Bike-Hike Route Changed For Saturday

BAIRD—The Cystic Fibrosis Breath of Spring Bike-Hike-A-Thon will get underway this Saturday, May 5, at 9 a.m. The event has been re-routed, however, in the interest of safety.

All participants are asked to meet at Hanner Chevrolet a little before 9 a.m. The actual route will be located on the North Frontage Road from Hanner Chevrolet to a point 2 miles east.

Any bikers or hikers who would like a lift to Hanner Chevrolet are to meet in front of the Baird High School around 8:30 a.m. Transportation will be available to the route site.

Anyone interested in riding/hiking in the Bike-Hike can pick up entry forms at the Baird grade school or high school office. Entrants are then to contact individuals to pledge a set amount for each mile that is walked or ridden.

Bikers will be divided into 4 categories: preschool & kindergarten, 1st thru 6th, 7th thru 12th and adult. Parents are encouraged to ride with the younger children. In the hiker's division, there will be no age breakdown.

CF Bike-A-Thon T-shirts will be awarded to any participant who collects \$25.00 or more. Prizes will be awarded to the top money collectors.

Water Covers Some Roads After Storm

COUNTY—County residents were awakened early Tuesday morning by the angry flash of lightning, rumbling thunder, torrential downpours and high winds. Some hail was also reported.

Local residents recorded from anywhere to 2 3/4" to 3 1/4" of rainfall.

James Grant of the Department of Highways and Public Transportation reported water over several roads in the county after the heavy rainfall. They

included: 3 to 4 spots on FM 2228, 604, north of Clyde, both of the above washed debris upon the road; water on FM 1864 caused shoulder damage; water was reported on much of the Frontage Roads water measured 5 1/2 feet deep on the Frontage Roads around Brush Creek Overpass and water went over the flood gauge which measured 5 1/2 feet around Battle Creek to cause shoulder and pavement damage.

Callahan Co. Sheriff's Posse Rodeo May 10, 11 & 12

BAIRD—The 1979 Callahan County Sheriff's Posse rodeo will open at 8 p.m. nightly May 10, 11 & 12 at the arena in Baird.

Producer of this year's show is Terry Walls of Stephenville. Dick Vestal will serve as announcer during the three-night run.

Couple Killed Near Clyde Sunday Morning

CLYDE—William Wesley Smith of Rt. 4, Clyde was the driver of the car which struck and killed Wesley Woodrow Kidd, 19, of Clyde and Deborah White, 19, of Abilene as they were walking in a road 2 1/2 miles west of here Sunday morning.

No charges will be filed against Smith, Justice of the Peace Lee Savell said.

The couple were struck down while walking down the middle of the road at 3:15 a.m. Sunday, bundled under a blanket apparently to shelter them from rain.

Another couple who had been double-dating with them escaped unharmed. The other man was identified as Ronnie Hawk and the woman as Kae Risley. Miss Risley and Miss White had just moved to Abilene from Clyde.

The car the four were in became stuck in mud on a road just off FM 18.

They began walking toward Hawk's mother's home to get her car so they could take the women home.

Smith's eastbound auto struck the two before they could heed warnings from Hawk, who was walking with the second woman along the side of the farm-market road. They were about one mile from Mrs. Hawk's home at the time.

Miss White was pronounced dead at the scene at 6:40 a.m. Sunday by Justice of the Peace Lee Savell. Kidd died at 7:39 a.m. Sunday in Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene.

Services for Miss White were at 10 a.m. Tuesday at the Bailey Funeral Home Chapel in Clyde. The Rev. Wallace Clay of Eula Baptist Church officiated. Burial was in Eula Cemetery, directed by Bailey Funeral Home.

Born Oct. 17, 1959, in Big Spring, she lived in Eula 11 years and attended Eula High School. She was employed

by Dairy Queen, Inc. at the time of her death and she had moved to Abilene a few days ago.

Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ben White of Abilene; a sister, Mickey Faircloth of Abilene; two brothers, Cary of Abilene and Tony of Eula; her paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. D.F. White of Big Spring; her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. George Jones of Vancouver, Canada; and several uncles, aunts and cousins.

Services for Mr. Kidd were at 2 p.m. Tuesday at Bailey Funeral Home Chapel. The Rev. Larry McAden of Bible Baptist Church officiated. Burial was in Clyde Cemetery.

