of earnest work and wholesome recreation, inciting each candicate to full performance of duty through the day in order better to enjoy the resulting leisure of the evening. What was a dream in the mind of Leonard Wood in the days before the great war and an experiment in the citizens' military training camp of 1921 is now a reality in the cistzens' military training camps, the call of which is written large in the history of the past six






Speech Not Possible

SEPARATE SEXES WHILE YET YOUNG

When the cockerels in a poultry dock reach a live weight of from one and one-fourth to two pounds each they should be separated from the pullets and put on a different range or in another inclosure. This will aid in the growth of both the pullets and cockerels, according to the poultry men at the New York State College of Agriculture at Ithaca. They explain that the pullets will be less crowded and will thus have a better chance to

eat and grow. The cockerels fight less and grow faster when they, too, have less competition in their range area and roosting quarters. They should have a shelter house, preferably among trees. to insure shade and open air roosting places. To raise vigorous males for breeding purposes the cockerels should be grouped together by size and vigor; aft should have large range areas, with feed hoppers and water troughs in at least three separate parts of the range so that there will be less chance for intimidation and consequent undernourishment for the smaller birds.

In choosing cockerels for breeding or for market, begin the selective process as soon as the birds begin to show marked sexual characteristics. The time may vary according to breed and feed, but for leghorns they may be selected first at from six to eight weeks of age, and from ten to twelve weeks in the heavier varieties. The earlier the market cockerels can be separated from the rest for crate fattening, the better, because the price by weight for broilers decreases with the season faster than the birds cap put on weight.

Broilers Bring Profits

To cause this favorable growth poultrymen keep the birds confined and feed them a special ration.

Laying Mash Suggested

by New York Station An egg is a pretty complicated thing, and the hen that makes it needs a lot of material of different kinds, espe cially if she is going to do herself proud and make you a profit by a blg year's output.

The ingredients commonly used in egg-laying mashes, says the New York agricultural experiment station, are wheat bran, wheat middlings, linseed oil meal, corn gluten feed, corn meal, ground oats, alfalfa meal, meat scrap, fish meal and dried buttermilk feed.

Of course you don't use all of these materials at the same time, but you need several. The Cornell mash, for instance, which has become so standardized that dealers are putting it on the market already mixed, consists of "equal parts by weight of wheat bran. wheat middlings, corn meal, ground

oats and meat scraps.' The above mixture makes a pretty good growing mash, too, except that rolled oats or oatmeal may be used in place of the ground oats. Bow meal or lime is also usually added.

Size of House

Most authorities recommend a poultry house 16 to 20 feet wide facing the south with single slope shed roof, or one 20 to 25 feet wide with low double roof, Half-monitor poultry houses are not very popular because of the large amount of waste space at top. From three to five square feet of thoor space per fowl is recommended. depending on type, with four square feet as a good working rule. For a house 16 feet wide, this would mean four fowls per foot length.

Poultry House Floors

Penitry authorities differ as to best foor for poultry houses. Important hings are freedom from dampness, cold, egifts and dust. Double wood floors with heavy paper between are much used and very good, except that they are short-lived and do not keep out rats. Dirt, gravel or sand-clay doors are dusty and harbor rats and are hard to keep clean. Cement floors are satisfactory when properly made Foundation walls should extend 12 to 18 inches into the ground.
