In the city council election, to be held at the EMS building on 3rd Street, voters must vote for three different candidates.

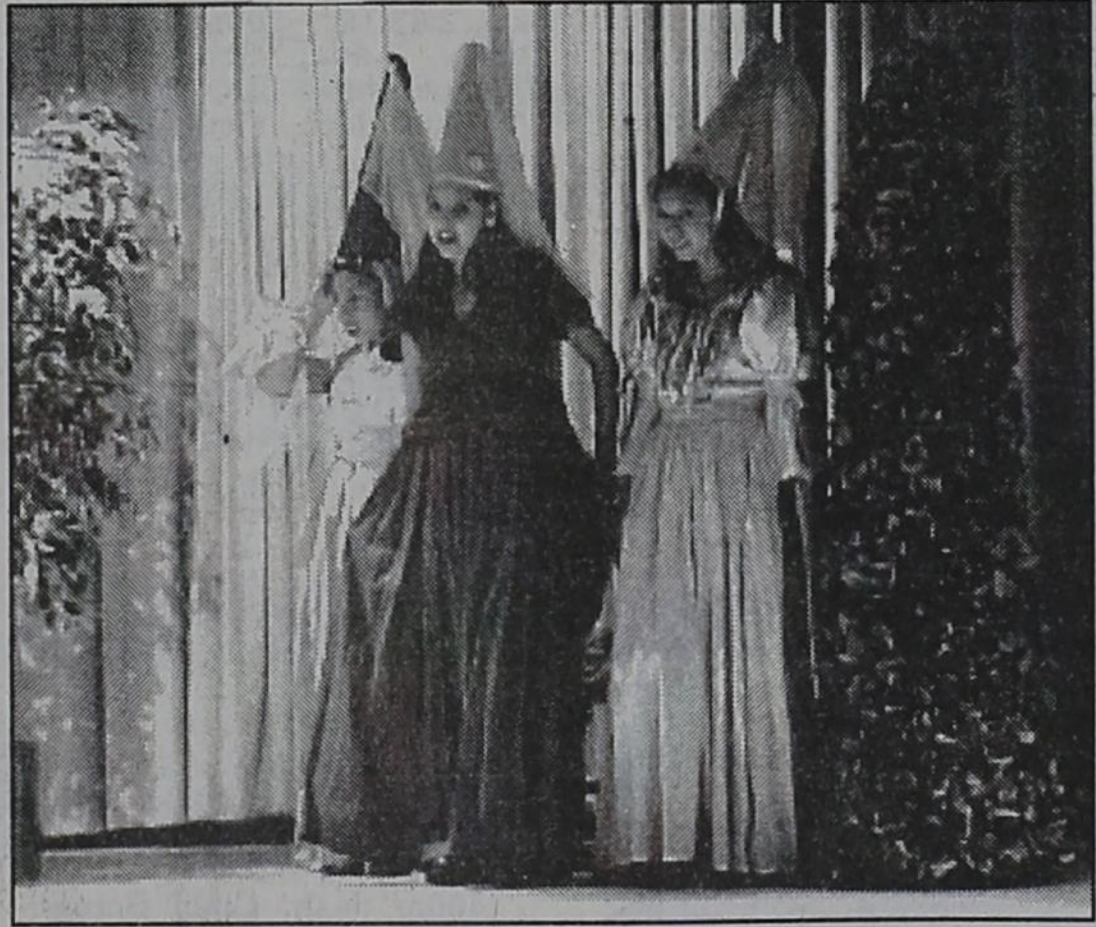
## Junior High Honors Band Concert

IT'S SO SMALL that it's not even on the map! We were introduced to one of the best kept secrets in Texas during our recent trip to San Antonio. Our son Stan enjoys taking us to neat little out-of-the-way places when we go for a visit downstate.

There was a large influx of German immigrants to the Texas Gulf Coast in the 1840s. Still today we see the German influence in many small communities which dot the Hill Country. Fredericksburg is probably the best known of these, now attracting tourists searching for a peek into the past.

Stan took us to the tiny town of Gruene (pronounced Green) on the old stagecoach road between San Antonio and Austin, just a few miles northeast of New Braunfels. Here in the 1870s the Gruene family built a cotton gin and mercantile store along the banks of the Guadalupe River.

Stan tells us that inner-tubing along the river is quite popular now. Folks will come from the city, rent a tube or two and spend a leisurely day floating down stream. You can lash two tubes together, plop your picnic lunch and cooler of drinks into the second tube and float all your cares away. There are stops along the way where you can tie up, do a little fly fishing or catch a shuttle back to the area where you started -- meaning, of course, where you parked your car.

