All the appliances in the kitchen were destroyed and a small television set that sat on a microwave oven completely melted onto the microwave. Smoke damage was sustained throughout the house causing damage to furniture and clothing.

Bovinians Honored On Super Team

Bovina was well-represented on the Amarillo Globe-News' Super Team for basketball, which was announced this past Sunday.

Two members of the Bovina Fillies, Marie Pesch and Mindy Neal, were named to the girls' area Super Team, and Marks Lanham was chosen as "Coach of the Year" for girls. The players and coaches are chosen from all classifications of schools throughout the Panhandle.

In addition, Scott Scaff, a member of the Mustangs' playoff team, was honored by the newspaper as "Freshman of the Year."

Profiles on the players and coach were compiled by Jon Mark Beilue, Steve Cowen and Jim Lexa, staff writers for the Globe-News. Here is what they had to say about Bovina's honorees:

MARIE PESCH--Only two things slowed down Miss Pesch this season: ankle and shoulder injuries. That caused the 6-0 post

to miss 12 games. Despite the injuries, there's no doubt that Miss Pesch deserves a berth on the Super Team.

Next year she will attend Texas, currently the top-ranked NCAA Division I women's team, on a basketball scholarship.

This season she helped power Bovina to a 24-5 record and wins over three state-ranked teams, including District 3-2A rival and state champion Abernathy.

"She's a physical player, very determined," Coach Marks Lanham said. "She's an exciting player. She's so strong."

Her strength helped her average 12.2 rebounds and 14.1 points in 17 games: She also grabbed 4.8 steals and dished out 4.3 assists per game, in addition to shooting 51 per cent from the floor.

MINDY NEAL--With teammate Marie Pesch sidelined early with injuries, Miss Neal, a 6-1 junior post, played in all 29 games and

Leading Citizens Feted By Chamber

The community's leading citizens were recognized at the 26th annual Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet last Thursday.

Named "Man of the Year" was Bovina High School basketball coach Marks Lanham. Tammy Willard was named "Woman of the Year." The "Teacher of the Year" award went to Brenda Wilson, and named "Outstanding Young People" were Marie Pesch and Terry Moore.

In a special presentation, Dale Gober was presented the "Conservation Farmer of the Year" award, which is presented annually by the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The program for the banquet was provided by Dean Kelley and Associates of Amarillo. Kelley sang, and the men's quartet which accompanied him presented a number of old favorite "barbershop quartet" numbers, much to the audience's delight.

Kelley also led in a number of audience-participation games, such as a special version of the sack race and the hula hoop competition.

Steve Sherrill served as Master of Ceremonies. Chamber president Bob Owen introduced out of town guests, and the officers and directors of the Chamber. He also presented the business members of the Chamber, and did the presentation of the special awards.

Lanham was born in Childress, and attended York College, Nebraska, on a basketball scholarship. It was said that from the age of seven, he aspired to be a coach.

While in college, doctors advised him to give up basketball and his

dream of coaching. But he only became more determined to achieve his goal. The past few years he has served as both the boys and girls basketball coach at Bovina High School. In the past four years, his boys teams have been in the playoffs three times and the girls made it twice, being edged out a third time.

Two different years, including this past year, Lanham has guided both the girls and boys into the playoffs. This year, the team was just a basket away from making the first trip to the state meet in history for the Bovina girls. The Fillies beat three state-ranked teams during the season.

Lanham met his wife Cathy while in college and they were married in 1977. The couple has two sons. In Cathy's words, Marks is "The Kid that's never grown up," and still likes to play ball with the boys.

Mrs. Willard is a lifelong resident of the Bovina area, attending schools here 12 years. She was active in athletics, was a cheerleader, student council member, drum major, basketball and football queen, FFA and FHA Sweetheart, was named "Most Beautiful," "Friendliest" and "Miss BHS."

She was named "Miss Bovina" as a junior, had earlier won the Bovina Bulltown Queen honors. She went on to be named "Miss Congeniality" award at the Wheatheart of the Nation pageant.

Tammy graduated from B.H.S. in three and one-half years. She married Dennis Willard in June of 1977 and the couple has three children, including twins. They were part-owners of The Body Connection. She has taught

aerobics, and is currently taking computer classes at ENMU, coaching Little Dribblers, is a Brownie Troop Leader and serves as the Chamber secretary. She and her husband are adult leaders in the Youth for Christ organization.

