

COOPERS COMMENTS

On this Tuesday morning, Jan. 27, my phone rang at 6:30 A. M. and the voice at the other end of the line informed me that I had just lost a very dear friend. It will be my privilege to hold a Memorial Service on Thursday morning, Jan. 29, for Dr. M. L. Stubblefield, long-time citizen and Physician of Baird.

His technical skill, his compassionate heart, and his deep concern for all of his patients will be bright spots in the life of a multitude of people. His ministry as a Doctor touched me more deeply than any man I have ever known. I think, perhaps because of his dedication to the profession he had chosen. He was my doctor and I was his preacher and in that relationship we found deep and abiding joy.

I think I can safely say that his personal concern for my physical welfare was greater than any one of whom I went with an ailment. I never went into his office without finding him reading a medical journal or studying the latest advances in the field of medicine. I often felt that he wished he were just a young man, so that he could have a great part in the advances that are being made, not only in medicine, but in the field of surgery.

I had become victim to a maladjustment which was diagnosed as an Aneurysm, and when Dr. Stubblefield received confirmation of the X-rays, he called me to his office. It was the only time in all my experience that a doctor was moved to tears in my physical examination. It was not because it was a fellow named Albert Cooper, but it was because I was his preacher, the pastor of his church, and he didn't want to lose him. And, too, it was because he had not developed the surgical skill for that type of surgery. Yet his joy in my recovery from the operation was just as great as though he had been able to do it himself.

The abundant inspiration of his life is that his concern was just as great for each and every one of his patients, whether the ailment was great or small. His dedication, his compassion, the healing touch of his hands, came from his knowledge of God and his faith in Christ and his love for the Church.

His desire was to serve, to help bring health and wholeness to those who came to him as patients. He will be remembered long and the brightening influence of his life will never die. We can rejoice that now he is safe in the hands of the Great Physician, whose healing power and matchless grace will take the deep desires of his heart and mould them into the perfection of the things for which he yearned. I think that Paul's word will be fulfilled. "For I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the Righteous Judge, shall give me in that day; and not to me only, but unto all them also that love His appearing."

DR. M. L. STUBBLEFIELD, BAIRD PHYSICIAN FOR 24 YEARS DIES

BAIRD — Dr. M. L. Stubblefield, 80, widely known Callahan County physician, died in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Jack Bishop of Dallas, Tuesday morning at 4:45 a. m. He was born October 3, 1889 in Jewel.

Funeral services were held Thursday morning at 10 A. M. at the First United Methodist Church of Baird, of which he was a member for many years. Officiating at the services were Rev. Albert Cooper, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Rev. Carrol Green, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Baird, and Rev. Charles Cook of Dallas.

Burial was in Ross Cemetery under the direction of Godfrey Funeral Home.

Dr. Stubblefield was married to the former Miss Adele Poe. He was graduated from the University of Texas and from the Medical School in Galveston in 1917. He practiced medicine in Gorman before coming to Baird. He practiced medicine in Baird for 24 years, prior to his retirement about three years ago.

He was a member of the Eastland-Callahan County Medical Society, a member of the American Medical Association and Texas Medical Association. He was associated with the American Legion for 35 consecutive years, a veteran of World War I, and was formerly Callahan County Health Officer.

MOTOR VEHICLE INSPECTION DEADLINE DRAWS NEAR

AUSTIN — With the State's April 15 motor vehicle inspection deadline approximately 90 days away, large numbers of Texas motorists have yet to take their vehicles in for the mandatory annual safety inspection.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged all motorists whose vehicles have not been inspected to visit an inspection station as soon as possible. "Those getting the inspection now will avoid long lines which are certain to develop at many stations as the April 15 deadline draws near," he said.

The DPS Director noted that Texas adopted an annual inspection program on September 1, 1969. All vehicles inspec-

ted since that date have had stickers placed on the left side of the windshield, with a large number tab inserted to show the month of expiration.

For example, vehicles inspected in September have the number nine displayed and will re-inspection before Sept. 30, 1970. Those inspected in October have the number 10 and must be re-inspected before Oct. 31, 1970. Vehicles which are inspected in January will bear the number one and reinspection will be required before Jan. 31, 1971.

