First Baptist Sets Bristow Campaign

Mr. Snipes has been engaged in an international ministry of music evangelism since 1959. He is recognized by pastors and evangelists as one of today's most gifted crusade music directors. Choirs under his direction use many of his own arrangements.

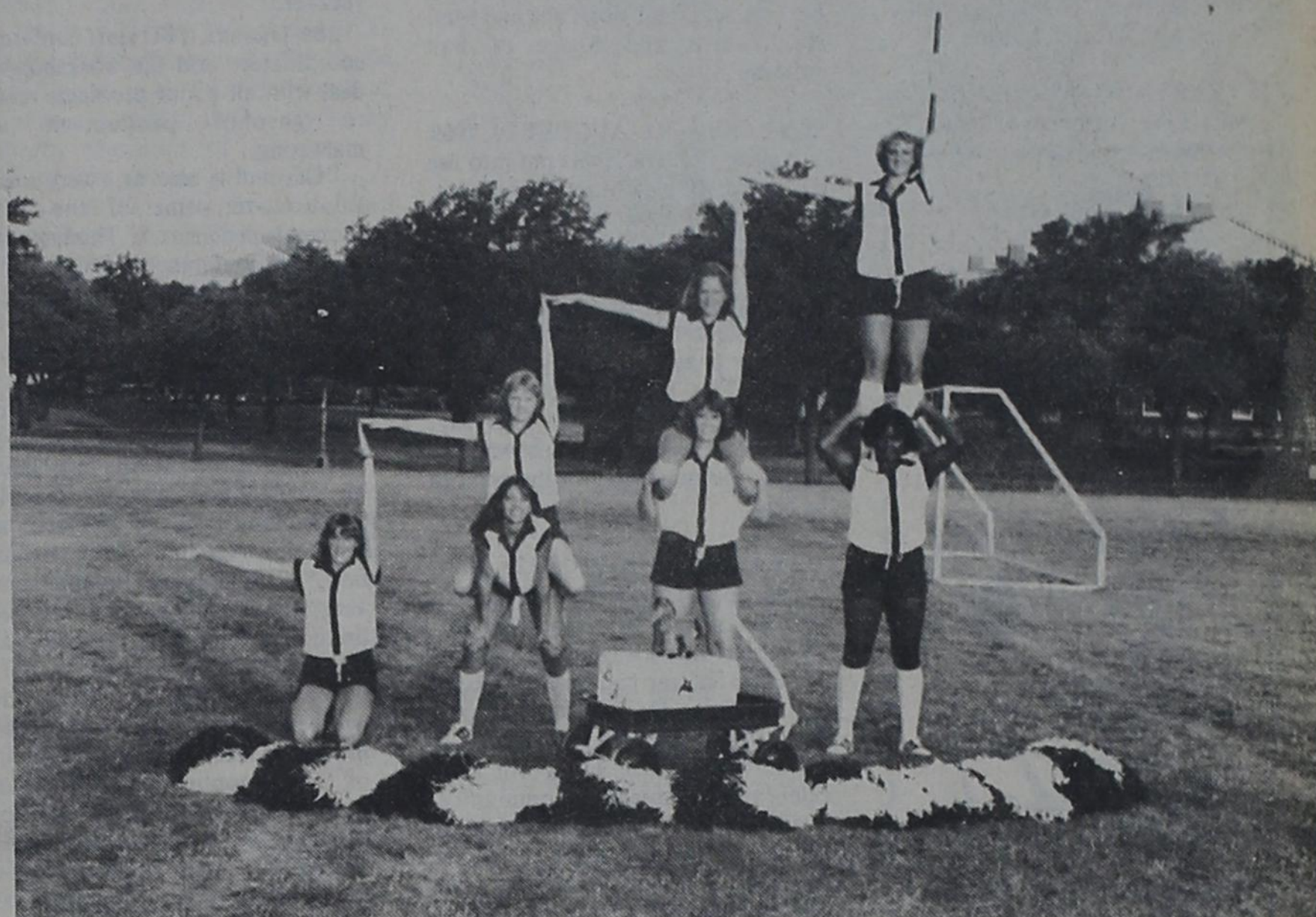


WAYNE BRISTOW

Playday Set For Saturday

The Bovina Roping Club will sponsor a Playday this Saturday, August 25. The playday will feature seven events with four age groups in all but one of the events.

Buckles will be awarded for first place in each age group in each event. The buckles are made possible by a donation from Crop Care Inc. of Bovina and Friona. The entry fee for each event is \$3.00.

School Starts September 3

Summer is drawing to a close rapidly for school children in the Bovina Independent School District. The first day of school will be on Monday, September 3.

Teachers of Bovina ISD will report Monday morning, August 27 at 8:30 a.m. to begin a five day in-service schedule prior to the beginning of school September 3. The in-service schedule will begin with a general faculty meeting, after which, the teachers will meet with their respective building principal to go over a detailed schedule for the in-service week.

