Red Ribbon Plans Announced Here

The Bovina Against Drugs Committee met last week to make plans for school and community involvement in the annual Red Ribbon Week campaign.

Saturday and Sunday, October 19 and 20, is designated Red Ribbon Religious Weekend. Monday is Red Ribbon Decoration Day and Wednesday is Wear Red Day.

Citizens and businesses of the community are encouraged to wear a red ribbon and decorate with red ribbons next week and to dress in something red on Wednesday to show support for the fight against illegal drugs and the illegal use of alcohol.

The school is planning special activities including an assembly, a poster and essay contest and classroom emphasis on drug education.

Events Focus On Drug Awareness

In the Spring of 1991, the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, in conjunction with the Public Policy Resources Laboratory at Texas A&M University, administered a survey to students in the Bovina Independent School District.

A total of 187 secondary students and 111 elementary students completed the survey. Eighteen of these surveys were excluded from analysis, because the students did not report their grade level or age, or because they were identified as exaggerators by claiming to use a non-existent drug or by reporting overly excessive drug use.

In the survey of secondary students, a majority reported of having experimented with alcohol at some time. Some students admitted having come to school drunk and there

was a significant link between conduct or attitude problems and drinking. The percentages of students who had driven a car while under the influence was over twice the statewide average.

While most students reported that their parents disapproved of teenage drinking, a significant number reported that they did not know how their parents felt about this issue. Parental attitudes do affect whether or not a student uses drugs and the parents have the greatest responsibility to be involved in this problem. When asked where they would go for help if they had a drug problem, students indicated they would go to friends, relatives, or parents, but seldom to school nurses or teachers.

The influence of drug education programs may be reflected in some of the student's attitudes. A majority responded that the use of such drugs as cocaine, crack, marijuana, inhalants, and ecstasy would be considered very dangerous. Less than half perceived that the use of alcohol would be considered very dangerous.

The survey among elementary students reported lower percentages of experimentation with alcohol and other drugs than the percentages among secondary students, but still suggested some relatively high numbers. A significant number again indicated that they were not sure how their parents felt about their consumption of alcohol. A positive note was that over half of the elementary students still felt that alcohol was very dangerous.

The value of the survey is found in indicating general attitudes and tendencies. Illegal use of alcohol is shown to be a continuing problem among the students in this city.

Scholarship Fund Is Established

Dr. Michael Jansen, superintendent of Bovina Independent School District, reported a scholarship fund has been established at First Bank Bovina.

The purpose of the scholarship fund is to encourage students to graduate from Bovina ISD and to pursue higher education after graduation.

Immediately after a Bovina High School student graduates and enters a higher education course of study, they will be able to bring a copy of their registration to the superintendent's office and receive a check.

The Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture contributed the first deposit to the account with a check for \$1,000. Anyone wishing to contribute to the fund may do so at the superintendent's office or at the Bank.

City Trash Policy To Be Enforced

Trash, junk, solid waste, etc. No matter what you call it, everybody has some. The big question is, what to do with it?

The City of Bovina is no longer in the trash business. Remember, we do not have a landfill. All of Bovina's trash is picked up by a private contractor and hauled to a landfill in another county.

In the past few months, the City has cleaned the alleys of all trash that was not put in the dumpsters. This is a very expensive process and not very successful.

The City of Bovina will no longer clean the alley and pick up trash that is placed by the dumpsters. You are responsible for your own trash. So what do we do with the stuff? You take it to the transfer station.

What is a transfer station? A transfer station is a forty cubic yard container for things not put in dumpsters. This container is located just to the left of the gate to the old landfill. This has been provided by the county due to the efforts of Commissioner Tom Ware and others. This is to be used by

the people of Bovina and of the county.

There are some guidelines to be used when using this facility. First--no hazardous waste of any kind. Second--no tires, car bodies or concrete. Third--all trash must be put inside container, not placed by it.

Most places that have this service are only open on certain days and a charge is made per load. At this time, ours will be open all the time and no charge to the public. How long this policy will last will depend on how it is used or abused.

Remember, do not put trash beside a dumpster or in a barrel and expect it to be picked up because it will not be picked up. "Let's all work together and solve our own trash problems," asks Mayor Keith Knight.

If you have any questions, ask Andy Garza or check with the office at City Hall. Let's make Bovina a clean and neat town in which to live. In the future, we will address the problem of junk cars and tree branches or brush.



FACTS ON THE TEXAS LOTTERY



LOTTERY

Merchandising a lottery is not an appropriate function of government.

No government should have a huge bureaucracy specifically designed to encourage citizens in destructive behavior. The government should not profit from the weakness of any citizen.

Lotteries are inadequate and inefficient sources of revenue that lull the citizenry into thinking real revenue problems have been met.

