Water board incumbents all face challengers

The Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District has four positions up for re-election in November.

Director Denette Coates has signed up for a place on the ballot in Precinct 4 and is being challenged by Don Hood, a former water board director.

Coates was appointed by Kinney County Commissioner's Court to replace Don Hood after his resignation from the board.

Stan Metcalf is challenging Ed Dillon for the Fort Clark position on the board.

Dillon was appointed by the Commissioners to replace Duke Meek after his resignation.

Director Kent Lowery is facing off with former City of Brackettville council member and Matt Bland.

Lowery was appointed by the Commissioners to replace Gloria Benacci.

Francie Wylie is challenging Tony Frerich for the County At Large position.

Frerich was also appointed by the Commissioners to replace the late Tootsie Herndon.

At a Regular meeting on August 21, the board appointed Dr. Joe Goebel as the Chair of the Ecological Balance Committee. This committee is part of the resolution recently adopted in regards to the Devil's River Minnow and the implementation plan for Base Spring Flow Requirements. The remainder of the committee members will come from governmental entities within the county to include the County of

Kinney, the City of Brackettville, Fort Clark Springs Association, Kinney County Farm Bureau, Fort Clark Springs Municipal Utility District and the West Nueces-Las Moras Conservation District. Board member, Beth Ann Smith suggested the board use members from these agencies to avoid partiality and jealousy within the community.

Director Dillon reported on the Karst Seminar he attended.

The board will have their next Regular meeting on Thursday, September 18.

To Mars and beyond

Serenity Gammill of Brackett High School in Brackettville, Texas traveled to NASA's Johnson Space Center (JSC) in Houston, Texas, this past summer and participated in a one week summer internship. Serenity is a Senior this year.

Nominated by Tracy King she had been selected as one of Only 350 high school juniors from across Texas to be part of High School Aerospace Scholars (HAS). They worked to complete 10 Web-based assignments during the school year. They applied what they learned during the year, and this was part of the challenge for them to work as part of a team to design a mission to Mars.

In addition and upon completion of the project students earned a certificate of completion that met the requirements for a full science credit. Serenity will also be selected to speak to and encourage this year's juniors about the opportunity to apply and how informative, unique, fun and exciting the program is and how

they can get involved. The week long experience at JSC included a tour of JSC facilities and briefings by noted NASA employees—including astronauts. These students and teammates concluded their experience by presenting their proposal at a luncheon to their parents, members of the Texas Legislature, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, Rotary, NASA and JSC senior management.

Serenity was selected as one of the first students to speak at the ending ceremony about the experiences they had during the program, especially the hands on projects they did while at the Space Center. This included building robots, launching model rockets and designing ideas for future exploration of space and other fun experiments. Also as part of the team challenge they put together a complete mission to Mars from beginning to end. This included all aspects that had to be coordinated from budgeting cost, space vehicles and suits, life support, living conditions, supplies and needs for a full 10 person exploration team to Mars and back and the time it would take to accomplish this mission. This was the presentation at the ending ceremony which in conclusion was quite fascinating to the audience. Four teams

worked in cooperation on different aspects of the project, each team had separate duties, logos and names. Serenity's design that she created on computer was selected as the logo for her team "Space Cowboys" depicted a cowboy riding a rocket in space and roping a planet.

The State of Texas, in partnership with JSC and the Texas educational community, developed HAS in 1999 to encourage more students to pursue studies and careers in science,

technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). More than 1500 students and teachers from across Texas have participated in the program since its inception. With this program, NASA continues the Agency's tradition of investing in the nation's educational programs. It is directly tied to the Agency's major education goal of attracting and retaining students in STEM disciplines critical to NASA's future missions, which include missions returning to the moon, on to Mars and beyond.

Give smart financial gift to grandchildren

September 7 was Grandparents Day. If you are a grandparent, you probably like to help out your grandchildren. But if you're thinking of making a financial gift, take your time to explore the options.

For example, suppose you want to help pay for your grandchildren's college educations. You could open an investment account and designate it for college. But you will probably be better off by putting the money in a plan that is specifically designed for college.

