President Johnson's decision to not seek re-election left us politically stunned and wondering, as is most everyone else, what's to come next.

To say we were surprised at the announcement is like saying hog meat is pork. We thought our Bull Town Days TV set of some 18 months ago had gone berserk and had started telling falsehoods.

Frankly, we thought if there was ever a political cinch, it was that LBJ would seek election to a second term.

Speculation as to what is to come next is as varied as the number of people you listen to on the subject. We feel almost non-qualified to speculate about the future when we were so positive about LBJ's running again.

The only thing we know for sure now is that the next few months ---- between now and the November general elections ---- will be interesting politically.

You'd have to say, we think, that Johnson's elimination of himself helps the chances of all other candidates who are in the race now and who plan to get in at a later date, if any. Getting the favorite out just can't hurt any of the others, we'd say.

LBJ wants to go down in history as a wise and successful candidate.

If he can do the things he is attempting to between now and the end of his present term, certainly he will accomplish that goal, even though we may never be in a position to know exactly why he decided against another term.

Other candidates for the presidency will cease to be critical of Johnson's policies as they attempt to capture all or a portion of the votes of his followers now that he's no longer in the race.

We expect, too, that people who have been critical of the President will sing a different tune about him now. His image will be much greater when these critics start looking around for someone to replace him.

We're proud that Bovina High School still has a baseball team. This has been an uphill fight down through the years to keep the sport active on the high school level. Most schools the size of ours don't participate in the sport.

Bovina is, then, 'way ahead of the majority of the other schools in this respect. There are only three baseball teams fielded by Class A schools in this region, if we understand correctly. These are Bovina, Farwell and Silverton.

The fact that the game of baseball continues to thrive in the school system here is a tribute to the farsightedness of the school board, the administration and the faculty members of the athletic department, not to mention members of the community who are highly interested in the program.

The first game of the season played here was Thursday afternoon. The weather was almost ideal, which made viewing the action a pleasure.

The Mustangs of Coaches Gary Cox, who attended Sul Ross on a baseball scholarship, and Bill Nicholas, looked sharp in their new uniforms.

Impressive, too, is the number of boys out for the team. There should be a lot of competition for all positions on the starting nine.

The Bovina players looked and acted every bit as sharp as did the opposition from Class AAAA Plainview. The fact that Plainview won the game failed to dampen our enthusiasm.

And there was a respectable crowd on hand for the tilt, too.

Baseball's biggest handicap in schools ---- and this goes for colleges, too ---- is that school is our during the main part of the baseball season. Summertime is baseball season and there is no school then, of course.

The game will probably continue to be a minor sport in school systems, even large ones, until the Interscholastic League sanctions it for summer play, even though there are no formal classes during those months.

Voters Elect 3 Trustees

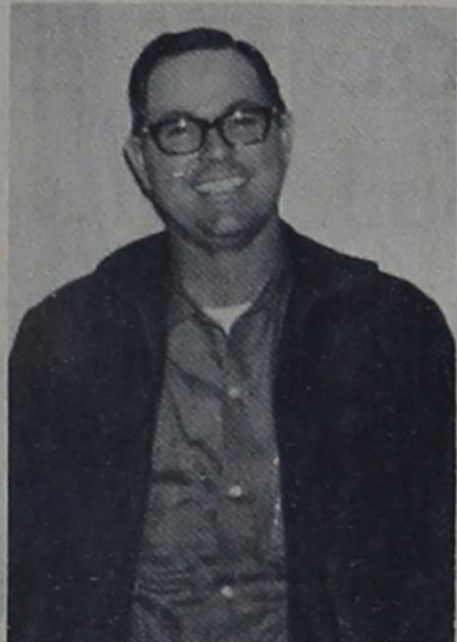

Killough Transfers; Moody New Foreman

Lloyd Killough, maintenance foreman for Parmer County Division of Texas Highway Department, will move to Muleshoe April 25 where he will assume the same duties and responsibilities of the headquarters there.

James Weldon Moody, assistant foreman here since 1962, will become maintenance construction foreman of the Bovina headquarters, according to an announcement from O.L. Crain, district engineer of Lubbock.

Killough will succeed Bud McMahan, who is retiring, at Muleshoe.

Killough joined the Texas Highway Department following his service during World War II. He came to Bovina in 1952 when this office was a branch of the Dimmitt headquarters. When section headquarters were set up here in 1957, Killough became the maintenance foreman.

Moody began working for the department in 1952 and spent two years service in the Armed

Forces. He continued his employment with the Texas Highway Department when he returned, and became assistant in 1962.