All vehicles which currently have a sticker on the right side of the windshield have not been re-inspected in compliance with the new law, and their owners have only until April 15 to visit an approved inspection station.

Billie Sol Estes Up For Parole

CLYDE — Friday, a group of men will decide in Washington whether Billie Sol Estes walks out of prison, after serving a few days more than five years of his 15-year sentence for mail fraud and conspiracy.

The group will decide whether he stays in prison or goes free is the federal parole board. All preliminaries are complete and all that remains is for the board to announce its decision. Estes entered Leavenworth prison in March, 1965, after fighting the courts for three years. He later was transferred to Sandstone, Minn., prison. He becomes eligible for parole on March 5 this year.

Whenever Estes gets out of prison, he could be tried on at least 13 more counts similar to the ones he went to prison for.

CALLAHAN CO. IN 19th PLACE IN VOTER REGISTRATIONS

FORT WORTH — "OPERATION: EVERYBODY!" chairman Mrs. James A. McMullen III of Fort Worth, announced that Callahan County has attained 45.5 percent of its quota as set by the Texas Democratic Party.

"That figure puts Callahan County in 19th place in its division," County Chairman Hugh W. Ross said. "The state-wide goal is to have 4,250,000 Texans registered by the time the 123-day voter registration period ends, Saturday, Jan. 31."

OPERATION: EVERYBODY is a project of the State Democratic Executive Committee. Mrs. Carol Vance of Houston, as vice-chairman, serves with Mrs. McMullen on the special drive. "More than half of the state-wide goal has been reached," Ross said. "Voter registration application forms are at the County Tax Assessor's office in the courthouse. Callahan county will be competing with other counties of similar size for

state-wide recognition in meeting and exceeding their quotas," Mr. Ross said.

Gold, silver and bronze plaques will be awarded to the counties which exceed their quotas by the highest margins. Callahan county is striving for the gold plaques, according to Mr. Ross.

Savings Bonds Total 70,224 For Year '69

United States Savings Bond sales during 1969 in Callahan County totaled \$70,224, according to Mr. Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of Callahan County Savings Bond Committee. The county has achieved 54 per cent of its goal of \$130,000. December sales totaled \$5,453. Sixty-nine counties in Texas have achieved their 1969 goal.

Texas has achieved 103 per cent of its goal of \$170.1 million with year to date sales totaling \$175,487,920. December sales were \$13,997,243 while sales during the same period of 1968 totaled \$13,070,587 - an increase of 7 per cent.

Bond sales over the nation during 1969 amounted to \$4,740 billion with 97 per cent of goal achieved. Sales of Freedom Shares totaled \$348 million during 1969 - 26 per cent above the \$277 million sold in 1968.

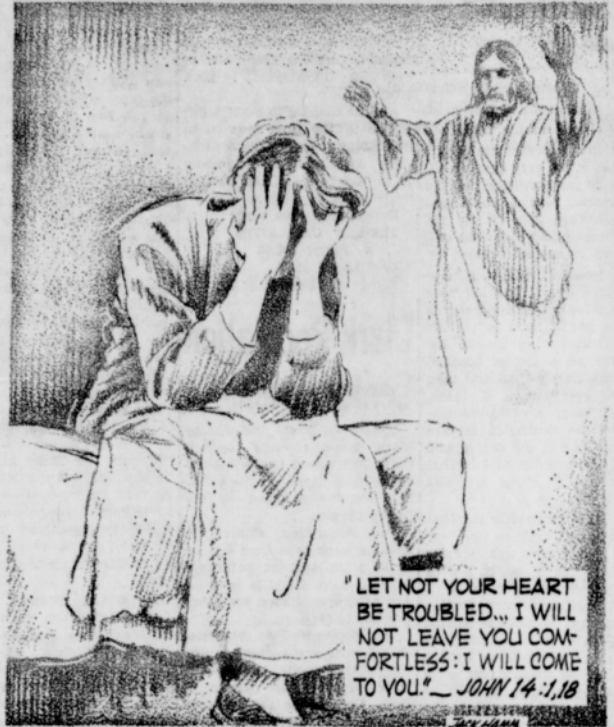