Although a Texas lottery would raise only \$460 million--less than 2 percent of state revenue--most citizens think that government could not be funded without lottery revenue. While proponents historically have claimed a lottery can divert the need for an income tax, more than 90 percent of the states with lotteries also have some type of income tax.

The lottery creates a new generation of gamblers, some of whom could become compulsive gamblers.

Although the state promotes lotteries as painless and voluntary, they are neither because high-pressure marketing induces citizens to engage in a gambling activity. Many of these citizens would never have gambled at the racetrack or in a casino. Because of the extraordinary amount of television advertising for the lottery to which they will be exposed, the children of today most likely will become the gamblers of tomorrow.

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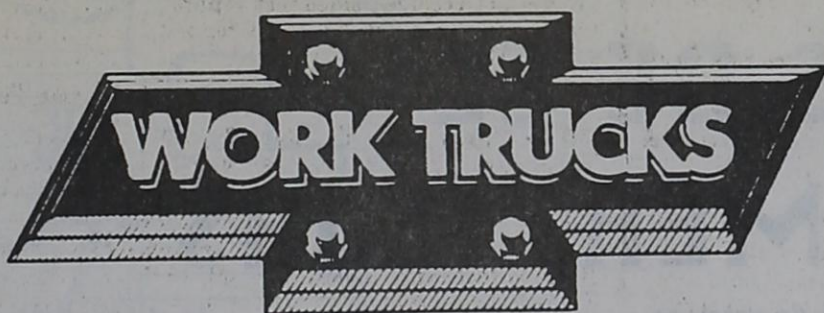
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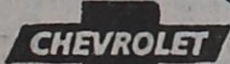

(1) In the future elections, there will be nine (9) Election Precincts. Plus the early voting polling place.

(2) Commissioner Precinct 1 contains 101; Commissioner Precinct 2 contains 201, 202 and 203; Commissioner Precinct 3 contains

301, 302, and 303; Commissioner Precinct 4 contains 401, and 402.

(3) These Election Precincts and the polling places in each precinct will be defined as follows:

COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 1

Polling Place 101

Polling Place 101 is the consolidation of old Election Precinct Numbers 2-1, 1 and 8. It has been designated 101 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 1, Polling Place Number 1. Polling Place 1 which was located at the Black Elevator in Black, Texas, and Polling Place 8, located at the Dee Willard residence in Lakeview, Texas, have been eliminated to provide secrecy of balloting and for voter convenience. The polling place is in the Calvary Baptist Church, Cleveland Ave., Friona, Texas.

COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 2

Polling Place 201

Polling Place 201 was previously known as Polling Place Number 3 and has been designated as 201 to coincide with Commissioner

New Environmental Ethic Needed To Sustain Society

By James F. Veninga

We have learned much in the last few years about the grave environmental crises that span the globe and threaten all societies: the erosion of topsoil, the undermining of

biological systems, the pollution of air, the depletion of energy systems. And we have learned that Texas--like the United States as a whole--has contributed to these global crises.

Much of the Texas myth is based on the taming and exploitation of nature. Of course, much of the human touch on the natural environment has turned nature into something better than it was before, but all too often it has blighted the earthscape, exhausted resources, and stunted the ability of nature to repair and regenerate itself.

Yet, as Glen Lich points out in the third volume of *Preparing for Texas in the 21st Century*, we hope and believe that nature's munificence will sustain and bless us, that we shall prosper, that we will be refreshed by the beauty of nature. For this hope to be realized, we

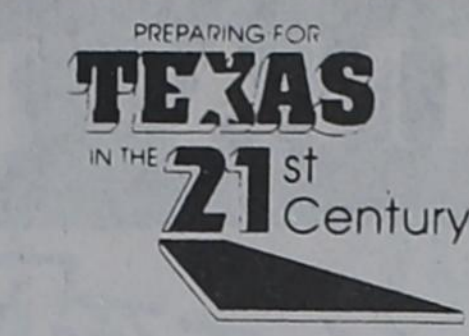
must see ourselves as part of nature, eager to participate in the stewardship of the environment at home and abroad.

"It is a mistake," explains Isaac Asimov, "to think of mankind as a thing in itself. It isn't. It is a part of an intricate web of life."

Public participation--the incorporation of a new environmental ethic--is the key to a sustainable society. Education, leading to changes in attitudes, values, and lifestyles, secures this participation.

But these changes won't come easily. Rice University president George Rupp writes that "co-operative activity in pursuit of shared values is all too rare in our society."

One of the primary responsibilities of government will be to ensure public education in which environmental studies hold a central



place in the curriculum. But legislative bodies and governmental entities must exercise leadership in making critical decisions that demonstrate a new and deep commitment to reshaping our relationship to nature.