Born April 12, 1960, in Hamilton, he moved to Clyde as a small child. He worked at Crown, Cork and Seal Co. in Abilene after graduating from high school in Clyde. He was a member of the Cherry Lane Baptist Church of White Settlement in Fort Worth. He was a member of the Clyde Fire Department.

Survivors include his parents, Jack Kidd of Clyde; two brothers, Bruce of Houston and Jack Jr. in the Navy; two sisters, Teresa and Dena, both of Clyde; several uncles and aunts; and three nephews.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN BY CALLAHAN COUNTY OF ITS RENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need.

Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rent schedule. Fair Market rents are based on standard market housing, however any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Participation in the rent assistance program is voluntary on the part of owners/landlords and renters.

Zinc Necessary For Pecan Tress

COUNTY—One of the primary nutrients necessary for beautiful pecan trees and regular harvest of high quality pecans is zinc, says Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent. Strange as it may seem, pecans are one of the few plants that can not absorb zinc from the soil. Application of zinc to the soil is of no significant value to pecan trees in Texas.

Zinc must be applied in a form that can be absorbed by the leaves. There are two types of zinc which can be used in Texas, zinc sulfate or NZN. The rates of zinc for spraying pecan foliage in Texas are two pounds of zinc sulfate or one and one-fourth quarts of NZN per 100 gallons of water. The homeowner should use two teaspoons of zinc sulfate or NZN in one gallon of water. Three or four applications of zinc in April and May on mature pecan trees are sufficient to prevent a zinc deficiency.

With good zinc management, other cultural practices such as fertilization and irrigation will be more effective so zinc sprays are one of the most important first steps to success each year.

1979 Set-Aside Program Sign-up: April 30 was the final day to sign an intention to participate in this program for 1979. Set-aside and diverted acres cannot be grazed between April 1 and October 1. No harvesting is permitted during the year from these acres. These acres must be devoted, by the normal planting period for spring crops, to one or more of the approved covers or practices which will effectively protect the acreage from wind and water erosion throughout the calendar year.

Acreage Report Needed on All Farms: May 1, 1979 was the last day to report your planted acres of wheat, oats, rye and barley. Failure to report can cause producers to lose program benefits. If no report is received the yield shall be established at zero.

July 15, 1979 is the last day to report corn, grain sorghum and cotton acres.

Peanuts: July 15, 1979 is the last day to certify on peanuts planted. It is very important that you certify correct acres so as to not lose program benefits. If you are in doubt as to your acres, this office has available measuring service you may request at a nominal fee.

Report of Seed Peanuts:

Producers will be required to furnish evidence to support the purchase of peanuts used for seed on the farm for the 1979 crop planting. Such evidence must include: (1) Name and address of the handler or person from whom the seed peanuts were purchased. (2) The pounds (by type) of seed peanuts acquired (indicated whether farmer's stock or shelled basis). (3) The date of acquisition.

At the time the producer files a report of the planted acres of peanuts, the producer shall file a report

to account for the acquisition and/or disposition of seed peanuts.

ACP: May 1 was the last day to sign up for any of the practices under the 1979 Agricultural Conservation Program EXCEPT "Aerial Control of Mesquite". Beginning May 1 and continuing through May 15, requests for Aerial Control of Mesquite will be accepted in the county office. A limited amount of funds will be made available for this practice. In approving these requests, the Committee will base its approval

on determinations that the conservation and environmental benefits justify the investment of public funds, and that conservation will result beyond that which the farmer would accomplish with his own resources. The amount of cost sharing to approve should be sufficient within program limitations to provide necessary incentive for timely performance of the approved measure.

As a precaution against contamination of livestock with herbicides, all livestock must be removed prior to aerial or broadcast treatment of a pasture with herbicides containing 2, 4, 5-T or Tordon, and the deferment continued for at least 90 consecutive days thereafter. Also, it will be necessary for producers to control respouts within the next five years following the year control measures were applied, at your own expense.

Crop & Livestock Reported Needed

COUNTY — During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and midyear livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry—agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing, and marketing plans.

Farm organizations and legislatures use them in planning programs. The estimates are also used in establishing the various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state

and county. Extension economists and private farm and ranch management consultants use them as a basis for advising farmers and ranchers.

Exporters use them in planning and promoting the sale of agricultural products abroad.

Prompt and accurate

completion of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

This is a cooperative

effort of the USDA's Economics, Statistics, and Cooperatives Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.
