FIRE DESTROYS CLYDE LUMBER & SUPPLY—
A fire broke out Sunday at 11:45 a.m. in the back-alley behind the Clyde lumberyard.

Firemen fought for 2½ hours to distinguish the blaze. No serious injuries occurred during the fire.

MID-DAY FIRE, SUNDAY DESTROYS CLYDE LUMBER

CLYDE- A back alley grass fire ignited the Clyde Lumber and Supply building at 11:45 a.m. Sunday. It completely destroyed the building.

The lumber yard had been in operation since 1957. Clyde townspeople called it a landmark.

About 25 firemen from three towns fought the fire for two and a half hours. Clyde responded with five units, three came from Baird and two from Abilene.

While fighting the fire, two of Clyde's firemen, Joe Don James and Billy Dezern, were overcome by heat and smoke. Dezern also suffered a slight steam burn when a window broke. The two were treated at the scene by Citizens Emergency Medical Service of Clyde and returned to work about half an hour later.

Flames swept the building and nearby sheds. Firemen saved a few bundles of lumber and a forklift. Lumberyard owner, Jack Ball estimated his lumber inventory losses between \$85,000. and \$100,000. Ball was uncertain of the total loss figure.

Firemen hosed down nearby property to prevent other houses from catching on fire. One house received smoke dam-

age, but was probably saved by the fact that it is made of stucco.

Other than the lumber yard property, a trailer and some small stuff were lost in the fire.

Several other firemen suffered heat exhaustion later in the day and were taken to the fire station to rest.

Clyde firemen sprayed the smoldering property with water all afternoon.

West Texas Utility crews worked to restore power knocked out when flames burned four cross arms off two power line poles, sending power lines falling to the ground. The loss of power affected about 400 residents.

Exact cause of the grass fire which started the blaze was unknown Sunday.

Ball has insurance, but he said it wouldn't cover everything.

Flames were about 100 feet high at the peak of the blaze.

With the flames under control by early afternoon and firemen hosing down the smoldering remains of Clyde's only lumberyard, fire captain Gilmore worried only that a change in wind directions might bring new problems.

Citizen Aides in Arrest of Dallas Pair With Stolen Car

BAIRD- On October 3, the Highway Patrol arrested Frank Burnett Jr. for auto theft. The car was stolen out of Dallas County. Burnett was armed with a 380 automatic pistol. He was to be transferred to Dallas County Jail on October 9, 1979.

October 5, Sheriff Bill Skinner arrested two white males at gun point in the City Park at Baird. These suspects were driving another stolen auto from Dallas County. One of these men was armed with a 32 pistol and the other had a 22 pistol. A Baird Citizen came to the Sheriff's office

and gave the officers the license number on this car. It was also learned that both suspects had been inside the high school in Baird.

The citizen that reported this prevented these men from stealing another car in Baird and pulling a robbery in Baird. The suspects were out of money and out of gas.

Both arrests could not have been accomplished without the new teletype in the sheriff's office.

Grass Fire Burns Estimated 1,500 Acres Monday Afternoon

CLYDE- Abilene and Clyde firemen fought a 5½ hour grass fire Monday that burned an estimated 1,500 acres. No injuries were reported, but deer and rabbits in the area were running crazy.

The fire started near the Dudley Community on the property of Leo Chrane. It burned along the Taylor-Callahan county line two miles north of Dudley and one mile west of Farm Road 1178.

The cause of the fire was either sparks from Chrane's lawnmower or a cigarette Chrane dropped to the ground. His dog got loose and he left his lawnmower on while trying to catch the dog.

A strong southwest wind hindered firemen while trying to fight the blaze.

Fence posts in the area were damaged by the fire and about 600 acres of grazing land burned.

Reported at 2:30 p.m., the fire was under control at 5:30 p.m. and the last unit left at 7 p.m.

Two Abilene units and four from Clyde responded to the fire.

This grass fire was the second major fire this week. Clyde Lumber and Supply was destroyed by fire Sunday.

The fire Sunday was possibly the worst to hit Clyde in 10 years.

