words of 15 th-century wise man Thomas a'Kempis wise true. "How seldom," he wrote, "we weigh our neighbor in the same balance with The problem is not limited individuals. o individuals. This sickness
easily infects churches. If picture speaks a thousand words, the painting by Pieter Breughel shouts loudly. He calls his painting "Parable of the Blind Leading the Blind." In the painting, five blin men are dutifully followin their blind leader straight to ward a chasm. He's already ward a chasm. He's already others don't know it.
The point is sharp, but becomes even more painful when we see clearly placed in the background-silent, impos ing, beautiful, but totally un helpful-a church.
One of the most dangerous pitfalls faced by individuals or churches is the temptation to read Romans $12: 2$, "Be ye transformed," and apply it to everyone but ourselves.
Churches are never more in danger of becoming positively proud of the logs obscuring their vision than when they become eye clinics specializing in speck removal from the eye of others. If we radiate arro gance instead of love, nobody will listen to what we're say ing, even if it happens to be true. Whether they are in scribed with religious traditions or adorned with pet scriptures nicely carved in rosewood logs are still pretty much impossible to see through.