Brenda Wilson began teaching in the Bovina school system during the 1975-76 school year. "She is a very dedicated teacher and has a strong desire to make the lives of the young people she teaches better," Owen said in making the presentation.

Mrs. Wilson is a very active member of the First United Methodist Church. She teaches English I and II, Advanced Reading and Introduction to Radio and Television Communications.

Marie Pesch has been active in high school in the FFA, FHA, band, athletics and the National Honor Society. In her own "autobiography," Marie said, "I would not have accomplished all that I have, if it were not for the support from the people of Bovina."

Moore, like Miss Pesch, a senior at Bovina High School, has been very active in his four years at B.H.S., especially in the areas of FFA and athletics. From his "autobiography," Moore said, "I feel that my life has been quite prosperous and I hope, for my future, to continue to do this well."

Each of the award recipients was given an attractive plaque, fashioned in the shape of the state of Texas, in honor of the state's Sesquicentennial.

Giving the invocation at the banquet was Richard Fox. Rev. Clark Williams gave the benediction.

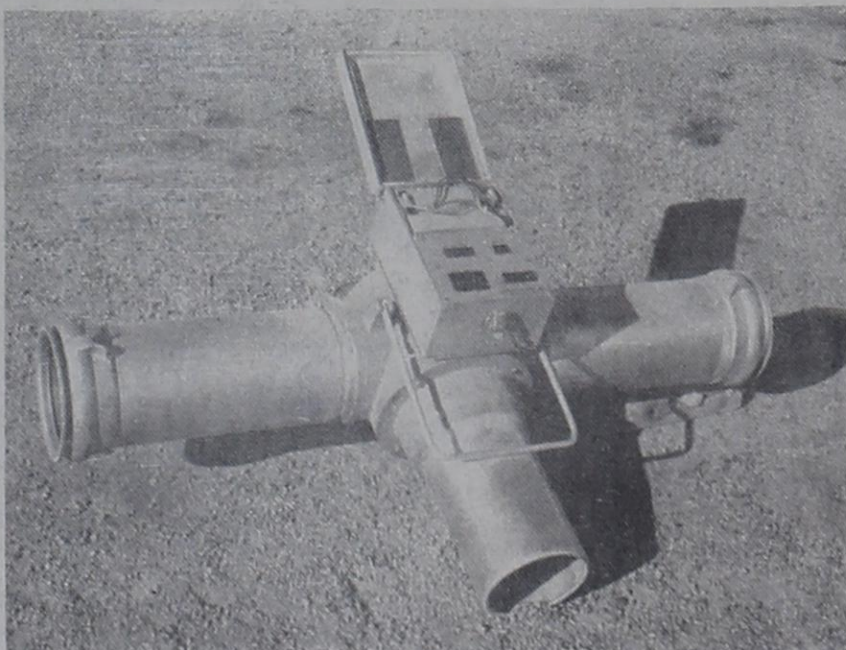

Fillies Have Good Marks In Track

Led by their one-two punch of Marie Pesch and Mindy Neal, the Bovina Fillies scored 52 points, good for fourth place in a talent-laden track meet at Abernathy last Saturday.

Miss Pesch won the shot put with a throw of 37-6, and the 100-meter hurdles with a 16.28 effort. She also placed second in the discus throw with a 111-5 toss, losing by just eight inches to a girl from Lorenzo.

Miss Neal, although coming up with her personal best in the high jump and improving her distances in both the long and triple jumps, had to settle for three second places, and scored the team's other 24 points.

Mindy cleared 5-2 in the high jump, which would have won any other track meet last Saturday, except for the fact that Friona's Ronda Ratcliff cleared 5-4, one of the top jumps in the area this spring, to win the event.

Miss Neal had a 33-11 in the triple jump, but was edged by Pope of Abernathy in 34-5. Mindy jumped 16-7 in the long jump, but Morton's Lynch logged a leap of 17-4.

Bovina's point total was hurt by the fact that Terisa Shepherd had injured a knee while jumping in the

Bovina meet, and re-injured it while playing basketball in the gym last week.

Terisa was held out of the Abernathy meet. She had earlier beaten the Olton girl who won the 100-meter dash on Saturday. Her absence in the 400-meter and 800-meter relay races also affected those teams, which had scored points the previous week.

The team has the weekend off this week, being Easter weekend, and Coach Marks Lanham hopes that Terisa will be back at full strength by the district meet. He thinks she will be able to run in the team's next outing at Dimmitt April 5.