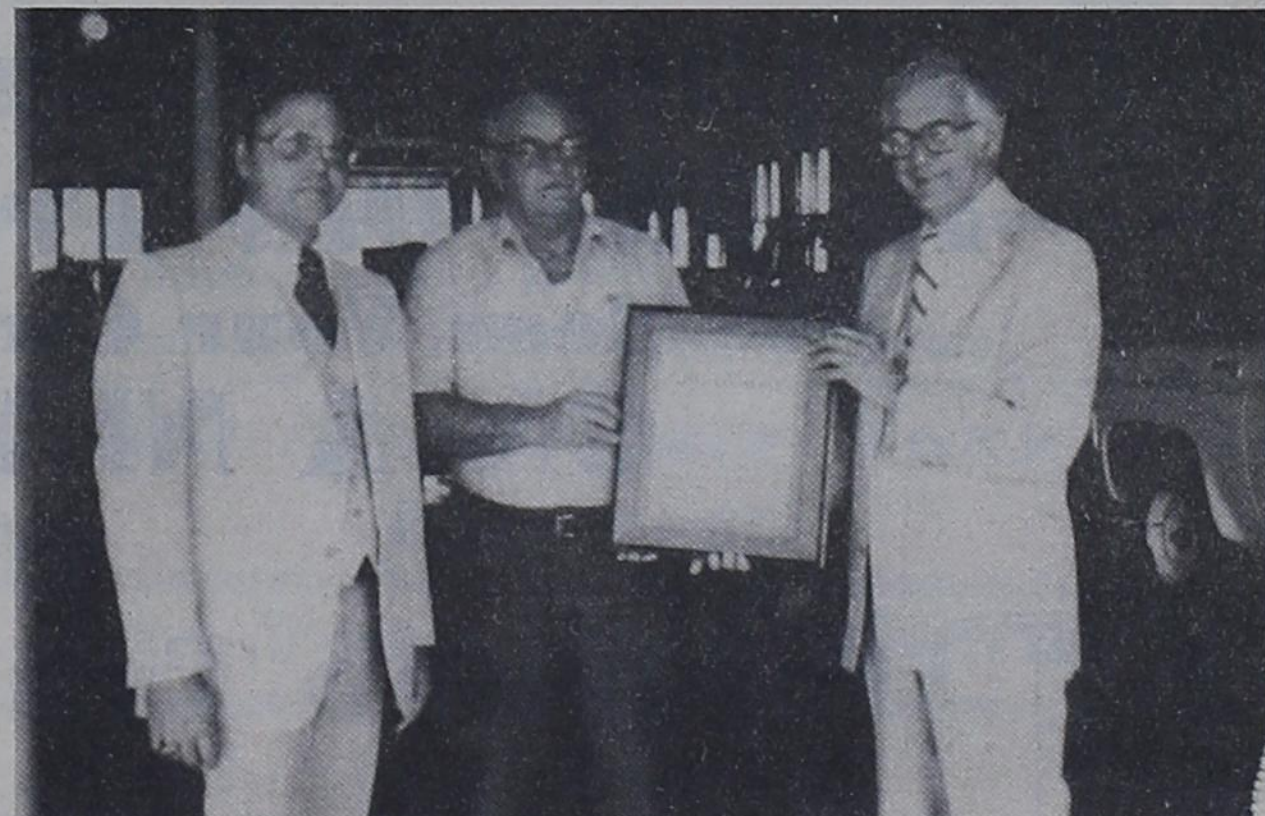
Bears Start District Play Friday - Here

CROSS PLAINS- The Paint and Pallet Club will have its annual art show Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 3 & 4.

Registration for the show will be from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m., Friday, Nov. 2, 1979. The hours for the show are Saturday, Nov. 3, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Sunday, Nov. 4, 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. It will take place at the school cafeteria in Cross Plains, Texas.

Entry fee will be \$1.00 per entry, limit of five.

In paintings and drawing: Any media. Original work only. Artists must reside within a 75 mile radius of Cross Plains. All pictures must be framed and wired for hanging. All en-

tries should be in good taste.

Childrens division: It will be 12 years and under. Entries will be judged and ribbons awarded to first, second and third, plus honorable mentions.

Intermediate division: It will be 13-17 years of age. Entries will be judged and ribbons awarded to first, second and third, plus honorable mentions.

Amateur division: This will consist of the following categories as determined by subject matter and will include all media: Portraits, Still Life, Landscape, Western, Open and Beginners- (Adults who have been painting less than one Year).

All entries will be judged and ribbons awarded to first, second, and third, plus honorable mentions, in each category. Cash awards will be given to the first, second and third best of the Amateur Division, as determined by the judge.

Professional division: It will include all media and all subjects. Ribbons and cash awards will be given to first, second and third, plus honorable mentions.

A Professional is any individual who derives his income from selling art, has held personal shows, or is selling on a semi-regular or regular basis.

Photography will be exhibited and if enough entries are received, they will

be judged and ribbons given.

Best of Show entry will be determined by the judge and a ribbon and cash award of \$50.00 will be given.

People's choice entry will be determined by a majority vote of those attending the exhibit. A ribbon and a fine picture frame will be awarded.

Cash awards in the Professional and Amateur divisions will be \$25.00 for first place, \$15.00 for second place and \$10.00 for third.