The new foreman is 35 years of age and is married. He and his wife, Julia Ann, have a daughter, Darla Elyse, and a son, Robb Dale.

Name Mayor, 3 Councilmen

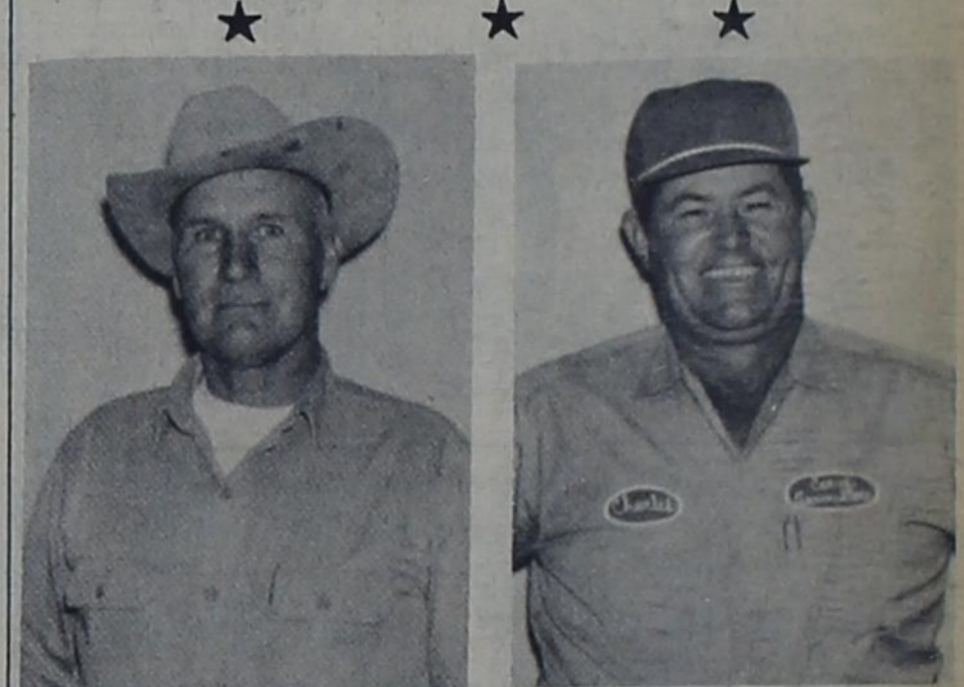

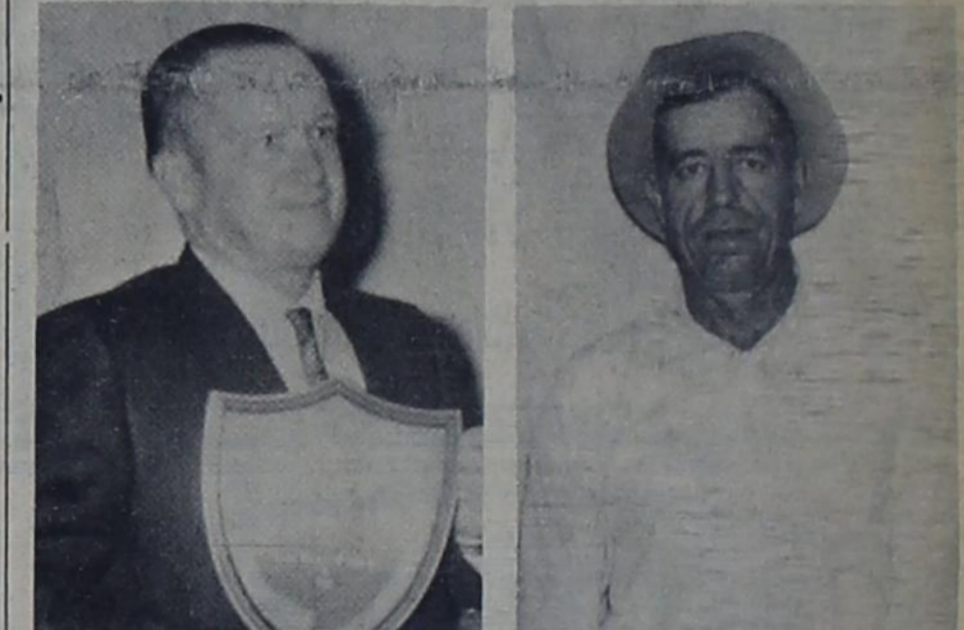
All registered voters living inside city limits of Bovina are eligible to cast a ballot in the election.