For the Mustangs, Rey Duran was a winner in the 1600-meter (mile) run, after performing a picture-perfect race in 4:58.19.

Duran also placed fifth in the 800-meter run, to account for all of Bovina's points in the meet.

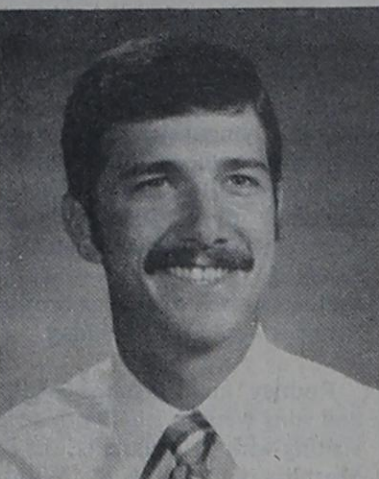

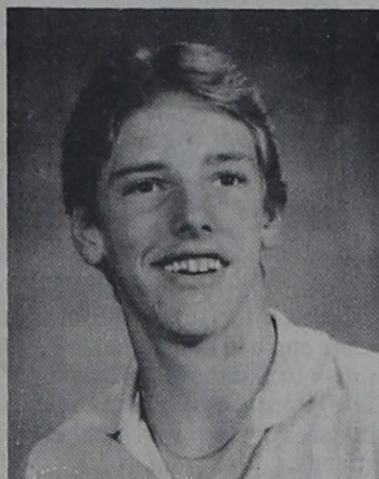

averaged 17.5 points and 9.7 rebounds per game. She also had 2.7 assists and 2.5 steals per game.

Miss Neal shot 72 per cent from the line and 50 per cent from the field. Her statistics are solid, especially on a 24-5 team that ended its season with a playoff loss to eventual state-champ Abernathy.

Miss Neal carried the ball club early in the year until Miss Pesch returned, when they formed one of the most potent post combinations in the Panhandle.

"I think it (Miss Pesch's injuries) made Mindy a better ball player," Coach Marks Lanham said. "She had to take on some responsibilities that she wasn't used to. In the first couple of games, we sort of played slow and stuff until Mindy realized that she was going to have to do it."

MARKS LANHAM--Lanham guided the Fillies to a 24-5 record and a berth in the Region 1-2A title game, in which they lost to eventual state champ-Abernathy by two points.

"We had to play three quarters of near-perfect basketball to beat them," Abernathy coach Pat Mouser said. Bovina beat three Class 2A-ranked teams in this season: District 3-2A opponent Abernathy in the regular season, number 4-ranked Morton in the playoffs and number 9-ranked Stratford, also in the playoffs.

Bovina earned the number one playoff seed from District 3-2A, regarded by many coaches as the toughest district in Class 2A. Hale Center finished 20-9 overall, took third in 3-2A and was the lone district team to beat Bovina in the regular season.

The year before, Bovina was 23-4 and missed the playoffs, finishing third in 3-2A. This year the non-district schedule was beefed up. "Again, it was the talent that has come along," Lanham said. "I had a lot of talent."

SCOTT SCAFF--The 6-3

forward/post averaged 15.4 points, 10.1 rebounds and 5 assists per game in helping the Mustangs to an 18-11 record and a District 3-2A runner-up finish. Scaff's play on the court made him a relatively easy pick for Freshman of the Year honors.

"There were some people who were watching one night and they wanted to know who he (Scaff) was," Coach Marks Lanham said. "I said that's (senior Blake) Scaff's little brother. They said 'What do you mean little brother?' I said 'He's just a freshman,' and they couldn't believe it."

Scott Scaff twice reached the "triple double," double figures in scoring, rebounding and assists. He shot 55 per cent from the floor and 62 per cent from the line. "He's just an amazing player for a freshman," Lanham said.

