

Federal Land Bank Announces New Variable Rate on Loans

COLEMAN — Leslie Bryant, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman, received word today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced its interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8%. "This reduction affects more than 90 million dollars worth of variable rate loans to more than 2800 farmers and ranchers throughout Texas," Bryant stated.

The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969 lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. In large measure, there-

fore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in prices which the Bank must pay for the money it makes available for farm mortgage loans. Bryant pointed out that this action is in line with the Bank's policy in providing farmers and ranchers credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. On January 1 of this year, the Bank had over \$529 million in volume of loans outstanding.

The local association makes and services loans in Coleman and Callahan Counties.

BAIRD — On an instructed verdict from Judge Raleigh Brown, a 42nd District Court jury found an Abilene man not guilty of felony theft charges.

After the state's case was presented by Asst. Dist. Attorney Joe Guyton against Charles Johnson of Abilene, Judge Brown granted Defense Attorney Don Wilson's motion for an instructed verdict of not guilty, based on insufficient evidence.

Johnson and his brother, James Johnson, were charged with stealing an antique automobile from the Jack Chapman farm near Hamby in October, 1969.

The Defense Attorney pointed out that none of the states witnesses were able to identify Charles Johnson as one of the men seen towing the Model A Ford from the Chapman farm.

Baird Dump Ground To Be Locked

BAIRD — On February 15, 1971, the Baird Dump Ground will be locked and said Dump Grounds is to be for the use of the citizens of Baird only.

For citizens who have additional trash they desire to haul, it will be necessary to come to the City Hall, between the hours of 8 a. m. and 5 p. m., Monday through Friday, to obtain a key. On Saturdays and Sundays, a key can be obtained at the Municipal Power Plant.

To obtain a key, you must be a bona-fide citizen of Baird, and must be listed on the city tax rolls and a city utility user.

The purpose of locking the dump ground is to assure the citizens of Baird a place to dump trash, etc., to be disposed of, and not for people from the various parts of the county who contribute nothing to the upkeep of the facility.

Remember keys are obtainable to citizens of Baird, and it is hoped you will be interested in helping to keep the dump ground in a reasonable condition.

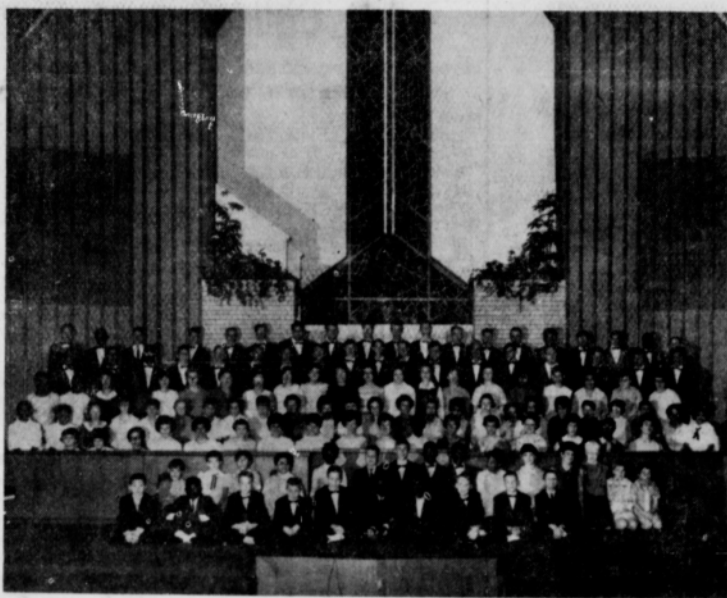
"3.76 IN '76" PROGRAM BEGUN BY TEXAS EXTENSION SERVICE

BAIRD — Cash receipts from all agricultural products in Callahan County should be more than \$6,500,000 by the end of 1976, says County Agricultural Agent Greg Gergross.

This will be an increase of 20% more than the current cash receipt total of \$5,250,000, according to projections from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This goal is part of a state-wide "3.76 in '76" program begun earlier this year by the Extension Service; and is a concentrated effort to have \$3.75 billion in cash receipts before the end of 1976. This would be one billion dollars more than the cash receipts of \$2.75 billion reported in the 1968-69 crop years, which serves as a base for the 1976 projections.

Guidelines for production and marketing of peanuts, small grain and beef cattle are available in the County Agricultural Agent's office at Baird.

The 3.76 program was announced in January, 1970 by Dr. John E. Hutchinson, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, after two months of intensive study by groups of specialists who determined long range projections on the agricultural commodity groups produced in the state. New Long-Distance Rates In Effect For Local Telephone Company

BAIRD — American Telephone & Telegraph official announce Federal Communications Commission approval of increases in some out of state long distance rates, effective January 26, at 12:01 A. M.

AT&T spokesmen explained that the increase was made necessary by operating cost rising faster than revenues, the depressed condition of the national economy, and the high interest rates charged for needed capital.

The new rates are designed to give the customer a discount by using Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) to dial his own calls. However, in communities not yet equipped for DDD, the same lower discount rate has been made available to customers on certain station-to-station calls.

To take advantage of the discount station-to-station rates, the caller must give the operator the area code and telephone number being called, have charges billed to the calling number, and require no additional operator assistance.

Discount station to station rates on out of state calls placed before 5 p. m., up to 675 miles distance, are increased between 2c and 10c for the initial 3 minute period. There is no increase in rates for discount station to station calls to dis-

tances greater than 675 miles, or on those placed after 5 p. m. and on weekends. Discount station to station rates on calls placed after 5 p. m. and to lesser distances, have been lowered by as much as 10 percent.

The interstate station to station increase is on collect and credit card calls, calls to a name and address without the number, those billed to a third number, and calls for which the operator is asked to give time and charges or notification after a specific time interval. This increase amounts to 15c for the initial 3 minute period on calls to points over 30 miles distance; and from 5c to 10c for the initial period to points less than 30 miles away.

Person to person interstate calls, at any distance, will increase between 20c and 30c for the initial 3 minute period. The charge for additional minutes will go up proportionately. Harvey Womack, local manager of West Texas Telephone Co. in Baird, and Merkel Telephone Co. in Clyde, said that because of the interconnecting nature of all telephone companies, every telephone customer will be effected by the new interstate long distance rates. He also pointed out that the increase does not apply to long distance calls which stay inside the state.

Deadline For W-2 Forms, Feb. 1st

DALLAS — The deadline for employers to give employees their 1970 W-2 forms is Monday, February 1, 1971, Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas said today.

The form should show earnings, income tax withheld and Social Security information.

A copy of the W-2 form from each employer has to be filed by the employee with his income tax return. Therefore, it is important that employers furnish W-2's to their employees by the date required to permit timely preparation and filing of employee's tax returns.

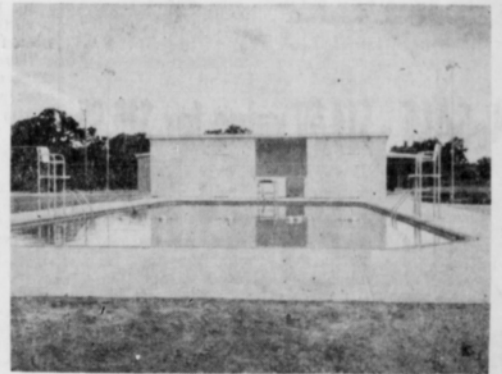