Some pretty Victorian-style homes were built by residents in the bustling little town of Gruene before the turn of the last century. German folks are fond of their beer, so Mr. Gruene

built a saloon with a good-sized meeting hall in the back. Gruene Hall became the center of the community's social life.

In the 1920s, boll weevils killed the cotton crops and the Great Depression killed the economy. The Cotton Mill burned and was not rebuilt. The mercantile closed and Gruene became a ghost town for several years. Then about 100 years after the town came into existence, some enterprising business people recognized good potential in the cluster of old empty buildings along the river banks and the town was reborn, eventually gaining recognition on the National Register of Historic Places.

We all had a delightful lunch, dining *al fresco* on one of the many outside porches and decks which are now attached to the remains of the old mill on the river bank. After lunch, we noticed a rather nondescript white frame building located next to the Grist Mill Restaurant. We ambled in for a look around. Oh gracious! It was the old saloon that Mr. Gruene had built back in 1880, looking just like a set from the old Gunsmoke TV series, and in the back was a great long dance hall with an old juke box at one end and a raised stage for performers at the other end.

A light bulb went off in my brain and suddenly I remembered seeing this place written up in *Texas Monthly* magazine and also on the "Texas Country Reporter" TV program. The "Wall of Fame" (actually three or four walls) was attracting a lot of tourists who were checking out pictures of all the famous and infamous country musicians who had performed at Gruene Hall. It seems that the place was

instrumental in kicking off the careers of George Strait, Lyle Lovett, Hal Ketchum, Joe Ely and Jerry Jeff Walker.

Also the movie "Michael" which starred John Travolta and Andy McDowell was filmed at Gruene Hall. For the big dance scene, the "Gruene Hall" sign was temporarily removed from the building and replaced with one that read "Tom's."

Here are just a few of the name performers whose signed photos adorn the walls. See if you recognize any of these:

Dixie Chicks, Kris Kristofferson, Jerry Lee Lewis, Asleep at the Wheel, Bo Diddley, Tommy Hancock, Garth Brooks, Little Richard, Patsy Montana, Leon Redbone, Willie Nelson, Rodney Crowell, Michael Martin Murphy, Ernest Tubbs, Arlo Guthrie, Merle Haggard, Hank Williams Jr., Tish Hinojosa, Stevie Ray Vaughn and a whole bunch of others, including quite a few that I've never heard of. Bill noticed a picture of Johnny Gimble and told us that he had been one of the originals with Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys.

I guess that sedate little laid-back town along the river bank is a real live jivin' jumpin' joint on Saturday nights. The locals, what few there are, must have to wear ear-plugs.

In addition to the oldest dance hall in Texas, the town has a nice pottery place which features local artisans. There are also plenty of antique and gift stores, a winery, a Mexican food restaurant, and a few interesting B&B places to stay.

Tell 'em Momma Carol from the Top of Texas sent you. That and a dollar might buy you an ice cream cone at the General Store at Gruene; so tiny that it's not even on the map.

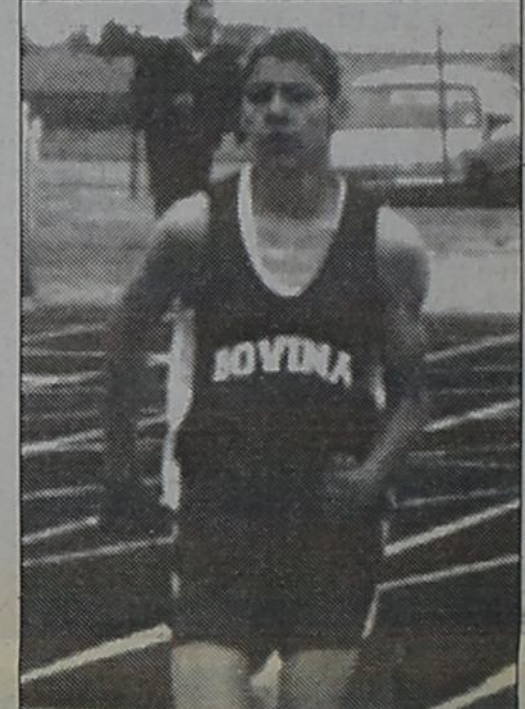

"Give Me A Good Old Swindle Any Day!"

Saw a sign at the local Allsup's advertising prepaid phone cards. Among the benefits listed for an Allsup's phone card was "No Tricks."

That leads me to believe that most prepaid calling cards have tricks of some kind. I'm sure you have seen the signs posted around: 912 minutes for \$1.25.