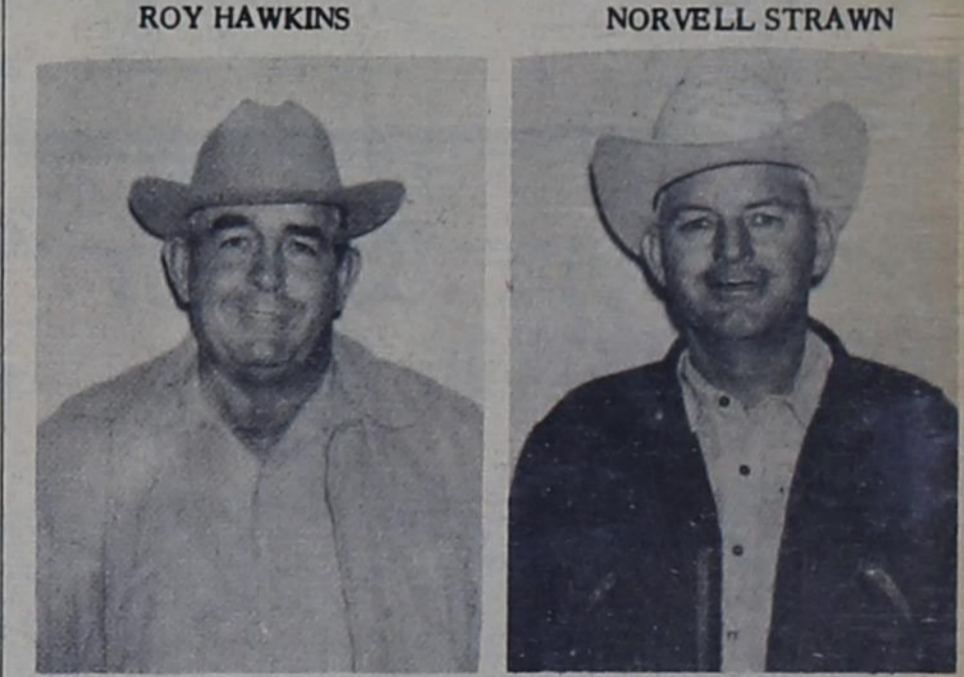

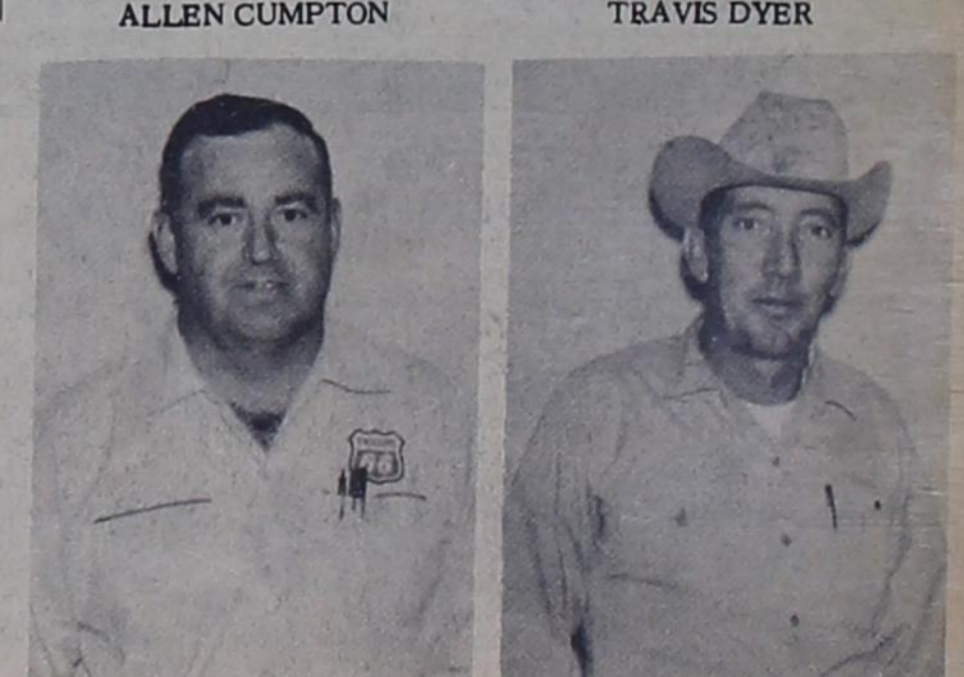

Baseball here and in most places is given a big boost through the organized play of young boys during the summer months.

