#### Local agents seize 241 pounds of marijuana

U.S. Border Patrol agents seized 241 pounds of marijuana Friday on Highway 90, approximately a half mile west of Ranch Road 693.

The drugs were discovered when two subjects fled from a vehicle, after agents attempted to conduct an immigration stop.

The marijuana, valued at \$192,800, was turned over to the Multi-Agency Drug Task Force in Eagle Pass.



## Tax free home runs

Baseball's Sammy Sosa and Mark McGwire are racing each other to make baseball history, and they just may end up making history together.

Both sluggers have beaten Roger Maris' record for hitting the most home runs in a single season. Maris' record was 61 homers set in 1961. Sosa and McGwire have each hit 62 humdingers this season and there are still several games to play.

But as the bats continue to crack and crowds continue to cheer, no one is cheering louder than the Internal Revenue Service. The IRS is looking to the bleachers aiming to pick the pockets of the fans that catch record-breaking homers.

A lucky fan who caught one of Mark McGwire's record-breaking balls, could find he or she wasn't so lucky when they generously returned the ball to McGwire. An IRS official said that exchange would be a gift and the IRS could slap the fan with a hefty gift tax. Supposing the record-breaking ball was worth a million bucks, the unlucky fan would find he owes the federal government over \$140,000 in taxes.

The IRS is hinting that it does not plan to impose the gift tax on fans who return the history making baseballs to McGwire and Sosa, but it stops short of flatly exempting fans who return recordbreaking home run balls. When asked directly, the IRS' answer has been, like the IRS in general, legalistic and bureaucratic.

Congress is stepping up to the plate, so to speak, to protect fans who end up on the receiving end of historical home runs by catching and returning home run balls to the sluggers that hit them. The legislation will keep the IRS from sticking those fans with the "McGwire-Sosa Tax."

Taxing fans for their generosity in returning the home run balls to the batter is just not right. This bill will make sure fans are free to catch historic baseballs rather than run from the bleachers every time a history making homer comes flying their direction.

The Las Moras Masonic Lodge presented 50 Year Service Awards to four of its members Saturday.


The open meeting was held at Slator Hall, with 54 members and guests present.