Never could figure out why you get an odd number of minutes on those calling cards. Someone gave me one once. The trick to that one was the 800-number I needed to dial to hook up to the prepaid computer was always busy.

The Public Utility Commission has new rules to provide protection for pre-paid calling card users. The companies now have to print all the rules, fees, surcharges, etc. on the card.

Not that you are going to read it, but at least it will be there. Most important, the card has to notify you at least one minute before the time runs out. That's nice. At least you will have time to say bye.

A lot of time is spent advising people, especially the elderly, about scams and ripoffs. We have to be careful these days with credit cards, telephone numbers, free giveaway offers and other private information.

The PUC also publishes a long list of things you can do to avoid telemarketing fraud. Like don't give your credit card number, checking account number, social security number or physical measurements over the phone.

I don't need to sit through a half-day seminar on avoid-

ing telemarketing fraud. Here is what I do: **HANG UP!** Why is that so difficult for most folks.

To tell you the truth I am not so lonely that I need to talk to everybody that calls my home number. If you call me at home, you have a milli-second to say something when I answer.

If it is not a familiar voice, I hang up. That's it. No fuss, no mess, no bother. No chance for telemarketing fraud if you don't talk to them.

Well meaning friends say, "That's so rude to hang up. They are just trying to make a living too. Don't you feel bad when you hang up on them?"

The short answer is, "no I don't."

The Independent Bankers Association of Texas (IBAT) say that investment fraud has grown to a \$10 BILLION a year industry which targets investors of all incomes.

A recent tip from IBAT stated, "Through common sense and a sound approach, the risk of getting swindled can be greatly reduced."

I like that word, "swindled." It is an old-fashioned word for a slick, con-artist type, sort of like impeached president Billy Jeff Clinton, one of the all-time greatest swindlers.

The modern politically correct words for swindlers include scam artists, cheaters, or ripoffs. If I was a crook I would want to be known as a swindler because I think it has more class than scam or ripoff.

Scamming and ripping off happens fast. To swindle takes some time and proper

planning. You don't just call someone up and swindle them in five minutes.

In fact I suspect professional swindlers enjoy the swindling more than the loot. For example, even if he goes to church three times a week and volunteers for charities, Billie Sol Estes will forever be known as a swindler.

Whether it is a scam, cram, slam, ripoff or swindle, folks like you and me can never be too careful. Crooks are hiding behind every tree and telephone to swindle us out of our worldly possessions and every thing else we own.

One of the more humorous areas of politically correct cheaters are items that might be hidden in your hospital bill.

A recent article in Modern Maturity magazine pointed out a few snags to watch for. The article was written by Pat Palmer whose company, Medical Billing Associates, audits major hospital bills to ferret out the hidden costs a hospital might bill you for.

# Immunization Clinics Are Slated For May

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for May throughout several Panhandle communities.

Protection will be against polio, diphtheria, lock-jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B) and varicella (chicken pox).

The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability of the individual or family to pay, however, no one will be turned away if not able to pay.

Additionally, flu shots will also be available at the clinics to be given to the general public. Those considered to be in a high-risk category should seek to be immunized as soon as possible. This would include anyone over the age of 65 and anyone with a chronic medical condition.

The vaccinations will be administered at the WIC Office, 607 Main Street, Friona, Friday, May 1, from 9-11:45 a.m. and 1:30-4:45 p.m.

Vaccinations will also be available at the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Office, 109 East Third Street in Bovina, Monday, May 14 from 10 a.m.-12 noon and 1-3 p.m.

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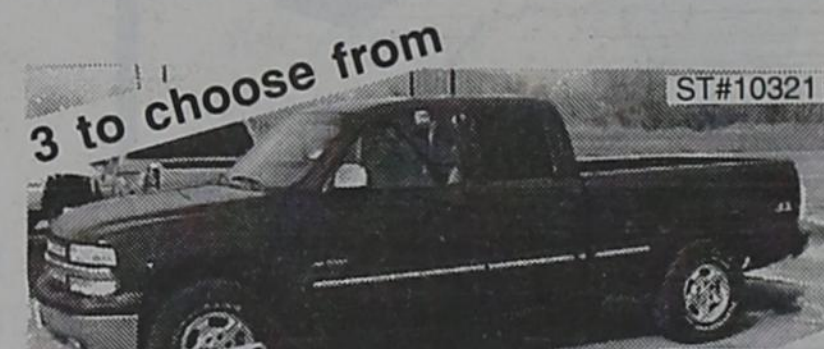