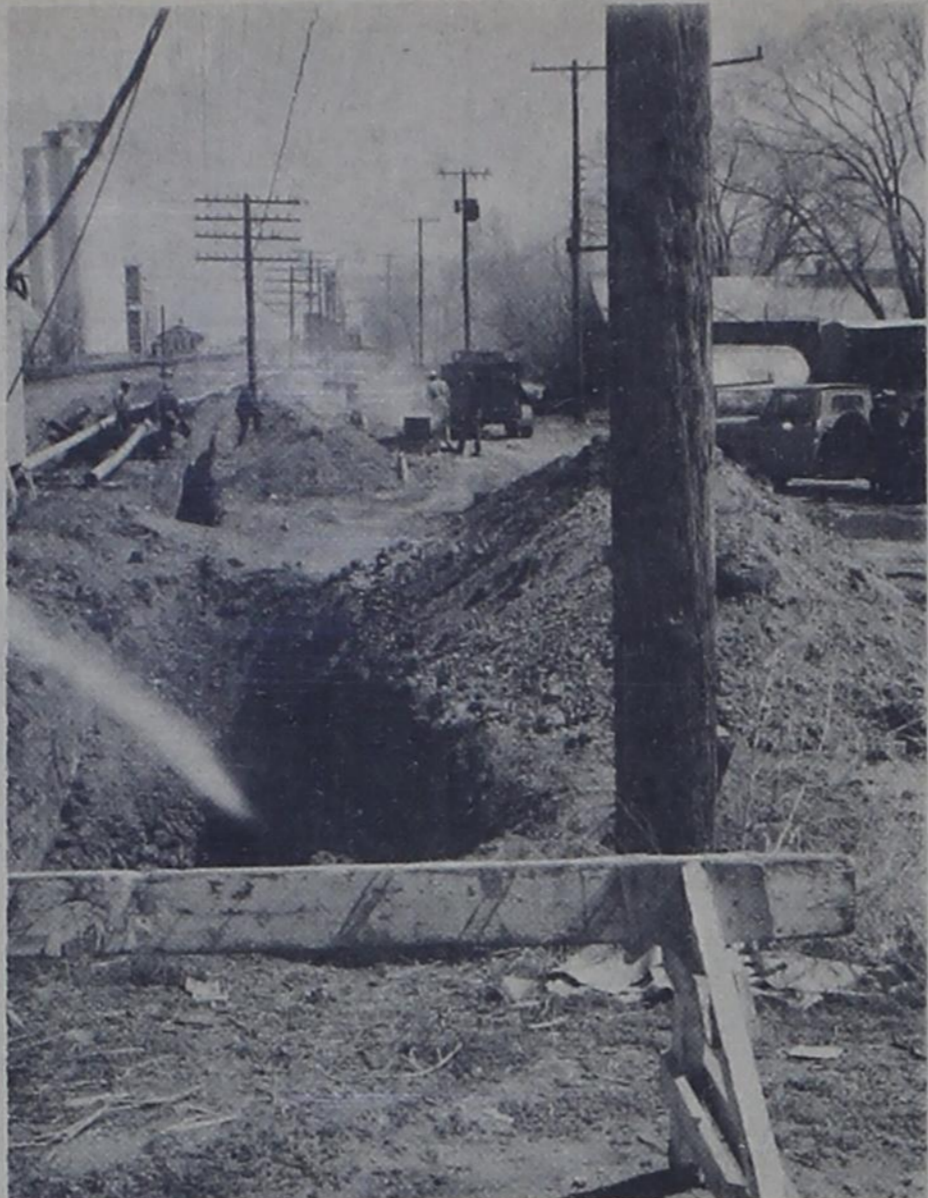
Maybe it would be good if we followed up that program with an American Legion team for boys in this area. The idea is certainly worthy of some thought.

Report From Sheriff's Office

Sheriff Charlie Lovelace reports that Red Barn Chemical at Lazbuddie was broken into some time Thursday night, March 28, and a large quantity of Treflon taken. Conference Held For Students

Senior and junior students in Bovina High School attended a Career Conference at Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church in Farwell Thursday afternoon.

Representatives from South Plains College spoke to the students on various occupational areas. Each student was able to attend five different sessions. The fields discussed included elementary and secondary teacher; all degree granting programs, such as pre-med, pre-law, pre-engineering, music, coaching, etc.; interior decorating and fashion design; business careers and computer programming; beauty culture; technical occupations, such as agri-business, metal trades, auto mechanics, irrigation technicians, radio and television broadcasting, radio and television repair, etc.

Purpose of a career conference is to acquaint students with the pros and cons of various professions in which they may be interested in entering.

