Official Memorandum

Greetings:

Special observance of increased emphasis on our education system has been marked annually for fourteen years by a Public Schools Week in Texas.

During this period, parents are encouraged to visit the public schools, and all citizens are urged through special programs to recognize the tremendous importance of our system of education. Our goal is to make Texas public schools the finest in the Nation, and to achieve this our citizens are urged to take an active interest in the school systems and to cooperate with their school boards, superintendents, principals and teachers.

Never before in our history has there been a greater need for educated leadership. As we rush to train young people in science and technology to keep pace with world events, it is also important to remember that our public schools will furnish our leaders tomorrow with the basic human, moral and spiritual foundations necessary for more advanced training and knowledge.

Therefore I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the period of March 2-6, 1964, as
PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK
in Texas.

Greenbelt Dam

The largest contract ever made by the City of Hedley and probably the largest that will ever be made was signed last Friday. That was the contract between the city and the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority. Other towns in the Authority also signed similar contracts.

Mayor Ed Boliver signed the contract, City Sec. M. O. Weatherly attested and affixed the seal of the city, and the aldermen were present at the signing. Mayor Boliver presented the pen to Clifford Johnson, who has worked diligently on the project for over 15 years.

The contracts will become a reality if the State Water Commission and the State Water Development Board act in our favor this week. Dr. S. H. Townsend of Childress, president of the Authority, still says there will be water in six months after the contracts are signed.

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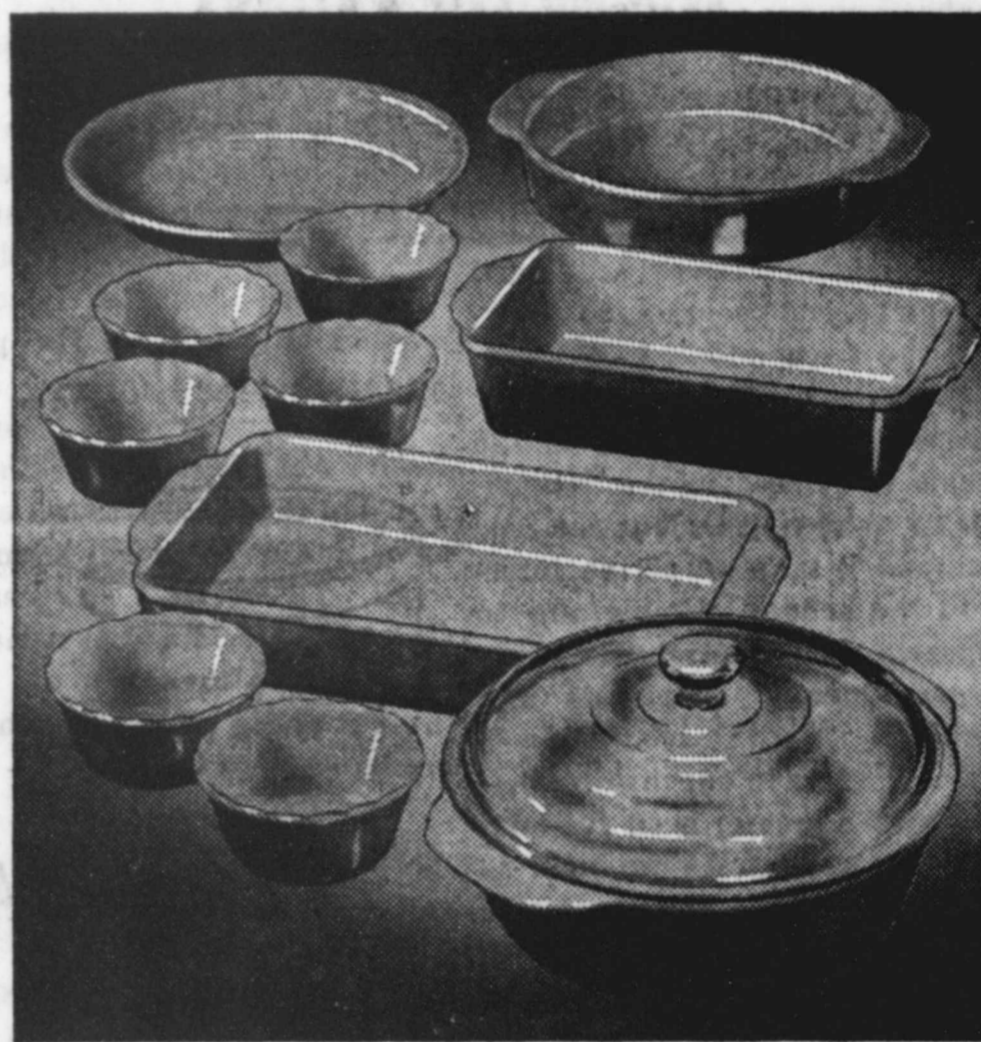

tion

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

ACP News

We are getting well under way in the 1964 ACP Program; to date we have had a total of 113 applications filed for cost-share assistance. These total \$20,041 82 obligated. Our operating budget for 1964 is \$57,895 00. These practices include deep plowing, terracing, stockwater dams, applying cotton burs, permanent grass, and sod waterways. In view of the fact the deep plowing practice is the most used at this particular time we would like to call the following facts to your attention. This practice is not eligible for cost-share assistance on any acreage not suitable for cultivation or where there is adequate cover on the land to control wind erosion; or on land on which this practice was carried out in 1959 or a subsequent year. The statement 'or where there is adequate cover on the land to control wind erosion' disqualifies any land that has recently expired from the conservation reserve and has never been broken out or any land where cotton burs have been applied or any land where there is a good stand of seeded grass, wheat, rye, barley or any fall crop. We will be glad to talk with you any time about your conservation problem and help you in any way that we can. Remember your future business depends on how well you use your soil today

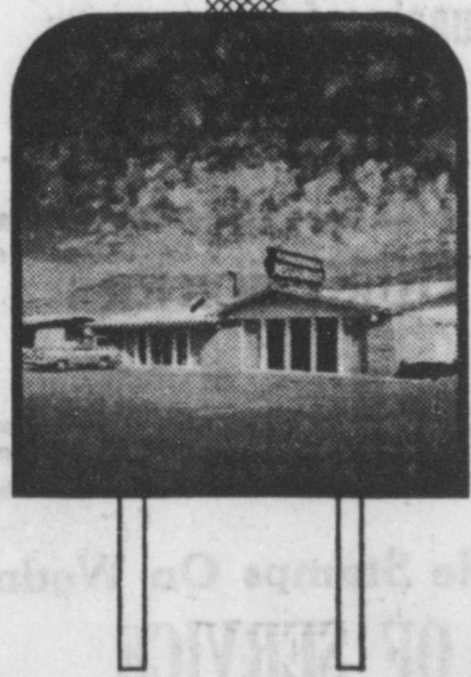
WTU is proud to be a part of your community

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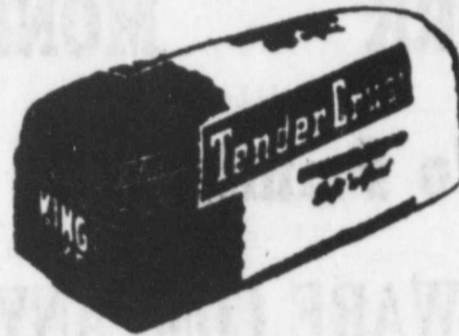