One thing is clear. If we do not preserve and nourish the environment, it will not preserve and nourish us. How we respond in the 1990s to the growing environmental crises will greatly determine the quality of life for citizens of the 21st century.

Pumpkins Provide Resource To Area

FLOYDADA--Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry visited Floydada this week to promote the state's pumpkin industry and encourage people to buy Texas-grown pumpkins.

The Floydada area, which bills itself as the pumpkin capital of the world, has about 800 acres of pumpkins in Floyd County. Nearby, another 500 acres are planted in Hale County and some 200 acres are in Bailey County.

The three counties are the top pumpkin-producing counties in the Plains.

Along with visiting the Heptad Vegetable and Specialty Co. packing shed, Perry addressed local school children about pumpkins and where other food they eat comes from.

Agriculture literacy is a major focus of Perry's administration.

"There are lots of school children in the state who are preparing for

Halloween and carving their pumpkins," Perry said. "But they have no idea that their pumpkin could have come from Floydada, Texas."

Perry told the group that he and his two children recently bought pumpkins in Austin which were shipped from Floyd County.

"When most Texans think of Halloween, they think of ghosts, goblins and trick-or-treating," Perry said.

"But those of us who know about Plains pumpkins, we think of dollars and what pumpkins mean to the economy in Floydada, or in Muleshoe, or in Plainview," he said.

Pumpkins bring in almost a half million dollars each year into Floyd, Hale and Bailey counties.

"Pumpkins will not rival corn or cotton as far as the top-dollar generator in the area, but they are providing a significant income in the area," Perry added.

