## Reappraisal Nears Completion In Callahan Co.

In the next week or so you will receive a notice advising you that the property value of real and or personal property you own has been re-appraised. As a result of that notice you will be interested in determining how or by what basis your property was valued. Also, you may feel that the proposed value is too high. In some rare cases, some may feel that the value is too low.

Many people do not understand what the process of "equalization" is all about. All too often the term "equalization" is synonymous with increased taxes. This does not have to be the case. Exactly how many tax dollars one pays is tied more directly to the budgetary needs of the various districts than to the actual value.

However, state law does require that "Taxes shall be equal and uniform." (Article VIII, Sec 1d of the State Constitution). In all counties to consolidate their appraisal functions into one office by 1982. As a part of that legislation was the requirement that all assessments be made at 100% of fair market value beginning in 1981. These are state laws, not the action of local governments.

What is "Market Value?" Often this question is asked, but rarely understood. Market value is generally defined as the price a person will pay in cash for a property to a person who willingly sells, both being knowledgeable of the factors that effect the value.

In order to assist you in understanding what these interviews are about, we have prepared a list of commonly asked questions and answers for your information.

1. How did you arrive at my value? In the case of real property we most often rely on actual local market sales. Where insufficient data is available to accurately use sales, we use reproduction cost less depreciation. Each property was inspected either visually or on-site to ascertain its class, type of architecture, quality of construction and general condition. Vacant land was classes according to its location, zoning, use and similar factors. Personal business property was inspected to determine use, type of inventory, density of stock and quality of merchandise. Although the laws do not require an appraiser to provide the detailed analysis that one might expect of a fee appraisal, we have tried to comply with constitutional requirements of equality and uniformity.

2. If you don't agree with our values what do you do? Please keep in mind that the notice you receive says "Proposed Values." If you have additional data that the appraiser may not have been aware of you may very well receive an adjustment in your value as a result

of this interview. Simply state your position to the interviewer. We are as interested in resolving any value to the mutual agreement of all. However, please keep in mind that the interviewer is limited in what he or she can or cannot do.

3. What can the Interviewer do? The interviewer is here as a representative of the appraisal district for the purpose of hearing questions concerning property values. Should the facts point out that an adjustment is required, this will be done. However, simple complains that the value is too high without adequate factual evidence is not a basis for an adjustment. In addition, the interview should not be used to voice any personal observations concerning the operations of local tax agencies.

4. The interviewer can not: Approve exemptions: This is the responsibility of the Chief Appraiser. Set Tax Rates: This is the responsibility of the various City Councils, School Boards and Commissioners Court.

5. If you are unsatisfied after the interview, what next? From time to time we are unable to satisfy those who attend an interview. If after the interview you still feel that the proposed values are too high, you may appeal the proposed value to the Appraisal Review Board (formerly the Board of Equalization). This Board is made up of local citizens not directly affiliated with the local tax agencies. Their purpose is to hear complaints of value concerning questions of over-evaluation or inequities. State law requires this Board to meet until those that have expressed a timely desire to appear before them have been heard. By law, you have a minimum of 20 days from the date of the notice before you can be required to appear before them. However, should you wish to waive this 20 day requirement, you may appeal directly to them at the next available open appointment.

A Final Word: This program is being conducted according to the laws of the State of Texas. It is our hope that each citizen will cooperate with the appraisal district and realizes that at best this is a difficult task. We are sincerely interested in doing a fair and equitable job. Your patience and understanding will go a long way toward making this program work. Once your property values are established at a more current level, you will have an opportunity to voice your opinion concerning the setting of local tax rates at hearings that are required to be held by the individual tax districts. The laws of this State provide ample protection of the taxpayer. All that is required is patience and understanding on the part of all.