Here are two possibilities:

- Section 529 savings plan — In a Section 529 savings plan, you put money in specific investments, managed by an investment professional. You can give \$12,000 per year, without incurring gift taxes, to every grandchild. In fact, you can even combine five years' worth of contributions and give \$60,000 (or \$120,000 if it comes from you and your spouse) to a Section 529 plan in a single year. (However, if you do bunch the contributions in this manner, you won't be able to make another \$12,000 gift to the same grandchild for the next five years.)

- All withdrawals from a Section 529 savings plan will be free from federal income taxes, as long as the money is used for the beneficiary's qualified college or graduate school expenses. (Withdrawals for expenses other than qualified education expenditures may be subject to federal, state and penalty taxes.) Also, if you participate in your own state's Section 529 savings plan, your contributions may be tax-deduct-

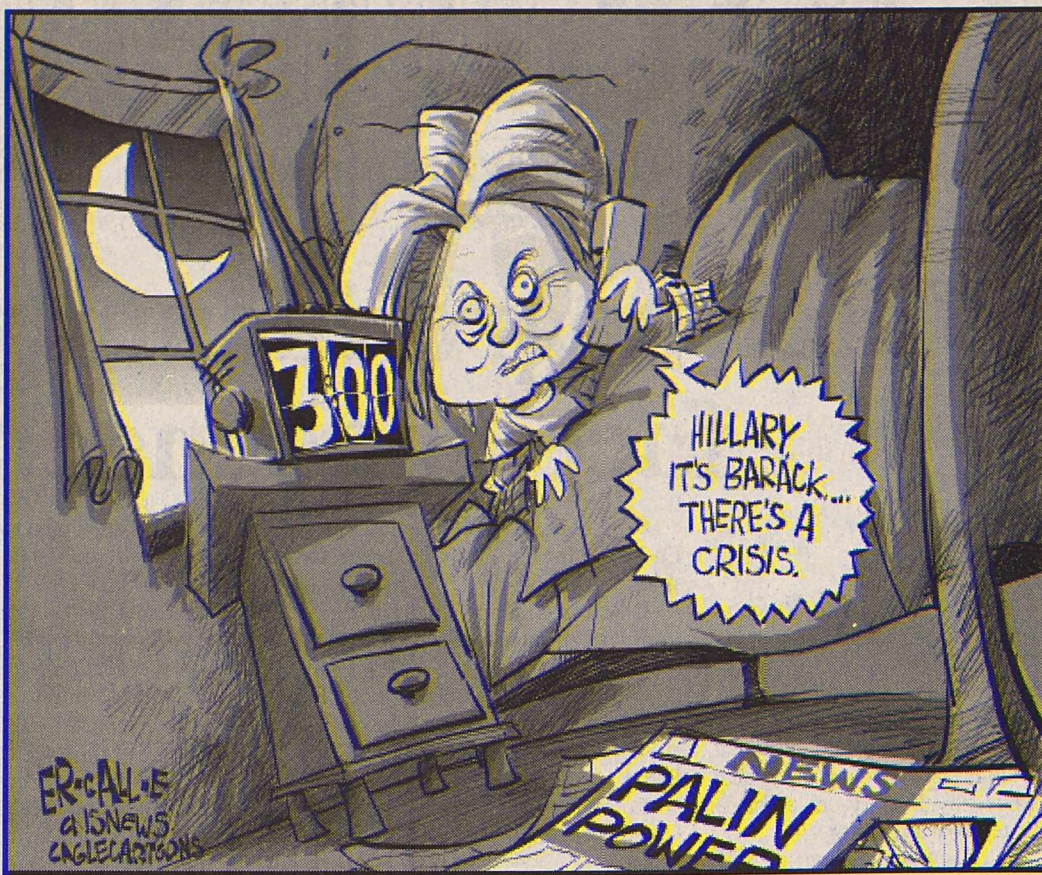
ible. Keep in mind, though, that a Section 529 savings plan could affect a beneficiary's ability to qualify for financial aid.