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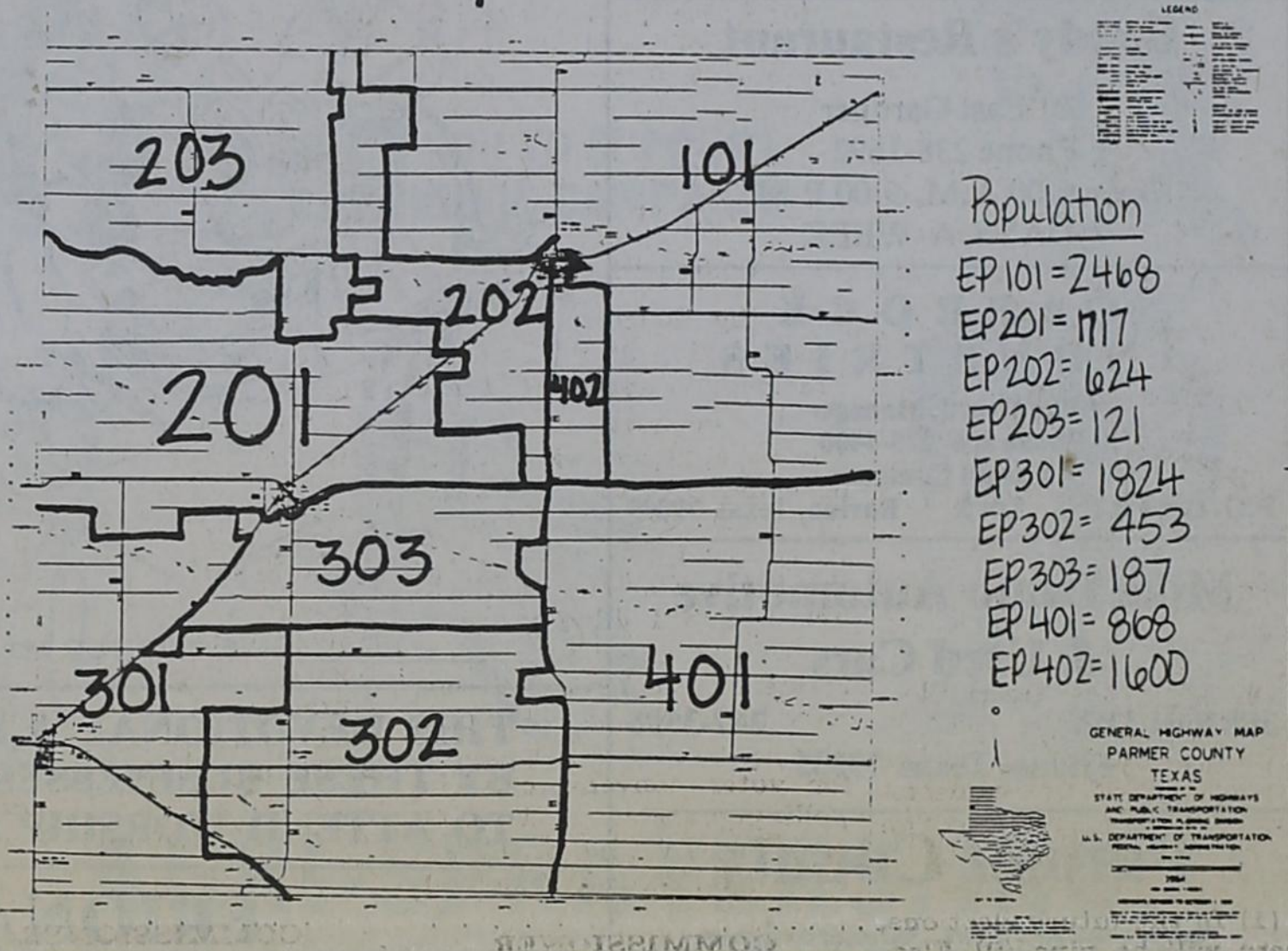
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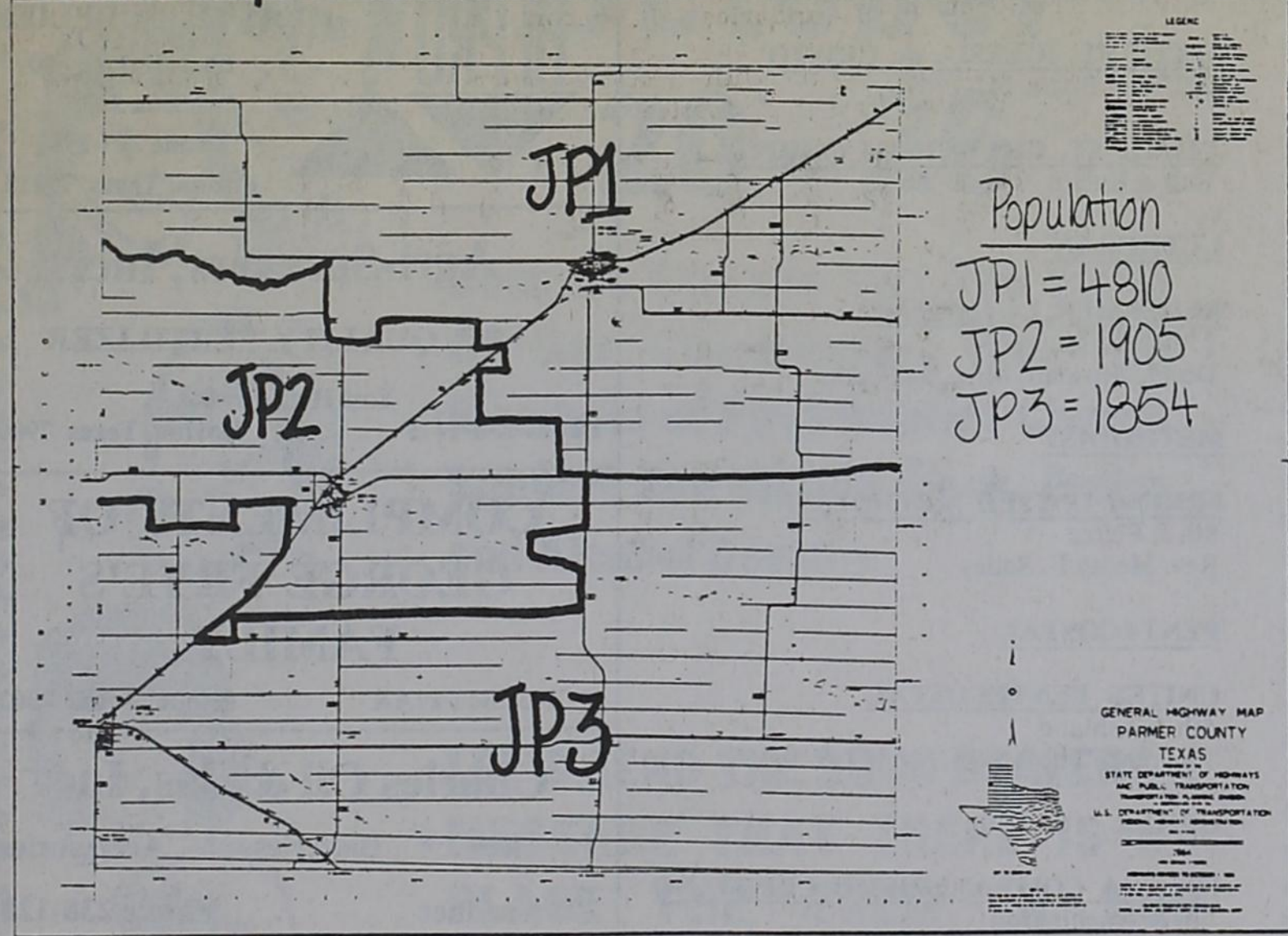
