Ralph Yarborough has joined the race for the Senate. After pondering for the past several months whether to seek the governor's chair or return to the Senate, Yarborough made his announcement for the Washington position last week.

His decision was really no surprise to his supporters. While he had had an ambition to be governor of the great State of Texas, he feels, no doubt, that he can do more good for more people in the Senate Chamber of the United States government.

With 13 years experience as a U. S. Senator, he has an advantage there, too.

The primary obstacle in Yarborough's path to returning to the Senate is the incumbent, John Tower, who is the darling of all Texas Republicans, He's held the position since Lyndon Johnson gave it up to become vice president.

It's true that Yarborough has opposition in the Democratic primary, scheduled for May, and it's possible that he won't win it. However, it's our opinion that his qualifications, popularity and ability to campaign will give him the Demo nomination.

After that, it looks from here like a different ballgame. However, a Democrat, and especially Yarborough, should have the advantage over a Republican, even an incumbent Republican, in the November election. The outcome of the senator-

al election will, in all probability, be tied in somewhat with the presidential election. Texas may go for Nixon --- it's much too early to tell. But evenso, a Democratic senatorial candidate would have the advantage over a Republican candidate in a state that still, fortunately, prides itself on voting Democratic. In spite of the fact that Yarborough has never enjoyed the backing of the metropolitan press in Texas----and that's an understatement ---- advocates of good, honest government find little to disagree with him about. He has been accused of being "liberal" and "prolabor."

"With the new increase in capitalization, the bank will be able to increase its loans to individuals and firms. This will help to promote a growing economy for the community," Kassahn said as he expressed appreciation to the bank's customers on behalf of the directors, officers and employees.

Water, Inc., is a membership-supported non-profit entity concerning itself with finding solutions to the long-range water supply problems of West Texas, Eastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle. Its uniqueness stems from the amalgamation of all economic interests, banded together in a common cause. It is concerned with the future water needs of all, agriculture, municipalities and industry. Water, Inc., was formally organized May 24, 1967 at a meeting in Lubbock. The organization was the result of concerted effort of the 12 incorporators who had chartered the non-profit corporation the week previously. Both the charter and the organization's by-laws set out its goals, principal among them the importation of supplemental water from northeast Texas and from cutof-state sources, the creation of public interest in and development of public support for water resources development and conservation projects, and to promote, conduct, and participate in studies, surveys, and research programs for the importation, distribution, reclamation, re-use, utilization, and the storage of water and to make such programs available to the public. Water, Inc., officials are aware that its aims include all sources of supplemental water, however, emphasis has been on import of water from the Mississippi River, principally because development of the Texas Water Plan was reaching full stride during Water, Inc.'s brief history. The organization was instrumental in seeing that West Texas was included in the state plan, and gave it strong backing. An indication of the effectiveness of the organization is evidenced in the fact that the area served by Water, Inc. gave strong backing to a constitutional amendment which would have provided the state's share of financing to launch the Texas Water Plan. The amendment was defeated statewide by a narrow margin. Even before the constitutional amendment balloting was official, Water, Inc., officials were initiating steps to see that voters would get a second chance as soon as possible. 



Take note, all of you . . . you will not fine me throwing a rock or a bomb; you will not find me under a placard; you will not find me ranting to wild-eyed mobs.





Indicating little interest, Bovina voters favored the city's \$100,000 bond election by a large majority in Saturday's ballot-

Only 111 voters marked ballots in the election which will provide funds for increased city water storage and improvements for the present system, a paving program and for re-financing of major city facilities and equipment.



### FEEDERS OF LIVESTOCK

Livestock is assessed for tax purposes according to its location on January 1st, regardless of the owner's residence. All livestock in the Bovina School District on January 1st of this year must be rendered by the owners or those in charge or possession. Taxes will be due the following Fall and payment should be made to this office.

PERSONAL PROPERTY IN THE CHARGE OR POSSESSION OF SOMEONE OTHER THAN THE OWNER SHALL BE ASSESSED TO THE PERSON HAVING IT IN CHARGE OR POS-SESSION. (Art. 7160, 7152.) Therefore, if you have cattle on your property or if you are looking after someone else's cattle, you are responsible to this office for the owner's name and address and the number of cattle. Please get this information to this office as quickly as possible so that we may get the ownership confirmed or these cattle will be charged to you. As soon as the ownership of the cattle in your possession is confirmed you will have discharged your responsibility for the tax.

Since by law the rendering of property is the responsibility of the owner, it is hoped that the livestock will be properly rendered to the Tax Office by all owners. A 100% count is expected. This will prevent inconvenience and liability for feed lot operators and others in charge.



WHENEVER THE TAXPAYER REFUSES TO MAKE RENDITION OR TO SUBSCRIBE TO THE OATH, THE ASSESSOR SHALL PROCEED TO ASSESS THE PROPERTY OF SUCH TAXPAYER, AND THE ASSESSMENT SO MADE SHALL BE AS LEGAL AND BINDING AS IF RENDERED BY THE TAXPAYER. 




Bovina's sixth grade boys traveled to Farwell Thursday afternoon with the A team picking up a win and the B team losing its bid.