Fire Burns Tractor

A tractor was badly damaged by fire Tuesday afternoon of last week when it was ignited by static electricity while being filled with butane at the farm home of J. C. Redwine.

Bovina Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene five miles southwest of Hub and extinguished the fire. The Redwines also gave the department credit for preventing the fire spreading to the barn or igniting the butane tank.

Although heavily damaged, the tractor is being repaired.

A grass fire Thursday near the Corn Farm Store fertilizer tank storage area and headquarters of Texas Highway Department resulted in only grass being burned. The fire began from sparks of welding equipment being used.

Likewise, he also wants a high production cotton along with that good turnout. But where will you find such a cotton? In '66 some of his cotton made 2 bales to the acre, and in '67 the field of 58.8 acres that was left made 1,004 pounds lint to the acre, net weight after deducting bagging and ties.

In looking through some experimental tests in which the new Gregg 45 has been included we find one on the Plains in 1965 with 1189 lb. production; one in Oklahoma in '65 with 1,066 pounds, with a 31.1% turnout handpulled; and one at Chickasha 1966 (dryland) with 777 lbs. This last mentioned is very impressive for dryland production.

College Meet Set Thursday

The counties included in the proposed region five on the junior college proposal of the Texas coordinating board for higher education will meet in Hereford at 7:30 p.m. Thursday.

Each of the four counties -- Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer and Oldham -- will have representatives of local and county government, chambers of commerce, school boards and other community leaders present for the meeting. Dr. Robert L. Clinton, assistant commissioner who is in charge of developing the proposals for the junior college system will be on hand to address the representative group.

The education committee of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce called the meeting so that the initial steps towards the eventual realization of a goal of the area may be taken. At this point no location for the junior college has been determined, according to Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce. Representatives present will elect a steering committee from each of the four counties to take over the fur-

Mrs. McCain said that women should always keep the point of interest around the face. A book display emphasized "mental improvement."

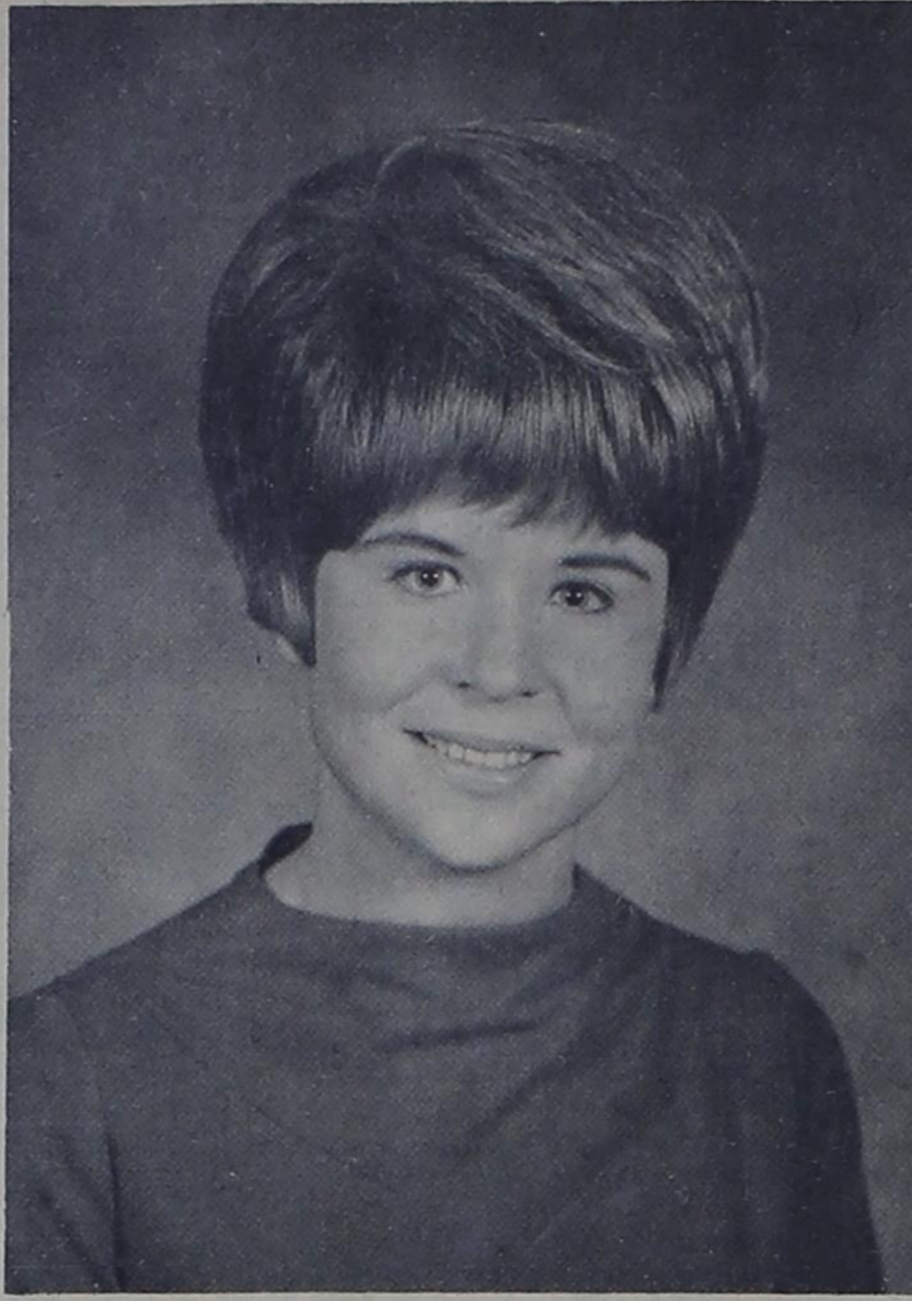
After answering 17 personality key questions, the women were told that "what you are shows in your face, so stay close to God."

