Greenbelt Dam

Bids are now being accepted on the pipe line from Lake Creek to Quanah. Bids will be opened at 10 a. m. Sept. 3rd at Childress and the contract granted.

The contract calls for a 24 inch line from Lake Creek into Hedley, a 21 inch line from Hedley to Childress and an 18 inch line from Childress to Quanah. It calls for steel pipe covered with concrete. The minimum wage scale on this contract will be \$1.25 per hour. It is estimated the contract will run nearly four million dollars.

Probably the next contracts open for bids will be for the erection of the one million gallon storage tank in the southeast part of Hedley, the temporary dam or excavation or whatever means is necessary to procure water from Lake Creek, and the pipe line from Quanah to Crowell. This will be a 14 inch line from Quanah to Lake Pauline and a 12 inch line from Lake Pauline to Crowell.

There will be some delay on building the reservoir on Salt Fork of Red River north of Highway 70 but it is hoped work on it can be started shortly after Jan. 1st. This contract will call for the erection of a 110 foot dam and 90 foot spillway.

As soon as the dam is completed on this project and a dependable water supply is obtained a second dam is scheduled to be started. This will be on Lake Creek for a 90 foot dam with a 70 foot spillway.

Boys Ranch Rodeo

The 325 boys at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch began practice this week for the biggest Labor Day event of the Texas Panhandle—the annual Boys Ranch Rodeo that will be held Sunday, September 6th, and Monday, September 7th, at 2:30 in the afternoons.

This will be the 20th year for the famed rodeo that began in 1944 with only 65 boys who were being cared for at that time. More than 7000 people are expected to be at the Ranch this year to watch a record number of contestants, and if they wish, enjoy a barbeque lunch before the performances.

Indications are the 1964 rodeo will be the most competitive, fastest, and thrilling the boys have ever put on. Almost 100 boys will be riding Brahma bulls bucking broncs, and other professional rodeo animals under R. C. A rules. The two performances do not permit all of the boys to ride who would like to, but everyone, including the Ranch's adult staff, will participate.

Boys who do not ride the bucking stock will appear in special feature acts, work the chutes, operate concessions, usher, and work at the many activities necessary for a successful rodeo production.

An added feature of the rodeo will be the sale of king size barbeque sandwiches with the trimmings that will be sold by the boys. The Ranch picnic area will provide a good lunch site for those wishing to enjoy a picnic near the rodeo arena.

Proceeds from the rodeo will be used for the expansion of the Ranch.

PUBLIC NOTICE
 Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT
 PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.
 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.
 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:
 "(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district; (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."
 Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
 "FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."
 Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. ●

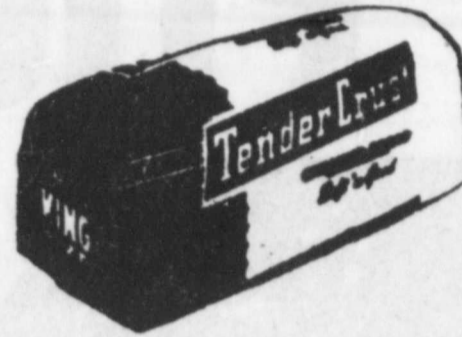