Friday, August 31 has been scheduled as registration day for students. Grades 9-12 should report

to the school auditorium at 9 a.m. Grades 7-8 should report to the auditorium at 10:30 a.m. Grades K-6 do not need to register until September 3 unless they did not attend Bovina schools last year. Any students who are new to the system should report to the respective building principal to pre-register. This includes all students K-12.

Parents are urged to check the immunization requirements as printed elsewhere in this edition. These requirements must be met before students will be accepted by the Bovina Schools.

The Bovina Cafeterias will begin normal operation Monday, September 3. Increased food prices have forced an increase in lunch prices for 1979-80 as follows: 75 cents for kindergarten through sixth grade, 85 cents for grades seven through 12. Teachers' lunches will be \$1.00 each, and other adults will be charged \$1.50.

Bovina Schools will make available the breakfast program for the 1979-80 school year. The breakfast price has been set at 50¢. This program probably will not be kicked off until the second week of school to give faculty and administration an opportunity to work out the final details.

The Bovina Booster Club will hold their first meeting of the 1979-80 year this coming Monday, August 27 at the High School, according to Booster Club president, Don Murphy.

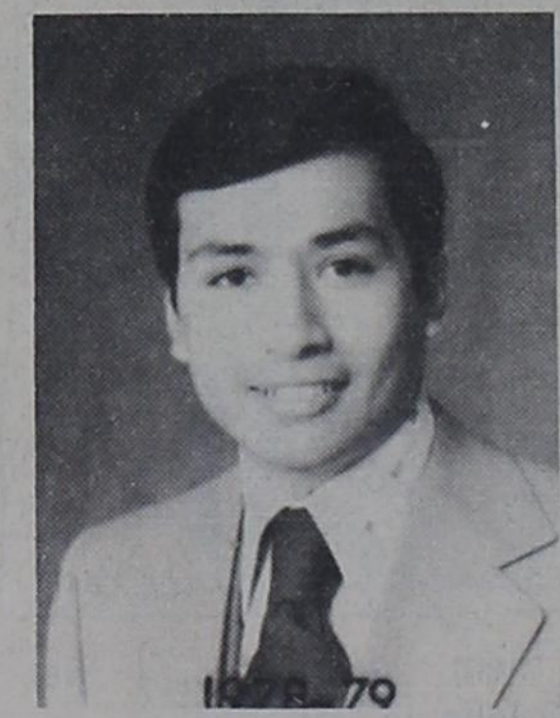
The meeting will begin at 8 p.m.

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Gasohol Workshop Sept. 6 In Lubbock

A statewide workshop on "Gasohol Know-how" will take place in the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center September 6 under co-sponsorship of the Texas Farmers Union (TFU) and the Texas Tech Center for Energy Research.

State Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale, whose support of gasohol production has earned him the name "Mr. Gasohol," will be the keynote speaker.

Jon Thomas, TFU staff conference coordinator, said the workshop will deal with all major problems related to gasohol production and marketing.

"Gasohol is seen as a very logical solution to some of the Texas farmers' problems," Thomas said, "and this conference is designed to be a gathering point for information on gasohol."

Rotating sessions are planned so that farmers who want to enter the field of gasohol production can attend all four technical meetings. The sessions will provide information on "Technology of Gasohol Production," "Legal Aspects and Financial Assistance for Production," "Equipment Procurement," and "Mixture and Uses of Gasohol," including blending, storage and marketing.

For the technology session there will be a slide lecture on methods of producing alcohol fuels, a description of solar applications to ethanol production, model glass and solar stills. Cindy Domenico, coordinator for alcohol fuels for the National Farmers Union, will participate. Director Victor Ray of NFU Field Services will give a Declaration of Independence for Farmers.

Speakers for the session on legal aspects, including the steps necessary for obtaining federal and state permits, will be representatives of the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms and the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission. Speaking on financial assistance will be representatives of the Economic Development Administration and other interested federal agencies.

Equipment producers of both large and small units and producers of the chemical materials necessary for gasohol production will speak and answer questions at the equipment

procurement session. Federal energy experts also are expected to participate.

For the session on mixture and uses of gasohol, one of the speakers will be Don Graham, manager of the Sunray Co-op, the first place in Texas where gasohol was sold. Texas Tech Chemical Engineering Prof. Steven R. Beck will discuss application of gasohol to diesel engines.