A Section 529 savings plan gives you, as the account owner, significant control over the money, so if the grandchild for whom you've set up the plan decides against attending college, you can transfer the assets to a different grandchild.

- Coverdell Education Savings Account — Depending on your income level, you can contribute up to \$2,000 annually to a Coverdell Education Savings Account (ESA). Your Coverdell earnings and withdrawals will be tax-free, provided you use the money for qualified education expenses. (Any non-education withdrawals from a Coverdell ESA may be subject to a 10 percent penalty.) You can place your contributions to a Coverdell ESA into virtually any investment you choose — stocks, bonds, certificates of deposit, etc.

If you'd like to give money to a grandchild, but you're not sure you want to designate your gift exclusively for education, you might want to consider opening a custodial account, commonly referred to as an UTMA or UGMA. You can fund a UTMA/UGMA with most types of investments, and, like the Section 529 plan, you can put in up to \$12,000 per year without incurring gift taxes. But once your grandchildren reach the age of majority (usually 18 or 21, depending on the state of residency), they can do whatever they want with the money from the UTMA/UGMA.

You may want to consult with your financial and tax advisors to determine which gifting methods are most appropriate for your situation. But no matter which route you choose, your generosity may well ensure that Grandparents Day will always have special meaning in your family.

I am a woman, a wife and a mother. What bothers you, most likely bothers me, too. I worry over my kid's grades, the bills, the price of gas and working for a living just like everyone else, but I also know that with owning this paper comes a huge responsibility to this community, so I am forced to be brave ask the difficult questions and print facts.

I think writing things down and publishing them in the paper is very hard, especially if what you are writing is negative and it's worse if you know that person. Ahhhhh, enter the dreaded Sheriff's Report.

The Sheriff's Report is the funniest thing in the world to read until you get a DWI and then the newspaper becomes the devil.

In the two plus years I have operated this paper, we have never omitted a name listed on the "Booking Log" (the actual arrest report). 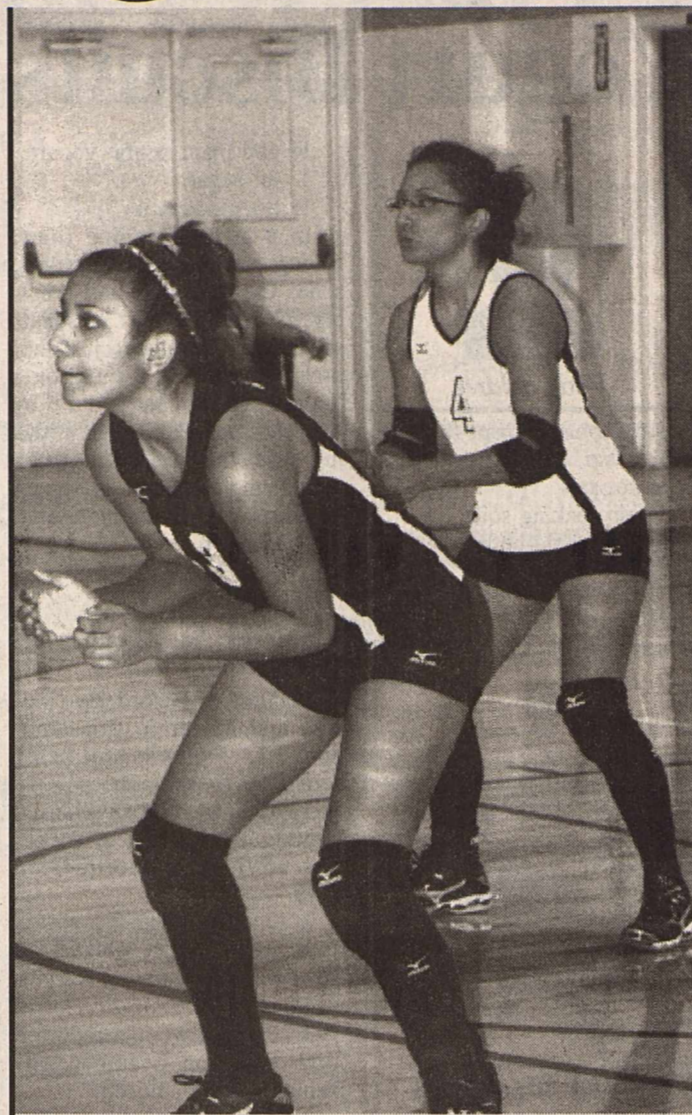


