

# **SATURDAY NIGHT Officers Seek Suspect For Murder Charge**

For the second weekend in a row, Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan was called to investigate an apparent murder, after a 25-year-old Muleshoe woman was found dead of a gunshot wound six miles west of Bovina.

The sheriff's office was notified at 1:10 a.m. Sunday morning by a motorist of trouble. The officers found Christy Sotelo, 25, dead at the scene. Miss Sotelo had been shot in the chest.

Tonya Parkinson, 22, also of Muleshoe, was taken to Clovis High Plains Hospital by Bovina Ambulance after sustaining a gunshot wound to the back. Miss Parkinson was listed in good condition on Monday.

Sheriff's officers were searching for a 22-year-old Spanish male in connection with the shootings, as well as the kidnapping of her 17-year-old sister at gunpoint.

Morgan said that the suspect met another girl, Ida Sotela, 17, when she got off work at the Allsup's store in Farwell at midnight Saturday. That was the beginning of

sheriff's department, reportedly left the Allsup's store with Ida Sotela in her vehicle. The other two young women were in another vehicle. They allegedly drove to a point west of Bovina, where one of the vehicles became stuck on a county dirt road. This resulted in the four people being in one vehicle.

The details that follow have not been worked out as yet, but the two women ended up being shot, and a passing motorist was flagged down by one of the women. Morgan said the motorist stopped at the nearest

farmhouse and called the sheriff's office, reporting the potential trouble.

The suspect allegedly left with the 17-year-old, Ida Sotela, in a vehicle belonging to another sister, Rosa Vital, also of Muleshoe.

Morgan said it appeared that a .38 calibre revolver was the weapon used in the shooting.

Justice of the Peace Frances Euler of Friona was called to the scene, and pronounced Christy Sotelo dead at the scene.

The previous Sunday in Farwell, law officers investigated the murder of Carl William Moore II, 26. Frederick Albert Cantrell, 63, of Farwell, was charged with the murder, after turning himself in at the sheriff's office and admitting the shooting.

The Farwell murder had been the first homicide case in Parmer County in about five and one-half years.

If you're counting on canning some of the extra produce from your garden this summer, plan now to do it the safe way.

Some canning methods, equipment and procedures are not safe and can result in food spoilage and even serious illness or death.

Canning in a microwave oven, for example, is dangerous. Microwave ovens do not allow even heat penetration in the closed canning jar and the metal lids interfere with heat distribution. The use of metals in a microwave can also damage the oven's magnatron tube, requiring costly repairs.

Canning in a conventional oven is not advisable, because oven temperatures vary as the heat goes off and comes on again. The dry heat may not penetrate the food thoroughly either.

Trying to can in a conventional oven is also a safety hazard. Pressure can build up in jars causing them to explode, or jars may break as drafts of cooler air hit them when the oven door is open.

The "open kettle" canning method which was popular years ago, may not kill spoilage organisms.

In the open kettle method, foods are simply heated and put into sterile jars. Spoilage organisms can enter the jar when the food is transferred from kettle to jar. Also, the initial heat treament may not be sufficient to destroy spoilage organisms and even if the jar seals, it may be only temporary.