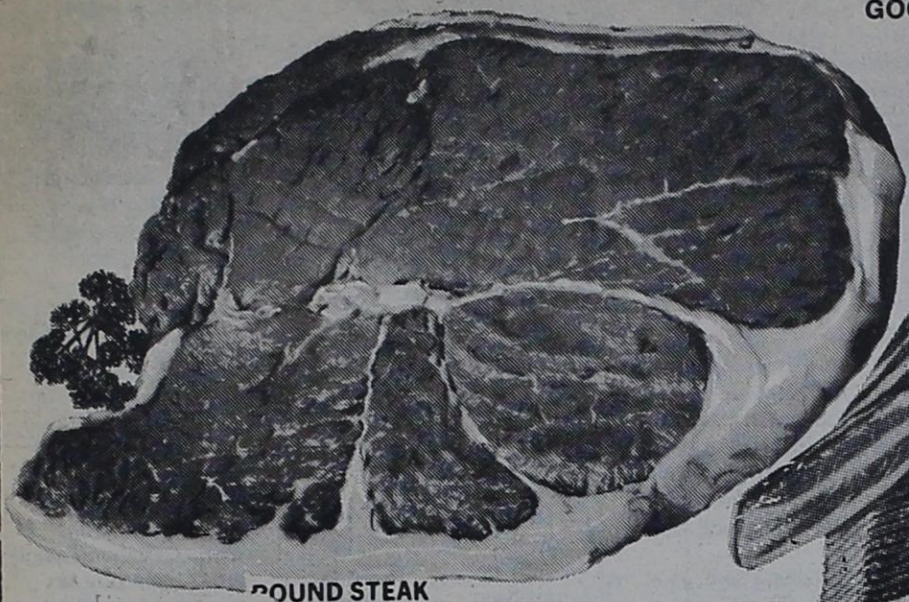

# Strake Talk

## SMALL BUSINESS— A RESOURCE WE MUST PROTECT

You can look around the square of any Texas town and see the backbone of the state economy—and of the national economy. It's small business and it provides half of all jobs. By the current state definition there are 260,000 in our state—that's 97% of all Texas businesses. The small businessman and woman not only provide jobs and pay taxes; their independent tradition also helps explain the enduring quality of our democratic form of government.

The state of Texas recognizes the importance of small business and has programs to help it. But we can do better.

For one thing, we can abolish the sales tax on utility bills which now falls basically on small business owners. Large manufacturing and processing firms don't have to pay the tax, but the grocer, retailer and florist do. It is not fair.

My opponent opposed doing away with this tax in the last session of the legislature. The tax will bring in an estimated \$220 million in 1984-85. But when you compare that with the extra \$5.1 billion the legislature will have to spend during that time, I feel we can do without the tax and the reve-

nue it will bring. And, as Lt. Governor, I would support its repeal.

I would also support putting into effect recommendations of the small business task force initiated by the Governor. Two of these recommendations are especially appealing. One is to help small business borrow money at better rates. Most small businesses which fail do so because they are under-capitalized. To help that situation, franchise tax money would be deposited in participating banks, which would, in turn, make loans at lower rates to small businesses.

The other recommendation is that we form a group of small business development centers at colleges and universities statewide. Money for the centers would come from the U.S. Small Business Administration, the state and participating schools. The centers would provide training, counseling and other help to small business owners so that they could be more competitive in the marketplace.

## West Texas Utilities Files For Rate Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a general increase in its rates for retail customers.

The official application was filed Monday in Baird by Local Manager Perry Cheshier.

The manager said the application is a systemwide request for higher rates. Simultaneous filings were made in other incorporated towns for retail customers within their jurisdiction and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for an increase in rural areas, unincorporated towns and in 13 incorporated towns which have ceded jurisdiction over electric rates.

The principal reasons cited for the request were the cost of WTU's construction program, high interest rates and the effects of general inflation on the cost of providing service.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total retail revenue of \$1,040,166. This amounts to 9.4 per cent. No major changes in rate structure are proposed except for some adjustments in allocations among customer classes. For residential customers, the average electric bill, including fuel costs, would

go up by about 10 per cent, although the actual increase would vary with the amount of usage.

WTU's last rate case was filed in the fall of 1981 and settled early in 1982 without hearing and for an amount considerably less than had been requested. WTU had asked for 15.2 per cent but received 8.3 per cent. Company officials said at that time that another increase probably would be necessary within the year.

The Company had to spend over \$55 million this past year on new construction and must spend even more in the years immediately ahead to assure a continued reliable supply of electricity. The construction program includes a new coal-fired power plant at Oklaunion, as well as new transmission lines and distribution facilities over the system.

WTU built its last power plant in 1977 and since then has been able to lag behind most other utility companies in new construction and in rate increases. A recent survey by the Public Utility Commission of Texas shows that WTU's customer bills are lower than the state and national averages.

Survivors include his parents; three brothers, William A. of Abilene, Mark David of Lubbock,

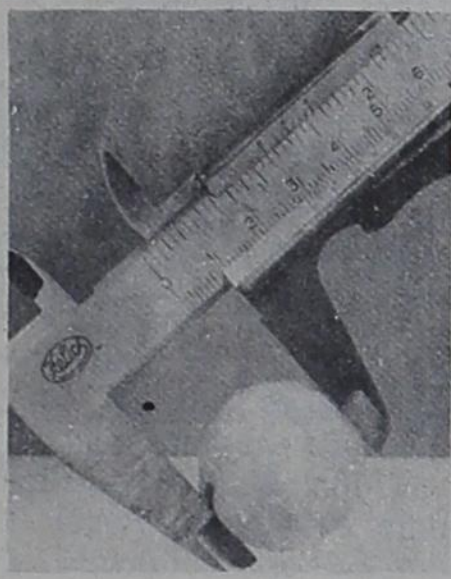

OF PROPOSED

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION  
NOVEMBER 2, 1982

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year.

The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.