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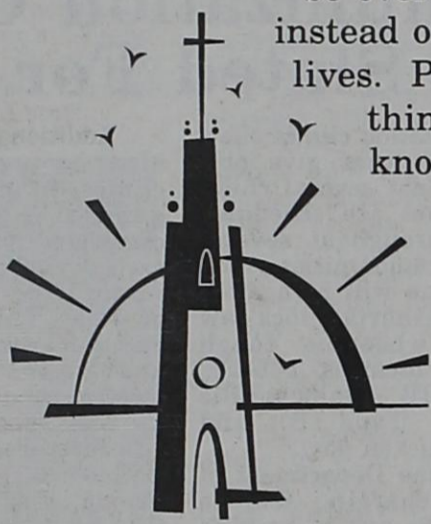

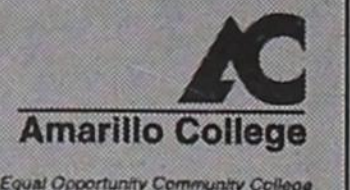

## Memories Of May Day Shared By A Friend

Quite a few of the May editions of some of the magazines I have read this year have had references to May Day. What fond, happy memories these brought back to those lovely spring months before World War II disturbed our carefree times.

Another "May Day" came into being at about that time. It is short for the French (Venez "Maiden," or "Come Help Me!" The international radio-telephonic signal for HELP is now "May Day," and is used by ships and aircraft around the world.

Not too many of us will ever forget the USSR's show of might and power, which they continue to exhibit in parts of the old Soviet Union in parades on the first of May.

May Day in New England was a happy day. May baskets were made of colored paper, filled with whatever flowers were growing at that time, and hung on the door knob of a favorite person: a school teacher, sweet older neighbor, or best friend.

I will never forget one May Day in particular. I had been quite ill that spring, and I was at home nesting on our living-room couch (a treat for us when we were ill).

There came a couple of knocks on my front door. I slowly got up to see who was there, and opened the door. There was no one there, but hanging on the door knob was the prettiest basket. It was trimmed with purple and yellow crepe paper "ruffles," and was filled with wild purple violets. They grow profusely in that area. I was thrilled one time to find a patch of yellow ones.

I never found out who left my surprise, but it sure gladdened the heart and spirit of a very sick seven-year-old.

This brings to mind the May Day celebration. May Day (May 1) was often celebrated as a traditional spring festival, often celebrated by dancing around

a May-Pole, crowning a May Queen, etc.

We lived not far from North Adams Normal School. This was where most young ladies (and a few young men) would come for their "teaching degrees." The school was also called State Teacher's College.

My brother Art and I passed this school every weekday on our way to school. Every May, on the Friday which was nearest to May 1, they would set up a May Pole in the middle of the lawn in front of the dormitory, and celebrate.

The May Pole was a high pole, wreathed in flowers, streamers, etc., around which merry-makers would dance on May Day. I remember lots of flowers and multi-colored streamers in spring colors of yellow, green, blue, pink and lilac. The "merry-makers" all wore light colored clothes, except for the Queen, who wore white and a wreath of flowers in her hair. They danced to Celtic tunes.