Entries should be picked up promptly after 5 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 4.

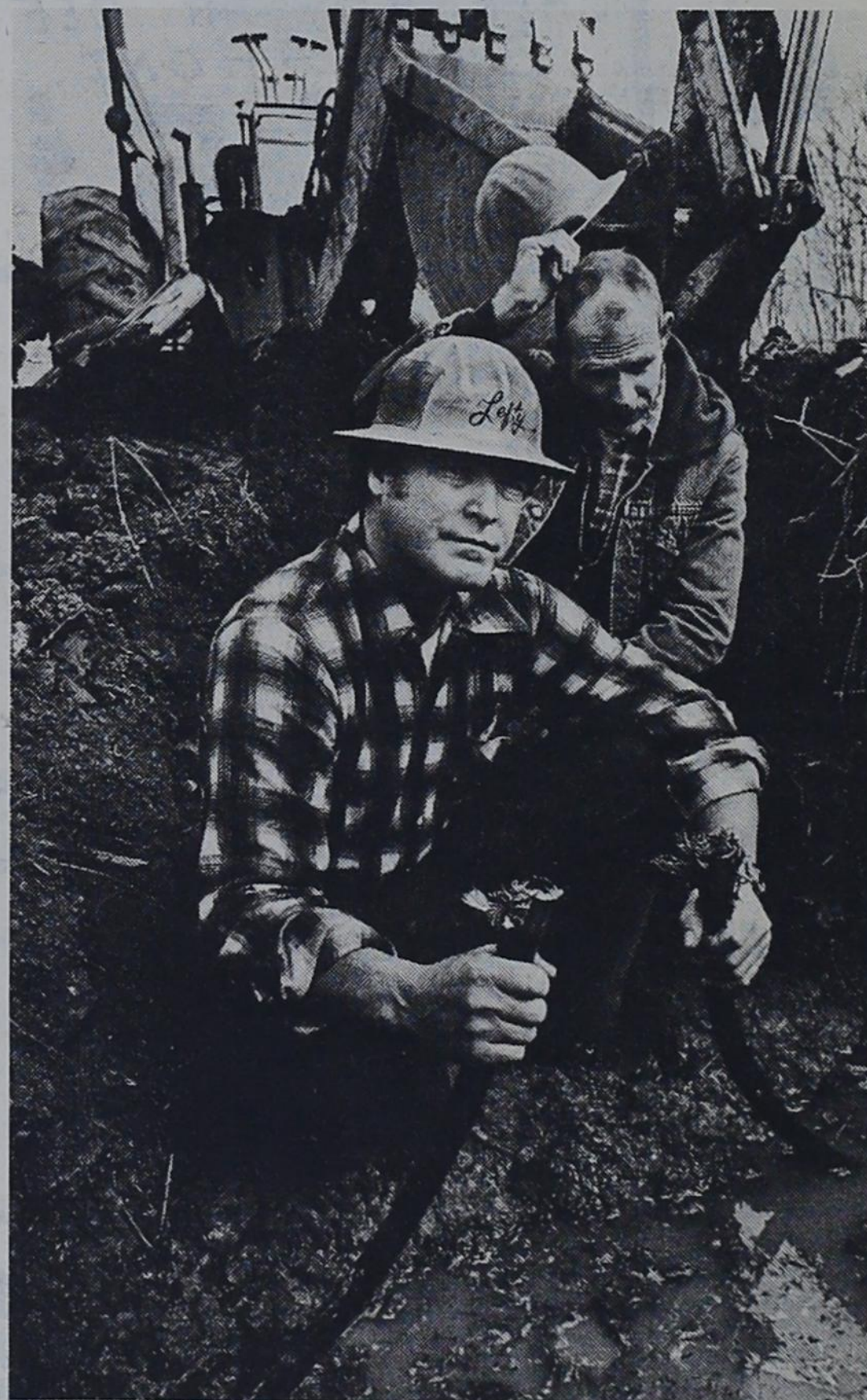

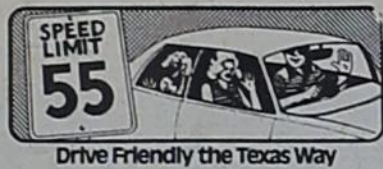

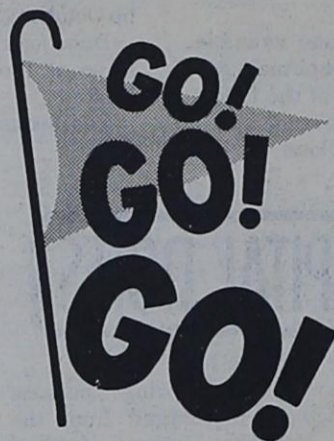