The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

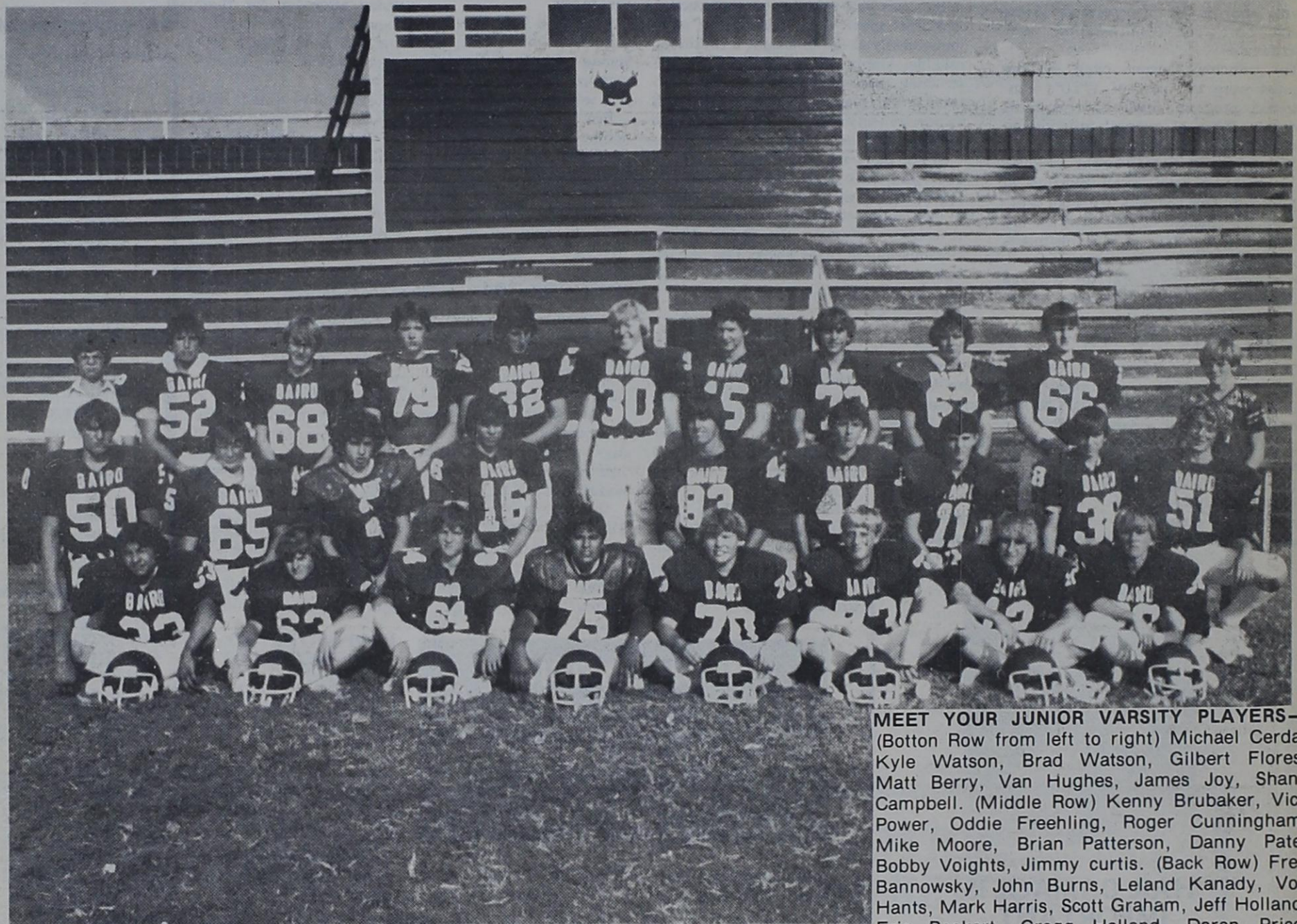
"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

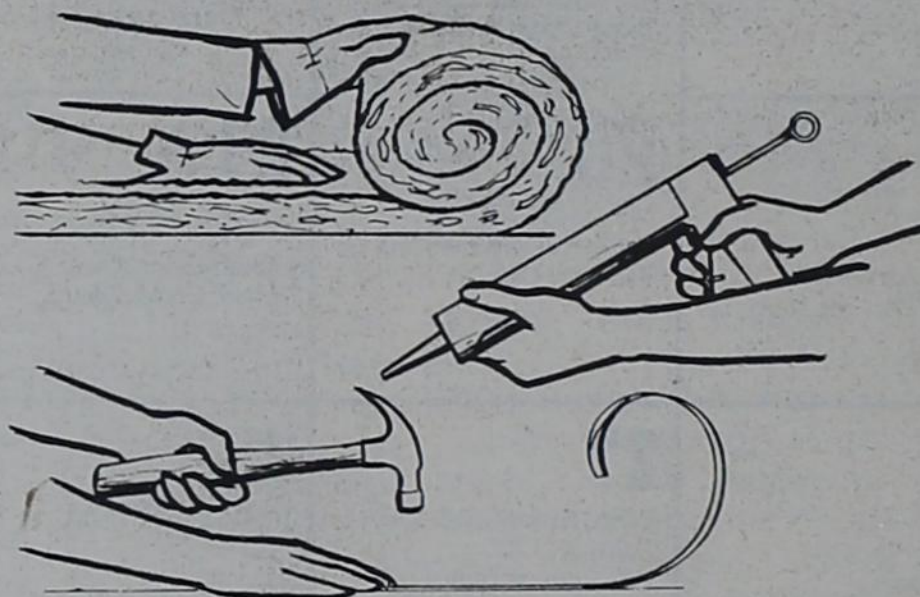
