County Included In Government Grants

WASHINGTON — Congressman Omar Burleson today announced approval of a \$119,250 Administration, General Community Programming, Emergency Food and Medical Services grant to the Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., which serves Callahan, Coleman, Concho, McCulloch and Runnels Counties.

The grant, effective April 1, 1972, will run for a 12-month period, to provide for the administration and management of the Community Action Agency. It will also provide 7 neighborhood Centers as focal points for services. Among these services are job placement, pre-vocational and vocational training classes, organizing youth councils and other community activities such as housing and emergency food and medical services.

REAGAN BROWN, TO SPEAK AT '72 BAIRD CofC BANQUET

BAIRD — Reagan V. Brown is one of Texas' most popular speakers. Brown's sparkling style and down to earth philosophy has made him a favorite speaker at many state and national meetings.

He holds three degrees from Texas A&M University and has studied at Cornell, Colorado State and Utah State Universities. In addition he has completed the American Association of Land Grant Colleges and State Universities Communications Training Program held at Michigan State University, Sales

and Business Management Course conducted by the International Harvester Company, and the National Education Association's Laboratory for Group Development. He is a professional sociologist with the Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, and is a recognized authority on community development and human relations.

He is a member of the graduate faculty at Colorado State University, and his summer class "Human Behavior," has attracted students from every section of America and many foreign countries.

He is responsible for the Texas Community Improvement Program sponsored by the electric utility companies and conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Working with local county agents and home demonstration agents, Brown has helped more than a thousand communities in programs designed to make the communities more beautiful, more prosperous, and a better place to live. He is often called "Mr. Community Improvement."

He has served as county agent in three Texas counties. He is past president of the Terrell Chamber of Commerce, Kaufman Lions Club, and the Lockhart Businessmen's Club.

He is a veteran of the 69th Infantry Division was wounded in the Battle of the Bulge, and was discharged with the rank of captain.

Brown is the recipient of the Association of Former Students of Texas A&M's Distinguished Service award and the Agriculture Extension Service's Superior Service Award.

Brown was selected as the Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture, 1968, by the Progressive Farmer magazine. He is also the winner of the Distinguished Service award of the National FFA, 1971, and is listed in Who's Who in the South and Southwest.

Equally at home in academic circles or at rural community meetings, he has received standing ovations on college campuses, sales meetings, conventions, and hundreds of community get-togethers.

Brown is a community builder, ambassador for Texas, Sunday School teacher, father, Aggie, and a champion for the development of a prosperous agriculture, and the acceleration of the industrialization of our state.

Continental Telephone Agrees To Acquire Tidewater Telephone

CHANTILLY, VA. — Tidewater Telephone Co. and Continental Telephone Corp., owners of West Texas Telephone Co. of Baird, have announced an agreement in principle on terms of a proposed acquisition of Tidewater by Continental. Tidewater serves approximately 41,000 telephones in the eastern part of Virginia immediately adjacent to 50,000 telephones operated by Continental's Commonwealth Telephone subsidiary.

In the proposed acquisition, each outstanding share of Tidewater will be exchanged for the greater of (a) \$1.8 shares of Continental common stock or (b) \$40 in market value of Continental common stock based on the average closing sales price for Continental common stock for the five business days ending five days before the Tidewater stockholders' meeting call to consider the proposed acquisition. Continental and

Tidewater, however, have each reserved the right to terminate the transaction in the event the market value of Continental's common stock, determined as provided in the preceding sentence, shall be less than \$19 per share. Tidewater's 7% convertible subordinated debentures will become obligations of the acquiring corporation and become convertible into that number of shares of Continental common stock that the debenture holder would be entitled to receive if he converted his debentures into Tidewater common stock immediately before the acquisition.

There are a total of 732,602 shares of Tidewater common stock, of which 128,534 are reserved for issue in connection with the convertible debentures. Assuming full conversion, they would be exchanged for 1,318,684 shares of Continental common.

The acquisition is subject to execution of a definitive agreement, approval of the proposed acquisition by the stockholders of Tidewater, receipt of a favorable tax ruling and certain necessary regulatory and third party approvals.

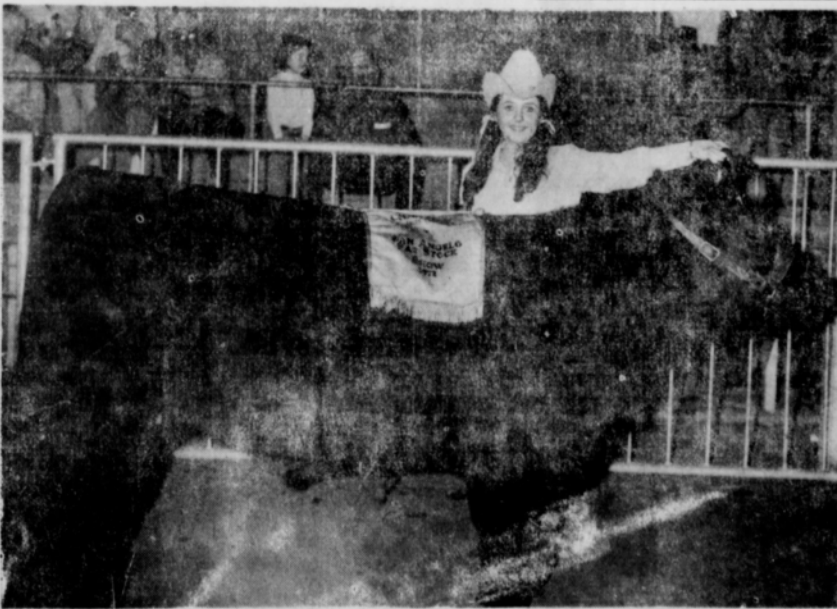
Elizabeth reports that Arts Pride has been the best natured