The promise is given in John 7:17 that if we are willing to do God's will when we learn it that we can learn it. Prompted by the right motive search the Scriptures daily. Some search for justification of a practice already begun, while others search to learn what God would have them do. To please God, one must know His will, Ephesians 5:17, "Wherefore be ye not unwise, but understanding what the will of the Lord is." Jesus said that some searched the Scriptures because they thought a promise of life was given to them in the Scriptures, John 5:39, yet they had no hope because they rejected Jesus. One group was praised for studying the Word, Acts 17:11, because as Paul preached they searched to see if he was preaching the truth; he was, and so they believed. Surely everyone should search for the truth for by it we are made free, John 8:32, "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free."

Seeing that God does not overlook ignorance, Acts 17:30, "And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men every where to repent;" (See also John 15:22), we must not be mentally lazy, and expect someone else to study for us. If we allow another to study for us, it might be a case of the "blind leading the blind," Matthew 15:14. One could no more do another man's studying than he could his believing or repenting. To please God, one must do the will of God, Matthew 7:21, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven." Yet he cannot do it unless he knows it.

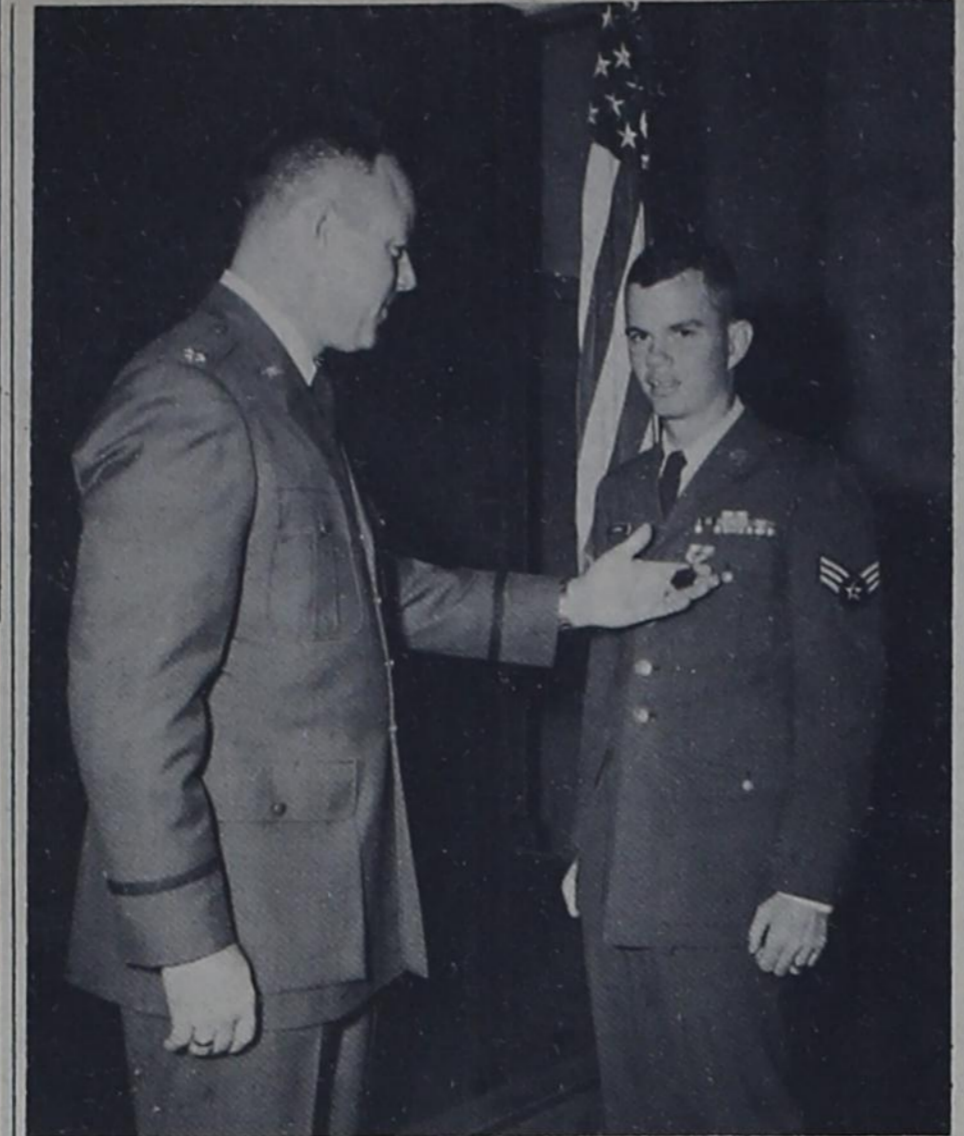

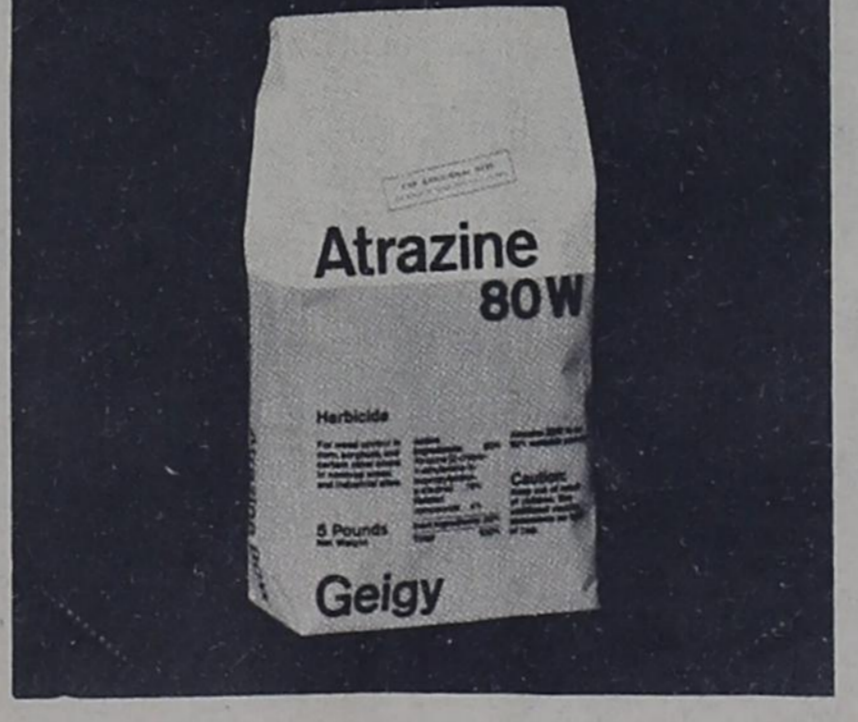
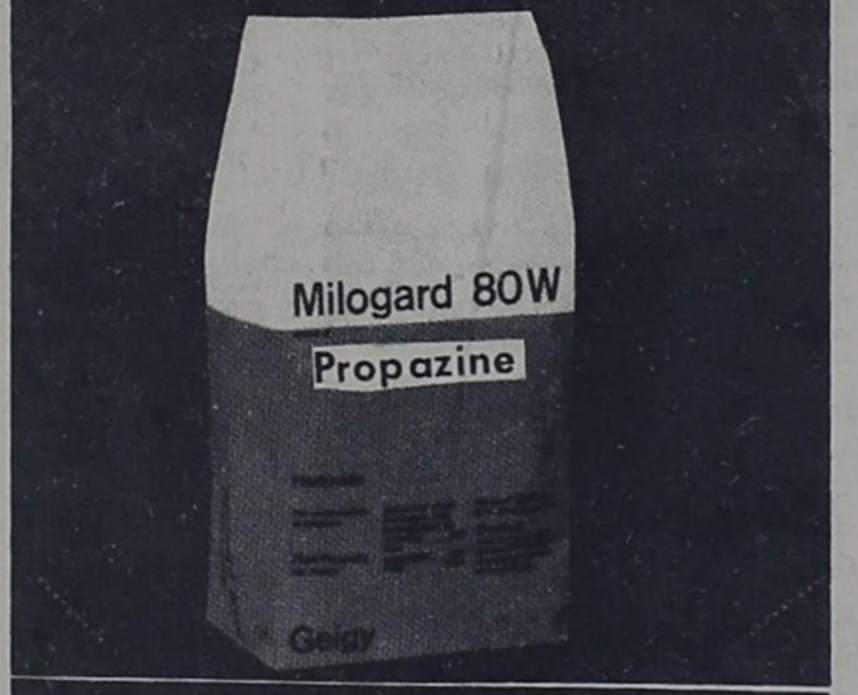