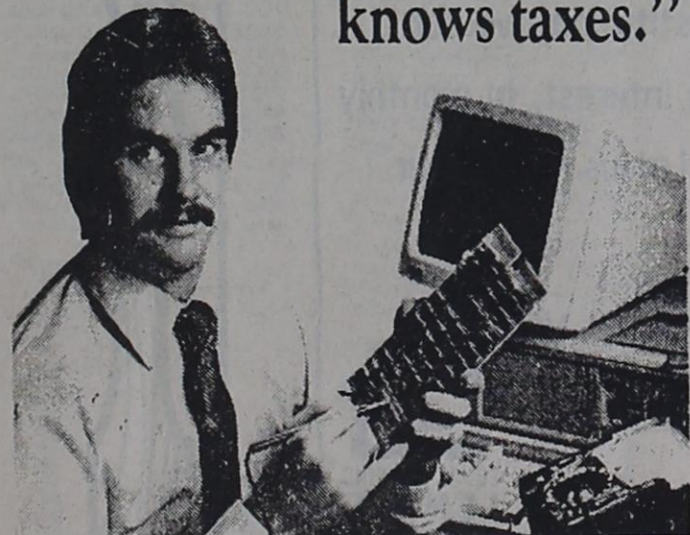

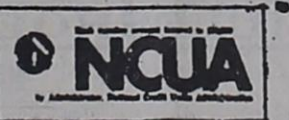

Sesquicentennial Notes

Bovina--Our Home Town

The following history of our home town was researched by the Public Works Administration and composed by Mrs. Minnie Aldridge. This information was taken from the county history book, *Prairie Progress*.

"As its name implies, the oldest town in Parmer County, Bovina, was a cow town and at one time attained the distinction of being the largest shipping point of cattle in the world. It got its name from the Latin "bos," meaning ox or cow.

Today it clings close to the Santa Fe Railroad, a small modest village, slightly noticed by the way many tourists who go hurrying through it on their way to places of more note. It is not incorporated.

About one hundred years ago, Bovina was started on its career with about a dozen souls, a general store, livery barn and barber shop and section house where boarders were accommodated with meals. Rooms were not a necessity then, for beds were carried as a matter of course. Wagons came in from the far distant ranches for groceries and the town lay for the most part silent and inactive until a drove was sighted coming in for shipment to market. Then everything came alive cowboys rode here and there, cattle bawled and rushed for the tanks of water, the old stock pens--still standing--were pushed to capacity to hold the huge droves, sometimes from many different ranches.

This condition existed until settlers began coming in about 1905, settlers from the developed east with slight idea of farming in the semi-arid country. Bovina received them all, looked curiously at them, wondering what they came for with farm horses, farm tools and the farmer's instincts. To them this was a cattle country and nothing else. Grass, short and succulent grew, but no plow had broken the soil and to the ranch owner or cowboy, it was a sacrilege to take from the cattle the native grass and give to them only a promise of grain to be grown.

Immigrant cars were unloaded and hopeful, but doubtful families moved out of Bovina across the unbroken prairie to their sections, half or quarter to build their homes.

The tale of loneliness, hope deferred, hot winds and lack of rain on these distant farms soon broke the spirit of most of these pioneers who had lived too long in comfort and plenty. This one went "back" and then another one followed, all passing through Bovina and Bovina looked on and smiled, thinking that soon all would get enough and leave them

in peaceable possession, but they reasoned without their host, for among these immigrants were a few with the pioneer spirit who saw a future in farming this land that needed only moisture to make it productive and set about finding ways to conserve moisture and those stayed.

Most of these families were young people with small children and at first schools were not needed, but as the needs for schools came, parts of the families moved to Bovina where the one teacher school existed and children began to be educated in their new home.

Bovina, always hospitable, received them treated them well and went on growing and introducing new forms of business. A bank opened, another boarding house, residences were built and then a new school building was demanded for the expanding scholastics.

Other families came to take the place of those who had left and gradually the country around Bovina became settled, not thickly, but a few years had dotted the prairie with fences, homes, windmills and every year added a new family or two to Bovina.

This is an outline, the bare facts about Bovina, the little town on the Santa Fe Railroad, but the story of the kindness, generosity, the goodness of the old timers of Bovina can never be told for it lives in the hearts of those who partook of it. The wind may carry it to distant parts and wherever lives anyone who at one time dwelt in Bovina lives love for Bovina.

A few of those old timers still live there, but most of the dwellers are newcomers who have moved into a growing town to go into business there.

Bovina's spirit will live as long as any descendants of any pioneer who knew it lives."