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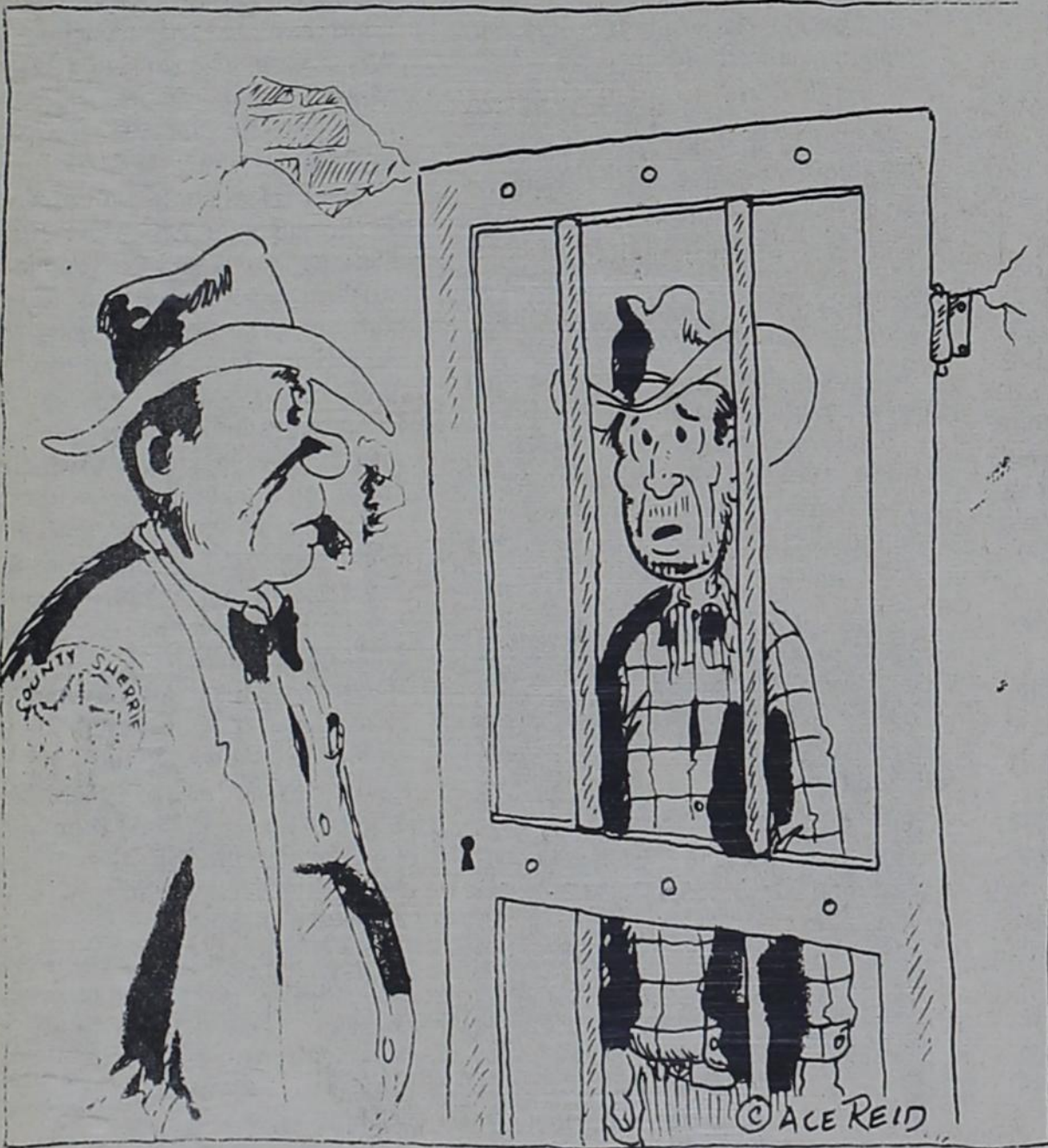

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Election Underway

Four directors will be elected to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board in an election which is currently underway. Ballots are being mailed to grain sorghum producers throughout the 29-county TGSPB area of the Texas High Plains.

Every two years, the terms of four members of the Board expire. Current members of the Board who have chosen not to seek reelection are: A.W. "Dub" Anthony, Jr. of Friona; E.C. Witten, Edmonson; and Don Nelson of Tulia.

The producers whose names have been placed in nomination are: Dennis Anthony, Friona; Olan "Jack" Crowl, Morse, Texas; John Gilbreath, Hart; Steve Lee, Hale Center; and Albert Scheele, Lockney. John Gilbreath is the only incumbent candidate.

All grain sorghum producers within the 29-county area of the Texas High Plains (served by the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board) are eligible to vote. Any producer who does not receive a ballot through the mail may obtain one at this county agent's office.

The biennial election deadline is September 15, 1979. Any ballot that is postmarked after that date will not be valid. In addition to the five candidates listed on the ballot, a producer may also vote for any grain sorghum producer who has agreed to serve on the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, provided he write in the preferred name in the space provided for write-in candidates.

TGSPB chairman, Larry Witten of Olton, encourages all grain sorghum farmers to exercise their right in this election by marking their ballots and returning them to the TGSPB office as quickly as possible.

Clovis Exhibitors Sweep Top Honors In Bovina Horse Show

Exhibitors from Clovis walked away with top honors in all three halter classes during the 19th annual Bovina Roping Club Horse Show held in conjunction with Bull Town Days.

L.R. Hammonds, Jr. of Clovis won the grand champion's rosette in both the mare and gelding divisions of the show, while Malcolm Garrett of Clovis exhibited the grand champion stallion.

Hammond won the grand champion trophy in the mare division with his two-year-old that had won the 1978 mare class, "Salt Seeker." He took top honors in the gelding division with "Silver Bulldog," who also won the 1978 gelding division.

Garrett made it a sweep for the Curry County Capitol by winning grand champion stallion honors with "Mr. Ole Bar," which had earlier won first place in the 1976 stallion class.