The Mustangs played Vega here today, and will meet Farwell there next Tuesday afternoon.

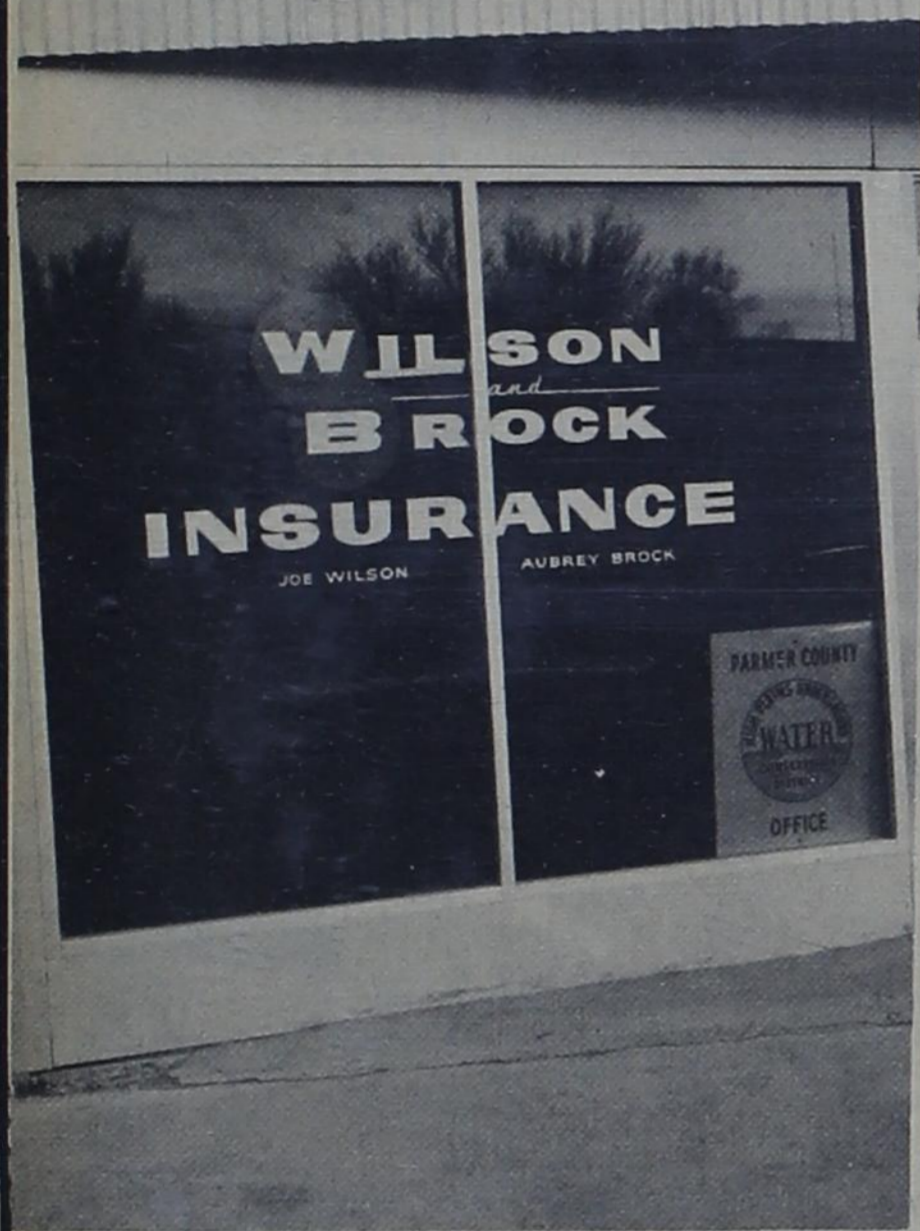