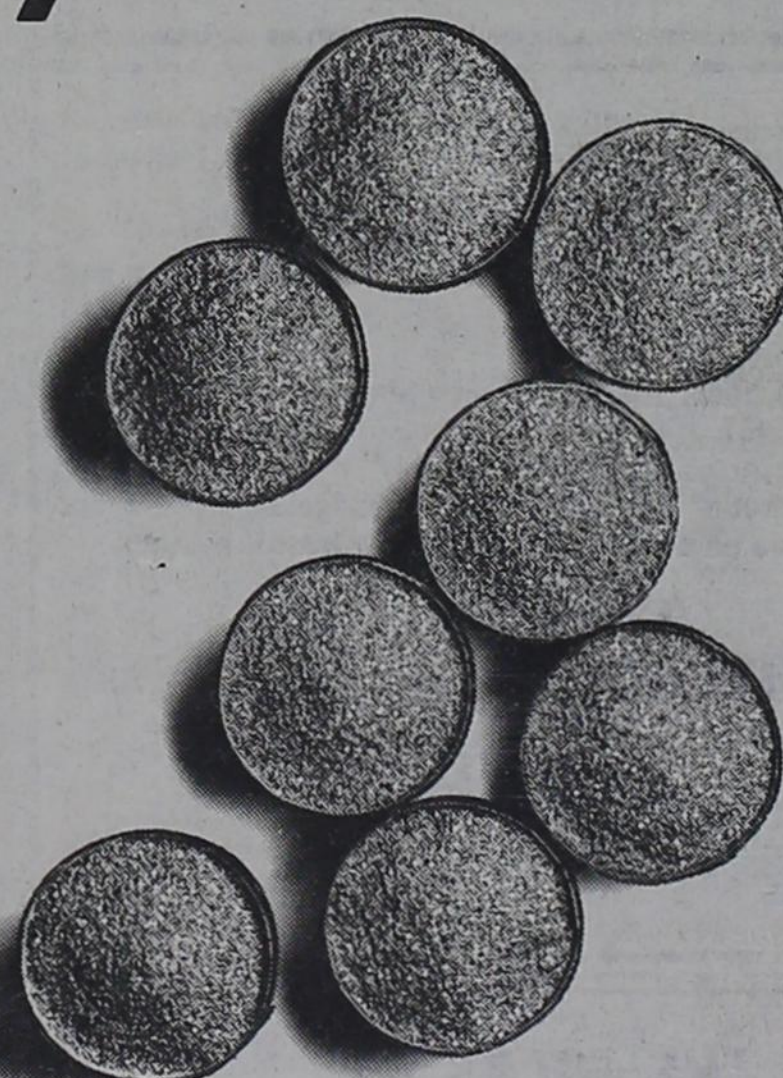

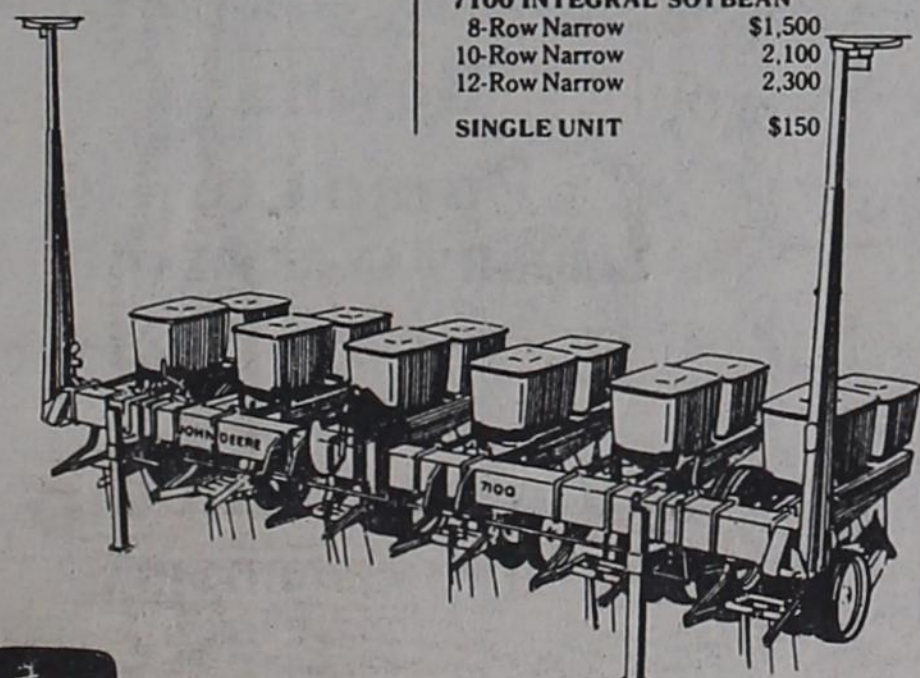

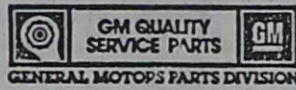