Tigers fall hard to Harper Longhorns

Mark Twain once said that "there are lies, damned lies, and statistics" the idea being that raw numbers, when not viewed in context can give one an incomplete or even an entirely inaccurate view of what happened in a given situation. That wasn't the case Friday night in Harper, though, as the unbeaten Longhorns rolled up over 500 yards of offense (most of it on the ground, never a good sign) en route to a 47-7 pasting of the Brackett Tigers. Oddly enough, the Tigers scored first on a one-yard touchdown plunge by Joe Anthony Sanchez about four and a half minutes into the game, a highwater mark for the Tigers, as it turned out. Harper owned

the night after that though, with touchdown drives of 70, 65, 77 and 93 yards (among others they had three more touchdown drives on the night, but those were the longest). After being shut out in the first quarter Harper racked up 20 points in the second, and a couple of touchdowns each in the third and fourth quarters (my apologies to the memory of Mr. Twain, who would have had no patience for all of the numbers that accompany your typical football game write-up).

The Tigers, 0-2 renew an old rivalry Friday night in Rocksprings against the host Angoras. As always, kickoff is at 7:30.

The Brackett Volleyball team brought home the championship trophy from the Pearsall volleyball tournament this past weekend.

The tournament began on Friday, September 5, with the Tigerettes facing Dilley, Pearsall, and Tilden in pool play games. When the day ended, Brackett had won 5 of 6 games and earned the number one seed for Saturday's tournament. Senior Becca Mann led the Tigerette attack with 11 kills, 14 aces, and 3 blocks. Sophomore Marisol Aguirre contributed 30 digs, while senior Bianca Terrazas added 21 assists to aid the Tigerette offense.

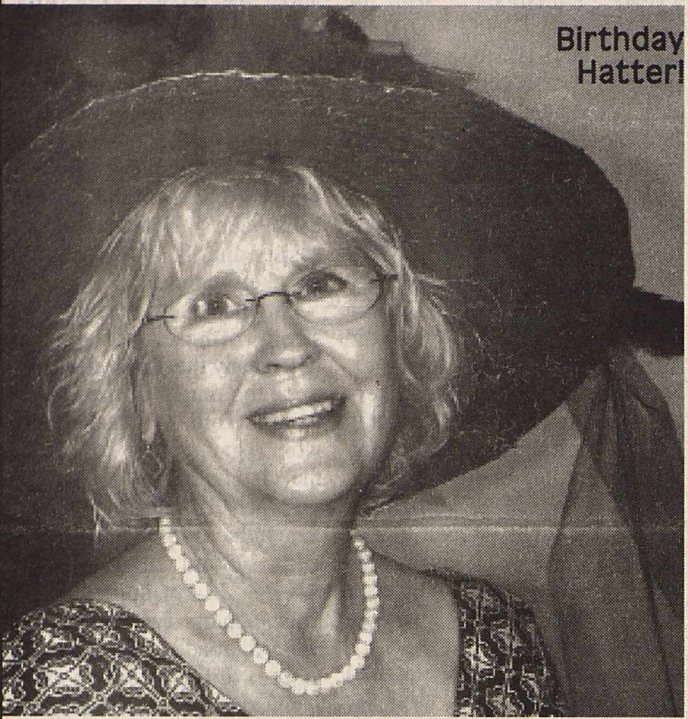

1/4 tsp. baking soda
2 Tbsp. cold butter

1/2 cup plain nonfat yogurt
1 tsp. sugar