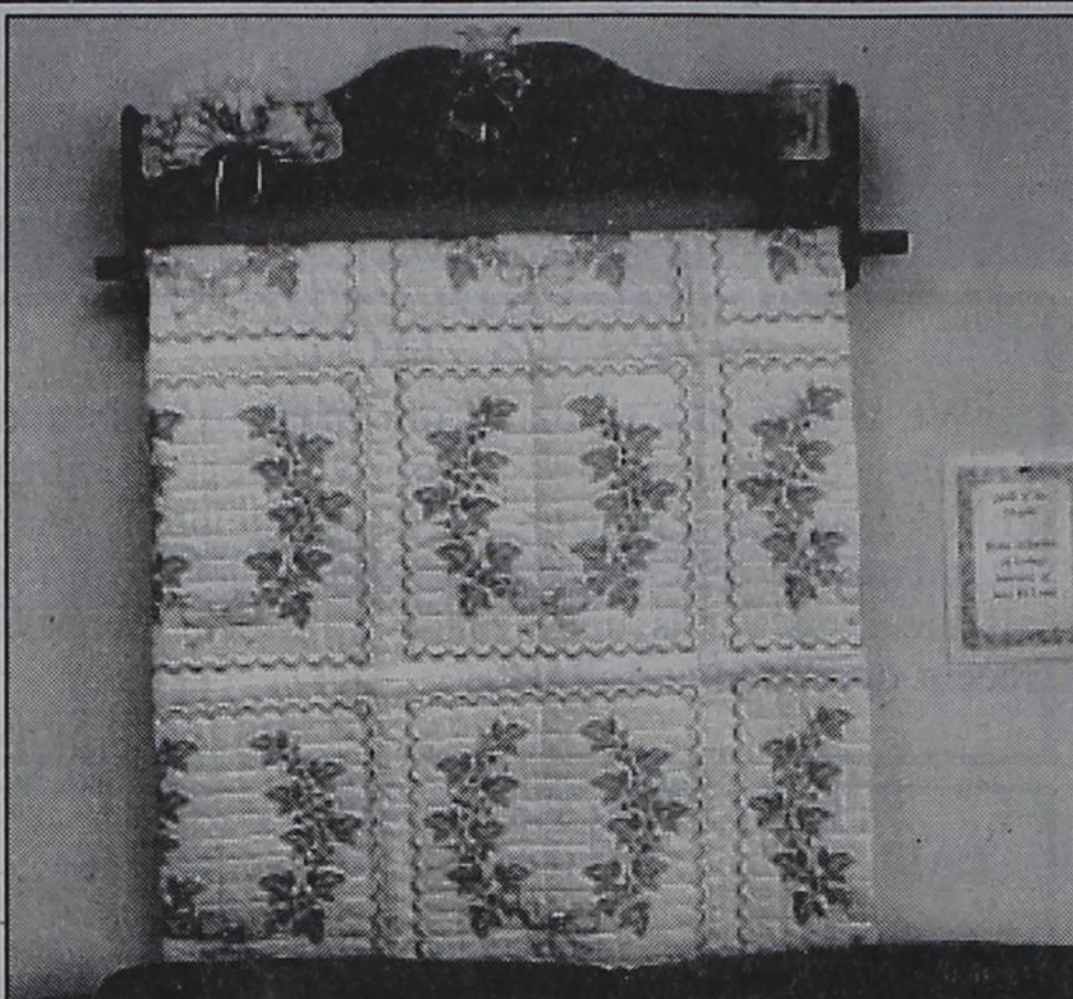
There were tables of goodies and punch, which were offered to us. They allowed us sit on the lawn and watch.

After they were finished, they would let us visitors dance around the May Pole 'til they were ready to take it down!

Those were happy times. My brother Art and I knew where to find the first pussy-willows, cow-slips, violets, wild strawberries and wild ferns. We knew what lady-slippers and Jack-in-the-Pulpit looked like, and we knew even then that they were becoming extinct, so we would never pick them—just look.

Happy, Merry Month of May—May you all have wonderful memories of your own!

## Muleshoe Dentist Is Buried Thursday

Funeral services for Charles G. Lewis, DDS, of Muleshoe, were conducted Thursday at 7 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church of Muleshoe, with Rev. Brad Reeves of Muleshoe and Rev. Richard Edwards of Midland officiating.

Dr. Lewis, 66, passed away Monday, April 30 at Covenant Medical Center in Lubbock. He was born July 26, 1934, in Abilene. He married Joan Lasiter in Austin on December 18, 1976.

Dr. Lewis was a member of the First Presbyterian Church in Clovis, N.M., and an associate member of the First United Methodist Church in Muleshoe.

He was born into a family of dentists: his father, Dr. A.E. Lewis, and three uncles, Dr. Ray Ross, Dr. Elmer Moore and Dr. B.Z. Beaty were all dentists. He grew up in Muleshoe, and graduated from Muleshoe High School in 1952.

Dr. Lewis attended Baylor University as a pre-dental student, and graduated from Baylor's College of Dentistry in 1958. He served as president of Psi Omega Dental Fraternity and was licensed to practice dentistry in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona. He also passed dentistry's national board exam.

Upon graduating from

dental school, Dr. Lewis served two years in the U.S. Army Dental Corps, stationed at Ft. Huachuca, Arizona. He went into private practice in 1960 after returning to Muleshoe.

Dr. Lewis was very active in his profession, serving on several boards, including president of the Texas Dental Assn. in 1980; was a Fellow of the Academy of General Dentistry in 1969.

He was also a Fellow, American College of Dentistry, 1974; Fellow, International College of Dentistry, 1977. He was inducted into the South Plains Dental Society's "Wall of Honor" in 1996.

He was also very active in his community, having served as president of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, 1965-66; on the board of trustees, Muleshoe Independent School District, 1967-76; and chairman of the Bailey County Hospital District, 1970-72.

Survivors include his wife, Joan of the home; two sons, Lamont Lewis of Wimberley, Texas and Jeffrey Charles Lewis of Austin; a daughter, Lashelle Wilson of San Antonio. Also surviving are three grandchildren, Maura Wilson, Colton Lewis and Colin Lewis.
